Demolition resumes in downtown Vinton

Beekeeper advises 'Let the bees be'

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Vasilia McCrady and her hive of honeybees from Heritage Apiary in Blue Ridge paid a visit to Mount Pleasant Library on July 17. Those who attended (ages preschool to seniors) were introduced to a live observation hive which McCrady keeps in her home in the bees' own bedroom. They fly in and out of the open windows.

She has been a beekeeper for four years and raises Italian honeybees specifically because they have the sweetest honey. They are also gentle and the most popular breed with beekeepers worldwide.

McCrady describes herself as an educational beekeeper and honeybee advocate who has created an outreach program to bring "the marvelous world

of honeybees" to the public in schools, libraries, Scout meetings, retirement communities, clubs, and other venues.

"My favorite thing is to educate the youngest-to reach them before they fear things that fly," McCrady said.

"My observational beehive lets us get up close with these amazing insects," she said. "With this interactive presentation you can hear, feel, smell, and even taste the wonderful creations that come from our honeybees."

Participants in the program were able to see how bees work, socialize, and eat together, as well as watch eggs being laid and hatched. With help from McCrady, they were able to identify the queen bee in the hive.

McCrady explained firsthand the role

Vinton History Museum updates Town Council on activities

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Randv Layman, president of the Vinton Historical Society, updated Vinton Town Council on activities at the Vinton History Museum at council's meeting on July 18.

"I'd like to express both thanks and appreciation to Vinton Town Council and Vinton citizens for their seemingly endless support of our efforts in preserving the past of Vinton, East Roanoke County, and surrounding communities," Layman

said

"With the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic continuing to fade back into our rearview mirror, we hope to have a great year and obtain even greater interest and opportunities to promote our missionnot only through individual and group tours, but through broadcast, print, and social media. We aspire to make our hometown of Vinton more visible and appreciated by nonresidents whenever we have the opportunity, mindful that our primary obligation is to serve the town and its citizens."

Layman noted that the Vinton History Museum accomplishes quite a lot in the approximately 52 hours it is open each month (Monday, Wednesday, Friday, and first Saturdays from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.).

In addition to providing tours of the museum, designing exhibits, assisting with research requests, maintaining inventories of and cataloguing new artifacts, the museum maintains two Facebook pages-Vinton Memories & History and Vinton History Museum, which have helped them maintain connections with their

audience-those target interested in history and preservation.

These pages have "posted near-daily photographs and stories of people, businesses, places, and events which invite comment and engagement with people dependent on the Internet for at least some of their social connections" Layman noted.

The Vinton Memories & History page had a "reach" in June of 33,236 with 4,425 views and 4,765 followers.

The History Museum staff has been contributing weekly articles to The Messenger, Vinton highlighting acquisitions and promoting hours of operation. The museum has also contributed an expanded article in each issue of the new "Vinton VA Magazine." They also strive to attract and engage town residents with the "Little Free Library" box on the front sidewalk, collecting over 2,500 books from donations and distributing 1,000 surplus books from those to other charitable agencies.

The museum and continue society to identify opportunities to secure outside funding via charitable foundations and other corporate charity donation programs, despite



<u>Recipes of the week</u> **Oven Barbecued Ribs**

Oven Barbecued Ribs Ingredients for rubbed ribs:

4 pounds baby back pork ribs

- 2 tsp. garlic powder
- 1 tsp. onion powder
- 2 tsp. paprika
- 2 tsp. salt

1 tsp. cracked black pepper

1/2 tsp. cumin

1 tsp. chili or Cayenne powder (optional)

- 2 Tbsp. olive oil Sauce Ingredients:
- 2 cups BBQ sauce
- 3 Tbsp. minced garlic
- 2 Tbsp. olive oil

1 Tbsp. Worcestershire Sauce

1 tsp. salt

Baking ribs in the oven means you don't have to watch them closely; it doesn't matter if it rains, and you don't have to clean the grill.

Peel off tough membrane that covers bony side of ribs, if desired. Place ribs on baking sheet lined with foil or parchment paper. Combine garlic powder, onion powder, paprika, salt, pepper, cumin, and chili or Cayenne (if you like it hot). Sprinkle seasoning over ribs and drizzle with oil. Rub seasoning in on foil; bake two hours.

Preheat oven to 350°.

Mix together sauce ingredients. Remove ribs from oven; remove foil; spread BBQ sauce on ribs. Increase oven temperature to 450°. Return ribs to oven, uncovered; bake 10 more minutes. Watch

carefully. Change oven to broil and lightly char and caramelize the edges for about three minutes. Watch carefully. Let stand 10 minutes before serving.

Alice Holpp's Pork Barbecue Sauce

Holpp, made her own BBQ sauce from scratch: Cook together 1/4 cup butter, 1 medium chopped onion, 1/4 tsp. salt, and a dash of black pepper. Add 2 tsp. dry mustard, 3-4 Tbsp. brown sugar, 1 and 1/2 cups catsup, 1 and 1/2 cups water, 1/4 cup vinegar, 1 and 1/2 Tbsp. Worcestershire sauce, and a dash of Tabasco - cook for 15 minutes. (You can add more brown sugar if you like it sweeter, more . Tabasco if you like it hotter.)

The DigiLab is a DIY space in the library that houses equipment used to digitize your old media-from photographs and film to vinyl records and audio cassettes. Get files onto your computer to share with friends and family and preserve your history for future generations.

We provide the equipment and detailed, step-by-step guides; you make an appointment and provide the memories and bring your own flash or external hard drive (or online/cloud storage) to store your newly digitized media on.

Here is a list of what is offered in the space:

Epson V600 Scanner that can easily scan your old photographs, as well as 35mm and 120mm film and slides.

Picscanner Mobile Phone Scanner to quickly convert film and slides into positive images right on your phone through the Picscanner app.

Emerson Video Cassette Recorder that can digitize VHS tapes to an .MP4 format as well as an adapter cassette for VHS-C tapes. So, break out those old home videos!

Wolverine Movie Maker Pro to scan and digitize old Super8 or 8mm film to an .MP4 file with no audio.

Marantz USB Cassette Player Recorder to convert your audio cassette tapes to a .WAV file.

ION Record Player to digitize your vinyl records into a .WAV file.

Floppy Disc Reader to get your files off of those old floppy discs.



FROM THE PULPIT The Beatitudes

The Sermon on the Mount can be found in Matthew 5-7. It is the first public sermon given by Jesus. This incredible sermon begins with a series of "Blessed are those who" statements. The third of these statements claims, "Blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the earth.'

The work "meek" tends to have a negative aspect to it in some circles. Meek does NOT mean weak! Meek in a spiritual sense means gentle, patient and long-suffering. This gives the idea of someone that always remains under control, treats others with respect and is not quicktempered.

This might be a good time to point something out. All the character traits within the "beatitudes" go against our natural instinct.

Which means the traits of humility, mournfulness, meekness, righteousness, mercifulness, pure in heart and being a peacemaker can only be truly achieved through the power of the Holy Spirit. All these characteristics require supernatural intervention to be had on a spiritual level.

Being meek (gentle, patient and longsuffering) on a regular basis towards everyone God allows to cross our paths is an impossible task for most of us. Just ask your kids, spouse, or co-workers how you are doing in this area.

Possession of this amazing characteristic is partial evidence of the Holy Spirit in your life. Again, these characteristics being displayed in our daily Christian walk is an expectation of our Savior if you call yourself a follower of His.

Certificate for Appreciation of Support of Children of the American Revolution (C.A.R.)

Higgins received an individual award from The National Volunteer Information Specialist Committee, Eastern Division, for Outstanding Use of Technology.

The Roanoke Valley Chapter National Daughters of the American Revolution was founded in Vinton in 1961. The chapter traditionally meets at St. Timothy's Lutheran Church on Hardy Road in Vinton on the second Saturday of each month September through May.

The organization is well-known for involvement in many community-service projects in Vinton and throughout the valley each year. Membes plant flags at the Municipal Building for patriotic holidays. The chapter supports veterans and active military personnel by making lap blankets for veterans each fall and sending CARE packages throughout the year. Members sponsor the William Byrd High School DAR Good Citizenship Award and scholarship, awarded each spring.

The local DAR chapter recently partnered with the Town of Vinton, Food Lion, and PFG in a recycling project which resulted in the donation of six composite benches by the Trex Corporation. The DAR donated the benches to the town to be placed along the greenways in Vinton.

The Roanoke Valley Chapter, like all DAR chapters, is made up of women (18 years of age or older) who can demonstrate a direct lineage to someone who fought or provided service during the American Revolution.

The DAR was founded in 1890 to promote historic preservation, education, and patriotism. As one of the most inclusive genealogical societies in the country, DAR boasts 190,000 members in 3,000 chapters across the United States and internationally. The DAR is one of the world's largest and most active service organizations.

displays from one floor to the other and getting mobility-limited staff, volunteers, and visitors where they can do good work, through the addition of an unobtrusive cargo/

personnel lift to move materials wherever required in the museum building."

Their pending plan is to use retained funds and seek additional grants and donations through a formal fundraising effort.

"Having apparently resolved a recent rainwater intrusion problem in the museum basement with the indispensable assistance of the Vinton Public Works Department, we have less budget competition with this project," Layman added. "We do, of course, have a lot of other less costly upgrades, renovations, and additional storage space to consider in our future budget."

Layman detailed museum and town events which the museum participated in during the past year, including the Vinton Fourth of July Celebration, the annual Museum Yard Sale, Vinton Fall Festival, Downtown Vinton Trick or Treat, the museum Holiday Open House, Hotel Roanoke's Fashion for Evergreens, National Unplug Day, Vinton's Scavenger Hunt, the Vinton Dogwood Festival, "Walk-up/Drive-by Ice Cream the Social," an online Collectibles Auction, a Roanoke Valley Dulcimers Concert at the museum, and visits from local authors Nelson Harris and Betsy Biesenbach.

If ever there were ample reason to justify retaliation, David certainly qualified. Repeatedly wronged by King Saul, David always responded with respect and love. Even when he had the opportunity to kill the treacherous king, David restrained himself. Because of his willing submission to Saul's God-given authority, David was crowned king over Israel. There are times when we too are wronged by those in authority over us. At such times, we often feel justifi ed in rebelling, thinking that we are simply standing up for ourselves. 

next week they will begin the heavy machinery demolition.

Plans are shaping up to include building back some mixed-use buildings with both residential and commercial space available.

Businesses in the surrounding area have been able to remain open downtown through the current process, although one lane of traffic is closed on Pollard Street and one on East Lee Avenue.

The building housing D.R. Music was nearly a century old, built in 1930. It was originally the home to White Front Pharmacy, owned by Kenneth Furbush. The pharmacy had occupied the building from the 1930s into the 1950s.

Due to the extensive damage sustained by D.R. Music and the collapse of its roof, the primary structure, located at 101 East Lee Avenue, was determined to pose a public hazard and was ordered by the Roanoke County Building Officials office to be taken down on July 2, 2022.

The former Edward Jones Investments building at 103 East Lee Avenue and Rustic Creations at 107 East Lee were demolished in April 2023 along with a structure at the rear of the buildings.

The Edward Jones, hair studio, and alterations buildings were all constructed in 1920. Many of the buildings shared walls which affected one another structurally when it came to planning safe demolition.

The Town of Vinton does not own the property, but has been working with the property owners, nearby businesses, and private contractors since day one to keep the project on track and provide accurate information about the process. Property owners are currently exploring plans for redevelopment of the lots.

The demolition is being conducted and paid for by the owners of the properties and their insurance companies, not the town.

Some businesses directly affected by the fire have relocated to permanent addresses and are still in operation. D.R. Music is now located at 128 N. Pollard and Rustic Creations relocated to 116 S. Poplar Street. The George Lester Edward Jones Investments office is currently located at 10 Walnut Avenue (behind the fire station), with plans to eventually return to the location on E. Lee Avenue.

Once the demolition is complete and debris is cleared, the rebuilding process is set to begin.

Andy Bishop says that what started as their business in Vinton.

What was previously a parking area, with a portable stage erected when needed, is now a fenced-in graveled area with a permanent stage, lighting, tables, umbrellas, and custom firepits "for cozy evenings."

"We have future plans to continue expanding the patio area by adding an outdoor beer shack, complete with eight taps to grab your favorite TCBC beer while you're outside enjoying the patio and pavilion," Curtin said. "The work done by Roanoke Valley Concrete and Renaissance Lighting on the poles, fencing, stonework, and fire pits was just phenomenal. We're planning to utilize the Creekbank for all sorts of outdoor fun—Bingo, trivia, live music, and maybe even a movie night. In addition to the seating provided, we've got picnic blanket. We're looking forward to booking larger bands and hosting exciting events."

Twin Creeks Brewing Company first opened in Vinton in November 2016 and was virtually a catalyst for change in Vinton. The brewery brought life back to the downtown area. It soon was joined by Vinyard Station, in recent months by Pok-E-Joe's BBQ, and soon by the new Pollard 107 South restaurant.

In 2016, Robertson and the Bishop brothers explained, "Twin Creeks Brewing Company is a dream that has been growing for years—the dream to build a brewery, to make beer, to be a part of a community."

(The Bishops are from Botetourt County, graduates of Lord Botetourt High School. Robertson is a William Byrd graduate.) a "fun hobby has been taken to the next level."

Now their goal with the new outdoor stage and pavilion is just "to build a place for Vinton to have fun in."

In 2008, the Bishops bought their first home brew kit because they wanted to try making their own beer. In 2011, they took a giant step forward from the kitchen to the back porch by designing and building their first all-grain homebrew system.

They connected with Robertson in 2013 and began researching breweries, visiting over 100 as they traveled for their day jobs. In 2014 they brewed their first beer as "Project Ale Works," and that was the impetus for establishing Twin Creeks Brewery. Former Vinton Town Manager Barry Thompson recruited them to set up Their name comes from the two creeks which pass nearby in downtown Vinton— Tinker and Glade Creeks. Andy Bishop says they wanted to tie the brewery to the town.

They took classes with the Gauntlet Business Program and Competition and won the top prize of over \$13,000 which enabled them to purchase more equipment. They received some grants from the Town of Vinton.

In 2019 they expanded and opened Twin Creeks Brewpub at Explore Park, which also offers live entertainment.

Twin Creeks Brewing Company is located at 111 South Pollard Street in downtown Vinton. Check out their Facebook page for information on upcoming events.

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

Thrasher Memorial hosting Vacation Bible School on August 4, register now

Thrasher Memorial United Methodist Church in Vinton will host a "Faith to the Rescue" Vacation Bible School adventure for one night on Friday, August 4.

This is an event for children ages 3 through fifth grade and their families, which will include dinner, worship time, class time, music and activities in the gym for kids, and a time with for parents with the pastors. Classes will be led by the Children's Ministry staff and volunteers. (Classes are based on age/ grade completed by June 2023.)

The "Faith to the Rescue" theme will explore the Parable of the Good Samaritan.



each bee has in the colony and their work as part of a team. In addition, she explained how bees and other pollinators play a critical role in the daily lives of humans and how we should work to "Save the Bees."

She also brought along proper attire for working with bees and explained what a beekeeper needs to know to stay safe while tending to honeybees.

McCrady emphasized

that "bees don't want to sting you"—because they would die in the process so "let bees be."

She talked fondly of the worker bees—her "little girls"—who do virtually all of the work inside the hive. Bees are very clean creatures. When they wake up, the worker bees clean their cells (rooms) and tend to the nursery of baby bees. They build the honeycomb which provides protection from wildlife such as bears,

opossums, and raccoons.

The worker bees live for 25-40 days. Once they are 20 days old, they are able to fly from flower to flower, collecting pollen and nectar.

On the other hand, McCrady says the boy b e e s — d r o n e s — d o nothing except mate with the queen. They live for about 60 days. In the fall, the worker bees "kick the drones out of the hive" to save food to survive the winter. The queen bee is larger than the workers and drones, with a big abdomen filled with eggs. She lives for about seven years, and is able to lay about 2,000 eggs a day. She wanders around the hive searching for empty cells where she can lay her eggs.

When the beekeeper receives the queen bee, she is marked with a dot (last year, yellow) to differentiate her from the other bees and keep track of her age. There is a specific color scheme beekeepers maintain for the markings.

If the queen bee is not producing adequately, the worker bees may decide to replace her.

Honeybees collect pollen as a source of protein which they need especially during the winter months. They scrape the pollen from flowers and carry it back to the hive in pockets on their back legs and drop it off.

They also collect nectar, a sticky liquid used in making honey.

Bees also need water for survival, vitamins, and minerals, which they collect from pools, ponds, puddles, and other places. McCrady said that it is helpful to bees to keep water out for them—just remember to add a little salt to keep it sanitary. If a honeybee lands on and licks you, it may be because they smell you or detect the salt on your skin.

McĆrady only harvests honey once a year and sells honey seasonally she leaves the other honey as nutrition for the bees. She said that not only is honey delicious, it is also healthy. Honey is used in hospital ICUs as a natural antibiotic to treat wounds.

She next described the structure of the hive itself and how honeycomb is made and used. She talked about beeswax bees make to form the honeycomb to store honey, but which can also be used in soap, candles, Chapstick, and pan liners for baking.

She invited the audience to join in the honeybee "waggle dance" which is how bees communicate. She brought gifts for the children—stickers, honey stix, and more.

Besides providing an education on all things bees, McCrady will also safely relocate beehives you may find on your property (in trees or even inside homes). 

assumed management until he died in 1950. His widow and William M. Miles continued to operate the small business. The water was marketed on a big scale, even shipping some abroad. The company had branch offices in New York and New Orleans.

In the early days, water was bottled and sold as it came from the springs. Later, most of it was piped from the springs and made into a flavored drink. The springs were tapped nine feet underground. The plant could bottle up to 800 cases a day, employing from 10 to 13 workers.

Near the beginning of the 20th century, that flavored drink became one of the finest soft drinks sold and was found in many areas of the East and Midwest and known as the Virginia Etna Ginger Ale made from the healthy mineral water from the springs.

The spring water was carbonated and used in producing the light caramel color ginger ale along with Jamaica ginger which gave it a distinctive flavor with the addition of the juice of grapes, lemons, and oranges.

The water from the springs was also used on the dining cars of Norfolk & Western Railway—a big bottle of the water was placed on each table. President Grover Cleveland once gave testimony to its good flavor.

One of these big bottles in its attractive container is now displayed in the Vinton History Museum along with a variety of the ginger ale bottles, water bottles, and crates.

When traffic became much heavier on Virginia Avenue in the 1950s, the road had to be widened and the bottling company had to close in 1954. The building was demolished. It was located on the site of what is now Vinton Pawn Shop.

The owners did not leave the precious ginger recipe to anyone, leaving sadness to all who enjoyed the sparkling drink.



The Salem-Roanoke Baseball Hall of Fame inducted the Class of '23 on Sunday evening after co-sponsoring "The Last Inning" baseball games on Saturday along with the Salem Red Sox.

The Hall of Fame's Class of '23 includes former William Byrd standout Nick Jones along with Reggie Poff, Matt Trent, Randy Lawrence and Roy Clark. Former Ferrum College baseball coach Abe Naff was the guest speaker for the event at the Salem Civic Center.

Jones grew up playing recreation ball at old Jaycee Field and was a standout at William Byrd High School, where he was part of three district champions, three region champions and a state runner-up in 2000. He was a three time all-district and all-region selection, twice named all-state and the recipient of district and region Player-of-theYear honors. He was the Hall of Fame's Ray Bellamy Award winner as Player-ofthe-Year in the area served by the Salem-Roanoke Baseball Hall of Fame in 2000.

Jones is the William Byrd career leader in runs scored (115), third in career batting average at .439, second in RBI's (87), second in triples (4) and home runs (24), third in hits(98), and top five in singles and doubles. Nick went on to play at Virginia Commonwealth University where he was a part of three NCAA Regional teams along with two CAA Regular Season and Tournament Champions. He was a two-time all-CAA First Team infielder and was selected to the East Coast Collegiate All-Star Team following the 2003 season. Nick is in the top five in the VCU season record book in at bats (253) and doubles with 21 in 2002 and 23 in 2003.

Jones was selected in the 11th round of the 2003 Major League Baseball Draft by the Chicago Cubs. While in the Cubs Organization, Nick was a member of three league championship teams.

Nick credited the William Byrd High School program for much of his success in his acceptance speech, calling Byrd the "Gold Standard of high school baseball in the Roanoke Valley."

On Saturday the annual "The Last Inning" double-

"The Last Inning" was the fourth annual. It was initiated in 2020 when the COVID pandemic wiped out the regular season, and the event gave seniors that year a chance to get on the field one last time. It was so popular it was decided to make it an annual event.

High school golf season opens Tuesday, Thompson is new Byrd coach

Around 20 teams are expected to participate when the annual Botetourt Metro Invitational opens the high school golf season next week, including William Byrd. A shotgun start will get the event underway at 10 am Tuesday, August 1, at the Botetourt Golf & Swim Club.

The Botetourt Metro is a one day event that replaced the old Bob McLelland Metro Golf Tournament. The McLelland Metro was cancelled by the COVID pandemic in 2020 and was not revived. In 2021, BG&SC pro Jeff Sprinkle decided to hold a one-day tournament to replace the event and this will be the third annual Botetourt Metro Invitational.

"We decided to make it a one day tournament to start the season," said Sprinkle. "The McLelland Metro was two days, but that's too long for this early in the season."

Blacksburg won the initial Botetourt

Metro in 2021 and Jefferson Forest edged Salem by one stroke to win last season. Sprinkle had 18 teams signed up for the tournament this week and was expecting a few more before teeoff on August 1. Also included in the event will be the awarding of a scholarship in the name of Kip Nininger, a former state wrestling champion who was killed in a car accident in May of 2021. Chris Nininger, Kip's father, is a good friend of Sprinkle's.

William Byrd will have a new coach this year, as Hunter Thompson replaces Tyler Goodman. Thompson assisted Goodman last year, and Scott Whitehead in the three years before Goodman took over last summer. Thompson played high school golf at James River High from 2010 to 2014, including the 2012 team that was state runner-up in Class 2.

"I'm looking forward to a great year with the team," he said.

In athletics, first place earns 50 points, second place earns 45 points, third place earns 40 points, fourth place earns 35 points, fifth place earns 30 points, sixth place earns 25 points, seventh place
