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# Terriers celebrate current and past students, and third win in a row

The William Byrd High School Terriers won their third football game in a row on Sept. 13, defeating the Christiansburg Demons 33-0.

The WBHS football players were not the only ones recognized at this first home game. Camden Thepsimuong, a football and tennis player at Byrd, was present for the game and recognized in his battle against bone cancer. He was diagnosed this summer with osteosarcoma and is undergoing treatment at a hospital in North Carolina. Members of the football team, the cheerleading squad, the student Dog Pound, and many others in the crowd wore yellow in his honor, as he supported them from the sidelines.

The WBHS Leo Club, a service organization, invited those in attendance to write cards for Cam to read during his chemotherapy treatments and provided the supplies.

Karen Jackson, the first African American member of the William Byrd Marching Band back in the 1973-74 school year (they were then known as the Tootin' Terriers), was introduced and performed the national anthem.

According to Jackson, she was raised on Raleigh Avenue, one of the only integrated streets in Vinton, and received her early education at Craig Avenue Elementary School. A few years later at Roland E. Cook Elementary, she discovered her great love for music. Before her sixth-grade year at William Byrd Intermediate School, her mother purchased her first flute. She studied music for three years under the direction of Joe Spigel. It was at this time that people began taking notice of her singing voice. She joined her first band, singing vocals, around the age of 14.

During the 1973-74 school year as a freshman at WBHS, Jackson took the field with the marching band as the first African American to march and perform at Byrd under the direction of Dr. Stephen King. She also played piccolo in the concert band.

Her high school years were met with a little more turbulence as the community struggled with the depths of the Civil Rights Movement. She would only remain in the band one additional year,

# Vinton Town Council recognizes heroic actions of police officers

Vinton Town Council members recognized the heroic actions of two of its police officers at their council meeting on Sept. 17.

According to Vinton Police Chief Fabricio Officers Drumond, Jesse Dibble and Grant Shepherd were dispatched to a scream for help call. Dispatch was unable to give any context to responding officers because of a frantic caller. Initial information was that there was "lots of screaming in the background," calls for help, and the potential that someone was either bleeding or not breathing. Eventually enough information was gathered to understand that an infant was unresponsive and not breathing. The call came in at 12:21. Officer Dibble arrived on the scene at 12:23;

Shepherd, soon after. Upon arrival, the officers were met by a family in distress. Despite the chaos, the officers were immediate with their priorities and acted on the problem at hand, an 18-month-old not breathing. Dibble was handed the child by a family member and administered life-saving procedures immediately. Shepherd aided Dibble by holding the child in a more advantageous position. As a result, the infant regained consciousness and began breathing on her own.

"Throughout officer's career, they will be called upon many times as a result of lifechanging scenarios, Drumond said. "They are expected to maintain composure, remain calm, and deal with the situation they are presented with tact, humility, and more importantly, resolve

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

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# Vinton WorldTrekkers invite you to travel the world

The Vinton WorldTrekkers are a group of people who "love to travel the world together." Their international adventures started when a group of William Byrd High School students asked their instructor, Cherry Bell Damasco-Farrington, to take them on a field trip to Spain to learn more about Spanish culture.

Damasco-Farrington has traveled to the Philippines, Canada, Mexico, Ireland, Scotland, England, France, Greece, Italy, Spain, Morocco, Gibraltar, Germany, Austria, Switzerland, and Liechtenstein. She says, "Each adventure has proven that there is just so much to see and learn about the world around us. Even though each country varies in language, history, and culture, there are still so many things to tie us all together."

Two more WBHS instructors have since joined the team, English teacher Dionne Nichols and English/Theatre teacher Ashley Satterfield. Their hope is to create exciting trips for students offering them valuable educational and experiential opportunities and exposing them to cultures different from their own.

Nichols has traveled to Holland, Germany, Switzerland, Liechtenstein, France, England, Mexico, Italy, Ireland, Scotland, and Austria. She hopes to someday travel to Australia and the Scandinavian countries, where she has some ancestry. Her experiences with EF Tours began when she was a senior in high school and traveled to Europe.

Nichols says that travelers are able to "develop a global perspective and to discover across barriers that people are so much alike.'

Satterfield has traveled to Mexico, Puerto Rico, French Polynesia, Italy, Spain, Senegal, The Gambia, and the Dominican Republic. She is looking forward to exploring more of Europe in the future. Eventually, she would like to travel to Morocco, Vietnam, and American Samoa. She is a strong believer that not all learning happens in the classroom and some of the biggest growth comes from traveling and experiencing other cultures.

This past July Damasco-Farrington and Nichols led a tour group of about 50 on an 11-day trip to Japan. Participants included former and current students and their family members and friends from all over the region.

Having found the trip "awesome," the Trekkers were anxious to begin planning more trips for the future.

As a first step, the three teachers held an informational meeting at the Vinton Library on Sept. 4 with students who might be interested in touring Europe either Austria, Germany, and Šwitzerland in 2025 or Scotland in 2026.

Other meetings are being held around the county to provide information on trips to Paris, Strasbourg, and Lyon in 2025, Belize in 2025, Rome and Athens in 2025, the Capitals of Scandinavia in 2026, and South Korea in 2027.

Satterfield will be leading the 10-day tour to Austria, Germany, and Switzerland which leaves in mid-July 2025. Nichols will be the group leader for the trip to Scotland in July 2026.

During the information session, the teachers talked about the benefits of international travel, the itinerary of each trip, what's included in the price, safety, travel documents and requirements, deadlines, and how to sign up.

The trips are arranged through EF Tours, their accredited educational partners, who have been in business for about 55 years and offer tours "everywhere," except disaster areas, Damasco-Farrington says.

The advantages of EF are that they provide "it all or almost all" for one price - round trip airfare, hotels, breakfast and dinner each day, a 24/7 tour director, all transportation, local guides, guided sight-seeing, entrance to landmarks and attractions, and access to a safety and accident response team in their travel package, at group rates.

Almost everything is taken care of except for passports, baggage fees, tips, snacks, and one meal each day.

The William Byrd teachers say you "come home changed. You grow a new mindset from facing new challenges. You develop a world perspective and expand your world view. You learn about yourself and may even develop skills to impact the world."

You can even opt to receive high school and college credits for your travels.


Scholarships are available to help with travel expenses. Tours are reasonably priced. Check the Vinton WorldTrekkers Facebook page for costs for specific tours.

The tour to Austria, Germany, and Switzerland begins in Vienna with tours of Parliament, City Hall, the Ringstrasse boulevards, Schonbrunn Palace (where Marie Antoinette spent her childhood), a classical music performance in a concert hall, and an authentic Wiener Schnitzel dinner. The tour moves on to Salzburg and medieval Munich, then a visit to the Dachau concentration camp. You visit a Bavarian castle, see the Swiss Alps and Lake Lucerne, followed by traveling along the Black Forest to Heidelberg.

The 2026 "Stories of Scotland" tour begins in Glasgow, with a visit to the National Bagpipe Center, then moving on to the West Highlands region and Doune Castle. There's a train excursion through the Scottish Highlands and then



# Early, in-person voting begins Sept. 20 for local and federal elections

Early, in-person voting begins this Friday, Sept. 20, for candidates in Town of Vinton, Roanoke County, and federal elections. Election Day is November 5, 2024.

Vinton voters in the North and South Vinton precincts will be voting for the offices of mayor and Town Council. Incumbent Mayor Brad Grose is running unopposed. Incumbent council members Laurie Mullins and Keith Liles are also running unopposed.

Voters in Vinton Magisterial Districts (North and South Vinton, North and South Lindenwood, Bonsack, and Mount Pleasant) will be voting for their Board of Supervisors representative. Republican Tammy Shepherd is running unopposed in a Special Election for a term which ends on December 31, 2025. The Special Election is the result of former Supervisor Jason Peters being elected Roanoke County Commissioner of the Revenue in last year's election, with Shepherd appointed by the Board of Supervisors to serve in his place until the Special Election is held.

Candidates on the ballot for President of the United States and their Vice Presidents are Democrats Kamala Harris/ Tim Walz, Republicans Donald Trump/J.D. Vance, Green Party candidates Jill Stein/Rudolph Ware III, Libertarian Party candidates Chase Oliver/Mike ter Maat, Independents Claudia De la Cruz/Karina Garcia, and Independents Cornel West/ Melina Abdullah. Candidates for the United States Senate are Democrat Tim Kaine and Republican Hung Cao.

Candidates for the House of Representatives representing the 6th District are Democrat Ken Mitchell, Republican Ben Cline, and Independent Robby Wells, Jr.

Voters may write-in candidates who are not on the ballot.

Voters in all Roanoke County Magisterial Districts will be voting on an amendment to the Constitution of Virginia which would extend the tax exemption currently available to spouses of soldiers killed in action to include spouses of soldiers who died in the line of duty (as determined by the U.S. Dept. of Defense).

# DAR celebrates Constitution Week

The Roanoke Valley Chapter Daughters of the American Revolution met on Sept. 14 at Campbell Memorial Presbyterian Church to kick off a new year of activities.

One of their traditional September events is the celebration of the founding of America during Constitution Week from September 17-23.

The Town of Vinton issued a proclamation at the council meeting on Sept. 17, recognizing National Constitution Week and the local DAR chapter. The proclamation notes that 2024 marks the 237th anniversary of the drafting of the Constitution of the United States by the Constitutional Convention.

According to the National DAR website, "The National Society of Daughters the Revolution American urges Americans to reflect on the United States Constitution during this month's annual

observance in honor this foundational document of national governance.

"The DAR initiated the observance in 1955, when the service organization petitioned the U.S. Congress to dedicate September 17-23 of each year to the commemoration of Constitution Week. Congress adopted the resolution, and on August 2, 1956, President Dwight D. Eisenhower signed it into Public Law. The celebration's goals are threefold: to encourage the study of the historical events that led to the framing of the Constitution in September 1787; to remind the public that the Constitution is the basis of America's great heritage and the foundation for its way of life; and to emphasize U.S. citizens' responsibility to protect, defend and preserve the U.S. Constitution."

"We are so proud DAR led the way in making Constitution Week an

official commemoration and our members enthusiastically promote the celebration annually in communities across the country by erecting community displays, sponsoring municipal proclamations, ringing bells and staging programs to raise awareness of the Constitution's tenets and importance," said DAR President General Pamela Rouse Wright. "We encourage all citizens to join us in celebrating this powerful document that is so important to American history and to reflect on the impact the Constitution has had on the lives of American citizens past and present.

the problem to the best of their ability. In this case, their actions completely reshaped the result of that call.

"The actions illustrated by these officers are beyond exemplary. Officer Dibble and Officer Shepherd exhibited the highest standard of excellence and compassion and treated a child as if it was their own. People like them make the world a better and safer place, through their unwavering devotion to our community, our citizens, and our children." They were presented with the Lifesaving Award.

Deputy Chief Tim Lawless introduced the newest member of the Vinton Police Department – Officer Jake Miller. He is a graduate of Glenvar High School. He served in the United States Air Force from 2004-2008 and then moved back home. Miller worked at the Salem Police Department for 12-1/2 years in various positions - patrol officer, detective, detective supervisor, and services supervisor. He earned his master's degree from Liberty University, and graduated from the Virginia Department of Forensic Science Academy and the National Criminal Justice Command College.

He and his wife Ashley have two daughters, Claire, 10, and Campbell, 7. They enjoy outdoor activities. Miller says that the most important thing in his life is "being a dad." He was pinned by his daughters.

Chief Drumond also recognized Officer Will Holland for earning his Crime Prevention Specialist Certification, a designation recognized by the Department of Criminal Justice Services. He completed 40 hours of training (theory and practice of crime prevention, personal safety, crime prevention through environmental design, and conducting security assessments) and 80 additional hours in community policing, school safety and security, youth and family violence, public speaking, and drug abuse prevention.

Officer Holland said, "When local businesses, citizens, community groups, and government agencies engage with each other, we develop a positive lasting relationship and become active partners in safeguarding our neighborhoods. This teamwork creates a network of welleducated and vigilant eyes and ears that can only enhance the effectiveness of curbing crimes."

Town Council presented a proclamation declaring September 17-23 as Constitution Week to Shannon and Sheila Campbell from the Roanoke Valley Chapter DAR.

Planning and Zoning Director Anita McMillan recognized Assistant Planner Fayula Gordon for completing the six-month Virginia Chapter of the American Planning Association Leadership

Program, Development sponsored by the Virginia Chapter of the American Planning Association.

Program participants engage in intensive conversations with instructors during threehour monthly meetings in Richmond, and complete outside assignments shadowing and interviewing a leader they admire.

Andrew Hopewell, Virginia Chapter president, noted that Gordon's "commitment and dedication to the class was admirable and speaks to her desire to improve her skill set and offer citizens of Vinton the utmost service. She represented herself and the Town of Vinton in a manner of which they should be proud."

McMillan also acknowledged Roanoke County's Virginia Association of Counties (VACo) 2024 Achievement Award for the Town of Vinton Stormwater Outfall Management Application Program. The application was built by Roanoke County's Information Technology GIS Team in collaboration with town personnel.

During the Citizens' Comment part of the meeting, several citizens spoke against the rumored abortion clinic coming to Vinton – Phil Buchy, Barry Witt, Ann Russell, and Carmel Flippen.

Public Works Director Bo Herndon updated council on several projects, including sign replacement throughout the town, installation of traffic signal lights, and paving. He noted that the WVWA sewer line replacement on Niagara Road is 20% complete, with 60 feet of pipe and two manholes installed. The project is complicated by the depth of the repairs (30 feet). He discussed working with VDOT on a plan to rebuild 3rd Street. His best news was that the new refuse truck is in Roanoke and will be delivered to Vinton next week.

Finance Director Andrew Keen presented the latest financial report, commenting that sales, meals, and parimutuel taxes are exceeding budget expectations for the fiscal year thus far. The opening of two new food service establishments, Marco's Pizza and Panda Bobo, will only increase those revenues. He reported the town is earning \$50,000 a month from interest on the CIP fund. He also informed council that a grant has been received for \$42,000 toward the cargo/personnel lift project at the Vinton History Museum. Current fundraising by the Vinton Historical Society and the grant will put contributions at over \$100,000.

Council held a public hearing, then adopted an amendment to Vinton's FY 2024-2025 budget which will appropriate funding for various operational and capital expenditures. According to

Deputy Town Manager Cody Sexton, this is customary at the end of each fiscal year. Funds totaling \$462,000 will be used for police equipment, the Wolf Creek restroom facilities, and the multi-generational park to be located on a site behind the Vinton War Memorial. This is "old money" being rolled over to the new fiscal year.

Council adopted a resolution accepting the Virginia Department of Conservation and Recreation's Recreational Trails Program funds in the amount of \$177,217 and appropriating \$44,304 in town funds (a 20% match) for the Wolf Creek Greenway Accessible Restroom Facility, a project to be completed in Spring 2025.

Council voted enter a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with Roanoke County for the county to serve as the Virginia Erosion and Stormwater Management Program Authority for the town, an arrangement which has been in place since 1984.

Town Manager Pete Peters thanked town staff for a successful Pink Warrior Walk to raise money for breast cancer treatment and research, which attracted 207 participants and raised \$7,000 in its first year. He especially thanked Town Clerk/Administrative Manager Arias-Magallon Antonia and council members Laurie Mullins and Sabrina McCarty for their part in organizing the event.

# Congress cuts Meals on Wheels funding nationwide; you can help

Because the United States Congress cut Meals on Wheels funding nationwide, 50 fewer seniors are being fed in Southwest Virginia.

The purpose of the Meals on Wheels program is to deliver a hot, nutritious lunch to homebound senior citizens

that has now been cut down to about 475 participants. While needs have increased, funding unfortunately has not. September 30 marks the end of extra, pandemic-related funding for Meals on Wheels. As the number of those in need increases, many seniors will now be placed on a waiting and administer Older Americans Act funds. The Virginia list. Rising food costs have only accentuated the problem.

source of most of the funding the LOA receives.

Amendments to the act in 1973 introduced the concept of a network of aging agencies. The act called for each governor to designate a "state unit on aging" to receive

Monday through Friday. (Each meal supplies one-third of the Daily Dietary Reference Intake.)

The program is cost effective and helps seniors to be able to live independently and age in place by keeping them out of hospitals, nursing homes, and assisted living facilities. Plus it provides much-needed socialization with the volunteer who delivers the meals each weekday (and a wellness check).

According to Livewell, "Investing in Meals on Wheels programs through federal funding can lead to substantial cost savings within the healthcare system. By ensuring that seniors receive proper nutrition, these programs help prevent malnutrition-related health conditions and hospitalizations. Adequate nutrition also supports faster recovery and better disease management for seniors, reducing overall healthcare costs.

Local Office on Aging (LOA) President and CEO Ron Boyd says the Roanoke-area Meals on Wheels program was serving about 525 clients, but due to lack of federal funding,

The LOA runs the Meals on Wheels program in the Fifth Planning District of Virginia, which includes Roanoke, Botetourt, Craig and Alleghany counties, as well as Roanoke City, Salem and Covington.

Meals on Wheels is available to those ages 60 and over who are residents of the Fifth Planning District. To qualify, they must be unable to prepare a nutritious mid-day meal with no one available, or willing, to prepare the meal for them. Spouses and disabled dependents, regardless of age, may also qualify.

The population in the district 65 years of age or older is higher than the average in Virginia and across the nation. By the 2030s, there will be more people 65 and older than 18 and younger.

There are Meals on Wheels plans across the country which are managed by organizations like the LOA. The Older Americans Act, which was passed in 1965, is the Department for Aging and Rehabilitative Services (DARS) designates "area agencies on aging" to receive these funds. LOA is one of 25 in the Commonwealth so designated, and one of 5,000 community-based senior nutrition programs nationwide.

The government funds are supplemented locally with fund-raising, grants, and recipient donations - including proceeds from the LOA's annual Let's Give Lunch fundraiser each June.

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

# Terriers down Glenvar, will open Blue Ridge schedule next week

The William Byrd girls played host to Glenvar in volleyball Monday and took a three set win to sweep the season series from their Roanoke County rival. The Terriers won 25-18, 25-21 and 25-20 after needing five sets to beat the Highlanders the first time.

"At the beginning of the season we picked up a win but battled five full sets," said Byrd coach Allison Thornton. "On Monday, the ladies started early and picked up the win in just three sets. I am so proud of the hard work the girls put into practice to prepare for a busy week."

This is a big time for the girls as they prepare to open Blue Ridge District play next Tuesday, September 24, with a home match against William Fleming. Byrd was scheduled to host Christiansburg in a non-district match on Wednesday of this week and, next Monday, they They host Fleming a day later and take on undefeated Lord Botetourt in a district match in Daleville a week from today.

On Monday in Vinton Graysen Divers had six kills, three aces and two blocks against Glenvar. Heidi Dixon had seven kills and an ace and Ava Ashworth had 17 digs and four aces. Bella Dudley had seven kills while Maggie Zimmerman dished out 27 assists. Kaylee Makuch had 10 digs and Raelyn Lancaster had two blocks.

With the win the Terriers improved to 3-5 in non-district matches, playing some of the top teams in the area. Last Thursday they lost to undefeated Hidden Valley for the second time. The defending state champion Titans took a three set win at Hidden Valley, 25-12, 25-13 and 25-10.

"We are working hard to keep up the intensity and drive to win in practice," said Thornton. "I love the competitiveness we are seeing in our workouts.

# **Terriers shut out Demons in home opener**

# Undefeated Byrdmen will host Bassett for Homecoming Friday

The William Byrd football team remained undefeated and avenged their only loss of the 2023 regular season when they shut out Christiansburg last Friday night. The 33-0 win at Patterson Stadium was the home opener for the Terriers as they improved to 3-0 on the season.

This Friday the Terriers will be home again to take on Bassett in Byrd's Homecoming game. The Bengals are 2-1 with a 41-14 season opening loss to Franklin County followed by two big offensive showings, downing Patrick County, 51-0, and Dan River last Friday, 51-20.

"Bassett is a very talented team that has a lot of team speed and can make explosive plays in all three phases of the game," said Byrd coach Brad Lutz. "I have a lot of respect for Coach (Brandon) Johnson and his staff, and I know they will be well prepared for our game and play really well."

There could be a lot of points scored Friday. . .or not. The Terriers have scored 149 points in their first three games and Bassett has scored 116 points. However, the Terriers have only allowed eight points all year and are working on a string of 10 straight shutout quarters going back to the second quarter of opening night.

The Terriers were fired up for their home opener last Friday and the defense set the tone with physical play. Justyn Rosenboom and Jonathan Rosser led the team with 10 tackles each and Rosser also had a sack and a fumble recovery. Ethan Haston had eight tackles, Blake Anderson had seven, Jerrett Shepherd had six and Jahdai English had five tackles and a huge interception that resulted from Greg Stiltner pressuring the quarterback in the second quarter. Stiltner had five tackles and three quarterback pressures while Maurice Burnette made a home in the Blue Demon backfield with a sack, two tackles for losses and four quarterback pressures.

"Defensively, our coaches are very pleased with the improvements and energy that our players are showing each week," said coach Lutz.

The Terriers jumped on Christiansburg early, as quarterback Cannin Lutz threw two TD passes in the first quarter, a 10 yarder to Thomas Purcell and a 13 yarder to Kam McKee. Byrd also got a two-point safety.

Jamez Toler broke off an 88 yard run in the second quarter to put Byrd up 21-0 at the half. Toler scored again on a seven yard run in the third quarter and Shepherd put some icing on the cake with a 21 yard TD run in the fourth. The only thing the Terriers didn't do well was on two point conversion attempts, as they failed to pick up the deuce three straight times following their last three touchdowns.

"Offensively we are producing points, but we are still making a few mistakes that are preventing us from playing to our potential," said Lutz. "That has been a huge emphasis in practice."

Toler had another big game running the ball with 200 yards on 15 carries. Shepherd had 100 yards on eight carries as Byrd's top two ballcarriers combined for 300 yards.

Cannin Lutz completed eight of 16 passing attempts for 105 yards with TDs to Purcell and McKee. Tate Kotz had two catches for 34 yards and Toler had two for 22 stripes.

The Terriers had a big crowd for the game on a beautiful Vinton night. It was their first home appearance after two scrimmages and two games on enemy turf.

"After four straight weeks on the road it was great to be back in front of our home crowd," said Lutz. "Our players and coaches are always thankful for the huge crowds for our home games and the continued support from our community. The environment that our fans create at home gives our players a lot of confidence on the field."


This week another big crowd is expected for Homecoming. Some coaches find that to be a distraction but Lutz doesn't buy it.

After Monday the Terriers will be practicing for the Region 3D tournament at the Draper Valley course on October 1st.


