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Vinton – a small town doing big things - hosts annual State of the Town address

The Town of Vinton hosted its annual State of the Town address for 2024 at the Vinton War Memorial on April 4. Over 150 attended the event, including many dignitaries from surrounding localities.

Angie Chewning, Executive Director of the Vinton Chamber of Commerce, welcomed guests as the town celebrated "the enduring spirit of our community," its many accomplishments, and the "opportunities that lie ahead."

"We are a small town, but we're doing big things, and that's thanks to the hard work and dedication of our town's staff, our businesses, and our citizens who continue to work tirelessly to make our town a better place to live, work, and play," Chewning

Vinton Vice Mayor Mike Stovall introduced his fellow members of Town Council (Mayor Brad Grose and council members Keith Liles, Laurie Mullins, and Sabrina McCarty) who "bring to the table not only love for this town but love for their

He also welcomed several members of the Roanoke County Board of Supervisors (Chair Phil North, Vice Chair Martha Hooker, and members Tammy Shepherd

of Vinton and David Radford), County Administrator Richard Caywood, and other county officials, along with School Superintendent Dr. Ken Nicely and members of the School Board (Chair Brent Hudson, Vice Chair Cheryl Facciani, David Linden, Shelley Clemons, and Tim Greenway of Vinton). Local principals Tammy Newcomb (William Byrd High School), Evan Noell (William Byrd Middle School), Ashley McCallum (W.E. Cundiff), and Julie Sandzimier (Herman L. Horn) were also recognized.

Stovall then welcomed to the podium Vinton Mayor Brad Grose, who has served on Town Council since 2000 and as mayor since 2004. Grose began by presenting a key to the Town of Vinton to Roanoke City Mayor Sherman Lea who is retiring.

"I'm excited to say that Vinton may look a little different since the last time we met here," Grose said. "We've seen new businesses open, roads improved, traffic signals replaced and both public and private investment in every direction."

The mayor went on to name some of Vinton's specific accomplishments over the past year, or currently underway: completion of Walnut Avenue Phase 1 and 2 projects with fresh pavement, new sidewalks, and bike lanes; the replacement of traffic signals with Opticom Emergency Alert signals at all

11 intersections to help emergency vehicles respond more efficiently;

completion of major utility projects improving water service in partnership with the Western Virginia Water Authority; and completion of the much-needed downtown Walnut Avenue Parking Lot.

Grose noted that one primary focus in Vinton is the outdoors. Work is now underway on the multi-generational park on the Vinton War Memorial campus funded partially through the Virginia Outdoor Foundation, and also local partners, including the Vinton Breakfast Lions Club.

The Greenway Phase 2B connection to Walnut Avenue, which will ultimately

McGhee graduates from FBI Academy

Police Captain Cydney McGhee became interested in a career as a police officer when she was in high school. Family members had been involved in both the police and sheriff's departments, so it came somewhat naturally. That initial interest led to her becoming an intern with the Concord, N.C., Police Department at age 18, which led to a scholarship and a college degree in Criminal Justice from Pfeiffer University. The scholarship was not a gift, but a partnership in which she agreed to work for four years with the agency providing the scholarshipthe Concord PD.

In almost 20 years as a police officer, McGhee has advanced from intern to patrol officer to field training officer to detective and eventually to Captain of Criminal Investigations. She has distinguished herself in her local department and beyond. Along the way, she also earned her Advanced Law Enforcement Certificate from the North Carolina Criminal Justice Training and Standards Commission and her Master's Degree in Business from Pfeiffer. She shares her experiences as an instructor in basic law enforcement at community colleges.

Celebrating Decades of Dogwood Queens

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The 2024 Vinton Dogwood Festival is scheduled for April 26 and 27. Over the past few weeks, The Vinton Messenger has been looking back on past Dogwood Queens leading up to this year's festival and the crowning of a new queen. Miss Vinton Dogwood Queen 2011, Chelsea Greenway (now Bartlett), is featured this

When the Vinton Dogwood Festival was established in 1956, the Dogwood Queen was chosen from princesses nominated by bands participating in the event. Beginning in the early 1980s, the festival became a preliminary to the Miss Virginia and Miss America pageants, with competitions in swimsuits and talent added to judges' interviews to determine the winner. Since the mid-1990s, the Dogwood Queen has been chosen from seniors at William Byrd High School nominated by the faculty and then selected by judges on the day of the festival and parade.

Chelsea Greenway (now Bartlett) was chosen as Dogwood Queen for the 56th Annual Dogwood Festival. She was interviewed the morning of the parade by a panel of judges with questions about her community involvement, current activities, and future plans. During her senior year at William Byrd, she was a member of the Leo Club, Spanish Club, and Beta Club, and co-editor of the student newspaper. She played varsity tennis and had served as a Model General Assembly member. Her plans were to attend James Madison University to become a physical therapist.

The other nominees that year were Sarabeth Landrum, Kelsey Owens, Kasey Short, Emily Jervis, Taylor Patterson, Jodi Overstreet, Regan Drew, Madison Gensurowsky, and Christine Vernon.

In an interview for the WBHS Black Swan yearbook, Bartlett said, "It was very surprising to hear my name called[as queen], since I was not expecting it at all. It was also fun to get dressed up because it was another time to wear an old prom dress. My favorite part about the Dogwood Court was spending time with the other girls before the first interview. We were all giving out tips for answering questions we were not prepared for. It was really cool to see how we all wanted to help each other.

"I can remember going to the Dogwood Festival each year growing up, and we still go every year as a family," Bartlett says. "On that day, I just remember having so much fun getting dressed up and spending time with friends who were fellow contestants. To this day, two of the girls who were selected as candidates are still my best friends."

After the interview, she was crowned by Vinton Mayor Brad Grose at noon on the front portico of the Vinton War

Then she and the other members of the Dogwood Court were honored with a luncheon in the grand ballroom of the War Memorial. After lunch, they boarded the Dogwood Queen float for the parade, which in 2011 reversed course and began at the War Memorial instead of the old William Byrd High School ball fields. The parade grand marshals that year were Manna Ministries of Vinton, a nonprofit which delivered food boxes to the needy in the Vinton area.

"I felt honored to be a part of the famous Dogwood Festival of Vinton that year. It's very nostalgic, and I look forward to seeing the new queen each year!" Bartlett says.

She went on to obtain a Bachelor of Science in athletic training from JMU, an Accelerated Bachelor of Science in Nursing from the Jefferson College of Health Sciences (magna cum laude), her Master of Science in Nursing (with the highest honors) from JMU, and now works as a Family Nurse Practitioner for Lewis-Gale Internal Medicine.

"I have the sweetest daughter and husband [Matt]," Barlett says. "We share our home with two dogs and two cats. We're supported by the best family and friends anybody could ask for. God has truly blessed me beyond measure.

"We have decided to put down roots in Vinton and don't plan on moving. My dad, Tim Greenway, has always been extremely proud of Vinton and the community we have here. We attend Vinton Baptist Church and enjoy many local restaurants."

Bartlett's mother, Paula Greenway, says, "As a mother, there is nothing more precious than witnessing your daughter achieve joy and success. Simply being on the Dogwood Court was enough, but when Chelsea was crowned queen,

InVinton Clean-Up Crew participates in Clean Valley Day

The InVinton Clean-Up Crew (members of Vinton town staff), along with Roanoke Clean Valley Council Executive Director Courtney Plaster, and citizens Janet Scheid and Bud LaRoche participated in Clean Valley Day 2024 in the Town of Vinton. Staff members clean-up supplies—gloves, garbage bags, included Town Manager Pete Peters, Planning and Zoning Director Anita McMillan, Public Works Director Bo Herndon, Economic Development Specialist Marshall Stanley, Assistant Planning and Zoning Director Nathan McClung, and Public Works Administrative Manager Jill Acker.

The group spent the afternoon on April 5 picking up litter along Clearview Drive and the Vinton Bowling Center embankments, Hardy Road and Bypass Roads, and the Pinnacle Bank and Whitlow properties. Nine people filled a total of over 20

bags with trash (cart wipes, plastic bags, realtor signs, plaster boards, etc.). "The environment thanks each of

you," said Plaster, who brought along grabbers, vests—to help with the project. Valley-wide, 25 teams and individuals

with an estimated 350 participants signed up to participate in litter cleanups on April 6 to keep the Roanoke Valley "Clean and Green."

Clean Valley Council's story began in 1978 with a group of concerned citizens determined to combat the litter in their community. Today, they are a 501(c)3 tax-exempt non-profit organization which teaches environmental educational programming within local school

will hold the fourth annual HeRow Expo at William Byrd High School on Saturday, April 13, from 5 to 10 p.m. This event is a car, truck, and powersports show where all proceeds are donated to a sponsored child with a life-threatening illness. With the help of Mandy Price, who

The non-profit HopeDriven organization

helps select each child for the HeRow Expo every year in honor of her daughter Rowan, HopeDriven has selected 8-year-old Tripp Poats of Roanoke.

Tripp was originally diagnosed with leukemia in September 2019 at the age of 3 and underwent two and a half years of chemotherapy. Tripp and his family enjoyed a cancer-free year and a half until his leukemia relapsed in September of 2023. He began treatment locally and suffered some major complications that caused him to be admitted to the hospital and eventually the PICU in Roanoke. His family made the decision to have him transferred to Cincinnati Children's Hospital to recover from complications and to continue

According to HopeDriven, Tripp returned home recently after an inpatient stay of 142 days. He's doing a lot better but is still dealing with some of the side effects from the complications around his treatment. He will return to Cincinnati periodically to receive stronger chemotherapies but can take many of the medications at home. He will receive a total of two and a half years of treatment yet again.

Historically, the HeRow Expo is held in honor of Rowan Price, a local child who gained her angel wings in 2019 after battling leukemia. Rowan's spirit and influence led to the formation of HopeDriven, and this event is held each year to honor the immeasurable impact she had on the community.

To date, HopeDriven has been able to sponsor three children/families and has raised upwards of \$20,000 to put towards medical costs and other associated costs.

For the HeRow Expo 4 event:

Awards are given to the Top 30 in show, People's Choice, Best Stance/Fitment, and Rowan's Choice (selected by the family being sponsored and given to the overall best vehicle in show)

There is a "Light Up the Night" competition (all types of vehicles with custom lights are eligible to enter)

Exhaust Competition: Motorcycle, 6 cylinders or less, and 8 cylinders or above, and the winner of each class competes for the Grand Exhaust Champion trophy All vehicle types are welcome and

there is only a \$10 minimum donation (per vehicle) to enter; larger donations are welcome, but not required All money raised from the entry

fees, raffles, 50/50, and donations goes directly towards the fundraiser for Tripp and his family

All spectators are admitted free

Auditions for American Idol began with 60,000 performers, which was cut down to 150 by Hollywood audition time. That number was cut again to 24 singers after Hollywood Week. Unfortunately, Jeslynn was eliminated in those auditions.

Jeslynn says she has been singing her

Her father, Adam Reynolds, says, "She has been singing since she was 3 years old with our family gospel group (the Reynolds Family). We traveled full-time for close to 10 years singing Christian/ gospel music and everyone always said, 'That girl is going to be a star.' Music and singing were a gift that she was truly born with and something she has always had a

When she was 10 years old, her parents felt God's call to leave their life on the road and lead a church. That led them to Wake the World in Salem, where her father and mother Rebecca are now pastors.

Jeslynn, her parents, and her 9-yearold brother live in Vinton. Her father is a graduate of William Byrd High School. Due to her schedule, she is homeschooled by her mother through Family Christian Academy out of Knoxville, Tenn.. She is now a sophomore. She is unsure of her future plans after graduation, but she knows it will involve music, which is her "passion and No. 1 focus in life. I will follow God's call and trust where He leads me in His will." She is a worship leader at Wake the World and leads the congregation in

She is not only a performer, but a songwriter. Her latest is "Beautiful" about the "feet of Jesus pierced for me." Her song which best describes her life so far is "Dreamer" about chasing your dreams and

Jeslynn says she chose "Gelaine" as her stage name for her Nene, who passed away in 2022 and was also a "powerhouse singer." Her father said, "Jeslynn's already

accomplished so much. Not only on American Idol, but also in writing and arranging her own music. We truly believe that she has songs destined to touch the heart of the world. Our daughter has a very kind heart and a great head on her shoulders. She has been writing songs for years now and wants to make a positive impact in this world. Jeslynn's heart is to spread love and hope through her songs.

"Having just turned 16, and only

being 15 years old when she auditioned for American Idol, we could not be any prouder of all that she has accomplished and the other doors that are already opening

Jeslynn will be going into the studio soon in Nashville to record some EPs which will be released to radio.

Last August, Jeslynn came across information about online auditions for American Idol. Her family encouraged her to try out and just a few days later, she auditioned via Zoom. She was selected for the second round of Zoom auditions, which ultimately resulted in her auditioning live in Nashville in November in front of judges Lionel Richie, Katy Perry, and Luke Bryan. The song she chose to perform was "Still Rolling Stones" by Lauren Daigle.

Jeslynn says the days in Nashville (and Hollywood) involved many hours of waiting to perform in front of the judges, but the time was not idled away. The contestants were busy with digital work, photo shoots, making videos for media and promotion, interviews, and rehearsals.

She describes the entire experience as "surreal." She was "shocked" that she was chosen, but "very thankful." Both her parents accompanied her to Nashville, along with her pianist, Brian Davis.

She knew when she auditioned it would take a "yes" from two of the three judges to receive the Golden Ticket and advance to auditions in Hollywood. During her audition, the judges first asked her questions, then she performed her song. To her surprise, Katy Perry began yelling, "More, more, more!" encouraging her to "belt it out" and give it all she had. Luke Bryan told herhe would "like to hear more grit and dirt," more maturity in her voice, that she wasn't "fully ready yet." Richie and Perry gave Jeslynn the two "yes" votes she would need for the Golden Ticket. When she heard the news, Jeslynn was sobbing and could hardly stand as she went to collect her ticket.

She describes Richie and Perry as down to earth, humble, encouraging, and willing to take time to help a young artist. As for Bryan, "he says it how it is."

In December, she and her mother flew to Hollywood for auditions (all expenses paid) along with 150 other performers. This time, she chose to perform "Don't

ranking female officer in the Concord Police

McGhee has received acclaim for several special projects she has been involved with including a unique one in community relations-the Concord Horse Mounted Patrol. In November 2018, McGhee submitted a proposal to use her own personally owned horses for special events such as the city's Tree Lighting Ceremony, Christmas Parade, and Law Day Ceremony—to the delight of the citizens in Concord. McGhee and her partner worked to train their horses not to be afraid of "bands, kids with horns, characters in costume, floats" and other distractions that

She recently placed herself among the top 1% of all senior law enforcement professionals in the world with her acceptance at the FBI National Academy in Quantico, Va., for a course in advanced leadership, communications, and fitness challenges.

The 10-week residential program which provides coursework in intelligence theory, terrorism and terrorist mindsets, management science, law, behavioral science, law enforcement communication, and forensic science—serves to improve the administration of justice in police departments and agencies at home and abroad and to raise law enforcement standards, knowledge, and cooperation worldwide.

The program was created in 1935 to standardize and professionalize law enforcement departments across the United

She was a member of the 289th class at the academy, which consisted of 197 officers (ages 31-61), 23 of whom were women, with officers from 47 American states, four military organizations, five federal civilian organizations, and 23 nations around the

McGhee has described the FBI Academy training as "a once-in-a-lifetime experience, a very high honor, and the highest recognized training in law enforcement for leadership training. I'm very appreciative to have been able to go."

Although the logistics were far from easyher husband, Todd, is a Major with the Concord Police; she is mother to almost 9-year-old Kellen, and the academy required her to be gone from home for an extended period of time. However, her department saw it as gaining skills, knowledge, and perspectives that would benefit the department and the community.

During her regular job, she is able to work a 12-hour day shift to be home with her son in the evenings. She says he is not yet interested in police work, he's "a sports kid—track, basketball, football, baseball,

The academy began in early January 2024 and ended in mid-March. McGhee took part in specialized trainings and classes taught by experienced FBI instructors and special agents in a "college atmosphere." They lived in dorms, attended daily classes, and ate meals in the cafeteria.

Members of the class took part in weekly "Wizard of Oz" themed physical fitness challenges, culminating in the "Yellow Brick Road" challenge, which involved "a grueling 6.1-mile run through a hilly, wooded trail, where they had to climb over walls, run through creeks, jump through simulated windows, scale rock faces with ropes, crawl in muddy water under barbed wire, and maneuver across a cargo net." When (and if) students complete the course, they receive a yellow brick as a keepsake to memorialize their achievement-McGhee came home

Graduates received their certificates and a handshake from FBI Director Christopher Wray. They were also able to earn 18 college credits with the University of Virginia to apply towards Bachelor's or Master's degree.

McGhee says she will be able to incorporate what she learned at the FBI Academy into her job in many different ways.

She hopes that her new training will benefit others, but also that just her presence as a female officer will be encouraging to other

women contemplating entering the field of law enforcement. She says that the reality is that law enforcement is a "male dominated" profession and "sometimes women have to prove themselves a little bit more. However, there is definitely a place for women."

She enjoys her career because "every day is different; you get to meet good people; you can change people's days. Usually, we get called on their worst days." The memories that stick in her mind are most often ones that involve children. "We try to help people and make those who do bad things, stop."

She wants not only to inspire other women to strive to meet their dreams, but to teach her son that "he can do anything he wants to do."

Angie Chewning of Vinton is McGhee's mother. Her siblings are Drake Lewis (Hannah), Abbie Lewis, and Elena Boitnott.

provide a direct connection to the Tinker Creek Greenway and the entire Roanoke Valley, is in progress. He thanked the Pathfinders for Greenways organization for a donation of \$60,000 to make the greenway connection happen.

Grose recognized local artist Jon Murrill for creating the "Lady Appalachia" mural on the Annex building in downtown Vinton (one in a series throughout southwest Virginia), and thanked Pok-E-Joe's and Pollard 107 South restaurants for choosing to set up business in downtown Vinton, and Twin Creeks Brewing Company for its expansion by adding a music pavilion.

"Thank you for believing in Vinton and for your partnerships. Entrepreneurs have a home here in Vinton."

Grose applauded the 10th anniversary of The Advancement Foundation's Gauntlet Business Program and Competition, "which has helped people locally, regionally, and throughout the state to achieve their dreams.'

He mentioned the partnership with local developers in revitalizing the former Cleveland Mart into new apartments and a commercial space on Cleveland Avenue.\

"Investments like these from local partners with the right vision help us redevelop underutilized properties in Vinton.

"The town is working with private partners on other challenged properties like the fire-affected downtown. Staff is working with the property owners on a daily basis to help with a build-back plan. We hope to redevelop this area into something that is ambitious and fitting for our downtown."

He next spoke about the Gish Mill project, "quite the undertaking, but nothing worth having comes easy. This is the founding structure in the town of Vinton—it's even on our town seal, so its history is deeply engraved and deeply part of Vinton's history. When Holdren's Store closed and the mill was left vacant, Town Council and staff saw an opportunity to bring back our most historic structure. We knew it wouldn't be easy—that has turned out to be

an understatement—but luckily, we have great partners in David Hill and Dr. David Trinkle, who have taken on the challenges to create a mixed-use property with an historic feel. There'll be lodging and space for restaurants.

"Business development brings unique experiences in Vinton but so does art, culture, and events. We pride ourselves on our marquee events like the Dogwood Festival, the Fourth of July fireworks, and the Christmas Parade. We are excited to work with the Boys and Girls Clubs of Southwest Virginia on the Four on the 4th Race, and the Chamber's Mingle at the Market concert series.

"I must say we have a lot of fun at these events, but the best part is watching Vinton citizens come together as a community, enjoy their community, and have fun. It's really

"There are perfect examples of coordination across all of our departments from Public Works to police to administration, to partners of all kinds, helping bring our community together.

"For example, the Vinton the Breakfast Lions Club has been extremely important in working with us to help us build two new bus shelters, one at Precision Fabrics and the other at Lake Drive Plaza. a Cop are just a few examples of how they get to know the residents that they work so hard to protect. I am really proud

of the service they deliver here in Vinton. "Our roads and neighborhoods have never looked any better and that's due to the hard work of our Public Works Department. I can't say enough today to cover all the things these professionals do for our community, but I'll say that we wouldn't have the newly paved roads, our incredible Christmas decorations, and our clean community without our folks at Public Works. They have a great team, and they do a great job.

"We've talked a lot about our projects, but they wouldn't happen without a balanced budget. Our Finance Department has worked hard to make the town financially strong across the board. This past year they implemented a new software program in coordination with our friends at Roanoke County to streamline the financial procedures throughout the town.

"I've talked a lot about the great things that we've done to help improve Vinton this past year but one of the absolute most exciting things coming up this next year is the start of our Comprehensive Plan which will be the vision for Vinton for the next 25 years. Every department will be involved and so will our residents, businesses, community partners and stakeholders. That's what makes it exciting—we want the entire town to be involved in this

important plan. "I think I can speak for the entire Town Council when I say that we are extremely excited to see our community

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
