Last week's edition of The Vinton Messenger looked back at the first six months of 2023 in the Town of Vinton what was most memorable and most noteworthy from January through June. This week we continue the review of the year from July through December.

"We have been very blessed as our town has continued to grow and prosper," noted Vinton Mayor Brad Grose. "The Town of Vinton is making incredible strides toward becoming a truly modern town with an eye toward becoming the most livable place in Virginia. Vinton has something for everyone who is looking for a great place to live, work, or shop.

"Some of our progress is very visible such as the new and exciting businesses in our downtown district. In addition, things like street improvements and updated signal lights are moving us toward being a very walkable community. Our citizens can enjoy outdoor musical events and other activities in a safe and pleasant environment.

"Economic development continues at an unprecedented pace. We are very excited about the Gish Mill project as well as several other initiatives that will help us continue to develop as a thriving community.

"Another recent and very important achievement was the EPA grant of \$500,000. Just as with previous grants, the funds will allow the town to perform many preliminary requirements that lead to more economic development. Developers can then invest in our community at a more affordable cost.

"Of course, none of our progress happens without the blessings of God and the hard work of many people in our town. The entire staff of the Town of Vinton works tirelessly to provide the best services possible for all our citizens.

"The other essential element in our continued progress is the supportive citizens of our great community. The people in our town have welcomed the changes that are necessary if we are to continue to grow as a modern, progressive community.

"Vinton Town Council has committed itself to supporting new projects and management practices that will ensure the long-term success and stability of our town. I am truly excited about the future of the Town of Vinton."

Town Manager Pete Peters has his own list of the most significant events in the Town of Vinton in 2023:

1. The official transfer of the ownership of the Gish Mill Property solidifying the financing– quite the milestone and setting the final construction phase to get underway in the spring of 2024.

Transportation enhancements: Town Council 2. took a significant step forward in their goals to ease traffic congestion by replacing 10 of the 11 signalized intersections within the town with new signal heads, internal control systems, traffic cameras, opticoms (for emergency service vehicles) and GPS-enabled signal synchronization to improve signal alignment. These updates have modernized our transportation infrastructure and allow us to make real-time adjustments for peak traffic flows and special events and move an ever-increasing number of daily commuters and visitors to and through our town, while limiting negative impacts on our residents and businesses. Walkability improvements: East Cleveland 3. Avenue and both ends of Walnut Avenue received significant enhancements this year to improve vehicle safety and improve the aesthetics of these two important corridors, and each have also increased the ability to walk downtown from the Jefferson, Cleveland and Midway neighborhoods. Construction is underway on the last remaining gap of the Glade Creek Greenway that will bridge the initial two phases together. The two

## What's coming up in Vinton in 2024?

According to a report from the Vinton Area Chamber of Commerce and the Town of Vinton Community Programs Department at a recent Town Council meeting, Vinton was the most happening place in the valley in 2023.

The Vinton War Memorial hosted 378 programs and events with an attendance of 20,000 over the course of the year. The Charles R. Hill Community Center was the site of 412 events including paid rentals and Senior Programs (with five events over two days on a recent weekend). The Vinton Farmers' Market hosted 39 events from car shows, to Mingles, to Police Department events, children's craft events, programs in conjunction with the Vinton Library, and pop-up vendors.

Vinton and the Chamber jointly hosted over 20 ribbon-cuttings, the Senior Expo, Fall Festival, Downtown Trick-or-Treating, nine Mingle at the Market concerts (with an average attendance of 700-1,000 per concert), two golf tournaments, the Fourth of July celebration at the War Memorial, the Four on the 4th race beforehand benefitting the Boys and Girls Clubs of Southwest Virginia, the Vinton Christmas Parade, the Santa Crawl, the Parade of

The 12 days of Christmas is the period in Christian theology that marks the span between the birth of Christ and the coming of the Magi, the three wise men.

It begins on December 25 (Christmas) and runs through January 6 (the Epiphany, sometimes also called Three Kings' Day). The four weeks preceding Christmas are collectively known as "Advent" which begins four Sundays before Christmas and ends on December 24.

I have been blessed by this whole concept this past week- the idea that Christmas continues through at least January 5 - and have gotten a lot of great feedback from our congregation at Vinton Baptist. # Time for annual Soup for Seniors food drive

It's time for the annual LOA Soup for Seniors food drive across the region. The community is encouraged to donate canned goods to "help provide a hot meal on a cold day for seniors."

Thousands of seniors in the area live at or below the poverty line. This year's goal is to collect 45,000 pounds of soup and other non-perishable items to provide bags of food for 2,750 older adults in need in the Roanoke Valley and surrounding areas.

At the top of the list of who to serve with Soup for Seniors donations are LOA's 570 homebound Meals on Wheels recipients. Other recipients include: LOA's Diner's Club participants; older adults receiving LOA's transportation, case management, and in-home care services; more than 1,500 residents of low-income, independent senior housing; and seniors who receive assistance from area Departments of Social Services and other agencies. The Soup for Seniors campaign started in 2006 with the modest goals of serving seniors who were part of LOA's Foster Grandparent and Senior Companion programs. The community fully embraced the project, and so much soup and crackers were donated, LOA was able to serve all of their clients, other needy seniors in our community, and more in neighboring communities. In 2011, LOA took on the project as an agency-wide service and joined forces with AARP Virginia. Collection and distribution were moved to early February to serve the senior population in the most vulnerable part of winter. In 2024, the community is asked to donate food, volunteer with the collection, hold a canned food collection at churches, schools, or businesses during January, or make a monetary gift to help buy shelf-stable items and support seniors' nutritional needs. The items most needed are soup, peanut butter, canned meats, canned fruit, canned vegetables, crackers, oatmeal, and Boost or Ensure. Lowsalt, nutritious items are preferred. No glass containers. Please check expiration dates. Donations will be collected at one of the LOA drop-off sites between January 29 and February 4 or may be taken to the main collection site at the Church of



pedestrian crosswalks on Hardy Road and Gus Nicks Boulevard have also been designed and have set the stage for additional walkability improvements for 2024.

4. Downtown is Happening: The recent expansion of Twin Creeks' Creekbank Music Venue, the opening of Pok-E-Joe's and Pollard 107 South, with an already established array of restaurants including Our Daily Bread, Big Belly's Pizza and Farmburguesa, have created a downtown scene that has the downtown hopping throughout the week and established an incredible energy on the weekends with live music in abundance. With the promise of the Dogwood Restaurant expansion and the new Tacos and Tequila Tacorita opening in the former Red Jasmine property, this will only increase the liveliness of our downtown in the New Year.

"It's a great time to be in Vinton," Peters says.

Here's a sampling of what went on in Vinton from July to December 2023 as recorded in The Vinton Messenger:

July 2023: The Town of Vinton delivered another spectacular fireworks celebration on the Fourth of July at the Vinton War Memorial. The fireworks were fabulous and so was the foam cannon- or "Foam on the Fourth," which turned out to be a huge treat for children and adults. The crowd was estimated to be the largest ever.

That July 4th morning the town hosted the two-part "Four on the 4th Race" (the regular 4-mile race and a Kids Fun Run) that benefits the Boys and Girls Clubs of Southwest Virginia.

In July, Thrasher Memorial UMC welcomed new Associate Pastor Ilgha Ilunga, who is originally from the Democratic Republic of Congo.

In the heat of summer, the Blue Ridge Figure Skating Club presented "Theatre on Ice: Night at the Movies" at the Lancerlot.

The HIVE Business Incubation Center on Pollard Street closed, and the Town Annex of staff offices opened in its place after renovations.

The entertainment options expanded in downtown Vinton with the opening of the Twin Creeks Music Pavilion on July 21.

Recreation possibilities in Vinton expanded when the town received a grant for \$218, 295 to help build a multi-generational park at the former Vinton Municipal Pool over the course of several years.

The Cleveland Market Redevelopment Project revved up with the demolition of the residence next door to the former market by Vinton Public Works.

Vinton Town Council members took a field trip to the Mount Pleasant area to see for themselves an example of the Full-Depth Reclamation process for rebuilding a road, which will be used to rebuild Mountain View Road in Vinton-a project long-awaited by local including the Vinton Luncheon Lions Club, the Dogwood Festival Committee, and the Vinton Area Chamber of Commerce. He served in the United States Army. A farmer, he was appointed by the governor to serve on the Virginia Milk Commission.

The Lancerlot hosted one of the most loved events in the valley on August 19-"Dog Days of Summer" which invites dogs and their owners to enjoy, free of charge, the ice rink and outdoor pool at the facility.

The Vinton Breakfast Lions Club held the annual installation of officers dinner on Aug. 24 with plans to continue excelling in service to the community in a host of projects.

September 2023: The Vinton Police Dept. unveiled its newly wrapped Military Appreciation Patrol Vehicle designed by Officer Jesse Dibble along with other members of the department.

WBHS Coach Brad Lutz was named Coach of the Week by the Washington Commanders Charitable Foundation for "his positive leadership."

Thrasher Memorial UMC held the annual Prayer Circle around the outside of the church on Sept. 10, praying for the church, the community, and the world.

Alex Coffey earned Scouting's highest honor by reaching the rank of Eagle Scout. His Eagle Scout project was installing new tree identification plaques along the Roanoke Valley Greenway, a project initially begun by Scout Matt Jones back in 2001.

The second annual Southwest Virginia Pride Fest was held at the Vinton War Memorial on Sept. 21.

Town of Vinton staff participated in the annual Greater Roanoke Workforce Development Board Career Quest for middle school students at the Berglund Center in Roanoke. The Public Works, police, economic development, Planning and Zoning, Community Programs, Finance, Human Resource/ Risk Management, and Administrative departments were represented.

The William Byrd Terriers honored both youth recreation teams and the military at football games in September. Another annual event, the Battle at Byrd cheerleading competition, took place on Sept. 30. The William Byrd Middle School cheer team won first place in the restricted middle school division.

October 2023: Israel Hairston and Makayla Price were crowned as Homecoming King and Queen at a halftime ceremony on Oct. 13. Members of the Homecoming Court are nominated by their classmates and then voted on by the entire student body and staff.

Vinton Town Council appropriated funds of \$1.8 million for Capital Improvement Projects involving rebuilding Mountain View Road, the Walnut Avenue parking lot (81 new spaces), Gish Mill, and community blight abatement.

The 2023 Vinton Fall Festival drew a record crowd downtown on Oct. 7 with over 100 vendors, the traditional Vinton Breakfast Lions Club Pancake Breakfast, entertainment by local children and others at the Vinton Farmers' Market, and the Doggie Costume Contest. The town took steps to improve the walkability of the downtown area by extending the 25-mph speed limit on Washington Avenue/Gus Nicks Boulevard from Garthright Bridge to the town limits to make the corridor safer for motorists, pedestrians, residents, businesses, and visitors, effective Oct. 2. William Byrd High School inducted 81 students into the Beta Club honor society at a ceremony on Oct. 2. To qualify, a student must maintain a GPA of 3.75 from freshman through junior years. William Byrd graduate Grecia Hernandez (Class of 2020) addressed the United Nations Human Rights Committee on human rights at a meeting in Geneva, Switzerland. She is a senior at Princeton University. Mill Mountain Theatre brought its production of "Stellaluna" to the Vinton Library to the delight of a full house of children and adults on Oct. 13. Vinton Town Council welcomed two new police officers- Sean Patrick McKittrick and Douglas Gene Aune, Jr.— at the council meeting on Oct. 17. The Vinton Breakfast Lions continued their vision screenings at local public schools and private preschools. Rosie's Gaming Emporium presented the organization a check for \$5,000 to support the Lions' community service projects. The Bonsack Lowe's contributed to the Vinton community, as well, through improvements at M.A. Banks Park, including pressure washing and replacing wood on the benches and tables at the picnic shelter, making improvements to the horseshoe pits, and replacing fencing- with landscaping yet to come in the spring of 2024.

Demolition of the buildings damaged by fire in downtown Vinton resumed after a pause. Faith's Hair Studio and Anita's Alterations were designated as the next to be torn down. The goal was to save the former Red Jasmine restaurant building next door on Pollard.

William Byrd High School football practice began on July 27. Vinton native Tim Lewis climbed McAfee's Knob for the 500th time on a very hot July night.

Annabelle Teague, a sophomore at William Byrd, attended the National Scout Jamboree at Summit Bechtel Reserve in West Virginia.

August 2023: The Vinton Police Dept. hosted the annual National Night Out celebration on August 1— a chance for the police and town and county officials to meet informally with citizens in a fun atmosphere. There were free hot dogs, free ice cream, a rock-climbing wall, a DJ, and games for the kids.

Football practice for the upcoming season continued at William Byrd with a unique "Midnight Madness" practice on a Friday night. As the Terriers prepared to open their season, head coach Brad Lutz said, "Our football team has improved in every aspect of the program. Our players have worked really hard to build themselves into a bigger, faster, and stronger team. The standard of our program has always demanded hard work, but our players have pushed themselves to do more than what was expected. As a result, this is the biggest, strongest team we've had." That turned out to be an understatement.

Olaedo Anyanwu was named as William Byrd High School's Top Terrier for the 2023-24 school year- the highest honor an individual student can receive at the school.

Mattie Forbes, Vinton's dedicated historian and Vinton History Museum volunteer, who co-authored the history of Vinton "Vinton History 1884 to 1984," passed away on August 2.



One of the most eye-catching displays in the Vinton Museum is the Maytag electric wringer washer. This model is from the 1920s and remains in great condition. This particular model was very revolutionary for its time and vaulted the Maytag Company to where it is today.

In the late 1800s and early 1900s, Maytag primarily created farm equipment. During the harvest off-season, Maytag tried its hand with washers. Howard Snyder eventually came up with the design seen in the museum, and this design became one of the most significant designs in laundry appliance history.

This machine, instead of dragging clothes through the water with a lid dolly like before, forced water through a veined agitator on the bottom of the tub.

You can see the Maytag washing machine for yourself on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays and every first Saturday from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. at 210 E Jackson Street in Downtown Vinton at the Vinton History Museum, always "Preserving the Past for the Future."

The Vinton History Museum will re-open after the holidays on Wednesday, January 3, 2024.

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

Byrd's third finalist was Gage Cockran at 144. After a bye and three wins Gage took on Jackson Brockenbrough of Parry McCluer in the final and was edged, 2-1.

Two Terriers won consolation final matches to take third place, Bricen Lancaster at 157 and Aidan Lucas at 190. Kyle Kalinke took a fifth at 113 and Curtis Dillon was sixth at 138.

This week Byrd will split up the team for two weekend tournaments. Half the team will go back to Lynchburg for a tournament at Liberty Christian Academy and the other half will participate in the Knights of the Roundtable event at Cave Spring High School.

Byrd also will be hosting a quad match next Wednesday, January 10. Patrick Henry, Glenvar and Roanoke Catholic will join the Orange in Vinton and it will be "Senior Night" for the William Byrd senior wrestlers.

We have a couple great examples right here in Virginia. How many VMI and James Madison players have left those programs after the school took a chance on them and they had a good year, only to leave for perceived "greener pastures?" Thanks for the scholarship, pal, see you later.

Now let's take the NIL. I'm all for players being rewarded for what they do on the field. The coaches make big money and the school brings in big bucks, so why not the kids who make it all possible? There's plenty of pie for everyone.

Their opening game didn't go well as Byrd fell behind 18-3 to Liberty Christian Academy on Wednesday of last week and lost 68-59.

"We kicked the ball around, threw it around, couldn't hit anything, just a bad quarter coming off Christmas," said coach Brad Greenway. "We competed and tried to get back in it but credit to LCA, they shot the lights out and every time we made a 5-0 or 6-0 run they answered with a big three." Isaiah Board led the Terriers with 25 points, with 15 coming in the second half as Byrd tried to rally. Isaiah hit five three pointers. Hayden Eads had 16 points and Drew Lindsay had 13, hitting three treys. With the loss Byrd played Alleghany on Thursday, the second day of the tournament. The Cougars lost to the eventual champion, Tunstall, in the first round of play. Byrd got off to a better

start in this one, jumping on top 19-13 after the first quarter. However, the Cougars bounced back to win the second quarter, 26-8, and race to a 39-27 lead at intermission. Alleghany then outscored Byrd 34-18 in the second quarter to pull away for a 73-45 win.

"I felt like we let one loss turn into two losses," said Greenway. "We didn't compete like Alleghany did. Again, give credit to Alleghany, that's a big physical team. Their size bothNIT, played for seventh place in the eight team tournament. They were matched up with Roanoke Catholic and salvaged a win, 69-55.

Eads stepped up big with his season high, scoring 28 points. He had 18 of his points in the second half, hitting seven of eight free throws in the process. Lindsay had 11 and Board had nine points.

"We were able to get off to a strong start, moved the ball around consistently and hit shots that were open," said Greenway. "Catholic didn't bring much size to the table and we were able to get off more good looks and finish them than we had the previous two games. Happy to finish the week with a win heading into the new vear."
