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PEIA board approves 3% rate increases for 2027

West Virginia state employees will see another increase in their health insurance costs beginning this summer.

The finance board for the West Virginia Public Employees Insurance Agency on Thursday approved 3% rate increases for employees, employers and retirees during the 2027 fiscal year, which starts in July 2026.

The board last month held a series of public hearings around the state about its plan to increase costs again this year. The board approved the plan as presented during its October meeting, with no changes.

For state employees, a monthly spousal surcharge will increase by an average of \$200 per month. The surcharge is for families that have a spouse who chose a PEIA plan despite having the option of a health insurance plan offered by their own employer.

PEIA director Brent Wolfingbarger said the spousal surcharge increase was the most contentious topic during the meetings. Wolfingbarger said state law requires PEIA to charge families the cost of the actuarial value of the spouse's plan.

"The proposed spousal surcharge increase of \$200 is mandated based on the opinions given to us by our actuaries," he said. "So the Legislature has established this policy, and if any changes are to be made, that would be a legislative decision to make."

An employer administrative fee will increase by \$2.50

Non-state agencies would be required to have at least half of their employees enrolled in a PEIA health plan.

In July, PEIA raised rates by 14% for state employees and by 16% for local government employees. Retirees also saw a 12% increase in pre-

miums.

PEIA leaders have said that the rising cost of health care — particularly inflation on prescription GLP-1 drugs that treat obesity and diabetes — are a major driver of the rate increases.

Leaders have also pointed to a report from the firm BDO that indicated that the sharp rate increases that public workers have had in recent years had been caused in large part because between the years 2018-2022, rates had been frozen. Former Gov. Jim Justice had vowed not to increase the rates during his time as the state's chief executive.

Speaking to the finance board Thursday, Dale Lee, co-president of Education West Virginia, said the Legislature should take PEIA's rising costs seriously and make the spousal charge more fair for state employees.

"I know of people, service personnel, who are making in the first or second tier and paying the same amount for spousal surcharge as the superintendent, making \$180,000 a year," Lee said. "There's something wrong. There's something philosophically wrong, in my opinion."

Lee thanked the board for researching the spousal charge so that the public knows what the answer is.

"Now we know where to turn our attention, and we turn our attention to the Legislature, because that has to be changed," Lee said. "There are other things that have to be changed in this we are more than happy to sit down and start the discussions, be a part of the discussions, be part of the solutions."

HUD helped this disabled West Virginian get housing. Funding cuts could send people like him back into homelessness

The Trump administration is cutting funding for a program that keeps hundreds of formerly homeless West Virginians with disabilities housed. Organizers that help the homeless expect more people to wind up in jails, institutions and on the streets.

Robert Stewart used to live in Charleston. But, homeless since he was 16, he was always looking over his shoulder. Always in survival mode.

Then, he got help finding a place that gave him a roof over his head, outside the capital city in small-town Belle. There, he finally feels at home, feels like he can take his pit bull Bruce for peaceful walks. Everyone knows everyone there.

About three years ago, a local group finally helped him find a home.

Workers from the Kanawha Valley Collective found him in an emotional crisis, about to divorce, worried about how much he'd see his son.

"They had faith in me whenever I didn't," said Stewart, now 50.

The collective gave Stewart U.S. De-

partment of Housing and Urban Development rental assistance to get a roof over his head first. Then, they gave him a case manager to offer additional services, like help finding churches to pay for high utility bills, enrolling in health insurance and driving him to the grocery store.

For example, his case worker, Morgan Cottrell, drives him for visits with his 12-year-old child.

But now, West Virginians like Stewart could see the help that they need disappear, thanks to budget cuts and policy changes from the Trump administration.

Last month, HUD announced it was cutting funding for this kind of housing aid by 70%. About 850 West Virginians statewide will return to homelessness, according to the West Virginia Coalition to End Homelessness.

Traci Strickland, who oversees the Kanawha Valley Collective, which is part of the coalition, said the region's shelters are already full.

"You're going to have more people on the streets," she said. "You're going to have more people in emergency rooms, potentially more people in jail, likely in institutions."

Stewart worked on and off at resta-

rants, but hearing loss, vision problems and mental illness eventually made that impossible.

He gets a small disability check but wouldn't be able to afford his apartment

on his own.

"It is the only housing model that works"

November General Revenue Fund collections exceed estimates by \$28.M, up 10.5% from prior November receipts

The West Virginia Department of Revenue reported strong numbers for the month of November, with a \$28.5 million surplus and collections up 10.5% from the previous year.

“I’m encouraged by the growth trends in recent months that contribute to our FY 2026 surplus,” said **Governor Morrissey**. “West Virginia will continue making fiscally conservative decisions to capitalize on this growth and prepare for any budget challenges ahead.”

November General Revenue Fund collections of \$442.4 million were \$28.5 million above the nearly \$414 million monthly estimate and 10.5% above prior November receipts. Cumulative collections of \$2.231 billion were \$131.3 million above the year-to-date estimate of nearly \$2.1 billion and 6.2% ahead of prior year collections.

Personal Income Tax collections totaled \$171.0 million in November which were \$26.5 million above estimate. Led by wage withholding tax growth of 13.2 percent, monthly collections were 12.8 percent ahead of prior November receipts. Year-to-date collections of \$877.4 million were \$65.1 million above the estimate and 2.8% above the prior year’s receipts. Current tax rates are nearly 6% lower than tax rates in place one year ago.

Consumer Sales Tax collections totaled \$180.5 million in November which were \$11.7 million above the estimate and 5.7%, ahead of prior November collections. Cumulative collections of \$803.6 million were \$29.0 million above the cumulative estimate and 11.6% ahead of collections from the prior year. Cumulative collections included \$39 million in receipts associated with a recently enacted law eliminating a

payment acceleration requirement for certain Taxpayers. Adjusted year-to-date collections were 6.2% ahead of prior year’s receipts.

November General Revenue Fund Severance Tax collections totaled \$27.1 million as receipts were below the monthly estimate, but 43.5 percent ahead of prior November receipts. Year-to-date General Revenue Fund collections of \$127.8 million were \$4.7 million below estimate. However, cumulative collections were \$40.5 million, or 46.4%, ahead of the prior year’s receipts. A trend of higher coal and natural gas production along with higher natural gas prices were largely responsible for the revenue gain to date.

Corporation Net Income Tax collections totaled \$3.9 million in November and \$103.5 million for the year-to-date. Cumulative collections were \$1.4 million below estimate and 15.9 percent below prior year’s receipts.

Interest Income totaled \$12.6 million in November and \$66.1 million for the year-to-date. Cumulative collections were \$14.6 million above the estimate and 29.8% below prior year’s receipts due to a trend of lower interest rates. In addition to these collections, the State Treasury transferred \$20 million in excess banking service funds attributable to interest earnings in prior periods to the State General Revenue Fund in November. This transfer was a contributing factor to the \$28.5 million monthly revenue surplus.

Tobacco Excise Tax collections totaled \$10.6 million in October and \$56.8 million for the year-to-date. Cumulative receipts were \$4.3 million below estimate and 6.3% below prior year-to-date collections due to a trend of shifting consumption away from cigarettes to other tobacco and vaping products.

THIS WEEK IN West Virginia History

Dec. 10, 1841: Logan County preacher “Uncle Dyke” Garrett was born on Big Creek. His greatest fame was for converting and baptizing Devil Anse Hatfield in Main Island Creek in 1911.



Dec. 10, 1949: The first class of 20 cadets graduated from the West Virginia State Police Academy in Institute. The State Police purchased property for the academy on a hilltop overlooking Institute in Kanawha County for about \$3,200. Construction began in 1948, and the building was completed the next year.

Dec. 11, 1905: “Pare” Lorentz, known as

“FDR’s filmmaker,” was born in Clarksburg. In 1933, Lorentz created The Roosevelt Year: 1933, a pictorial review of FDR’s first year in the White House.



Dec. 12, 1931: Attorney George Daugherty, better known as the comic singer, storyteller and songwriter “The Earl of Elkview,” was born upstairs over a Mannington silent movie house.

Dec. 12, 1942: Internationally known jazz pianist and recording artist Bob Thompson was born in Jamaica, Queens, New York. He studied music at West Virginia State College (now University) and is the house pianist for the Mountain Stage radio program.

Dec. 12, 1953: Chuck

Yeager set a speed record by flying two-and-a-half times the speed of sound in a Bell X-1A. Yeager, who grew up in Hamlin, had broken the sound barrier six years



earlier on Oct. 14, 1947.

Dec. 13, 1861: The Battle of Allegheny Mountain, one of the bloodiest conflicts of the Civil War’s first year, took place in Pocahontas County.

Dec. 13, 1926: Wheeling radio station WWVA-AM began broadcasting. The 50-watt station operated from the basement of John Stroebel’s house for most of its first year. Stroebel was a physics teacher and wireless pioneer.

Dec. 14, 1910: The accidental death of a Chesapeake & Ohio Railway

engineer near St. Albans led to the popular train song “Billy Richard-



son’s Last Ride.”

Dec. 14, 1857: Coal operator Justus Collins was born. He owned mines at Glen Jean and Whipple, and the octagonal Whipple company store survives today as a local landmark.

Dec. 15, 1879: Roman Catholic Bishop John Joseph Swint was born in Pickens. He was responsible for building many religious institutions in the Diocese of Wheeling (now the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston).

Dec. 15, 1953: Black-


smith Jeff Fetty was born in Spencer and later graduated from Spencer High School. In 2012, he was named one of the world’s top metal designers by the International Metal Design Annual—becoming only the sixth American to receive the honor.



Dec. 15, 1967: The Silver Bridge at Point Pleasant collapsed, killing 46 people. The Silver Bridge was opened to traffic on May 19, 1928. The accident led to the passage of legislation for a national bridge inspection and safety program.

Dec. 15, 1972: An

explosion at a Weirton Steel coke plant on Browns Island killed 19 men and injured 10 others. It was the worst industrial accident in Weirton’s history.




Dec. 16, 1893: Alexander Martin died at the age of 71 in Greencastle, Indiana. Martin was the first president of the Agricultural College of West Virginia, which was renamed West Virginia University at his recommendation in 1868.

Dec. 16, 1897: The last public hanging in West Virginia occurred in Ripley. John F. Morgan had been convicted of murdering Chloe Greene and two of her three children in the Grass Lick area of Jackson County.
