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Two years ago, during the pandemic, businesswoman Kat Pascal, noticed an alarming trend. While many businesses were struggling or outright failing, a disproportionate percentage of them were owned by Latina women. She watched in dismay as women dropped out of the workforce and Latina-owned businesses closed down.

Those statistics led Pascal to co-found the Latinas Network in November 2020 to create a support system for local Latina businesswomen and entrepreneurs—to empower them in professional development, business development, and representation.

In an interview with reporter Gene Marrano of WFIR radio, Pascal said that her mission is to take potential entrepreneurs and even people who have been in business for themselves for a while and help them find resources to elevate their businesses to the next level.

In an interview with WDBJ-TV,

Jones and Sealey win Bland Music Competition

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The Vinton Breakfast Lions Club hosted their seventh annual Bland Foundation Music Scholarship Competition at Thrasher Memorial United Methodist Church on March 5. The Bland competition was established by the Lions Clubs of Virginia in 1948 to "assist and promote cultural and educational opportunities for the musically talented youth of Virginia." Any elementary, middle, or high school student is eligible to participate. They may perform in the vocal or instrumental category, but not both. Presentations are limited to eight minutes and

The competition honors James Bland, deemed "the greatest black writer of American Folk Music" who composed over 700 songs throughout his career which began with building a banjo at age

Sixteen contestants participated with vocal or instrumental performances this year, ranging from 8 years of age to seniors in high school.

Pianist Cary Jones won first place in the instrumental category performing "Lara's Theme"

from "Doctor Zhivago." She is 14 and a 9th grader. Baritone Paul Sealey placed first in the vocal category, singing "Stars" from the musical "Les Miserables." He is 17 and a junior in high school.

Second place in the instrumental division went to Lilla Clark, age 8, and a second grader. She

performed "Bundle of Joy" on the piano. Third place in instrumentals was awarded to

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The Veterinary Specialty Services Center, adjacent to Vinton Veterinary Hospital on Washington Avenue, dedicated the new facility on March 1 with a ribboncutting (and confetti bombs) ceremony and tours of the premises.

Chief Medical Director Dr. Courtney Wiegard, DVM, welcomed guests to the event as the center nears completion. Ground was broken for the project last October leading to a complete renovation of the former Sweet Dreams Mattress Store next door into the new, state-of-the-

First place winners advance to the Lions Club Regional Competition to be held in two weeks at Community Church in Salem. Regional winners advance to the Lions of Virginia State Competition where 12 contestants compete from across the state. Over \$25,000 is awarded annually in prizes at the local, district, and state level. At the state level, first

place winners receive \$3,000; second place winners, \$2,500; third place winners, \$2,000; and fourth through sixth places, \$1,500. Local winners receive monetary awards and

certificates. First place winners in the March 5 competition received a check for \$100; second place winners, \$50; and third place winners, \$25.

Judges for this year's Vinton competition were Judy Barger Edgell and Doris McDonel, who served as vocal judges, along with Charles Krause and Roma Scriven, who evaluated the instrumental performances.

Barger Edgell has served as a Minister of Music in the Roanoke Valley for over 50 years and has taught private piano and voice lessons over the same period. She is currently president of the Thursday Morning Music Club, and also directs the chorus that performs at local organizations and venues. She is a graduate of Longwood University with a BA in Fine Arts and Masters Study with Radford University in vocal

Krause has a Bachelor of Music in Education degree from VCU. He taught in Richmond before becoming an education consultant with Boykin's Music Shop. He received his Master of Church Music and became the first graduate to serve in a full-time capacity as director of a church orchestra and the first to complete 25 years as a minister of instrumental music in a church. Krause has also played the tuba with the Richmond Symphony Brass Quintet and Opera Roanoke.

Doris McDonel has a Bachelor of Music degree in Piano and Voice from Shenandoah Conservatory of Music with a Master's Degree in Music Education from Penn State. She has taught piano, general music, music arts, drama, and vocal music in schools for 28

Throughout interludes in the program when the judges were scoring performances, McCarty and Mills shared the history of the Bland competition and some facts about the numerous Vinton Breakfast

McCarty explained that the Breakfast Lions began hosting the Bland Competition because of the quality of local music programs—both private and at William Byrd High School. They thought they could "get a good turn-out of students" for the contest. McCarty said the local competition has turned out to be one of the top contests in the state for number of participants. He thanked music teachers Susan Lewis and Carla Fosbre for encouraging their students to take part each year.

Mills told the audience there are approximately 50,000 Lions Clubs in over 200 countries, with over 1.4 million members around the world—reportedly the largest service organization in the world. They celebrated their 100th anniversary in 2017.

The Vinton Breakfast Lions Club was chartered in 1985 and is part of Lions of Virginia District 24C. Its members fulfill their motto—"We Serve"in community outreach in a multitude of ways years. She has received superior ratings and awards in throughout the year. They sponsor many fundraising of Vinton for a recreational project at t competitions throughout Virginia, North Carolina, events including a Pancake Breakfast during the Swimming Pool. They have also rais and Tennessee. She remains active as a Director of Vinton Fall Festival and their Spaghetti Dinner Metro bus shelters at Kroger and PFG.

traditionally prior to the Vinton Christmas Parade. Proceeds from all Breakfast Lions' fundraisers go back into the local community and communities across the Commonwealth, the nation, and the world.

The local Lions are well-known for their broom sales which provides support for eyeglasses and eye exams for needy children.

One of their most important functions is sponsoring the Leo Club at William Byrd High School. Leo Club members, and their sponsor Lisa Stover, assist with virtually all Vinton Lions Club projects, including the music scholarship competition.

Each spring, the club awards five \$1,000 Wallace Cundiff scholarships to seniors at William Byrd High School and also provides scholarships for Staunton River High School seniors.

The Breakfast Lions maintain the bright yellow eyeglass collection boxes at the Bonsack and Vinton Kroger. Donated eyeglasses are sorted by prescription by local Lions members at the Lions Eyeglass Recycling Center in Roanoke and then distributed around the world.

A main focus for Lions is youth. Each year the Breakfast Lions sponsor a Christmas Shopping trip for about 20 students from Herman L. Horn and W. E. Cundiff Elementary schools. The Lions also donate clothing and school supplies to the HLH, WEC, and Bonsack Elementary schools and art supplies to William Byrd High School.

The Lions Club participates in the Lions of Virginia Foundation which assists local Virginia communities in disaster relief.

The Breakfast Lions conduct vision screenings in many area schools and preschools—both private and public.

In the Vinton community, the Breakfast Lions have taken on legacy projects in the preservation of the historic Gladetown Cemetery, in building a picnic shelter for the community at Herman L. Horn Elementary and are now partnering with the Town of Vinton for a recreational project at the old Vinton Swimming Pool. They have also raised funds for

Remembering Vinton:

Fifty years ago in March 1973

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March 1973 was a busy month for the Vinton Police. Chief Clarence Irby told The Vinton Messenger that "a Friday night brouhaha spilled out of a downtown establishment and ended a block away with one man knifed, one shot, and four arrested."

The trouble apparently started about 10 p.m. at the Swan Restaurant on Lee Avenue when "about half a dozen visitors from North Carolina started a ruckus." It ended at the corner of Pollard Street and Washington Avenue. One of the visitors

reportedly gave some beer to a younger brother who was a minor and the owner of the establishment ordered the group to leave. The fighting reportedly spread to a nearby parking lot and a service station with persons "battling with pool cue sticks, knives, broom handles, and a motorcycle chain." The commonwealth's attorney described the scene as "near riotous."

Five Vinton officers responded to the call, the Swan owner's brother was knifed in the arm requiring multiple stitches

and one of the North Carolina visitors was shot in the foot. Police were unsure who fired the gunshot. Disorderly conduct charges were filed. Later in the month, four men were convicted of disorderly conduct and sentenced to six months, with sentences suspended after 10 days were served.

In March 1973, Vinton Police also solved four of five residential break-ins which had occurred in juveniles were arrested. stolen. In other crime news, a



INTON HISTORY: TRAINMAN HAT

"All aboard!" Thomas Royal May was a trainman as a "passenger brakeman" with the Norfolk and Western Railway Company.

During the mid-1800s, the beginnings of a distinguishable railroad employee uniform emerged. Apparel typically consisted of a sort of suit, or pant and jacket combination, and a hat. This move was an effort to present a consistent image and to enhance the reputation of train companies as train travel gained popularity. It also allowed for easier differentiation between employees and travelers displaying job titles.



Pascal said that the Latinas Network focuses on helping Latino-owned ousinesses, mentoring youth, and ouilding their representation on boards and in government. The organization aims to create a bridge between resources and the Latina community and overcome the "lack of generational wealth, credit knowledge, and language barriers which create setbacks."

The Latinas Network has grown since then from three members to hundreds of members. They hold professional training and organization-building meetings, monthly luncheons, and encourage those with a business dream to join the Gauntlet Business Program

and Competition.

The Gauntlet was founded by Annette Patterson of The Advancement Foundation (TAF); it is Virginia's largest program of its kind and each year offers a ten-week session of business classes, concluding with the awarding of tens of thousands of dollars in cash and in-kind orizes.

Kat Pascal was born in the Roanoke area to second generation Columbian mmigrants, grew up in Vinton, attended William Byrd, and started off her career in the banking industry.

In 2011, Pascal and partner Jimmy Delgado decided to open a commercial cleaning business, Spotless America, which they intended to maintain as their "bread and butter" business. He eft a job at Wells Fargo in 2015 to run the cleaning business full time; she oined him in 2016 because business was

booming, and he needed her help. Pascal signed up for the Gauntlet to make connections for building relationships and attracting investors for Spotless America; she wanted to use the Gauntlet resources to build her expertise in franchising and licensing.

Their success with Spotless America gave them the opportunity to fulfill their dream of opening the first Farmburguesa restaurant in Vinton in 2018, and then a second location in Grandin Village. Pascal found the Gauntlet's precepts

so valuable that she referred countless other Latina entrepreneurs to the program--not only referred them but worked with them in-person as a group and individually through the Gauntlet classes. They sat at a table together during Tuesday night classes and worked through the business development essons.

That lead to a continuing informal partnership between the Latinas Network and the Gauntlet with the goal of strengthening female business leaders in the local Latin American community. Latinas Network organizers say that the Gauntlet program has "been the cheerleader of our dreams and inspires us to lead our future." Pascal has been a cheerleader and recruiter for the Gauntlet as well.

Gauntlet classes were originally held at the Vinton War Memorial until COVID-19 forced them to go virtual but that ended up being beneficial as the Gauntlet program was able to spread exponentially to over 50 communities across the state.

This year Pascal and the Latina ntrepreneurs in the Gauntlet meeting at The Greater Williamson Road Area Business Association (GWRABA) offices to watch the online classes together and apply the concepts to their individual existing or potential businesses. They work on writing business plans, planning budgets, doing market analyses, becoming familiar with digital tools, understanding legalities, finding resources, establishing relationships with mentors, determining locations for their businesses, and more.

One of the entrepreneurs this year is Veronica Buendia, owner of DeModa Nails, specializing in natural nail manicures, gel manicures, and acrylic nails. She and her children came to Roanoke from California in 2011 to escape a domestic violence situation. In the long and winding road to a new life, she lived for a time at the Rescue

She has worked as a Nail Technician at Indulgence Salon & Spa and at Fresh Studio in Salem. She was formerly employed as a Certified Nursing Assistant at Springtree Health and Rehabilitation Center and as a Bilingual Family Support Counselor for TAP. She was introduced to the great variety of programs available through TAP as well-education, training, family services, financial services, and housing.

Buendia became determined to qualify for a Habitat for Humanity home and began saving to make that a reality. In 2014, WSLS-TV partnered with Habitat for Humanity of the Roanoke Valley, community volunteers, and Buendia to build that new home. It took 140 volunteers working 2500 hours to build the house in 12 days. She is eternally grateful. Buendia enjoys "the art of doing

nails," and finds it relaxing, plus it gives her the opportunity to serve others and helps boost her clients' self-esteem. Her marketing is mainly through photos of gorgeous fingernails and appointmentmaking on Facebook and by "word of

She met Pascal about three years ago online while working with TAP when Kat was thinking about establishing the Latinas Network, and got involved with the Gauntlet through her influence.

Buendia's reason for joining the

Gauntlet is not so much to grow her existing business, but to develop another business idea which will allow her to potentially move into storefront space and help other beauty professionals do the same by renting space from her. She believes the Gauntlet will help her network, make connections, and find resources for opening the new business.

"I had a business idea for a couple of years, but didn't know how to start a business," Buendia says. "Cosmetology school doesn't teach you basic business planning. The Gauntlet program is more in-depth."

One challenge she says she faces is finding the perfect space for a professional beauty suite. It needs to have room for several professionals and must be well-ventilated because of the odor of acrylics and the products other beauty professionals will use.

She is surveying both clients and potential professionals to assess their needs and desires—to better fit her plans to her clientele and fellow

entrepreneurs. "I have a passion for helping people and helping them grow," Buendia says. "I would like to be a mentor, renting space to others, preparing them to open their own businesses."

Ivana Savany, of Savany Financial a Gauntlet graduate Services, member of the Latinas Network says the biggest advantage of the network is "We believe in each other as women and business owners alike and it's that support that helps us to realize and achieve our goals.





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

Additional funding requested for William Byrd renovation project

At a Roanoke County School Board work session on March 2, Director of Operations and Facilities Todd Kageals informed the members that additional funding would be necessary to replace multiple HVAC units at William Byrd High School during the renovation project. have

received recommendation from Construction to replace multiple HVAC units at WBHS which are not currently functioning as designed," said Kageals. "The cost for these replacements is approximately \$1.5 million. The RCPS Maintenance Team has reviewed the proposal and determined that many of these units have significant service life The Maintenance Team has proposed that in lieu of replacing the units we can replace the control systems and make additional repairs. One unit (PAC-E3) would be replaced under this plan. The total estimate to replace PAC-E3, replace all control systems, and make additional repairs is \$350,000. The Maintenance Team believes this will allow the entire HVAC system to function as designed."

These repairs/replacements were

not included in the original scope of work and would require additional funding. Staff is recommending that the board consider funding the repair/replacement plan as recommended by the RCPS Maintenance Team, rather than replacing multiple HVAC units. Funds will come from Major Capital. Action will be taken as the next School Board meeting on

Discussion from board members determined that it is best to complete these repairs/replacements while the renovation/construction project is still underway.

Kageals also requested that \$130,224 be appropriated from the WBHS Renovation Contingency Fund for additional furniture (\$99,430), 47 filing cabinets (at \$234.99 each), shelving for the cafeteria and special education closets (\$2,000), concrete sealer for sidewalks (\$1,500), 76 corkboards and installation (\$4,750), and RPZ Backflow Preventer and Shut-off Values (\$11,500).

The additional furniture includes tables of different sizes, chairs, and desks for teacher workrooms. guidance rooms, the library office. other small offices, the second floor corridor, along with bookcases for the library, and display cases




