

Hurd and Richards will compete with the other 19 schools for the prestigious award.





honor—the Golden Apple Award. She has been teaching for 30 years. As winner of the Golden Apple, Alcoke becomes the Roanoke County Educator of the Year for the Salem-Roanoke County Chamber of Commerce and Roanoke 2025 Virginia Teacher of the Year.

Galatians 5:22-25, "The Fruit of the Spirit", "fruit" includes love, joy,

peace, patience, kindness, goodness, gentleness, faithfulness and self-control. Next in our study of the fruit is patience. This ought to be fun, right?

Patience is literally having a long-temper, being able to control one's emotions without "flying off the handle," able to hold-out emotionally before giving into action or passion. It describes a state of emotional calm or quietness in the face of provocation, misfortune or unfavorable circumstances.

What is the Legend of the Dogwood Tree?

There is nothing more majestic than a dogwood tree in the spring, decked out with fabulous flowers! To some people, though, dogwoods hold a deeper meaning. The "Legend of the Dogwood" is an ageold story that tells of this magnificent tree and how it became so beloved.

According to the legend, the dogwood is said to have been "chosen as the timber for the cross" and carries the marks of Jesus' crucifixion. Its four large petals represent the cross he died upon, and each petal displays four redtinged notches, believed to be representative of the four nail holes. In the center of each flower is a green cluster, symbolic of the crown of thorns.



He says the role of the William Byrd students will be "laying in all of the base layers with brushes and rollers prior to me shading it and detailing the mural using spray paint."

The group was rained out on their first scheduled day of painting, but on April 23, several William Byrd students and two of their art teachers, along with Murrill, spent the afternoon applying base coats of some very vibrant colors (including "Marsh Magnolia" and "Solar Smash") to

The art students who volunteered their time on the first day included Cadence Fralin, Mikayla Blair, and Hannah Johnson, along with teachers Sartell and Spangler.

Other art students, the teachers, and Murrill will continue the painting during the remaining weekends in April, with the goal of finishing by the end of May.

Once the base coats are applied (probably in two coats), Murrill will be using special Montana brand artist spray paints (with special nozzles and caps), said to have incredible UV resistance and color longevity, to add and shade the wildlife, trees, and other elements of the mural.

Then finally the entire wall will be sealed with a clear coat of anti-graffiti

It turns out that you can't just take

a notion to paint the exterior wall of a business in Vinton, or in most localities. There are rules.

Murrill has been working with the Town of Vinton Planning and Zoning Department and Assistant Director Nathan McClung to navigate the local signage rules for wall murals. One rule is that you cannot actually advertise the business in the mural. Murrill says the Town of Vinton has been very supportive and easy to work with on the wall mural

project.
"The revised Zoning Ordinance that went effective in 2022 provided for more robust definitions and distinctions between art (e.g. murals, etc.) and signage," McClung says. "This allows for freedom of speech and expression to be protected while also ensuring that all our businesses, non-profits, and other use types are on a level playing field in terms of advertising according to the sign codes."

Murrill was recently featured in the Roanoker Magazine in the annual "40 Under 40" issue featuring "up and coming

young professionals."

According to the magazine, "He has been awarded multiple times for his artwork at national juried shows over the last five years and has displayed his work at the Taubman Museum of Art, Virginia Tech's Perspective Gallery, Roanoke College's Olin Gallery and many more."

After graduating from William Byrd in the Class of 2005, Murrill earned his BA in Art from Roanoke College (2009) and his MFA in Painting and Drawing from Radford University. He started his career in teaching art at Craig County High School. He married his high school sweetheart; they have two young sons.


He is currently an art teacher at Patrick Henry High School in Roanoke (since 2015) and volunteers as assistant coach for the PH boys varsity soccer team (he was team captain in high school). He has served as an adjunct professor in Studio and Art History at Virginia Western Community College.

Vinton Police present annual report to Town Council

Vinton Police Chief Fabricio Drumond, along with Executive Assistant to the Chief Mandie Baker, Lt. Scott Hurt, Records Manager Ginny Rhodes, Community Resource Officer William Holland, and Det. Justin Baker, presented the Vinton Police Department's annual report for 2022 to Vinton Town Council at its meeting on April 18.

Chief Drumond started off by discussing administration of the VPD and its allimportant accreditation. The department must be reaccredited every four years and passed with flying colors during their last evaluation in 2022. There are certain standards each department must comply with to attain that

The VPD was first accredited by the Virginia Accreditation Coalition in 2002 and has been reaccredited in 2006, 2010, 2014, 2018, and 2022. In the latest evaluation, 191 files were reviewed. The VPD was found compliant in 187 of those files. Waivers had been granted for the four others, which mainly concern jails (Vinton does not have a jail.). Mandie Baker

Of those incidents, reports were written for 965 with 333 arrests made (custodial or noncustodial).

Lt. Scott reviewed the activities of the Patrol Division for 2022. He reported the Total Calls for Service at 12,593, security checks at 1,580, Suspicious activity 1207, Civil Advice at 596, and disturbances at 384. He also reported 372 community policing opportunities, which the police sponsored or participated in, in 2022.


Det. Justin Baker reported on Criminal Investigations Division (CID) and the circumstances in which the CID takes the lead in an investigation, rather than the Patrol or Community Services Divisions. The CID is on call 24/7/365. At times, due to the seriousness of an incident, detectives respond to the initial scene to investigate. Investigators are also available to assist with coverage. Generally, cases involve felony cases that require substantial follow-up for investigations such as robbery and major breaking and entering.

Detectives conduct interviews with victims, witnesses, and suspects; coordinate with the Commonwealth Attorney's Office and neighboring agencies; and document investigations with detailed reports, photographs, photo lineups, and lab results.

In 2022, the CID received 33 referrals; five remain active; eight are closed; five arrests were made, and 15 are inactive. Nine cases involved personal assault; seven, grand larceny; and five, fraud.

Mayor Grose commended the VPD for their efforts saying, "We are very proud of our police department; they are very professional and it shows every day."







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
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

St. Clair got the fourth goal off a cross from Andrews, and Logan got the fifth goal off an assist from Taylor Davis for a 5-0 halftime lead.






