Vinton First Aid Crew hosts Santa at annual Officer Installation Ceremony

The Vinton First Aid Crew held its annual Christmas dinner and Officer Installation Ceremony on Dec. 14 at the Vinton War Memorial.

In 1939, 17 men with a strong desire to help their friends and neighbors in need met in the basement of Vinton Baptist and officially established the Vinton First Aid Crew, Inc. It was one of the first 10 volunteer first aid organizations in the Commonwealth of Virginia. Their stated goals were "to save life, administer first aid, and teach safety," which they have continued to accomplish throughout the years. The crew celebrated its 84th anniversary in October.

Vinton Mayor Brad Grose installed the VFAC officers for 2024: Chief Chris Sayre, Assistant Chief Aaron Albertson, 1st Lt. Brandan Arthur, 2nd Lt. Ethan Hobart, Sgt. Trace Poindexter, Secretary Megan Sayre, Chaplain Tom Philpott, and Public Information Officer Steve Thrasher.

Members of the Board of Directors recognized were President Jason Peters, Vice President Steve Thrasher, Treasurer Mitch Vaughan, Asst. Treasurer Jason Peters, Chris in the Class of 1990. He had a McCarty, and Registered Agent passion for running calls his entire Tom Philpott.

Mayor Grose thanked all the First Aid Crew members for their devoted service to the community and the thousands of lives they have touched since their founding. He described them as "one of the pillars of our community. The Town of Vinton wouldn't be the same without all you folks. No group represents the town better than the Vinton First Aid Crew."

He also described the VFAC as a "big family" as a whole, and with multiple generations of Vinton families continuing the tradition of service in the crew.

Chief Sayre noted that 2023 had been a very busy year with an impressive gain in membership-12 new members in just the past three months. The VFAC has received a new truck after working on the project for about two years.

Philpott paid tribute to the members the crew has lost this past year- Greg Meinel, who passed away in February at age 51, and Roy McCarty, who passed away in October at age 85. Meinel's sister Dawn Layne and his niece Brittney Layne attended the ceremony and were recognized.

Meinel served with the crew for over 31 years, recruited just out of high school from William Byrd in the Class of 1990. He had a life. He was awarded a Lifetime

Membership in the VFAC for his years of service.

Meinel served in multiple positions and on multiple committees during his time with the crew, including as First Lieutenant of Training and Captain of Membership. He decided to take his career a step further and obtained his Associate's Degree in Health Sciences from Virginia Western Community College, then attended the Jefferson College of Health Sciences to complete a Paramedic to Registered Nurse upgrade. He spent most of his nursing career as an ICU nurse at Carilion Roanoke Memorial Hospital. He also served as an instructor for Carilion, teaching Staff Advanced Cardiovascular Life Support and Pediatric Advanced Life Support, even traveling to other Carilion hospitals to teach

Roy McCarty, Jr. lived a life of public service to the community. He served in the U.S. Navy, was a lifetime member of the Vinton First Aid Crew (starting with the Junior First Aid Crew), worked as a sergeant in the Vinton Police Department, and then taught special education and served as the job development coordinator for Roanoke County Schools. McCarty also served as a member of Vinton Town Council for many years.

Town of Vinton calendars on the way

It's that time of year when Vinton residents look forward to with anticipation— delivery of the town calendars. Staff expects the calendars to be delivered in the mail by the U.S. Postal Service right around Christmas.

The calendars are very popular; citizens begin asking when they will be available in early December. Many keep the calendars hanging on refrigerators or near their desks as a source of information on the town, its events, its services, and its emergency phone numbers— a summary of life in Vinton in brief.

For many years, they were delivered to the doorsteps of homes and businesses by the Town of Vinton Public Works staff, but that became cumbersome and the task took over two weeks to complete.

The theme of this year's calendar is "Vinton's Civic Pride." The calendars were designed by Johnny Kunda of Delivery Design Company, with input from the town's leadership team. Once again, they were printed by Bison Printing in Bedford.


About 5,000 copies were printed with 4,500 of those being delivered directly to residents and businesses. Photography is by Jenny Marie's Photographie, with a couple from The Vinton Messenger.

The town calendar is a synopsis of information on all things Vinton.

This year's vintage calendar opens with greetings from Vinton Mayor Brad Grose, Vice Mayor Mike Stovall, and Town Council members Keith Liles, Laurie Mullins, and Sabrina McCarty, including a history of the Town of Vinton, named for the VINyard and PresTON founding families. Settlers began arriving in the area in the mid-1700s.

Each year's calendar includes holidays, special event and festival dates sponsored by the Town and the Vinton Area Chamber of Commerce, some of the featured activities at the Vinton Library, the Vinton History Museum, the Vinton Farmers' Market, and classes at the Charles R. Hill Community Center, along with the basics of when the seasons change and when Daylight Saving Time begins and ends.

It contains the sometimes hard to remember regular refuse/bulk refuse/

recycling schedules by the week, month, and year (including modified holiday schedules), due dates for real estate and personal property tax and utility bills, and Town Council meeting dates.

There are phone numbers for all town departments, emergency numbers for police, fire, and rescue, the Regional Center for Animal Care and Protection, and the Vinton Post Office, plus many frequently used Roanoke County numbers and the Western Virginia Water Authority.

The idea for the town calendar originated several years ago. The town had previously been distributing magnets displaying the recycling schedule in packets with brochures from several different departments of the town. The calendar format was adopted to include all the information that might be needed by residents in one compact package. The town distributes the calendars to new residents and businesses when they contact the Town of Vinton with questions.



"These guys believed in one another and joined with a William Byrd coaching staff that engaged with them and celebrated community service by cleaning up the local trails and celebrating fallen soldiers. They marched into games behind the local police and veterans associations.

"These guys were a part of something special and they are V(IN)ton's team.

"We celebrated and complained. We coached from the stands and played GM to our shame, but the team kept fighting and they deserve this championship.

"This championship is HOMEGROWN championship. No recruiting, no NIL, no scholarships, no promise of stardom. Just whatever walked the halls of Byrd was what they had. No one was in the transfer portal to help; they just decided to stay and help themselves. No shortcuts, just lessons in hard work, the fear of the Lord, and 'holding the rope.' O's, motions, formations, and victories. "It was great to see a town pack out the hole in Ridgeway, and then turn around and overflow the visitors' area two or three people deep at the fence in Lynchburg.

"Sure, it was Goliath, but this was Vinton. Vinton has all it needs. I wasn't born here, but I'm glad someone showed me where this place was. For this period of my life, these boys represented a story that I hope many will hear about- a bunch of kids, dragging their fathers and families to the field to play a game. The only thing their parents had in common was that they had kids the same age; many had never met before.

"Now as we look around the stands 10 years later, a simple nod or smirk would say it all. Whether Biddy, 8U, 10U, 12U, Terriers or Raiders was your team, you have a lot to be thankful for. You did Terrier Town proud. Congrats to the Terriers- you won!"

W.E. Cundiff art students create recycled bottle Christmas tree

W.E. Cundiff art teacher Lisa Huffman and her fourth and fifth grade art students created a unique Christmas tree this holiday seasonmade from recycled bottles. The tree stands in the school's vestibule for everyone entering the building to see.

"It took a lot of work, but was fun as well," said Huffman. "The fourth and fifth graders hand painted the bottles and cut them into a spiral shape. Then they helped me wire them to the armature which was made from a donated tomato cage and some chicken wire.

"These trees are always a huge hit. When I taught high school in Austin, Texas, we made a lot of them but with the younger kiddos it's a lot of work just to make one.

"It was also harder to get people to bring water bottles in today than it was eight years ago when I made them with the people are being more

Chief Sayre and Vice President Steve Thrasher next presented the most coveted awards to crew members: Brady Poindexter (still a high school student) was named "Rookie of the Year," Trace Poindexter was named "Member of the Year," and Aaron Albertson was chosen as "Officer of the Year" (for the second year). The awards are especially meaningful as recipients are chosen by the entire crew.

Steve Thrasher next recognized the nine charter members of the Vinton Junior Rescue Squad from 1974: Chris Stull, Kenneth Drewery, Terry Fuqua, Ralph Hargis, Perry Spangler, Mike Huddleston, Ray Sloan, and Danny Wood. Four (Stull, Drewery, Fuqua, and Hargis) were able to attend. (Member Gary Honaker is deceased.)

Thrasher commented that in moving boxes at the station, he had come across the plaque identifying the charter Junior Rescue Squad members. He noted that in 1973, VFAC members decided to establish a junior crew. Members Doug Adams and Mike Chewning visited William Byrd High School during study halls to recruit teens to serve in the crew. These nine expressed an interest, prepared for, and passed the American Red Cross Advanced First Aid course and CPR training, and qualified as junior members. Philpott was their advisor.

Mayor Grose presented a proclamation from Vinton Town Council for each of the original nine members thanking them for their "outstanding commitment to public service, especially for service to the First Aid Crew. Partly because of

the accomplishments of these charter members, the Vinton First Aid Crew has had a provision for a Junior Crew continuously since that time. Many young people have served in the Junior Crew since 1974 and many have gone on to serve in the Senior Crew. Many have also gone on to serve our community and nation in a variety of public services including emergency services and the military.'

After the installation ceremony, Santa arrived (in fire boots), bearing gifts for all the children present. They were able to sit on his lap (including the mayor and crew members) to whisper their wish lists and have their photos taken.

The Vinton First Aid Crew is a nonprofit organization which operates on tax-deductible donations from the community which provide funding for equipment, training, and medical supplies.



The 2023 Vinton First Aid Crew Christmas dinner was catered, as is tradition, by Country Kitchen of Christiansburg.



<u>Remembering Vinton</u> with the Vinton Historical Society

An Old-Fashioned Christmas

This article was written by Vinton historian and Vinton History Museum volunteer Barbara Dillon (now deceased) and published in The Vinton Messenger in 2012.

Christmas was always a special time at Vinton Baptist Church and most other churches in town. There was a big lighted, decorated tree in the main sanctuary. The choir would have special music. There were always boxes of hard candy for the Sunday School children and always a pageant with Mary and Joseph and the baby Jesus, and wise men, shepherds, and angels.

At the Christmas Eve program put on by our friends and family, we saw our dad or a friend in his long bathrobe march down the aisle as a shepherd to the manger on the stage with a choir behind them singing joyfully along with the audience.

Santa would then come out to the tree, call a child's name, and they would go up and receive a wrapped present from under the tree. Our parents would bring one gift per child earlier to place under the tree. How thrilling it was to get a package from Santa himself!

We five brothers and sisters with our mother and dad could hardly wait to walk home and go to bed so Santa could visit us. Few people had automobiles so nearly everyone in town walked wherever they went.

My mother and dad would get us up

after Santa had made his visit and let us see what he had brought us. We opened our presents and played awhile, then went back to bed. My sister and I would always take our dolls with us and our three brothers would usually take a small toy with them. We would sleep until later in the morning, then have a ham biscuit and an orange, while the adults were fixing dinner for the crowd.

We lived at our grandmother's big tenroom house on Second Street. Granddad had died when I was two years old, but they had nine children. One daughter had died very young, but I still had three uncles, four aunts, and lots of cousins.

Every Christmas all of the family would come for Christmas dinner. The turkey and ham were cooked there. The ham was locally grown, butchered, and salted down to cure. For Christmas it was boiled, covered with whole cloves, and put in the oven to bake a little.

Of course there was turkey, dressing, giblet gravy, green beans, cranberry sauce, sweet potato pudding with marshmallows on top, celery, pickles, homemade rolls, Waldorf salad with lots of nuts, pumpkin pie, fruit cake, fresh coconut cake, and boiled custard.

Everything was homemade and cooked on a wood range. Some cakes were made weeks ahead. When the meal was served there were so many people that the men were served first, then the wives and children.

Food filled up the dining room table and buffet, so people ate all over the house. There was a large closed-in back porch that was used as a dining room during the summer because the windows and screened-in back door made it cooler (no air conditioners back then). This was opened up and heated so people could eat Christmas dinner out there. Before the meal, one of the uncles would always call everyone together and ask the blessing.

After the meal was over, we were allowed in the parlor where the Christmas tree was decorated. It was covered with candles, as well as fabulous glass ornaments in the shape of Santa, balls, bells, and birds, and a star on top. The live tree was always from my Uncle Joe's farm in Bedford County.

Children were not allowed to go into the parlor and play at anytime without permission or without an adult. On this afternoon, someone would go in and light all of the candles on the tree and on the mantle. Then everyone was called to come in and see the tree lit. The candles were blown out and packages were given out.

Adults and children would have drawn names earlier. Everyone would get a present from under the tree and we would find out who had drawn our name.

The parlor always had a fire in the fireplace and after all the gifts were opened, everyone would gather around the piano and sing Christmas carols. Two of my aunts could play well, and several aunts and uncles made an excellent quartet and would lead in group singing. My, what a wonderful day this always was!

The rest of the days until after New Year's when the children had to go back to school, each family would visit another family to see what they had gotten for Christmas and usually had a meal or at least cake, cookies, or candy with them. Most everyone made lots of homemade goodies and boiled custard to serve.

No Christmas was ever complete unless there were dishes of old-fashioned hard candy with filled centers, dried raisins on stems, a bowl of mixed nuts with a nutcracker and pick, and oranges, grapefruit, and tangerines that were only available at Christmastime.

In later years, it was always fun to go in the attic and play where the Christmas ornaments were stored from year to year and look at the little holders that would clip onto the branches and hold the small candles. Then electric tree lights became popular and were much safer.

Today's families miss all of this togetherness because we can go to the store and purchase everything already cooked and even a tree can be unwrapped, set up already decorated, and ready to be plugged in. But, oh, what wonderful memories!







SUNY Cortland wins 50th Stagg Bowl in 2nd half shootout

The 50th Stagg Bowl returned to Salem last Friday and may have been the best one ever. The game went down to the final minute when the State University of New York(SUNY) Cortland defense stuffed a two-point conversion try to beat defending national champion North Central College of Illinois, 38-37.



Defensive second team All-BRD Terriers include Burnette on the line, linebackers English, Rosser and senior Lane Shoemaker and Dulak at punt returner.








