William Byrd High School welcomes new administrators and faculty members for 2024-2025 school year

William Byrd High School begins the 2024-2025 school year with three new administrators and 10 new faculty members.

Travis Anderson is Byrd's new principal, replacing Tammy Newcomb who was named Executive Director of Administration for the school system. Anderson grew up in Mechanicsville, Va. He earned his bachelor's degree in mathematics and a Master's Degree in Curriculum and Instruction from Virginia Tech, and a Master's Degree in Educational Leadership from Radford University.

He began his career with Roanoke County Public Schools in 2012 as a math teacher (mainly geometry) at Cave Spring High School. In 2018, he became the testing coordinator at William Byrd High School. In 2020, he was named as an assistant principal at WBHS. One of his most impactful duties has been coordinating the multi-milliondollar William Byrd Renovation and Expansion Project.

As for his special interests, Anderson loves Hokie football and seldom misses a home game; in fact, he estimates that he has only missed three or four games since 1996.

He and his wife, Christine, have four children, a 2-year-old, 6-year-old twins, and an 8-yearold. They are active members of Clearbrook Baptist Church. "I love working with the William Byrd students and the community, and I am excited for the new opportunity to lead in this community," Anderson said. "There is a lot of positive history and tradition to build on."

New Assistant Principal Hannah Prater began her teaching career at WBHS in 2017 as a geometry and Algebra teacher. This past year, she became the testing coordinator. She has served as Senior Sponsor for several years, organized pep rallies for the past six years (which she will continue), and coached JV girls basketball.

She is originally from Naperville, Ill. She earned her undergraduate degree from Virginia Tech and her Master's certificate in Educational Leadership from James Madison University. She will be assuming the duties Anderson covered in his years as assistant principal at Byrd, plus serve as the Data



Niagara Road closed for replacement of sanitary sewer line

Niagara Road has closed from Hardy Road to Lauderdale Avenue so that the Western Virginia Water Authority (WVWA) can make permanent repairs to a sanitary sewer line that was damaged by a sinkhole earlier this year.

The replacement of the line will take several weeks to complete. Drivers will need to follow detours using either 3rd Street or Clearview Drive as they did when the sinkhole first appeared in June.

The temporary line will continue to operate while the new line is completed and then the temporary line will be disconnected. The WVWA expects any disruption to service would be minimal and most likely not even noticed. The Authority may also supplement service with a pump if necessary to keep service active.

The original line was approximately 40 feet underground. The new line will be closer to the surface and more easily accessible should another problem arise.

The new line will most likely be ABS or PVC plastic and should be good for 100+ years. The old line itself wasn't really a problem, until the sink hole opened and damaged the pipe. This was exacerbated by the extreme depth of the old line.

KFC, Long John Silver's, Grand Storage, and Salon 121 will remain

accessible from Niagara Road. The back entrance access road to Rosie's off of Niagara Road will be closed during construction as the work involves that specific area where the lines interconnect.

The turn lane from Hardy Road onto Niagara will not close for now except to through-traffic.


coffee pouches). Lunch includes assorted sandwiches, fruit salad, chips, cookies, and beverages (at no charge).

Tai Chi Defensive Cane Class begins at Vinton community center

A new free Tai Chi-based class, "Eight Immortals Tai Chi Cane and Defensive Cane Class," kicked-off on August 12 at the Charles R. Hill Community Center. Steve Garay, who taught basic Tai Chi classes for many years at the Community Center, is the instructor. He is also the pastor of Roanoke-Oakview Church of Christ where he has served for about 25 years.

He got hooked on the Tai Chi discipline when he enrolled in a class at Virginia Western Community College and realized it "was a perfect fit for me." Although the movements in Tai Chi appear to be simple, Garay says they take time and patience to master.

He noticed a significant improvement in his balance, flexibility, and focus within a few weeks, and went on to teach Tai Chi himself at VWCC, in Vinton, and at other locations, and at various events.

Most people think of Tai Chi as a introductory class was what kind of

gentle form of exercise with extremely slow circular movements perfect mainly for seniors, but actually Tai Chi is a form of martial arts derived from Chinese Kung Fu. That's where the new class Garay is teaching comes in.

The "Eight Immortals Tai Chi Cane and Defensive Cane Class" is somewhat different from basic Tai Chi movements- a very special routine. It involves an actual walking cane, which individuals in the class learn to use for self-defense. While there are still simple methodical movements, one following another, there are also powerful moves, blocks, and explosive strikes using the cane.

About 20 students attended the first class, primarily middle-aged and seniors. One of them was Mike Ferguson who first learned basic Tai Chi from Garay and now is an instructor himself at the Community Center on Thursday mornings. Some of the others were Ferguson's students, eager to learn more. The first topic of discussion at the cane was needed for best results. Garay had brought a large selection with him and took time to discuss their pros and cons. For example, lightweight aluminum canes are most likely too flimsy to provide much protection, but they are adjustable in height; heavy duty ones are more useful.

Garay also demonstrated combat canes, stockman canes used to herd cattle, Bubba sticks (with no hook), gentleman canes with fancy knobs, hardwood canes, and canes that disguised a sword within. He had advice on where to buy canes sturdy enough for self-defense- drug stores, Walmart, Goodwill, medical supply stores, and yard sales. He noted that you should select a cane that is the correct length for you or one that can be adjusted.

For those who didn't bring a cane to practice or own one, Garay offered a check-out system from his supply.

He demonstrated the correct way to walk with a cane (elbow bent and using the opposite foot when walking, with the hook forward for more control).

"Canes help develop confidence, help you think defensively, and learn how to move in manner so you don't attract attention or don't appear to be a target," Garay said. "The cane becomes an extension of you and your arm. Remember, canes can do damage."

They can keep you safe and help you escape in a variety of situations such as threats from stray dogs, animal predators (like coyotes), and the random mugger.

The class next practiced swinging their canes (without clobbering each other) and then moved into the Tai Chi routine, which involved more intricate movements in handling the canes, along with strikes, blocks, and lunges. Garay said learning the Eight Immortals Tai Chi routine takes a lot of repetitive practice.

The cane sessions last for an hour and will continue through the end of the year. The Charles R. Hill Community Center is located on the grounds of the Vinton War Memorial.



Downtown Vinton now officially deemed 'Historic'

The Downtown Vinton" designation is now official on the national level. The town received the Virginia Landmarks Register designation from the Virginia Dept. of Historic Resources in March 2024, but now officially appears on the National Register of Historic Places. The announcement was made via the Weekly List of the National Register of Historic Places issued on August 7.

The National Register of Historic Places is the official list of the nation's historic sites worthy of preservation. Authorized by the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966, the National Register is part of a program to coordinate and support public and private efforts to identify, evaluate, and protect America's historic and archeological resources. Being on the list helps qualified historic properties receive preservation benefits and incentives.

The Vinton Downtown Historic District encompasses the commercial core of the Town of Vinton, centered around the intersection of South Pollard Street and Lee Avenue, bound Walnut by Avenue, Washington Avenue, Maple Avenue, Jackson Avenue. and

The district features a collection of commercial and municipal buildings from the early to mid-20th century and typifies a rural community in Southwest Virginia that developed into a downtown business

"Historic hub over the course of the 20th century, after the establishment of railway transportation in the region.

The campaign to place downtown Vinton on both historic registers grew out of the desire to relocate the historic Cundiff's Drugs store sign to its original location in downtown Vinton.

The town discovered that Virginia State Code states, "It shall be unlawful for any place of business which is not a pharmacy to advertise or to have upon it or in it as a sign the words, 'pharmacy,' 'pharmacist,' 'apothecary,' 'drugstore,' 'druggist,^{*} 'drugs,' 'medicine store,' 'drug sundries,' 'prescriptions filled' or any like words indicating that drugs are compounded or sold or prescriptions filled."

The town discovered an exception could be granted "for such signage on an historic building

VDOT hosting design public hearings on Route 460 improvements on August 22

Virginia Department The of Transportation (VDOT) and the City of Roanoke will hold public hearings at the same time and location for three adjacent projects intended to improve traffic flow and safety on Route 460 (Challenger Avenue/ Orange Avenue) in Roanoke County and Roanoke City.

The VDOT hearing will include information on two projects in Roanoke County. One project starts at Blue Hills Village Drive and extends about 1.1 miles east and the other starts 0.27 mile east of Huntridge Road and extends about 0.5 mile east. The City of Roanoke's hearing will focus on the project that starts at Hickory Woods Drive and extends about 1.1 miles east.

The hearings are scheduled for Thursday, August 22 from 5 to 7 p.m. at Bonsack Elementary School in the cafeteria.

This will be an open-house style meeting where attendees can come and go as they please. If you live in the Bonsack area or eat at Chick-fil-A or shop at the Bonsack Walmart or Lowe's or Country Corner, these projects will be of special interest to you.

The projects include improvements at six intersections along Route 460 (Challenger Avenue) in Roanoke County. VDOT and Roanoke County staff will be available to answer questions. The following intersections in Roanoke County will be improved:

- West Ruritan Road
- Carson Road

East Ruritan Road / Bonsack Road Country Corner Store (4273

Challenger Avenue) Huntridge Road

Cloverdale Road (U.S. Route 220 Alternate)

The intersections will be reconstructed

using innovative intersection design concepts, such as restricted crossing U-turns (RCUT), thru-cuts or a displaced left turn.

An RCUT redirects traffic that currently would turn left onto Route 460 from a side street to make a right turn and proceed to make a U-turn. A thru-cut intersection redirections side street through traffic to turn left or right at the signal and make a U-turn. A displaced left turn requires left-turning vehicles to cross to the other side of the road temporarily and reduces signal phases to improve the operations at the intersection.

The first project starts at Blue Hills Village Drive and extends about 1.1 miles east.


The second project starts 0.27 mile east of Huntridge Road and extends about 0.5 mile east.

VDOT completed a study in 2021 for the section of Route 460 (Orange Avenue/ Challenger Avenue) from Route 11 (Williamson Road) to Route 220 Alternate (Cloverdale Road). This study identified and evaluated alternatives to address safety issues and to improve traffic flow and reduce congestion.

Roanoke County submitted funding applications for the two projects between Blue Hills Village Drive and Avery Row as part of the SMART SCALE process and funding was approved by the Commonwealth Transportation Board.

The Roanoke County projects are now in the design phase. Construction bids will be accepted in Spring 2026 with an estimated project start date of Summer 2026. The anticipated completion date is Spring 2028. The estimated cost of the project is \$43.9 million.

A story that needs to be told

Roanoke native Jae McCadden and Salem baseball legend Billy Sample have been working on a project they hope will make it to the silver screen and touch some lives, and baseball is a part of it.

McCadden began his professional career in sports working for the National Basketball Association and National Hockey League front offices in sales. He grew up around sports, as he's the son of long time Roanoke politician and social activist Delvis "Mac" McCadden. Mac was a professional baseball umpire, including a stint in the Carolina League, and Jae was a fixture around Salem Municipal Field, which is ironically enough now named for Sample.

Jae showed a knack for forming partnerships with companies to invest in major sports teams and in 2010 he turned his interest to financing independent films. Now living in New York City, he formed TubbyTownFilms in 2017 and has structured financing with major banks and film productions for independent films.

McCadden optioned the script, "Love for An Iron Horse" a couple of years ago. It was introduced to him by Ann Champion, a Glenvar graduate, about a decade ago.

"At that time I wasn't in a position to impact from behind the camera as I was just a film financier on smaller movies," said McCadden. "I always thought the story was relatable and could see the appeal from not only the commercial standpoint but also something that could resonate with everyone."

The story is not really about baseball, but dreams.

"No matter how much money you have or accolades you've collected over the years, we all still have them," said Jae. "A couple of years ago while walking around New York City I was on the phone with Ann, frustrated that a major film opportunity had fallen apart, and she encouraged me to pick up 'Iron Horse' again. I remember I was on the corner of 59th and Central Park. Anyway, I went home and read it again and found it to be a message that I needed at the time. I said to myself, maybe I should give Jim a buzz, and the rest is history."

"Jim" is Jim Meredith, a longtime educator in the Lynchburg School system and a Glenvar graduate as well. He wrote the script for "Love for an Iron Horse" over 30 years ago on a typewriter, and it's visually based on his memories of growing up on the Roanoke River in Salem.

"He would ride his bike to town from Antrim Street, down Mill Lane across the Low Water Bridge, across two sets of railroad tracks all the way to Academy Street where his paper route began," said McCadden. "In the screenplay, 12 year old African-American boy William lives on a river which separates the Black community from the White community. This was not the case in Salem, but William's bridge becomes the passageway to uncertainty and adventure."

The river separates two cultures that have more in common than they think. William's railroad is on the main line somewhere between New York City and St. Petersburg, Florida, where the New York Yankees have spring training.

"If you know that the great Yankees' player Lou Gehrig was known as the Iron Horse you'll likely start to imagine the story for yourself," said McCadden. "William loves baseball but his only point of reference is what he has heard on his Aunt Rachel's radio and a few baseball cards. While on an errand to town for Aunt Rachel, William sees White Boys playing baseball and he's captivated. But, in a southern town in the 1930's, the two races did not mix."

In this story a white boy, named Charlie, befriends William but their growing friendship creates a series of racial incidents. The name of the project, still a working title, is a play off the great Lou Gehrig and the train that runs through this Virginia town.

"After executing a deal with Jim(Meredith), I assembled a team starting with Susan Michels of SWE Films," said McCadden. "She produced Spike Lee's 2020 film 'Son of the South.' She agreed that the message in this script was something the world needed at the time as well.

"We thought this story could use a little bit more of something, and what better time to add former Salem-Roanoke Baseball Hall of Famer Billy Sample? Even though he played just a little over a year with the New York Yankees, it made sense to bring him on."

Sample, who played in the big leagues nine years with the Rangers, Yankees and Braves, has dipped his toe into the film industry as well with his "Reunion 108" several years back. Billy read Meredith's script and was eager to get involved.

"Everyone knows Mac McCadden, but actually I had met Jae in New York City when he and my oldest son, Ian, were working on a project," said Sample. "Ian has produced some small works and even wrote a script with and involving Marilyn McCoo and Billy Davis Jr. of the Fifth Dimension.

"After understanding the theme and reading the script, I think that this will be a feel good movie, but with some hard twists and turns. I felt a tug of sentiment knowing that screenwriter Jim Meredith, a white man, had to deal with racism from whites while going to Glenvar because he has the same name as renown civil rights leader James Meredith."

Sample opened up his Major League Baseball contacts to Jae to continue to make the movie a reality. Billy will also serve as a baseball consultant for the project.

"I try to make sure that the movie is as accurate as possible to the time setting of the movie," said Sample. "The other producers are probably tired of me already, but I can't have a broadcaster from the late 1950s calling his name on the radio when it's in the late 1930s.

"I was an advisor for the Showtime movie, 'Joe Torre, Curveballs Along the Way' and I had to eat the editing mistakes. The producer, who wasn't allowed on set because he went over the budget with his actors hires, relied on me for evidently more than I could cover. At the premiere of the movie, I held my breath until the end, but just before I could exhale there was one horrible glitch because the director didn't shoot enough footage to cover the scene. This won't happen with this picture, as I'll be

in close communication with the editors, if not there in person. I'll be on set otherwise."

Meredith suggested that McCadden reach out to Leigh Anna Fry, a Salem High School and University of Virginia graduate. She had been familiar with the script for many years through her mother, the late Freda (Crosswhite) Fry, who taught both Jim and Anna at Glenvar High School and knew Billy when he was at Andrew Lewis High in the early '70s.

"Leigh Anna is currently an actor residing in Los Angeles, and is no stranger to sports nostalgia films," said McCadden. "She appeared in the 2015 film 'Coach of the Year,' based on a true story about a Richmond swim team trying to win a state championship without a pool to practice in."

Sample saw a lot of himself in the script. Growing up in Salem when segregation was still an issue, Billy had to deal with racism as an everyday fact of life. His athletic prowess made him a popular figure, starring in baseball and playing receiver on some outstanding Andrew Lewis High School football teams, but that only went so far.

"This film reminds me a bit of meeting Ronnie Galliher, who only lived a couple of short blocks away in the segregated part of downtown Salem," said Sample. "We played against each other in football, he wearing the green and white of the American League team, and me wearing the Halloween black and orange colors of the Baby Eagles."

The "Baby Eagles" were named after the G.W. Carver High School Eagles. Carver was the school for black children in Roanoke County and located in Salem. It still stands and is now an integrated elementary school.

"Ronnie invited me to come out for his little league team," remembers Sample. "I wasn't getting much playing time with the neighborhood team, so I ended up playing for Dr. Pepper, coached by the tough taskmaster, Junior Epperly, where I derived some significant self-esteem from playing baseball."

McCadden is considering filming some of the scenes in the Roanoke Valley. It's still a work in progress, but he has high hopes it will become a reality in the near future.

"Since acquiring the script, the project has attracted interest from some big talent and a couple of Hollywood Studios," he said.

Sample feels it has a lot to offer. While the plight of minorities is improving, there's still a long way to go.

"It seems to me just when I think racism is waning, and believe me I don't look under rocks for it, something happens to slap me back to reality," he said. "I had a couple of incidents in the last few years that had me asking, 'really?

"It makes this script still very relevant."


