Band, sports, community help William Byrd student overcome obstacles

If you spend too much time watching the news, you may conclude that there aren't many really good people left in the world. I beg to differ. There are hard-working students with loving, supportive families, teachers who care deeply, and communities who rally around when there are challenges to overcome.

Case in point—Cadin Byrd, a senior at William Byrd High School, Class of 2023. Cadin has navigated his way through some serious challenges in his life with fortitude and determination, along with support from his parents, dedicated teachers and a soccer coach and team at Roanoke College.

According to his mother, Terra Byrd, "Cadin has over-come many battles in life, but he doesn't let that stop him; he has fought through every single one. Cadin and his twin sister Braelyn were born three months early and spent three months in the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU) fighting for

"In second grade, Cadin was diagnosed with Spastic Diplegia, which is extremely tight hamstrings," his mother says. "He used to wear braces on his legs but was able to come out of them in ninth grade because he was doing so well. Although his legs have improved, they still get tired easily and hurt after spending long hours on

That didn't stop Cadin from wanting to join the marching band at William Byrd High School. (He be-

gan playing trombone in sixth grade with much encouragement from Denise Aspell, Director of Bands at William Byrd Middle School)

Cadin expressed an in-

terest in being a part of the

marching band as an 8th grade student," said Dan Plybon, Director of Bands at WBHS. "We felt that, given his physical challenges, the front ensemble would be a good place for him to participate." Plybon and Marc Hinkle, another WBHS teacher with a music back-

Who knew—William Booth of Vinton wired the Mill Mountain Star

The next time you visit the Mill Mountain Star, stop and look at the plaque honoring William Henry Booth, the lead electrician when the star was constructed back in 1949. Booth and his wife Mildred lived on Bowman Street in Vinton for about 50 years.

worked Jefferson Electric Company in Roanoke, awarded the job of wiring the star, built by Kinsey Sign Company with assistance from Roanoke Iron and Bridge Works. Kinsey designed and erected the star; Roanoke Iron and Bridge Works designed the steel structure.

According to the City of Roanoke, the Roanoke Star was initially created to be a seasonal Christmas decoration shining over the city during the holiday shopping season. The Roanoke Merchants Association sponsored the project, and the star was supposed to be dismantled in 1950 after the holiday season. Instead, it still stands some 73 years later and has become a "regional icon" and popular

application for placement on the National Register of Historic Places explains further, "During the prosperous years after World War 11, the Merchants Association began thinking of ideas for decorations--

something elaborate that illuminated every would put Roanoke on the map' and increase trade in the city. Although nobody knows whose idea it was, Roanoke's Christmas Street committee is credited with the idea to build a huge neon star on top of Mill Mountain to tie in with the then-existing multicolored stars on the downtown streets. It was decided that the star would be financed through contributions made by downtown merchants. The final cost of the project reached a little over \$27,000." Now, it's priceless.

The application continues, "The citizens of Roanoke quickly fell in love with the giant neon Star and demanded that it remain of the year, and not just at Christmas, as was its original intent. Since 1949, the star has been painted, turned off, turned red, studied, argued over, suggested for removal, criticized, voted the number 'visitors attraction' and 'the place to take your mom,' loved, worshipped, and adored, and is turned on every night until midnight. For many Roanoke Valley residents, it is the symbol of being home, and for all, it is the symbol of Roanoke."

The star was so popular that it received nationwide attention, including coverage in Life Magazine and the newspapers of New York, Washington, Detroit, Memphis, Savannah, and even Australia.

The Mill Mountain Star is the most prominent freestanding, manufactured illuminated metal star in the world, visible 60 miles from Roanoke in the air. Roanoke became known as the "Star City of the South" after the star was first lit.

As for the specifics, the

Admission is \$6 for adults. Since this is a family-friendly event, kids under 12 enter free. This week's food truck is Mun-


sey's Smoke Shack. The volunteers assisting with this Mingle and giving back to the community are from Trinity Landscaping.

The Town of Vinton and The Vinton Messenger partner to put a spotlight on Town of Vinton employees during the month of their birthdays. The town is proud to have these individuals on staff and wants to make the community aware of who is "behind the scenes," making the town operate successfully.

The spotlight this week is on Patrol Officer Jesse Dibble. He was sworn in as a member of the Vinton Police Department in May 2022.

Dibble is a military veteran, having served in the United States Navy from 1994-1996. He has been a sworn officer since 2000 and started his law enforcement career with the Albemarle

County Sheriff's Office in an auxiliary position in court security. In 2002 he accepted a job with the Fluvanna County Sheriff's Office as Patrol Supervisor, Narcotics K9 Handler, SWAT team leader, and Field Training Officer.

Officer Dibble joined the Franklin County Sheriff's Office in 2013 when he moved to Roanoke. He served in an auxiliary capacity but stayed active in patrol and the Marine Patrol on Smith Mountain Lake.

He has a long history of public service, joining the Orange County Rescue Squad at age 14 as a junior squad member and running calls until he joined the Navy.

Dibble is the founder and

Director of the (Master Sergeant) George A. Bannar, Jr., Scholarship. Bannar was a high school friend killed in on in 2013 as a Special Forces Medic. The \$1000 scholarship is awarded annually to graduating JROTC cadets at Orange County High School.

He is also the co-founder and vice president of the "Queen City Rucking for 22," a veteran and first responder-based non-profit designed to align veterans and first responders with outreach programs to reduce veteran and first responder suicides.

Dibble enjoys spending time with his 11-year-old daughter and kayaking, hik-

ing, and fishing.
"The Vinton Police Department continues us make us proud every day by providing excellent, exceedingly professional service for all the citizens of our town,' said Vinton Mayor Brad Grose. "The VPD is fully accredited, which means the leadership and the officers maintain an extremely high level of integrity and operational excellence. 
Apple Music, Alexa, YouTube, or virtually anywhere you can listen to music.

Team Impact placed Cadin on their soccer team. However, "Cadin and our family have always been huge soccer fans. He is a Barcelona fan due to his favorite soc-

cer player, Lionel Messi." The coaches and past and present players are like family and continue to stay in our lives," Byrd says. "Our family looks forward to going to every game. Head Coach Ryan Pflugrad is a wonderful person and looks at Cadin like his own son. Cadin has all of the jerseys and gear, just like all the other players on the team. Also, an award named after him hangs in the men's locker room at Roanoke College. It's the Most Valued Player Award, known as the Cadin Byrd Award."

Pflugrad and the entire soccer program welcomed Cadin as the newest Maroon in September 2017 when he formally signed with the team. He had just gotten his hair back in and finished chemo. He was still doing radiation treatments for cancer that was

"Cadin was just a young man when he first joined the team. He was going through treatments and the stress that involves, but he has always maintained a positive attitude and great resilience, despite challenges he faced. He reminds us to have gratitude and not take anything for granted."

One of most special moments in my life and the lives of his soccer teammates was when Cadin announced to the team that he was cancer-free," Pflugrad said. "We have been excited to work with him in the Team Impact pro-

gram. We would have welcomed him anyway, but it was even more special because Cadin absolutely loves soccer and has so much knowledge about the sport." "Cadin is a special person to

be around. He is a 'man of few words,' but I have watched him grow and mature and watched his great qualities develop exponentially. I can hardly believe he is a senior in high school. I am excited for his future and hope he comes to Roanoke College and remains 'in and around the soccer pro-

Byrd says, "Cadin and his twin sister are seniors this year, and after graduation, they both plan to attend Roanoke College. The school is very dear to our family."

Coach Pflugrad says Cadin's family is always thanking him and the soccer team for their impact on Cadin's life, "but we thank them because Cadin has probably had a bigger impact on us than we have had on him."

Former soccer player Sam Rauf was on the Maroons team with Cadin. In a blog entitled "What. A. Moment," Rauf shared some of his thoughts about Cadin joining the team. "My favorite experience was not scoring a game-winning goal, beating school rivals, or even our team's trip to Barcelona. Even though all those things were amazing, I got to experience something that went far beyond the game of soccer in meeting a then 11-yearold boy named Čadin."

'Our first interactions with Cadin and his family came as he underwent the recruiting process, which included an official visit and tour of the college, an introduction to meet all the players, getting hooked up with some gear, and signing a letter of intent in front of the whole program," Rauf

"Throughout his battles, Cadin had received a signed hat from Lionel Messi [a member of the Barcelona team] as an incredible gesture since Barcelona is Cadin's favorite soccer team. I had thought celebrities such as Messi or other professional athletes giving back would be the only ones who could really impact someone in Cadin's situation. I extremely underestimated the effect Cadin joining our team was going to have on me and how much impact the team was going to have on him."

"As the season went on, Cadin's presence became more and more mutually beneficial. He became the closest thing I have to a little brother. We had an awesome secret handshake; we would celebrate goals in practice; he would lead the team out on the field for our home games; he even traveled with us to some away games, and his family would invite us over to his house to play video games." (The coach and team also traveled to Vinton to see Cadin perform with the Marching Terriers.)

Rauf says, "seeing Cadin became the best part of my and the team's day. All of a sudden, this complete stranger, who was 7-10 years younger than the team, started to have an immense impact on all of us. Seeing him as he was going through his treatment brought inspiration to us to have zero excuses. If Cadin could go through everything he was and still come to practices and games to be with us, we had no reason to complain about tough classes we had or how late we were getting back to campus after a game." "Cadin would wear his Roa-


noke gear to his school, and his mom would always tell us how excited he was to come join us in whatever we were doing. Luckily, our experience with Cadin did not stop there. There is nothing that gives me goosebumps as quickly as remembering the day Cadin walked into our locker room and told us he was cancer free!"

"Getting to see that massive smile on his face and the relief his family had after getting to know them so well so quickly made everything soccer-related completely minuscule."

The impact of the team on Cadin was immense as well. "As one of the last surgeries Cadin was going to have, he needed to get a port taken out by his heart that was used for injections of his treatment. On the day of his surgery, Cadin was rocking a Roanoke College soccer jersey so we could be with him. I think that says it

Terra Byrd says band and soccer have become a big part of Cadin's life, and "he enjoys every second of it. Everyone who comes in contact with him says that he has the best smile and attitude. I have had band kids tell me that when they see and talk to Cadin, it makes their day better."

See, good people are out there meeting challenges and helping others beat challenges.



88.5-ft. tall, 10,000-lb. Star is mounted on a 60,000-lb., 100-ft. steel tower. The eight-story high steel tower rests on a base of 500,000 pounds of concrete. Originally lighted with light bulbs, the Coming Glass Works later manufactured two thousand feet of neon tubing.

The Mill Mountain Star wasn't the first construction project on the mountaintop. A wooden observation tower was built in 1910 but blew over the next year. In 1914, a 90-foot-tall wooden tower with shingles was erected, which allowed spectators mountain views all the way to the Peaks of Otter. A searchlight was added, but the tower was destroyed by fire in 1936 and never rebuilt. In 1957, the Roanoke Valley Citizens

Traffic Safety Council persuaded the Merchants Association to burn the star red to acknowledge traffic fatalities in the city. That 15-month trial period turned into 17 years. When a traffic fatality occurred, the police called the Kinsey Sign Co., which dispatched a man to throw the switch at the base of the star, and after a two-day mourning period, he returned to turn it off." "One exception was the lighting of the

star for three nights when President John Kennedy was assassinated in 1963 and five nights after the crash of the Challenger space shuttle in 1986. The star was turned off in voluntary compliance during the energy crisis of 1973."

In 2001, City Council changed the colors to red, white, and blue to honor those affected by the attacks on September 11. In April 2007, the star stayed white for over a month to honor the victims of the Virginia Tech shooting and then went dark a year later, on April 16, in remembrance of the shootings at Tech.

But back to its beginnings. The Mill Mountain Star was lit for the first time at 8:22 p.m. on November 23, 1949, by Roanoke Mayor A. R. Minton, with fewer than 100 people in attendance due to the cold weather and the Thanksgiving Holiday coming up the following day.

William Booth's daughter, Glenda, remembers watching the Mill Mountain Star being lit for the first time that night in 1949 when she was just five years old and her brother William Booth, Jr. (Bill) was five months old. The lighting of the giant star was "magical" and made even more so since her father was the lead electrician who had wired it. Glenda, her brother, and others in the

Roanoke Valley have heard different versions of the lighting ceremony. Glenda says it always annoyed her mother that all the officials there were praised, but the workers, including the electricians, were never recognized. While news stories credit the mayor with flipping the switch to turn on the star, the truth might be that his switch was fake and that Kinsey and Booth were in the woods with the actual power switch.

William Booth was born in Franklin County on New Year's Day in 1911. He and Mildred were married in 1940 and remained married for 57 years until his passing in August 1997. They both grew up on farms in the Hardy area. The Booths built the

Vinton Bowman Street house for about two years and moved there in the early 1950s.

Bill Booth says his father was a self-taught electrician and used what he had learned to "help electrify the South," serving in the Civilian Conservation Corps in the early 1930s. After traveling all over the South with the CCC, he got a job with Jefferson Electric, where he remained until he retired

In 2007, with the blessing of Roanoke City Parks and Recreation, Glenda and Bill sponsored the plaque placed beneath the star recognizing their father's talents and contribution to the Roanoke Valley. The family also wished to pay tribute to all the steel workers, excavators, and other laborers who did the actual construction of the star. They also transplanted some boxwoods

from the family home in Vinton to be placed next to the plaque. Those boxwoods started from sprigs rooted at Booth's parents' farm in Franklin County at least 100 years ago. Over this past summer, the family


worked with Laura Reilly, Roanoke Parks, and Recreation's Landscape Management Coordinator, to add new boxwoods where some of the original plantings had not The Booths chose boxwoods because

their father was a "blue-collar man with no frills and a boxwood was similarly 'no frills." Bill and Glenda Booth have expressed

their gratitude to Reilly, who "understood what we wanted and was generous in helping us accomplish it."




