Eric Lynn's hobby is a blast

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Some people fish; some people craft; some peo-ple play golf. Eric Lynn builds and launches highpowered model rockets as

Lynn traces his interest in model rocketry to growing up in southern California about 20

miles from Vandenberg Air Force Base. Rocket outside thinking "earthquake," and stay to watch

missile launches would shake the ground; neighbors would stream the massive trails of smoke in the sky. Lynn, his dad, and brothers took up model rocketry in the '90s, when high-powered rocketry

was just getting started, building from kits. It gave them an interest in common – something they could do together as a family. That's what piqued his interest in the hobby again as "something to do" with his almost 4-year-old stepson.

Lynn has been involved with competition shooting and reloading ammunition for several years, but his enthusiasm has waned over time. Learning there was as local model rocketry organization at Virginia Tech – New River Valley Rocketry (NRVR) where high-powered rockets can be launched, sparked his curiosity.

He started off building rockets with small motors from kits – ones that could be safely launched from his backyard, the driveway, or nearby fields. That led to extensive research and building more powerful rockets - and eventual certification in high-

powered rocketry. Since it's best practice to launch high-powered rockets through affiliation with a club, Lynn joined NRVR, which launches from Virginia Tech's Kentland Farms, and also the Valley Aerospace Team (VAST) in

northern Virginia near Monterey. Both groups host monthly launches (at least prior to CO-VID-19) for members. He is also a member of the Tripoli Rocketry Association (TRA).

The most recent NRVR launch at Kentland Farms in Blacksburg was on November 21 with both afternoon and evening sessions. NRVR members, students, and spectators spent a beautiful fall afternoon watching rockets lift off (with such powerful blasts that preschoolers needed earmuffs) and then drift slowly back to earth when parachutes deployed.

The evening session was a spectacular light show. Lynn launched three rockets while it was daylight and a unique spool spinner rocket after dark – which does just what its name implies - with glow sticks attached.

He says that model rocketry is not really a hobby familiar to, or available to, most. Supplies are usually not readily available locally. It can be an expensive pursuit; and there are

Thanksgiving Parade had to make some major adjustments due to the COV-ID-19 pandemic. The Bonsack students made some adjustments to their assignment, as well.

In past years, after reading the story, the fifth grade students at Bonsack would form groups and take on a "Design Challenge" of creating a "balloon puppet" to represent one of the traditional balloons in the parade

Vinton Town Council fills two leadership positions from within

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Vinton Town Council approved the appointment of a new town manager and chief of police at its meeting on December 1. Richard "Pete" Peters was named town manager, and Fabricio Drumond was introduced as the new chief of

"The Town of Vinton is in a unique position that will help set the stage for service to our citizens for the next several years," said Vinton Mayor Brad Grose. "The Vinton Town Council is filling two especially important positions in our town, namely, town manager and police chief. The fact that both positions of leadership are changing at the same time could have been a challenge of enormous portion. However, over the past few years, Vinton has attracted very qualified, talented people for many staff positions. Council had the opportunity to contemplate and evaluate some extraordinarily strong people within our own organization.

"Of course, Vinton Town Council approached this situation with prayer and careful consideration," Grose said. "While council could have advertised for candidates outside of our staff, it soon became obvious that the best people for the positions were already employed by the Town of Vinton. The existence of these highly qualified individuals in our organization

was not an accident nor a matter of good luck. The fortunate situation was the result of good planning and great leadership on the part of the two men who previously held the positions, former Town Manager Barry Thompson, and former Police Chief Tom Foster. They agreed that a strong line of succession and thorough peer training are essential to seamless transitions.

"As mayor, I want to thank Barry Thompson and Tom Foster for their leadership and foresight. Their hard work allowed Vinton Town Council to promote within our own staff. Thank you, gentlemen, may God bless you!"

During the meeting, council held a public hearing to consider public comments on the petition of Giacomo Montuori of New York Pizza for a Special Use Permit for a proposed indoor amusement use to be located at 700 Hardy Road, next door to New York Members had been briefed at

the council meeting on November 17 and the Vinton Planning Commission unanimously approved the plan at its own public hearing on November 19. Principal Planner Nathan McClung reviewed the specifics of the proposal for

The property was formerly a dry cleaning establishment, built in 1972, and zoned GB General Business District. In 2016, site plans were approved for the property for a drive-thru facility that would convert the vacant building into an ice cream shop and coffee shop. New York Pizza now intends to incorporate a new use into the existing structure under that umbrella that would include a family friendly arcade.

Council approved the SUP with two proffered conditions:

- None of the amusement or entertainment devices or machines associated with the use shall be "gambling devices" or "skill
- The petitioner must obtain approval on the change of use requirements from the Roanoke County building commissioner prior to use of the building for the commercial indoor amusement

The building has an estimated finished floor area of 3200 square feet. The parcel is accessed by three commercial entrances.

In other business, council recognized the CivicPlus Website Redesign Project Team - Town of Vinton employees Julie Tucei, Barry Thompson, Pete Peters, and Susan Johnson, and Roanoke County IT employees Chad Sweeney and Brian Gladden- as well as all departments' staff who coordinated with the project team, for being awarded the "Pinnacle Award" in the City/County Small Population Group (up to 50,000 residents) by the National Association of Government Web Professionals (NAGW). The award was announced at the organization's 2020 Virtual Conference in September.

This year the winners of the coveted award were chosen by the general membership through popular vote, rather than by the traditional awards committee.

NAGW membership includes IT, Design, and Communications (PIO) staff from hundreds of localities across the United States. According to Vinton Executive

Assistant Susan Johnson, "Winning a 2020 NAGW award is a resounding vote of approval by our web peers across the country. At its heart, NAGW is an organization of government web professionals working together to share knowledge, best practices, innovative ideas, and other resources." Council was briefed by Hu-

man Resources Director Donna Collins on extending the rollover accrual date for vacation hours for town employees from December 31, 2020, to June 20, 2021. Due to travel restrictions related to the pandemic, employees did not utilize time off as they normally would have. Extending the rollover date allows staff to retain those hours as vacation rather than being rolled over into sick time.

In the early days of the pandemic when the town feared revenues would be severely impacted, several positions were frozen with revisions to the town budget. Council has now adopted a resolution approving unfreezing and reclassifying several positions to improve efficiencies and service delivery to citizens. The Utility Service Operator position was unfrozen and reclassified to Financial Analyst. The Senior Financial Analyst position was reclassified to Assistant Finance Director. Equipment Operator I was unfrozen and reclassified to Project Manager. Certified Officer position in the police department was unfrozen and reclassified to lieutenant. The Assistant Town Manager position was unfrozen to fund Public Works separation pay and hire a new Public Works Di-

Council adopted a resolution approving and initiating the National League of Cities (NLC) Service Line Program. The program assists residents by providing an affordable solution to water and sewer line and indoor plumbing repairs or replacements. Property owners in Vinton will be able to enroll in the opt-in home warranty program, contacted in a direct mailing. Those choosing to participate will be billed by the company. If repairs are needed, the company sends out repairmen. The program is also educational in nature, as most homeowners mistakenly believe the town is responsible for the lateral water and sewer lines coming into their homes. In fact, the property owners are responsible for lateral lines off of the main lines, which the town maintains.

Vinton Chamber cancels Christmas Parade, makes alternative plans

The Vinton Area Chamber of Commerce board of directors has made the decision to cancel the 2020 Vinton Christmas Parade, which was scheduled for this Thursday, Dec. 3.

"This was a very hard decision and was not decided easily," said Chamber Executive Director Angie Chewing. "While we were hopeful we could host a parade in 2020, the board came to the realization that it was necessary to cancel the event, considering the governor's recent executive order limiting public gatherings and the ongoing uncertainty surrounding the coronavirus pandemic."

Despite the Vinton Chamber's decision to cancel the parade, there remain several other activities to celebrate the Christmas and holiday season throughout the Vinton community.

Town of Vinton Christmas Tree Lighting: Vinton Mayor Brad Grose and Vinton Police Officer of the Year Brandon Alterio will light the town's Christmas tree in front of the Vinton Municipal Building at 6 p.m. on December 3. 

Hughes Associates Architects and Engineers are providing architectural and civil engineering services for this project, developing the building and site plan. G&H Contracting Inc. will begin site preparation and building in the near future.

Bank of Botetourt is 121 years old; it was chartered in 1899 and operates 12 retail of-

fices in Botetourt, Rockbridge, Roanoke, and Franklin counties and the City of Salem. The company also operates a mortgage division, Virginia Mountain Mortgage, and a financial services division, Botetourt Wealth Management.

helicopter made its way to them, Drumond and the Marines of 1st MAP took the kids to the nearest major road to await the flight. When the helicopter arrived, the children were loaded up, along with a parent, and flown to a nearby hospital for further treatment.

"The biggest thing that I tried to do was to keep them smiling; I can't imagine how much it must have hurt,' he said. "They were just little kids, seven or eight years old. They were innocent, never did anything to anyone. They just wanted to play."

Drumond credited his ability to efficiently use basic first aid to the classes he received before deploying.
"We got a lot of first

aid classes over and over again and sometimes it got boring," he said. "But, I listened to the corpsman teaching because I had a feeling I might have to use it. Every Marine is a rifleman, and every Marine should know his first aid."

Drumond has been married for 10 years to Julianna Drumond and has two stepchildren, Dakota and Morgan, and one daughter, Athena.

many rules and regulations to follow. Some people are just hesitant about a hobby they perceive as

involving flammables. Decades ago, in the early years of model rocketry, it was considered a more dangerous hobby with metallic frames and mixing of dangerous propellants. Today, model

rockets are constructed of much safer materials - such as cardboard, plastic, fiberglass, and balsa wood - and the commercial motor manufacturers have made it possible for rocket modelers to buy motors eliminating the need to mix propellants or work with flammable materials.

Vinton Vice Mayor Sabrina McCarty and Councilman Mike Stovall, who are both Breakfast Lions, headed up the project. They worked with guidance counselors at Herman L. Horn and W.E. Cundiff Elementary Schools to select children to participate.

Twenty children were included this year, but were unable to accompany the Lions on the shopping trip due to COVID-19 restrictions.

About 10 Lions and vol-

unteers met at Walmart to purchase clothing, shoes, and coats for the students, who were also able to obtain one toy. About \$135 was allocated per child.

The Lions will also be helping several older students from William Byrd High School in the weeks before Christmas.

Members of the club will gather to wrap the gifts the first weekend in December at the Vinton Moose Lodge and then deliver the gifts to the schools just before winter break for them to take home to open for Christmas.

For many years, the Christmas shopping trip was headed up by Lion Galen Conner and his wife Laura. Originally the Lions did their shopping at the G.C. Murphy store in downtown Vinton which is no longer in business.

Lions Club International was founded in 1917 and is most recognized for championing the blind and visually impaired. The club contributes to eve research and conservation. They fund eye exams, eye surgery, and eyeglasses for disadvantaged children and adults.

The local Vinton Breakfast Lions Club was chartered in 1985. Chris Mc-Carty currently serves as president. While the members collect and sort used eyeglasses for distri-

School Board Chairman Wray recovering from COVID-19

Roanoke County School Board Chairman Mike Wray is recovering from COVID-19 following an eight-day hospitalization that began on November 22. Wray says he contracted COVID-19 in a community setting and not at a school or from any students

"At one point this was a very serious situation," said Wray. "My oxygen levels dropped significantly, and the medical staff had to take action. While my condition never became life-threatening, I was in bad shape for a few days. I'm incredibly grateful to Dr. Price and the staff at Carilion Roanoke Memorial Hospital for their care and helping me overcome this virus."

Wray says he's sharing his story because he wants others to take this pandemic seriously. "I now have first-hand experience with the coronavirus, and I can tell you it's nothing to take lightly. We have got to have the entire commu-

nity come together to beat this virus. We all must be serious and vigilant about wearing masks, being physically distanced, and washing hands. Our schools are doing a great job of this. It's time everyone in our community does the same thing. Trust me, you do not want this," Wray said.

Roanoke County Public Schools continues to encourage parents, students and staff to maintain at least six-foot physical distancing. All staff and students are required to wear masks in keeping with the governor's updated mask mandate. Additionally, students and staff are encouraged to wash hands frequently and use hand sanitizers that are placed throughout school facilities.

The district has implemented a comprehensive cleaning and disinfecting program with multiple levels of cleaning with an anti-viral solution throughout the day and weekly deep cleaning using electrostatic sprayers.

The district also asks parents to review the daily health checklist with their children each morning (www.rcps.us/covidchecklist), and strongly recommends parents keep children home if they are sick, displaying any COV-ID-19 symptoms, or have been exposed to someone with COVID-19.

School Board member Don Butzer shared the news from Wray during a School Board work session on December 1.

Dr. Rhonda Stegall, director of administration for RCPS, updated board members on the COVID-19 pandemic in the school system. She explained that there is no significant transmission of the coronavirus within the schools. No Roanoke County schools have recorded outbreaks. Local health authorities are anticipating an impact from the Thanksgiving holidays, however.

RCPS has recorded 248 positive cases among students and staff as of November 30. According to the data Stegall presented, there are 68 staff members and 317 students under quarantine.

In the William Byrd area, with a total of 3,769 students and staff, 51 have tested positive as of November 30, a percentage of 1.4 percent (positive cases relative to total students and staff). The Cave Spring area has seen the highest number of cases at 65 (students and staff combined), followed by Northside (63), the Byrd area, Glenvar (22), and Hidden Valley (17).

The student cases have come from community activity, Stegall said. She emphasized the need to "tighten up, follow protocols, and consistently reinforce" mitigation strategies. She also encouraged parents to be prepared with back-up plans in case the COVID situation worsens.

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Basketball practice opens Monday under COVID restrictions

Ready or not, high school basketball practices for both boys and girls are scheduled to begin next Monday, December 7. It's fitting that "Pearl Harbor Day" will mark the occasion, because most folks think there will be surprises to deal with due to the pandemic.

As of now the teams will be practicing under "Phase 2" guidelines. Each player must have their own basketball and there's no sharing or team play.

"We are planning to have tryouts beginning Monday as of right now," said Byrd boys coach Josh Cunningham. "To be honest, we are extremely limited in what we will be able to do. I'm still deciding on exactly what tryouts should look like. Every player has to have their own ball, no live competition, no one within six feet, no passing, etc. It makes it difficult. With that said, we want to do whatever we can for our guys, even if that looks like just continuing workouts similar to what we've been doing for the past couple of months."

Girls' coach Brad Greenway has been holding open gyms for those hopeful of making the team since October, when the guidelines weren't as strict.

"I use that term lightly because they are anything but 'open'," said Greenway. "We were allowed to share a basketball, do some team activities, but never actually compete against each other. There was never any offense versus defense but we could at least work some 5-0 and that type of thing."

When practice starts Monday Byrd will have to abide by Roanoke County rules.

"The governor and the VHSL have since opened everything up full go for December 7, but at the

same time the Virginia Department of Health is saying it's not safe for kids to play sports so Roanoke County has decided to go back to Phase 2 guidelines," said Greenway. "For basketball specifically, there is no longer any sharing of the basketball and we must remain 10 feet apart, wear a mask, etc."

Coaches must choose a team under these circumstances, and Greenway finds that impossible to do. "There's no way to hold a fair tryout under these

conditions, nor is there any way for us to play under the metrics that the VDH has set to determine it is safe," he said. "So, the bottom line is we will continue our open gyms under these restrictions until it's deemed safe to play or until they cancel the season officially."

Practices for high school wrestling, swimming, sideline cheering and indoor track are scheduled to begin on December 14.

Do as your toad

Today is day 264 AG, or eight and a half months "After Gobert" came down with the virus and the Utah Jazz walked off the court. Since then sports events have become a week to week adventure with few or no fans in the seats and many things being called off.

It's been better lately, at least for fans, with some decent stuff to watch on TV. I watch old Jack Benny and Groucho Marx shows on the Jewish station and every gangster or Nazi known to exist is on some channel or another late at night. But the "Triller" channel? Is that 24 hours of Michael Jackson dancing or what?

I found the easiest way to get the fight was on pay per view, and you could buy it for "only" \$49.99. If you think 50 bucks is a little steep to see two guys box whose combined ages are 105, join the club. I wonder if anyone actually signed up for that? Not me.

As most of you realize, Tyson is one bizarre character. Anyone who gets tattoos on their face is either a couple bricks shy of a load or planning to be in prison for a good number of years. From what I understand if you're in prison and you look really crazy they'll leave you alone. Never been there so I can't say for sure.

Tyson was at one time the heavyweight champ and a feared opponent, but that was many years ago. His explanation for his return to the ring is as strange as the man himself. He claims "Toad Venom" made him do it.

"I took the medicine, and the medicine told me to get into shape," he said, via USA Today. "It really blew my mind. It told me to come back and start getting in shape."

VHSL clarification

The Virginia High School League (VHSL) has clarified the difference between spectators and participants in regard to Virginia Governor Northam's new statewide measure to contain COVID-19. Specifically the VHSL has addressed the reduction from 250 to 25 spectators for in-person gatherings at VHSL sports and activities.

The reduction in public and private gatherings to 25 individuals applies to "spectators" and does not include participants at those events. The Governor's order defines "participants" as players, coaches, officials, school event staff and school administration critical to the operations of the contests, media, law enforcement, and medical services. Cheerleaders, pep bands, etc., and other student support groups, are counted as spectators in the limit of 25 allowed at events.

According to Amended Executive Order 67 guidelines for recreational sports, which emphasizes that sports activities are permitted but must comply with the following requirements:

The total number of spectators cannot exceed the lesser of 30% of the occupancy load of the certificate of occupancy for the venue, if applicable, or 25 spectators per field. Races or marathons may have up to 250 participants, provided staggered starts separate runners into groups of 25 or less.
