The closeknit Vinton and William Byrd communities came out in force on August 18 to show their support for student Camden Thepsimuong. After a visit to the emergency room in early July for what he thought was a meniscus tear, the 16-year-old was diagnosed with osteosarcoma (a form of bone cancer). He has undergone surgery with chemotherapy treatments to follow at a hospital in North Carolina.

His aunt, Sounida Wilcher, set up the “Cam’s Purpose” GoFundMe page to raise money both for his treatments

and for expenses involved in traveling back and forth to the hospital and lodging. Jason Lane, who is a William Byrd parent, offered to facilitate a fundraiser, which featured craft and food vendors and a cruise-in car show.

Cam was able to attend the fundraiser and boosted the spirits of everyone who attended. He circulated through the crowd, courtesy of a wheelchair pushed by his friends and family.

“Camden is a big light and is very active in his faith, church, and school,” his mother, Charlene, says. “We are claiming victory now over his healing. We know he is strong, and we appreciate how close the community

has come in their thoughts and prayers for Cam. We are very appreciative of the messages sent and the phone calls/text received. The outpouring of love and support from everyone has been comforting to receive.”

Cam has been a valued member of the football and tennis teams at Byrd. He is an honor roll student, currently in the 11th grade.

“Those who know Cam will often say he is always smiling. And he is; he always does,” his mother said. “He has so much energy, so much love and so much light to give. We know that there is still so much more of him to give. He is strong and we stand beside him through this journey. We are expecting

a victory, and we are confident that Camden will be healed in Jesus’ name. We are so very thankful for the prayers and ask that you continue to keep our son in prayer, if and when you can.”

His mother also expressed her appreciation to William Byrd and Jason Lane for hosting the event.

The costs associated with treatment, medical bills, travel, and hotel stays quickly add up.

Donations at the fundraiser Sunday totaled about \$5,000. Almost \$30,000 has been raised toward a total goal of \$50,000 on the GoFundMe page. You can help by donating to Cam’s GoFundMe page at <https://gofund.me/f0d7164c>.

VDOE wants your opinion on cell phone usage in schools

The Roanoke County School Board has approved changes to the policy for the use of mobile devices by high school students. Under this policy, high school students may use mobile devices (cell phones, smart watches, or tablets) before school, after school, in between classes and during lunch, but not during classroom times. Mobile devices must be off and kept out of sight at all times during the entire class period. The policy was approved by the School Board at the meeting on August 13.

As part of this policy, elementary and middle school students may not use mobile devices during the entire school day, which is in keeping with established procedures at elementary and middle schools. Mobile devices must be off and kept out of sight at all times during the

school day.

The use of the personal mobile device in violation of School Board policies and procedures, school rules, and this regulation will result in the following consequences:

- 1st offense – Student will surrender the personal mobile device(s) to the teacher. Teacher will return student’s device(s) at the end of class. Student will be assigned one day of after-school detention or silent lunch. Teacher will notify the parent/guardian.
- 2nd offense –Teacher will make an office referral. School administration will suspend the student’s personal mobile device privileges for five school days. The student will be required to

Street, which is rumored to be preparing to perform abortions. In several previous meetings, Mayor Brad Grose has stated that the Town of Vinton did not recruit the business and was unaware of its intentions until recently. Council, the Planning Commission and the town attorney have since been exploring legal remedies to the situation, given that abortion is an issue of state law and currently permitted in Virginia.

In relation to the matter of the proposed clinic, Assistant Director of Planning and Zoning Nathan McClung briefed council on proposed amendments to the Vinton Zoning Ordinance. The proposed amendments would “require medical and dental clinic uses to obtain a special use permit in the R-B Residential-Business District, GB General Business District, CB Central Business District, M-1 Limited Industrial District, M-2 General Industrial District, PD Planned Unit Development District, and MUD Mixed-Use Development District, and require hospitals to obtain a special use permit in the GB General Business, M-1 Limited Industrial District, and M-2 General Industrial District.”

McClung explained that special use permits are legislative in nature; that uses allowed by special use permit are considered to have a potentially greater impact than those allowed as a “matter of right”; special use permits must be evaluated under reasonable standards, based on zoning principles; and impacts from special use permits are addressed through conditions which council can impose.

The proposed zoning amendments are justified by the Virginia Code which recognizes the needs of agriculture, industry, and business in future growth, provides residential areas with healthy surroundings for family life, and provides for growth that is consonant with the efficient and economical use of public funds.

The Virginia Code also states that the purpose of zoning ordinances is to reduce or prevent congestion in the public streets, facilitate creation of a convenient, attractive, and harmonious community and the provision of

adequate services, encourage economic development activities that provide desirable employment and enlarge the tax base, and encourage the most appropriate uses of land throughout the town.

The Town of Vinton Code states that special use provisions are intended to consider impacts of a proposed use on neighboring properties in deciding whether to grant or deny a special use permit or to impose certain conditions upon an approved use.

Town staff has recommended the change to the zoning ordinance to no longer permit medical and dental facilities and hospitals as a “matter of right” within the town, but instead to require such uses to undergo the special use permit process.

This process will allow the Planning Commission and Town Council to determine the most appropriate use of land by evaluating, among other factors, the existing use and character of the property proposed for use as a medical or dental facility or hospital, the suitability of the subject property for various other uses, the need for the proposed use in light of the trends of growth or change, the current and future requirements of the community as to land for various purposes, the impacts on public services, the conservation of properties and their values and the encouragement of the most appropriate uses of land throughout the town, and the impact of the proposed use on neighbors.

The proposed amendments will be discussed at joint Planning Commission and Town Council public hearings to be held on Tuesday, September 3 at 6 p.m., in the Council Chambers of the Vinton Municipal Building. The Planning Commission and Town Council will also hold a joint work session on September 3, at 5:15 p.m., prior to the public hearing.

Council next adopted a resolution approving the “Term Contract for Architectural, Engineering, and Surveying Services” and authorizing the town manager to execute and deliver contracts to 27 selected qualified firms for professional services on an on-call basis.

a Purchase Agreement between Jimenez & Karki Properties, LLC, and the town for property located on Tinker Avenue in the Midway section of Vinton. The owners expressed a desire to sell the real estate, which is located within the floodway, near the intersection of Tinker and Glade Creeks, making it prone to possible property damage and physical harm to future inhabitants. The purchase price of the property is \$18,000. The cost of demolition of the property is \$7,000, which can be completed in-house by Vinton Public Works. The property will be preserved as green space.

Council also adopted a resolution authorizing the town manager to execute a five-year deed of lease with the Commonwealth of Virginia, Department of General Services (known as the Health Department) for a portion of the building located at 227 South Pollard. Some physical improvements will be made to the building.

McClung updated council on issues discussed at the most recent Community Development Committee meeting. The traffic signal at PFG which was damaged in a vehicular

accident has been repaired and is back on-line. Discussion continues on the proposed West Lee Avenue Project that will make significant improvements to the alleys in the downtown area. Bids are out for prospective developers of the Jackson/Walnut Avenue property (formerly Steve’s Garage). Bids are due on September 11 for the Thrasher Stormwater Improvement Project at the church, a situation caused by a failing culvert. Playground equipment has been ordered for the Community Park to be located on the site of the old Vinton Municipal Pool and will be installed early next spring. Signalized crosswalks have been completed on Gus Nicks Boulevard and Hardy Road.

Deputy Town Manager Cody Sexton noted that new flashing yellow arrows have been installed on the traffic signals at the Virginia/South Pollard and Washington Avenue/Bypass intersections, and that the new (and much-needed) trash truck will be arriving in early September.

He also announced that Downtown Vinton has been added to the National Register of Historic Places – quite an achievement.

Reminder for attendance at Roanoke County School events

If you are attending events in Roanoke County Public middle and high schools, there are procedures to follow for guest events (athletic competitions,

performances, concerts and any event where the public is invited to attend):

- Only clear bags are allowed (exceptions made for small clutches 4.5” x 6.5”, medical

supplies, and diaper bags may be searched)

- No outside food or drinks allowed
- All elementary and middle school age students must be

accompanied by an adult at all times

- No re-entry for ticketed events (exception for events with all-day passes)

These restrictions

exclude participants, officials, and authorized individuals. Event staff, with the support of school administrators, will enforce these procedures.

Those violating these procedures may be denied entry or may be asked to leave school property.

Overcoming Obstacles

Read Joshua 14:1 through 17:18

Sometimes, in the pursuit of God’s will, we “spiritualize” our natural desire for comfort. We make “faith statements,” claiming that if God is leading us, every problem should resolve itself. That is not the reality of godly living. Scripture is filled with examples of God’s people encountering obstacles while following divine directives.

Division of the Promised Land among the Israelites came with the responsibility of engaging enemy nations. Israel’s record in fulfilling that responsibility is spotty. As just one example, the tribes of Ephraim and Manasseh claimed their inheritance was too small.

“If you are so numerous,” Joshua answered, “and if the hill country of Ephraim is too small for you, go up into the forest and clear land for yourselves there in the land of the Perizzites and Rephaites” (Joshua 17:15).

Joshua reminded the descendants of Joseph that much of their inheritance in the Promised Land remained to be conquered. They needed to step up to that challenge.

Prayer Suggestion: As God shows you what He wants you to do, pray in faith that He will help you overcome the obstacles.

check the personal mobile device(s) into the main office at the upon arriving at school and retrieve the device(s) from the main office upon leaving school. The student will be assigned one day of after-school detention or silent lunch. School administration will notify the parent/guardian.

- 3rd offense –Teacher will make an office referral. School administration will suspend the student’s personal mobile device privileges for 10 school days. The student will be required to check the device(s) into the main office upon arriving at school and retrieve the device(s) from the main office upon leaving school. The student will be assigned after-school detention or silent lunch. School administration will notify the parent/guardian.

- 4th offense –Teacher will make an office referral. School administration will suspend the student’s personal mobile device privileges for the remainder of the semester (a minimum of 30 days) and contact the parent/guardian for a required parent conference. The student will be required to check the device(s) into the main office upon arriving at school and retrieve the device(s) from the main office upon leaving school. The student will be assigned after-school detention or silent lunch. School administration will notify the parent/guardian and schedule a required parent conference.

- 5th offense –Teacher will make an office referral. School administration will suspend the student’s

phone privileges for the remainder of the school year. The student will be required to check the personal mobile device(s) into the main office upon arriving at school and retrieve the device(s) from the main office upon leaving school. Additionally, the student will be assigned after-school detention or silent lunch. School administration will notify the parent/guardian.

In addition,

- The use or display of mobile devices in a restroom or locker room is strictly prohibited.

- Students may not use any device to photograph, video record, or audio record any verbal or physical altercations between students on school grounds or during school activities or to record any school staff members addressing specific disciplinary situation involving students on school grounds or during school activities.

On July 9, Governor Glenn Youngkin issued Executive Order 33 to help bring cell phone-free education to Virginia schools. Recognizing the mental health effects on children and the impact student’s dependence on cell phones are having in schools, Governor Youngkin directed coordination between VDOE and the Secretary of Education alongside the Secretary of Health and Human Resources, State Health Commissioner, the Department of Health, and the Department of Behavioral Health and Developmental Services to help parents, teachers, and students better understand the effects of cell phone and social media usage on children.

Governor Youngkin’s Executive Order also charged the Virginia Department of Education with defining what a cell phone-free education means in the

Commonwealth and to develop guidance on policies for school divisions to adopt to remove cell phones from instructional time in K-12 public schools. He requested that the VDOE facilitate a statewide discussion and engagement on cell phone-free education and listen to Virginians’ ideas on how to create a better learning environment without cell phones. To help support Virginia’s parents and teachers, Governor Youngkin looked to VDOE to support school divisions with best practices and other implementation resources to demonstrate where others were already having success removing phones from their schools.

Parents, students, teachers, public school administrators, school board members, and all Virginians are encouraged to submit feedback on the draft guidance by September 15, 2024. You may send feedback by visiting <https://www.doe.virginia.gov/programs-services/school-operations-support-services/cell-phone-free-education-in-virginia-k-12-public-schools>.

Then Virginians can expect the following next steps:

- After considering Virginians’ feedback to the draft guidance, VDOE will issue final guidance on September 16, 2024.

- School divisions will adopt policies and procedures by January 1, 2025. School divisions are encouraged to review their current policies and adopt age-appropriate policies and procedures aligned with the guidance ahead of this date or policies that are more comprehensive than the final guidance.
