Vinton Town Council continues discussion on transportation safety projects

Vinton Town Council continues to meet in a variety of settings to discuss proposed transportation projects to ensure the safety of the town's

In March 2022, the town hosted a public meeting to gain citizen input on the Town of Vinton Route 24 Bike/Pedestrian Plan. The meeting covered recommended improvements to enhance biking and pedestrian accommodations

along the "loop' of Washington Avenue, Bypass Road, Hardy Road, East Virginia Avenue, South Pollard Street, and the neighborhood streets within that area. Proposals included adding sidewalks, high visibility crosswalks, traffic calming measures, wayfinding, large in-street stencils, signalized intersection enhancements, crosswalk enhancements, and lane

reconfiguration. At a Town Council meeting on July 16, 2022, discussion of transportation issues continued with a request from Vinton As-

sistant Planning and Zoning Director Nathan McClung for council to adopt a resolution authorizing the town manager to file an application for VDO I SMART SCALE funds for a possible roundabout project at Hardy Road/Bypass Road with the application due on August

1. The resolution was approved. The grant would fund the conversion of that intersection from a signalized intersection to a two-lane roundabout, fa-

Ever since butter was discovered (rumored to be by accident when nomads transporting milk in a sheepskin bag on horseback found it transformed into butter), people have invented different ways to convert milk or cream to butter. The oldest form of butter churn is

the Swing Churn or the Rocker Churn, dating to 6,500 years ago, similar to the way the first butter was rumored to be made. By rocking back and forth, the agitation helps form the cream into butter. In the 19th century, it was incorporated into more complex methods of churning butter.

The most common or well-known method to churn butter is with the

Dash Churn, also known as the Plunger Churn and the Scottish Churn. It dates back to the 6th century in Scotland and possibly even earlier, though the inventor is unknown. It became obsolete in the 18th century when better and more complex options became available. One of the newer ways to churn but-

ter is the Crank Churn, popular from mid-18th century to mid-19th century. It was easier due to simply cranking instead of physical labor, like the other

Easy Apple Dumplings Here's an easy recipe for Apple Dump-

lings that make it look like you really know how to cook: Ingredients:

- 1 and ½ cups sugar 2 cups water
- ½ tsp. cinnamon, divided
- ½ tsp ground nutmeg, divided
- 1/4 cup butter or margarine Another 2/3 cup sugar
- 2 (15 oz) packages refrigerated piecrusts
- 8 medium apples (Braeburn, Golden Delicious, Granny Smith), peeled and Another 3 Tbsp. butter or margarine,

Directions: Bring 1 and ½ cups sugar, 2 cups water, ¼ tsp. cinnamon, and ¼ tsp.

nutmeg to a boil over medium-high heat, stirring constantly. Reduce heat to simmer and stir occasionally for 10 minutes. Remove from heat; stir in 1/4 cup butter. Set syrup aside. Combine the other 2/3 cup sugar, the

remaining 1/4 tsp. cinnamon and remaining 1/4 tsp. nutmeg. Cut piecrusts in half and roll into 8-inch

circles. Place 1 peeled and cored apple in the center of each circle. Sprinkle evenly with sugar mixture. Dot with 3 Tbsp. butter, divided.

Fold dough over apples, pinching to seal. Place in lightly greased 9 x 13 baking dish. Drizzle with syrup. Bake at 375° for 40-45 minutes. Serve with vanilla ice cream, if desired. You can easily cut this recipe in half.

NIMO Teams are often mobilized to manage remote fires with complex logistics. Zeph Cunningham, originally from Vinton and the son of Jim and Judy Cunningham, served as Deputy Incident Commander

Both Complexes were located in remote wilderness areas along the U.S.-Canadian Border in the northwest corner of North Cascades National Park Service Complex and the Methow Valley Ranger District of the U.S. Service-Okanogan-Wenatchee National Forest.


The team was tasked with not only managing the fires but developing strategic plans and recommendations for long-term

Remembering Vinton 50 years ago in September 1972

There was lots of breaking news in Vinton in September 1972. Not one, but two, houses fell victim to automobiles rolling out of control. One incident was caused by a two-year-old left in a parked car and either releasing the brake or putting it in gear. The car subsequently rolled down a hill, across an intersection, and into a neighboring home. Strangely enough, a small child entering a car caused the second accident as well.

A Vinton youth and three juveniles were arrested on charges of glue sniff-

ing from tubes of model airplane glue. They were also charged with drinking alcoholic beverages while underage. The police had the young people under surveillance due to information from a local merchant who reported an unusually large amount of glue being purchased repeatedly. The youth was addition-

ally arrested on a Peeping Tom charge after a complainant reported someone on the roof of Jack's Pizza Place on Pollard Street peeping into apartment windows.

During the second week of September 1972, a couple was charged with forgery at the General Finance Corporation in Vinton. Vinton Police Detective Steve Goodwin was in charge of the investigation.

He was also tasked with investigating the death of a Vinton woman killed in an explosion and fire at the Holyfield Food Company on Walnut Avenuea wholesale distributor of pre-packaged foods. The fire was thought to have been caused by fumes in the office where painting was being done and ignited a spilled container of gasoline.

The month of September came to a close with two fires reported in Montgomery Village. Both were unfinished homes. One was the result of arson. The second home had been occupied by workmen during the day.

The Vinton Municipal Pool closed on Labor Day, as was the tradition. The summer of 1972 was one of the pool's most successful seasons.

The Oren Roanoke Corporation of Vinton joined with its parent company, Howe Fire Apparatus Company of Anderson, Ind., to celebrate their 100th anniversarv.

The Terriers defeated the Clifton Forge Mountaineers who had been "touted to win the Blue Ridge District Championship" with a score of 16-0. The win moved Byrd to second place in the district. The Tootin' Terriers presented a special half-time show featuring aspects of their summer trip to Mexico. Town Manager Don

Smith reported to Town Council that 10% of the town's budget was being used for garbage operations. In 1972, it took three trucks and 10 employees to keep 150 tons of garbage moving daily. Part of the problem was a housing construction boom. The town was awaiting approval from the state for its 18-acre landfill site on 3rd Street. The site was owned by the town (6 acres) and Henry Brabham (12 acres), who was allowing the town to use it.







Feeding Southwest Virginia held a community roundtable for Hunger Action Day Sept. 22 at its distribution center and administrative offices in Salem.

During the event, the organization's new mission was discussed. The mission now reads: "Nourish neighbors. Engage community partners. Develop solutions to address food insecurity."

The roundtable was led by Pamela Irvine, president and CEO of Feeding Southwest Virginia. The conversation focused on the three components of the new mission.

Town Manager Pete Peters defined the pur-

reducing traffic backups in pose of the workshop as enhanced transportation planning for the next 10 years" to improve safety for citizens in Vinton and facilitate travel for those

passing through the town. He commented that Vinton and the surrounding areas are growing, and that growth will naturally impact traffic in the area. Changes will have to be made to accommodate the growth, even though change can be difficult and even controversial. The workshop covered traffic safety issues facing pedestrians, motorists, and bicyclists.

Peters noted that currently the town is working to coordinate all of the traffic signals in Vinton, to improve the traffic flow through town with synchronization through signalization.

Town staff invited Transportation Division Manager for the City of Roanoke, to describe several transportation projects within Roanoke City focused on public safety. Andrea Garland, Director of RIDE Solutions from the Roanoke Valley-Alleghany Regional Commission (RVARC) was also invited to the meeting to speak about public engagement with projects and outreach strategies. Both emphasized the importance of obtaining citizen input and their subsequent support when making transportation decisions.

D'Ardenne spoke in depth about a recent transportation project on Brandon Avenue near

The city decided to modify the existing travel lanes in each direction to include a center turn lane and one bicycle lane in each direction. Data indicates that pedestrians are able to cross more safely with only one lane of traffic in each

direction. The stretch of Brandon Avenue that was modified had a seven-year history of 182 crashes, 37 injuries, and two fatalities. In May 2020, a vehicle struck two pedestrians crossing Brandon, killing one and seriously injuring the other.

Prior to undertaking the Brandon Avenue project, the city used an online survey to determine whether residents were in favor of the three-lane configuration. Sixty-three percent were in favor of the changes. Seventy-five percent of those with disabilities favored the change. Eightythree percent who walked the corridor indicated support of the change, along with 92% of bicycle riders. Traffic flow tests were

conducted. Motorists, pedestrians, and bicyclists were interviewed. Traffic signal timing was coordinated. Eventu-

ally the lanes were repaved and restriped as part of the

Council members asked town staff to continue conversations with Roanoke City regarding cooperation on Gus Nicks Boulevard enhancements from Route 460 through to Garthright

"Nothing is imminent, although we plan to discuss speed limit, crosswalks, and compare paving schedules for opportunities to partner on that corridor over the next several years," said Peters.

Plans are currently in the works in Vinton for a signalized crosswalk on Gus Nicks near Gish Mill, a wide stretch of road dangerous for walkers to attempt to cross, but which will soon be a greenway connection.

The workshop concluded with a tour of the Towers Mall/Virginia Western area in Roanoke City to look at pedestrian safety improvements, traffic calming, and roundabouts (there are three at Virginia Western). Several projects have been completed in the area recently on Colonial Avenue in front of the mall and on Brandon Avenue below the mall to improve traffic flow and public safety for all groups-motorists, pedestrians, and bicycle riders.

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Terrier football returns after bye week to face Cave Spring

Death of Knights' assistant and former Byrd coach puts dark cloud over Homecoming festivities

The William Byrd football team will return to the gridiron Friday with a game at Bogle Field in south Roanoke County against Cave Spring. The Terriers had their bye last week, giving them two weeks to prepare for the county rival Knights.

"We had a great week of practice," said Byrd coach Brad Lutz. "We worked on a lot of fundamentals so we can continue to improve each week."

Friday will be Cave Spring's Homecoming game, which usually provides some distractions, but this week it will be especially challenging for Knights' coach Nick Leftwich to keep his players focused on the game. On Monday Cave Spring assistant coach Chris Askew died unexpectedly, leaving the entire valley football community in shock.

Askew's death hit the William Byrd family especially hard, as Chris was an assistant football coach for the Terriers for 15 years, as well as being a physical educa-

Chris leaves three children, including a senior who is a member of the Homecoming Court for Cave Spring this Friday. Graelyn, who is also a cheerleader, plans to go through the Homecoming festivities in what promises to be a very emotional night for folks on both sides of the field.

"He was a good friend of mine," said William Byrd athletic director Jason Taylor. "He taught both of my kids and I tried to get him to apply for the football job here when Jeff left but he wanted to stay close to his kids. I offered to do whatever they wanted as

far as moving the game this week but they said they wanted to get the team back on the field as soon as possible."

There will be a Memorial Service for Chris this Sunday at Cave Spring from 11 am to 3 pm and the public is welcome.

As for the football game, the Knights were enjoying their best start in years before this tragedy put a damper on the season. Cave Spring comes in at 4-1 in Leftwich's second year as head coach. They shut out their first two opponents, 37-0 over Hidden Valley and 30-0 over Northside, before losing to Glenvar in a close one, 10-3. In the past two weeks they won at Alleghany, 34-7, and last week they beat Pulaski County at Bogle Field

Last Friday was the

first time since 2014 the Knights beat Pulaski County. Their 4-1 start is the best since 2011 when they finished 9-4 and won two playoff games.

"They're a solid football team," said Lutz. "They're playing with a lot of confidence, and that is very important in being successful. They are coming off a big win over district opponent Pulaski, so they will have a lot of momentum going into our game."

Byrd comes in at 1-3 and this will be the Terriers' last non-district game before taking on the five Blue Ridge District schools, beginning with a trip to Lord Botetourt next week.

Today the jayvees will host Cave Spring at 6 pm at Patterson Stadium and the middle school is at Hidden Valley for a 5

Abingdon and Lord Botetourt will advance to the Class 3 state tournament at the Stonehenge Golf and Country Club





Volleyball team will try to make it three in a row at Northside tonite


