"Our car proudly displays the High Ground Veterans Monument, a monument that honors past and current Vinton and Roanoke County service members and those who paid the ultimate



Vinton announces permanent transportation updates on Washington Ave./Gus Nicks Blvd.



A new speed limit will take effect in Vinton on Oct. 2 reducing the speed limit to 25 mph from Garthright Bridge to the town limits entering Roanoke City.

According to Vinton Town Manager Pete Peters, the Town of Vinton is growing and in order to be proactive, town leaders and the Vinton Police are making some transportation upgrades in anticipation of that growth.

Beginning Oct. 2, , the existing 25 mph zone on Washington Avenue will be extended from Garthright Bridge to the town limits entering Roanoke City to make the corridor safer for residents, businesses, and visitors.

The area continues to grow with fully occupied Billy Byrd apartments,

redevelopment of Gish Mill into a variety of businesses, the expansion of the Glade Creek Greenway, the increasing number of athletic events at Vinyard Park, and new $and \stackrel{\cdot}{expanded} \ downtown$ businesses. The new outdoor music pavilion Twin Creeks, the new Pollard 107 South restaurant, Pok-E-Joe's, and other businesses in Vinyard Station have led to increased traffic in the area.

Vinton Deputy Chief Tim Lawless says the new speed limit takes effect in October, but the town is asking drivers to begin

acclimating themselves to the new speed during the month of September. Signage and striping will be put in place to help illustrate the boundaries of the zone. Signage will remain covered until Oct. 2 when the change in speed limits becomes official. There will be message boards as well advertising the changes.



Vinton Computer expert warns of rising computer scams

Cybercrime losses have continued to spiral year-over-year across the country - and this community is no exception. According to FBI reporting, cybertheft increased by 49% in 2022 compared to the previous year. The financial losses people incurred totaled \$10.3 billion. This data only includes reported losses. Many individuals do not report when they have been scammed online.

Area computer expert Chris Duncan, owner of Vinton Computer and Brambleton Computer, says an increasing number of individuals come into his stores each week asking for help after their bank accounts were wiped out by a cybercriminal who gained access to their computer.

Duncan says the amount of money people in the area have lost is likely in the millions. He shares that, just last week, a customer said she lost \$300,000 to a hacker who emptied her bank account.

One example contributing to the increase in losses is the number of criminals who act as tech support or help desk representatives. They email individuals offering computer assistance, impersonate reputable companies by buying ads on search engines, or call saying something is wrong with the person's computer. Sometimes these thieves provide a link for people to access their tech support. Yet, clicking on the link may provide the criminal with full entry into the computer.

With access, the cyberthief can steal passwords, banking information, personal data, and other valuable information. Other times, a nefarious tech support person will spend time talking, chatting, or emailing the individual and then ask for compensation to fix the fake problem. The criminal will send a dangerous link to secure payment, which allows free rein to credit card information, bank accounts and

personal data.

In addition to gaining access through dubious help desk support, criminals can take control of a computer by sending emails with fake link-based offers, providing clickable images, using phony social media accounts with links, and enticing people to click on a link to participate in a fake sweepstakes.

How to protect yourself? Duncan advises to never, ever let anyone access your computer remotely even if you think they are offering legitimate help. Often criminals will spend an inordinate amount of time on the phone or chat with you to gain your trust so they can scam you.


To avoid being a victim, here are tips and red flags to be aware of:

- Don't open emails or click on links from persons and companies you don't know. • Don't give out any personal
- information in an email, chat or on the phone to someone you don't


- Check for suspicious email domains in your inbox.
- Do not click on pop-up warnings on your computer that indicate a problem.
- Don't take phone calls from unsolicited help desk representatives. And don't trust caller ID. Never send money to
- someone you don't know even in exchange for alleged services they provide, such as fixing a problem with your computer. See if your browser provides
- the option of blocking or enabling remote access. Turn off the remote access.
- software package and VPN and keep them up-to-date.



constitutes application preliminary consideration of a historic district for eligibility for the Virginia Landmarks Register and the National Register of Historic Places.

This project grew out of the desire to relocate the historic Cundiff's Drugs store sign to its original location in downtown Vinton.

Virginia State Code says, "It shall be unlawful for any place of business which is not a pharmacy to advertise or to have upon it or in it as a sign the words, 'pharmacy,' 'pharmacist,' apothecary,' 'drugstore,' druggist,' 'drugs,' 'medicine store,' 'drug sundries,' 'prescriptions filled' or any like words indicating that drugs are compounded or sold or prescriptions filled.

"Upon consultation with the Department of Historic Resources, the Board may grant exception from this section for such signage on an historic building that formerly housed a drugstore or pharmacy if that building is individually listed as a Virginia Historic Landmark, a contributing property in a Virginia Historic and Senior Preservation the northwest end of District, Landmark determined to be who has

eligible for listing by the Department of Historic Resources, provided that the signage relates to the historic character of the building."

"It's our intent that the overlay district will help to relocate the Cundiff's Drug Store sign to its original location on South Pollard," Peters said in announcing the approval. "We are also hopeful that by achieving the historic designation, we'll have cleared the first step in eligible properties being cleared for Historic Tax Credits that could assist with future rehabilitation projects – similar to Roland E. Cook and Billy Byrd."

Once state approval is gained, the town plans a public information meeting in Vinton to introduce the project to the community and then get to work on the survey and National Register nomination.

Peters emphasizes, "This program will not adversely affect property ownership or dictate development of privately owned property."

Being named as a historic district is mainly an honorific recognition, explained Alison Blanton, Architectural Historian Fellow at Hill Studio

numerous National Register nominations. Hill Studio has been a frequent partner with the Town of Vinton on projects of a historical nature, most especially Roland E. Cook and Gish Mill.

Blanton notes that acquiring historic district status puts no restrictions on property or property rights. "You can still paint your building purple, tear it down," etc., but the designation does provide benefits in addition to historic tax credits.

Being named as a historic district, "puts Vinton on the map and recognizes its historical significance; it attracts tourists and indicates that the town is a place of character and identity."

Historic designation may even mitigate the negative impacts of federally funded projects on historic properties such as road building, utility installation, and other projects since the impact must be taken into consideration.

According to the preliminary information form, the proposed Vinton Downtown Historic District is approximately seven acres located at

/ INTON HISTORY: SEWING BASKETS

Before massproduced clothing affordable, sewing was a way of life for people around the globe. Even at a young age, women were required to master complicated sewing skills and most had a basket designed to hold their sewing tools. They were both attractive and durable and of various sizes to keep all of a woman's sewing tools, as well as a little bit of her handiwork.

Tools and notions like needles, pins, scissors, buttons, hooks, and eyes were wrapped tight to prevent them from rusting. Delicate colored threads were protected from light and air with brown paper.

Sewing implements included different types of shears and scissors, a pin cushion and needle emery, a jar of beeswax, and a folding measure or measuring tape. Pictured are sewing

baskets of the 1940s from Odessa Moorman's, family donated by Joyce Moorman. See these lovely baskets along with thousands of other artifacts at the Vinton History Museum, 210 East Jackson Avenue in

downtown Vinton, open Monday, Wednesday, Friday, and every first Saturday, 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.

Last month Medicare announced that one of its contractors had been hacked and the personal information of 612,000 Medicare beneficiaries was stolen. The security breach put Social Security numbers, birth dates, driver's license numbers, health insurance claims, medical history notes, prescription information and other personally identifiable information

Anyone whose information was compromised in the breach will be notified

by Medicare and offered two years of free credit monitoring. However, even if your data weren't stolen, this incident reminds us all of one stark reality – we have little control over much of our personal data.

So many companies and government entities have our personal data and so many have been hacked in the past that the most practical thing for people to do is assume that your information is out there and take the necessary precautions. Two things you can do to protect against ID fraud are to check your credit reports regularly for suspicious annualcreditreport. com), and be sure that you are using strong and unique passwords for all websites and storing them securely.

RECIPES OF THE WEEK Hawaiian Crockpot Chicken

Here is Pam Vaughan's "go-to recipe" for not just one, but two easy meals. Ingredients:

2 lbs. boneless chicken, cut into chunks

3/4 cup crushed pineapple (small can of crushed pineapple will do)

1/2 cup soy sauce

3/4 cup firmly packed brown sugar

town, encompassing approximately constructed from 1900 through the 1980s. The area is bounded by industrial and residential areas and an active railroad line.

Centered around the intersection of South Pollard Street and Lee Avenue, the streets are laid out in a grid pattern with curbs and public sidewalks. The district is generally bound by Walnut Avenue, Washington Avenue, Maple Avenue, and Jackson Avenue.

The one- and two-story buildings in the district post-date the formation of the town in 1884 and are of brick or concrete block construction. Construction has continued into the present as the area continues to function as the commercial hub for

The buildings throughout the district reflect a palette of hybrid commercial styles. Common detailing includes corbelled brickwork, decorative pressed metal cornices, and rockface block facades. While some modifications have occurred over the years, they are generally limited to remodeled storefronts and some contemporary exterior cladding.

The PIF also notes, "On July 2, 2022, a fire occurred at 101 E. Lee Avenue. Due to structural damage from the fire, the building at 101 E. Lee Avenue, along with the buildings at 103 E. Lee Avenue, 107 E. Lee Avenue, and 208 S. Pollard Street have all been demolished and the lots at the southeast corner of E. Lee Avenue and S. Pollard Street are vacant."

The report presents specific details on some buildings in the proposed historic area:

"An early example of vernacular commercial construction is the ca.1900 commercial building at 131 E. Lee Avenue, which houses the Conner Group. One of the earliest buildings in downtown Vinton, this two-story, masonry building features decorative, pressed tin cornices at the parapet and above the storefront. The rockface block walls are laid in a pattern resembling Flemish bond with blocks of varying shapes of block. The central, recessed entrance is flanked

by wood-frame storefront windows

and transoms. A furniture store and

a drugstore historically occupied the

Several other buildings within four blocks of commercial buildings the district feature painted rockface block walls, including the commercial buildings at 129 E. Lee Avenue (Citizen's Upholstery), 118 E. Lee Avenue (Vinton Chamber of Commerce) and 116 E. Lee Avenue (Cyndi's). The ca. 1922 First Baptist Church at 111 W. Jackson Avenue is also constructed of painted rockface blocks, which were handmade by local tradesman, Albert Woods. This church was organized by black congregants in 1883 and the current building replaced an earlier church building on the same site. This rectangular church has a front gable roof and stands on a concrete foundation. The façade is characterized by a projecting entrance

> The ca. 1935 building at 100 E. Lee Avenue (Vinton Appliance) is an example of vernacular commercial construction in the second quarter of the 20th century, when growth in Vinton was rapidly accelerating. The large, two-story brick building is sited on a prominent corner lot at E. Lee Avenue and S. Pollard Street. The façade comprises two storefront systems with central, recessed entrances flanked by plate glass windows in aluminum frames. Arched wood pediments with keystones surmount the second-story doublehung sash window openings.

> The two buildings at the north end of the district (109 and 111 S. Pollard Street-Twin Creeks), are well-preserved mid-century examples of the Main Street Commercial style. These one-story, masonry buildings are characterized by brick facades, parapeted roofs, recessed entrances, and plate glass storefront windows. The buildings represent the evolution of vernacular commercial construction into the second half of the 20th century.

> In summary, the form says, "The Vinton Downtown Historic District appears to be eligible for National Register listing at the local level of significance, under the Commerce criteria with a period of significance of 1884-1965, spanning from the incorporation date of the town through the year immediately following the 1963-1964 annexation, when the last significant development in the district within the last fifty years occurred."

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

Green Hill Park in west Roanoke County will be the site of the 19th annual Knights Crossing Invitational Saturday, hosted by Cave Spring High School.

This yearly meet is always one of the biggest of the season in the state of Virginia for high school runners from all over. The Knights Crossing has been ranked as the third best invitational in the state according to the web site MileStat. Green Hill Park is a fast course that will once again host the Virginia High School League Class 1, 2 and 3 state championships in November.

had two each. Rosser also had a sack, a






"Our coaching staff is very happy with the improvements we are seeing on
