

Dogwood Queen to be crowned on April 27; 10 Byrd seniors vying for title

The 2024 Vinton Dogwood Queen will be crowned at the Vinton Municipal Building by Mayor Brad Grose at noon on April 27.

Her hobbies include tennis, singing, hiking, baking, and reading. She has worked at Pok-E-Joe's since last August and plans to continue to work there through this summer as well.







Vinton Town Council recognized members of the Vinton/Roanoke County Veteran's Monument Committee at its meeting on April 16 with a proclamation thanking them for their service to the town. The committee was established in 2006 to raise funds for and build a monument on the Vinton War Memorial campus to honor veterans and current members of the armed forces. The results of their hard work and dedication to the community and to veterans is the much-acclaimed, frequently visited, and often photographed High Ground Monument in Vinton.

The monument holds the names of veterans from Vinton and Roanoke County who were killed in action during the Korean War, World War II, Vietnam, Desert Storm, Iraqi Freedom, and Afghanistan.

Bootie Chewning served as chair of the committee, along with Vice Chair Audrey Thrasher, Secretary-Treasurer Kathryn Sowers, Directors Mary Beth Layman, Brad Grose, and Jason Peters, Assistant Director Candye Peters, and committee members Sam Cundiff, Norm Jasper, Betty Kelly, JoAnn Lonker, Steve Lonker, Bob Patterson, Doug and Mattie Forbes, and

After nearly 20 years, the committee has decided to dissolve and the town has elected to create a designated account to hold the remaining monies, as well as future donations and grant proceeds, for the "ongoing maintenance, enhancement and promotion" of the iconic structure.

Town Council welcomed two new employees— Mandy Adkins and Rachel Nunley. Adkins has been named Cultural Placemaking and Events Director; she

will be responsible for planning and facilitating events and festivals in the town, working with the Chamber of Commerce, and overseeing the Vinton War Memorial, Vinton Farmers' Market, and Vinton History Museum. Nunley is the Community Programs Supervisor of Marketing and Events.

Adkins comes to Vinton from Botetourt County where she served as Director of Parks and Recreation. Nunley served as Sales & Marketing Project Manager for Visit Virginia's Blue Ridge and previously worked as an intern with the Vinton Area Chamber of Commerce. Town Manager Pete Peters noted that the Community

Programs Department is now fully staffed. Adkins and Nunley join Amanda Payne, Caroline Loveland, and Shay Hicks. Vinton Chamber of Commerce Executive Director

Angie Chewning and Executive Assistant/Financial Coordinator Kathryn Sowers updated council members on Chamber activities and events in 2024.

Associate Planner Fayula Gordon discussed the 2024 Arbor Day celebration coming up at the Vinton Library on April 25 at 10:30 a.m. She noted that the town has been designated as a Tree City USA for over 20 years. To retain that designation, the town is required to hold an Arbor Day Celebration each year, along with tree plantings and tree education outreach. Staff is responsible for securing Virginia Department of Forestry grant funding and partners with the Roanoke Valley Urban Forestry Council and Roanoke Valley-Alleghany Regional Commission (RVARC) in submitting the grant request, with the town providing the required matching funds.

These funds have enabled the town to plant trees on public properties, including the elementary schools Vinton, Wolf Creek Greenway, M.A. Banks Park,

on the grounds of Vinton Public Works, Vinton War Memorial, Vinton Municipal Building, Craig Avenue Recreation Center, and Glade Creek Greenway. This year 10 trees will be planted along Glade Creek Greenway to complete a natural screening fence.

The children's outreach program this year includes an Arbor Day Drawing Competition around the theme "The Life Cycle of Evergreen Trees." Citizens are encouraged to vote online at https://pollunit.com/ polls/arbor_day_drawings_2024 or in-person at the Municipal Building for their favorite drawing.

The Arbor Day Celebration will include remarks from Assistant Planning and Zoning Director Nathan McClung and Mayor Grose, a poetry reading by Gordon, announcement of the winners of the Art Contest, a visit from Senior Area Forester Denny McCarthy and Smokey Bear, and story time with the library staff. Vinton History Museum celebrating 35th anniversary, kicks off 'Rising to New Heights' fundraising campaign

The Vinton History Museum will visit the website to make a donation or celebrate its 35th anniversary on Stop by the museum on April 22 or Monday, April 22, from noon to 6 during their business hours. p.m. That day will also mark the kickoff of the fundraising campaign for the "Rising to New Heights Cargo/ Accessibility Lift." The installation of the lift will improve accessibility to the second floor of the museum for visitors and volunteers.

The 1906 Upson home that houses the museum boasts over 4,000 artifacts and resources available for viewing. The stately two-story home was donated to the Town of Vinton by the Upson family.

The cargo/personnel lift fundraising campaign is the largest project the museum has undertaken since its opening in 1989. Over the past 20 years, \$60,000 has been raised for the installation of the lift. The museum expects to receive another \$4,000 in grant funding but will need to raise an additional \$60,000 to make this project a reality.

If you would like to help the Vinton History Museum "rise to new heights,"

Museum staff will be "Churning It Up" by receiving dollars and donations in an antique rocking butter church for the Cargo/Accessibility Lift project. There will also be more information available about the project at the anniversary open house.

Light refreshments will be served throughout the afternoon. Door prizes will include drawings each hour for free Vinton Historical Society Annual Memberships, a Vinton Historical Landmark Throw, Vintage Dogwood Festival plates, and more.

Historic artifacts may be viewed throughout the day.

Several Vinton Public Works employees competed in the Southwest Virginia Public Works Academy Equipment Rodeo at the Berglund Center on April 10.

The rodeo began originally as a Roanoke City event and grew through the years to include workers from surrounding areas including the Town of Vinton, Salem, Roanoke County, Blacksburg, Christiansburg, the Western Virginia Water Authority, and others.

Individual competitions require specific skills, accuracy, and/or speed with various pieces of equipment— the knuckleboom truck, backhoe, bucket truck, mini-excavator, zero turn mower, and front-end loader.

uses a hydraulically operated arm to pick up brush, appliances, and other large bulk items. In the competition, the operator is required to use the arm and its claw to pick up a small brick, swing it around the vehicle, and lower it onto a bulls-eye target. Mini-excavator operators must pick up a toy ball and dump it into a bucket on the ground.

The bucket truck competition requires the operator to replace a traffic signal light on a pole between 18 and 35 feet in the air, dressed in full safety harness and using all safety precautions. The zero turn mower competition is a tight course with many obstacles to avoid in a timed competition.


they wish to compete in. Events are scored on the actual time taken to complete the task and any penalties acquired.

The Association of the United States Army (AUSA) Allegheny-Blue Ridge Chapter hosted their "Community Salutes Our Future Soldiers" event, including swearing-in ceremony, on April 12 at the Vinton War Memorial. Col. John Miller (R),

president of the local AUSA Chapter, served as master of ceremonies. Tammy Shepherd, who represents the Vinton Magisterial District on the Roanoke County Board of Supervisors, welcomed guests, including the new recruits and their families. She noted that her

grandfather served in World War II. She commended the military personnel in the ballroom who are currently serving or were about to be sworn in, for their dedication and sacrifice. She also thanked their families for their support.

Col. Miller introduced the guest speaker, LTC Bowe Averill, Battalion Commander of

U.S. Army Recruiting Command (USAREC) in Richmond. He enlisted in the Army in 1996 and has since been deployed in Afghanistan several times as a platoon leader, an advisor, and a Battalion Executive Officer. His awards and decorations include the Bronze Star and the Meritorious Service Medal.

The Vinton Veterans Outreach Committee (VOC) helped to organize and facilitate the "Salute to Future Soldiers" event.



A Study of Ephesians: 'Made for Good Works'

Our focus at Lynn Haven Baptist Church for 2024 is on Discipleship. Discipleship is the process of becoming more like Christ tomorrow than you

Halfway through Ephesians 2 (v.11),





Vinton's Patterson Stadium. Pantoja had 23 saves to keep the Terriers in the game. "I thought our guys played really


well but fell 7-5 to Jefferson Forest at

The Terriers were back in the Blue Ridge District on Tuesday and were shut out by Franklin County




