

Garthright Bridge maintenance begins Nov. 7

Beginning on Monday, November 7, the contractor for the Town of Vinton will begin the rehabilitation of the Garthright Bridge on Gus Nicks Boulevard which spans the Norfolk Southern Railroad tracks. According to Assistant

Town Manager Cody Sexton, "this is a town project that we are doing to invest in our infrastructure." The town anticipates the preventive main-

tenance project lasting from 60 to 90 days. Motorists will experience lane closures and possible delays during the project. "When planning the work of major con-

struction projects, such as the work on Garthright Bridge, town staff take many different factors into consideration," Sexton said. "Cost to taxpayers, complexity and duration of the project, impact to the traveling public, and availability of contractors are just some of the items we take into account when working with our contractors to plan the project.""Nighttime construction is more expensive and more restrictive

than daytime construction," he added. "Unlike some of the other projects going on in town, the Garthright Bridge Project is 100% locally funded. This means that town staff gave extra weight to trying to make the project as affordable as possible without sacrificing any of the necessary construction costs. We opted to have daytime construction in order to be better stewards of taxpayer money and give our citizens the best bang for their buck.""We recognize that this project will be an inconvenience while going on and ask for patience during the construction. Just like going to the doctor for a checkup, a little bit of inconvenience now means we will avoid much more expensive and longerlasting projects in the future. We hope that our citizens see this and all the construction projects in Vinton as a mark of their town working for them. The town appreciates your patience as they work to improve the safety of the roadways in Vinton.'

William Byrd Navy Cadets visit D-Day Memorial

Cadets from the William Byrd High School Navy National Defense Corps (NNDCC) traveled to Bedford to visit the National D-Day Memorial on October 27.The cadets were able to learn about the events that led up to the epic invasion, named Operation Overlord, to overthrow Adolf Hitler, ending Hitler's dream of Nazi domination of Europe. Overlord was the largest air, land, and sea operation undertaken before or since June 6, 1944. The landing included over 5,000 ships, 11 thousand airplanes, and over 150,000 service men. The field trip lasted approximately two hours and the D-Day Memorial offered a hands-on interactive learning experience for the cadets.



Perhaps we learned it in the principal's office after committing a misdeed or when a traffic court judge determined the fine for our traffic infraction. But at some point, we all learned that our actions have consequences.

corn sheller is a hand-held device or piece machinery used to shell corn kernels off the cob for feeding to livestock or for other use.

The operation of a corn sheller is similar to a threshing machine, but with some differences to deal with larger grain size and other differences of corn compared to wheat and other crops. Corn shellers can be powered by a hand crank, a tractor, a stationary engine, or by an electric motor.

Whole corn cobs are fed into the machine. They are pulled between two toothed wheels, usually made of metal. Each wheel spins the opposite direction of the other. The teeth pull the kernels off the cob until there are no kernels left. The cob is then ejected out.






season," said Thornton. "The last game was tough, wasn't ready for this season to end, but it was such a blessing to be a part of this team."

It's "Highfill Field" with a dog paw

Family, friends and former players and coaches came from all over last Friday as the field at Robert A. Patterson Stadium was officially named for former William Byrd coach Jeff Highfill. A reception was held in the school prior to the game and a ceremony took place at halftime of Byrd's 37-0 win over Northside to honor the retired Terrier football and soccer coach. Jeff and wife Katie had 40 members of their extend-

ed family at the game, including daughter Owen and her family and son Jeff, Jr. and his wife and baby. Jeff, Jr. came all the way from Arkansas, where he's serving the United States government as a member of the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

"I have seven siblings, three brothers and four

sisters, so you always have a bunch when they get together," Highfill said with a laugh.

Jane Layman, who served as athletic director at Byrd for many years, came from Atlanta for the ceremony and many others came from near and far to honor Highfill, including former Roanoke County School Superintendent Bayes Wilson, who recently turned 90 years old.

William Byrd principal Tammy Newcomb presented Jeff with a plaque and a banner was unfurled that read "Robert A. Patterson Stadium, Jefferson W. Highfill Field" with a dog paw in the middle. Highfill

expressed his appreciation and high regard for the late Patterson, a long-time principal at Byrd.

"I owe a lot to people like Bob Patterson, Bayes Wilson and Dale Foster," said Highfill. "This would have never been possible if they hadn't gone to bat for me. To have my name tied with Bob Patterson and William Byrd High School is very special to me. I spent a lot of my time here and this is a big thing for me."

Indeed, Highfill spent 38 years as a teacher and coach at the Vinton school. Jeff concluded his 38 years as head football coach at Byrd in 2018 with a record of 211-184-1. He also won 446 games as soccer head coach at Byrd over 35 years after starting the program, giving him 657 wins coaching Terrier athletes. Never is a long time, but that's a record that probably never will be broken.

It was an emotional time for Jeff last Friday, but he said it was more emotional when he took off the white and orange saddle shoes he wore on the sidelines, a Christmas gift from son Jeff years ago. He took the shoes down from the mantle to wear one more time Friday night

"I was more emotional coaching that last game," he said. "It's been awhile now but I still miss it, especially on Friday nights."

Terriers shut out Northside to keep playoffs hopes alive

The William Byrd football team is back home this week to wrap up the regular season with William Fleming coming to town. It will be a big game for the Terriers, who kept their playoff hopes alive with a 37-0 win over Northside at Vinton's Patterson Stadium last Friday night.

The Terriers come into the final week in ninth place in the Virginia High School League rankings among Region 3D schools. The top eight make the playoffs and Hidden Valley is currently in eighth with a rating of 17.90, with Byrd close behind at 17.55.

Hidden Valley's horse is in the barn, as the Titans ended their regular season at 3-7 with a 61-3 loss to Salem last week. Byrd, at 3-6, has one more game remaining and it's a good one in regards to Virginia High School League points. William Fleming is a Class 5 team, two classes higher than Byrd, with four wins. Teams are rewarded for "playing up," and if the Terriers can beat Fleming they'll get rider points for Fleming's four wins. Most likely, that would be enough to leap frog Hidden Valley into the playoffs and set up a rematch with top-seeded Lord Botetourt to open the playoffs on November 12.

Byrd's confidence is high after a big win over Northside on newly named "Jeff Highfill Field" last Friday. The Terriers scored early and often to dominate the winless Vikings on a night when many former players attended to congratulate Highfill on the field being named in his honor.

It took the Terriers less than two minutes to get on the board as Ethan Haston returned the opening kickoff 61 yards and Davian Hopkins capped off an opening drive with a one yard TD run. Then, after Dexter Gaines blocked a Northside punt, Israel Hairston sprung loose for a 22 yard TD run and Byrd led 14-0 with 7:25 still remaining in the first quarter.

"Our special teams have played well all season, and they produced again Friday," said Byrd coach Brad Lutz. "Bricen Lancaster had two more kickoffs in the end zone and we blocked our third punt in four weeks. Elliott Gaines has created huge plays on special teams all season. Ethan Haston opened the game with a 61 yard kickoff return that set the tone for the game."

Hairston added two more first half TDs on a 10 yard run to close out the first period and another 10 yard run to open the second, putting Byrd up 27-0. Bricen Lancaster kicked a 22 yard field goal just before the half and Byrd led 30-0 at intermission.

The third quarter was scoreless, but Hairston's 19 yard pass to Alex Dunn made it 37-0 in the fourth quarter and that set the clock running continuously, sending Byrd fans filing for the exit with smiles on their faces.

"Offensively, we had a great effort by all of our players," said Lutz.

"We had a lot of players help us have success. Our offensive line was physical and helped us have success in the run and pass game. Our staff was very pleased with our run game that was led by Davian Hopkins and Israel Hairston."

Hopkins finished with 124 yards rushing on 24 carries while Hairston had 86 yards on just seven carries and completed six of eight passes for another 109. Dunn had two catches for 41 yards and Dustin Richards, Cooper Minnix, Brayden Andrews and Hopkins had one reception each.

On defense Richards had six tackles with two sacks and John Kiker had eight tackles, including a big stop on fourth down to kill a Viking drive. Haston had six tackles and an interception and Lane Shoemaker

The Colonels have had an up-and-down season, losing their first four games but bouncing back to win four of their next five. They scored late to beat Staunton River last week in Roanoke, 28-27, and they also have wins over Harrisonburg, Northside and Franklin
