## Roanoke County Fire & Rescue extinguishes fire in Rosie's Gaming Emporium parking garage

Crews from Roanoke County Fire & Rescue were dispatched to the parking garage at Rosie's Gaming Emporium in Vinton at 1:58 p.m. on October 9 in response to a reported fire. At the scene a vehicle was found on fire on the second story of the garage. No other vehicles were parked near the vehicle.

According Clingenpeel, Brian Community Outreach Coordinator Roanoke County Fire & Rescue, "The fire originated in the engine compartment and was caused either by an electrical or mechanical function of the engine."

The department said the fire was extinguished in about 20 minutes, and the 105-foot ladder truck at

only damage reported was to the vehicle in which the blaze started. There was lots of billowing smoke, but no injuries.

Rosie's Marketing Manager Jeff Spaugh said there was a great response from emergency personnel.

Roanoke City Fire & EMS crews also responded

to the call. Coincidentally, November 2023, Roanoke County Fire & Rescue held a Driver Aerial Operator Class for its

the garage at Rosie's. The class included in-depth training for those who would be driving and operating ladders trucks, including setting up the truck, moving the ladder, positioning the truck, and basic maintenance of the truck. The training includes classroom instruction, but practical skill learning was the focus at Rosie's. One topic discussed in last year's ladder truck training was providing not just vertical

# Roanoke County School Board updated on W.E. Cundiff renovation, need for bus drivers

The Roanoke County School Board met in a work session on Oct. 3 and among the topics discussed was the W.E. Cundiff Elementary School renovation project in Vinton.

Todd Kageals, Director of Facilities and Operations, noted that the project at Cundiff (and a similar one at Glen Cove Elementary) has involved:

- Setup and installation

W.E. Cundiff The project kicked off in August 2024 with a groundbreaking ceremony; the estimated completion date is Fall 2026. The cost of the project is \$29,946,814.

The Roanoke County Career and Technical Education Center, which also broke ground in August, is currently in the "earth-moving" stage, Kageals said.

He also updated the School Board on the quarter-million-dollar project to replace the gymnasium bleachers at William Byrd Middle School. This project was expected to be completed by Oct. 10.

Each Roanoke County middle school will receive \$2,500 for media center improvements. Projects have also been proposed (but remain unfunded) for replacing several areas of carpeting at Bonsack and Herman L. Horn Elementary Schools.

Kageals, Superintendent Dr. Ken Nicely, and Deputy Superintendent Dr. Jamie Soltis said that the county schools are searching for additional bus drivers. Nine new drivers were hired this fall,

but more are needed. A proposal will be presented at the next regular School Board meeting on Oct. 17 to raise the minimum pay for bus drivers to \$25.42 per hour for a five-hour day/188 days per school year schedule. The school system offers full-time benefits (health, dental, vision) and a signing bonus up to \$1,500. It also provides paid CDL Class 2 training.

School Board member Tim Greenway, who represents the Vinton District, said, "Bus drivers are the second most important position in this organization, after teachers. They carry precious cargo, getting children to and from school safely." Those interested in employment as school bus drivers are encouraged to contact the school system at www.rcps. us/beabusdriver.

Board members also received an update from Soltis on the new policy for mobile devices (cell phones) introduced just before schools opened in August. Under the policy, high school students may use mobile devices (cell phones, smart watches, or tablets) before school, after school, in between classes and during lunch, but not

during classroom times. Mobile devices must be off and kept out of sight at all times during the entire class period. Elementary and middle school students may not use mobile devices during the entire school

Soltis shared statistics on compliance by students with the new policy. reports Disciplinary indicate that William Byrd High School students have adhered well to the policy with only 22 reported first offenses and just one second offense.

# Shepherd and North dedicate Explore Park bench to Sister City partnership

From Oct. 6 through Oct. 12, Roanoke County celebrated 30 years of Roanoke Valley Sister Cities partnership with a delegation from Opole, Poland. Guests from Opole included

Arkadiusz Wiśniewski, Mayor of Opole; Maciej Wujec, Deputy Mayor of Opole; Łukasz Śowada, Councillor (former chairman of Opole City Council); Łukasz Śmierciak, Director of the Department of Promotion; and Maciej Wróbel, Department of Culture, Tourism and International Cooperation.

Throughout the week, the county had the opportunity to showcase the Roanoke region and in turn, learn about its Sister City.

The officials from Opole began the week with a visit to Explore Park, where Board of Supervisors Chair Phil North and Vinton Supervisor Tammy Shepherd led the unveiling and dedication ceremony for a bench commemorating the decades-long partnership. The guests also tried out the park's TreeTop Quest.

The delegation also visited the Town of Vinton on Oct. 6, for a presentation by Vinton Mayor Brad Grose and Town Manager Pete Peters, and a visit to the Vinton Library.

The next day they attended the Board of Supervisors meeting and accepted a proclamation expressing the appreciation of Roanoke County for their long-term relationship.

Over the course of a busy week, the guests from Opole visited the Burton Center for Arts and Technology, McAfee's Knob, the Roanoke County E9-1-1 Center, the Roanoke County Sheriff's Office complex, Mack Trucks,

Roanoke College, the D-Day Memorial, the Public Safety Center, and the O. Winston Link Museum, in addition to Roanoke County offices.

Their goal was to learn more about how Roanoke County strives to deliver best-in-class services to its citizens.

According to Roanoke County, the beginnings of cooperation between Opole and Roanoke County date back to 1993, as the "Manager to Manager" program through the Association of Local Government Managers in Virginia. The program consisted of the exchange of experiences between representatives of local governments during visits to Opole and Roanoke

Thanks to this, Opole officials were able to familiarize themselves with, among other things, the structure of American local governments, economic development strategies, infrastructure and promotion methods, and then try to transfer some of these strategies to their home community. The "Manager to Manager" program resulted in the signing of the "Agreement on Establishing Friendly Contacts and Cooperation Between the City of Opole and Roanoke County" on November

30, 1994. The Sister City relationship with Opole has allowed both communities the opportunity to gain new perspectives and insights into the inner workings of a local government in a different country.





# Vinton 2050 Committee envisions Vinton 25 years in the future

The Town of Vinton is in the process of planning Vinton's future for the next 25 years. Last spring, the town hired consultants from 3TP Ventures to facilitate the process. Mike Callahan of 3TP was named project manager.

The project kicked off in April at the Vinton Dogwood Festival, raising awareness and soliciting community input on what matters most to people in Vinton and what issues need to be addressed over the next 25 years.

Much of the time since April has been spent gathering data about the town and meeting with stakeholders to complete a needs assessment. In September, citizens had the opportunity to complete a community questionnaire online about the town's assets, challenges, and opportunities for the future.

The surveys and meetings defined what citizens consider to be the most significant needs of the community.

- Transportation goals—citizens want safer streets for all users and reduced traffic congestion
- Land Use and Environmental goals—citizens want to maintain the small town feel and stable neighborhoods and to improve water quality in Vinton's streams, creeks, and the Roanoke River
- Recreation and quality of life goals—citizens want to expand and connect the town's greenways and trails and walking connections to public parks
- Downtown and economic development goals—citizens want more

employers and jobs in Vinton, along with redevelopment of aging commercial Housing and Neighborhood

revitalization goals—citizens listed supporting renovation of older homes as the top priority in this category

Various committees and focus groups were formed, including the Vinton 2050 Advisory Committee, which held its third meeting on October 10. The purpose of that meeting was to share results of the community survey, develop initial visioning principles, and obtain input from the committee on land use strategy and vision. Callahan, along with consultant Vlad Gavrilovic, led the meeting. Now at midpoint/pivot point in the

process, the consultants are developing a set of vision themes to shape the "big picture" and goals resulting in an implementation plan and updated comprehensive plan, setting the direction of Vinton for the next 25 years. The latest meeting began with a

recap of the results of the community survey completed by 450 citizens (5% of the population, an unusually high participation rate).

Based on surveys and meetings, Callahan said that Vinton has "so many assets" that its citizens love—the downtown area, the events, the schools, the greenways, the neighborhoods. The

town has become a hub for outdoor recreation in the area with its proximity to the Blue Ridge Parkway, Explore Park, the greenways, the blueways, and rec/travel sports fields Vinton has finally become what Council member Keith Liles likes to describe as a "to" place, not a "through" place.

The Advisory Committee participated in a visioning exercise using a detailed map of Vinton to discuss preferred land use strategy and vision for different areas of Vinton, including areas to stabilize and

preserve, those to infill and revitalize, those to transform, and areas where housing could be added. According to trends, citizens in 2050 than today

The consultants noted that "People want to live here, and they give Vinton high marks for its services."

The consensus by the committee was that the town needs to "build on what we are doing well," without changing the fundamental character of the town– to emphasize Vinton's good schools, low crime rate, cleanliness, public services, and

outstanding snow removal. Specific suggestions from committee members included Vinton may have 1,000 more the potential to infill and revitalize the downtown area, Walnut Avenue, Washington Avenue, and the Roanoke County Annex building adjacent to the Billy Byrd; connecting the Glade Creek Greenway to downtown and River Park Shopping Center; revitalizing Jackson Avenue, Virginia Avenue, Walnut Avenue, and the Midway area; adding housing behind River Park, developing

River Park as a "Midtown" mixed use center; taking steps to increase foot traffic from downtown to River Park by converting an existing street to a pedestrian path/trail; making Bypass Road more pedestrianfriendly, build sidewalks to connect Hardy Road and the Wolf Creek Greenway; slow the speed on Washington Avenue; explore redevelopment of the former landfill on Third Street recreational purposes; change zoning to allow duplexes and apartments in areas with outdated strip development;

encouraging addition apartments above businesses in the downtown area, and consider the Vinton Business Center for apartments.

The next step is a Community Meeting on the Vinton 2050 Plan scheduled at the Vinton War Memorial for Nov. 12 from 5 to 7 p.m. with a presentation on the plan by Callahan at 5:30. All are invited to view the plan so far and to share their input.

Being inexpensive children's toys, paper dolls with faces have been around as long as there has been Paper dolls are figures cut out of

paper or thin cards, with separate clothes, also made of paper, that are usually held onto the dolls by paper folding tabs.

Today, they have become highly sought-after collectibles, especially as vintage paper dolls become rarer due to the limited lifespan of paper

Movie stars and celebrities became the focus in the early days of paper dolls in the United States. Brides were another common figure often represented in paper doll form. The

first manufactured paper doll was "Little Fanny," produced in London in 1810. Around this time paper dolls became popular in the U.S. and grew in popularity.

Paper dolls are still being created but the older ones are often found today in museums. Some earlier papers dolls are on display at the Vinton History Museum, 210 East Jackson Avenue in downtown Vinton – open Monday, Wednesday, Friday and every first Saturday, 10 a.m. to







# Terriers look to bounce back from first loss at Botetourt Friday

The William Byrd football team will be in Daleville this Friday night for a big game with Blue Ridge District rival Lord Botetourt. The winner will be next week's top ranked team in the Virginia High School League Region 3D rankings.

Byrd and Botetourt come into the game "one-two" in this week's region rankings. Both have 5-1 records but Byrd's rating is 23.0 and LB is second at 22.0. Abingdon, at 6-1, is third at 21.5 and Carroll County rounds out the top four at 21.0.

William Byrd lost for the first time last week when the Terriers fell to undefeated William Fleming, 28-14. Lord Botetourt lost their first game of the season to Class 4 E.C. Glass, 11-8 in overtime, but the Cavaliers have won their last five.

The Botetourt-Byrd rivalry has been a good one over the years. Long-time rivals in the Blue Ridge District, Byrd holds a 39-24-1 edge all-time but since 2018 Botetourt has won six of eight.

Both of those Byrd wins were last year, when the Terriers went 12-2 and reached the Class 3 state semifinals. Byrd broke a six game losing streak to LB with a 16-0 win in the regular season, then beat Botetourt in the region playoffs, 41-14. Both of those games were in Vinton, and this Friday's game is important because if the two meet again in the playoffs it could very well decide home field.

Byrd coach Brad Lutz is hoping the Terriers bounce back in a big way after last week's loss to Fleming. It was a big game played in front of a big crowd at Patterson Stadium against a strong Class 5 Colonels' team. It was the kind of game high school football is all about, and this Friday will be another one.

"As a coaching staff, we are always looking to see how our players respond to adversity," said Lutz. "Our players and coaches were not satisfied with our performance against William Fleming. We learned from that game and got back to work this week. Our players brought a lot of energy and work ethic to practice this week, and that is a great response to last week's loss."

Malachi Coleman, Fleming's Syracuse bound tailback, put the Terriers in an early hole with first quarter touchdown runs of 44 and 84 yards. The Colonels missed an extra point kick on the first one and failed on a two-point try on the second but still led 12-0 after the first period.

Byrd drew to within a touchdown in the second quarter when quarterback Cannin Lutz hit Tate Kotz with a 31 yard TD pass and Connor Whitehead converted the extra point. That cut the lead to 12-7 at the half and it was anyone's ballgame.

the Colonels blocked a punt out of the end zone for three balls for 29 yards and Jonathan Rosser had two a two-point safety. That not only added two points to their total, making up for the missed extra points, but set up the Colonels in good field position on the ensuing kick. Fleming drove for another score with Coleman going over from the two, and the extra point put the visitors up 21-7.

That series proved to a critical point of the game. Fleming increased the lead to 28-7 on an eight yard TD pass before the end of the quarter, putting the Terriers behind the eight ball. Lutz found Kotz again for a 24 yard score but it wasn't enough as the Colonels held on for a big Blue Ridge District win.

Jamez Toler led Byrd in rushing with 62 yards on 20 carries before leaving with an injury. He's out for the season and that's a tough break for Byrd, as Jamez was the Terriers' leading rusher and scorer.

Cannin Lutz had a good night with 17 completions on 26 attempts for 207 yards. Kotz had 62 yards receiving on three catches with two touchdowns. Jerrett Shepherd had four catches for 52 yards,

Fleming drew first blood after intermission when Ethan Haston had four for 33, Kam McKee caught receptions for 13.


> On defense Maurice Burnette continued to disrupt opposing offenses as he had a tackle for a loss and two quarterback pressures to go with eight tackles. Jahdai English also had eight tackles, Haston had seven and Blake Anderson and Rosser had half a dozen each.

The game was the first in the BRD for Byrd and after one week of intra-district play the race looks to be wide open. Lord Botetourt beat Staunton River, 21-0, and Northside is 4-2 overall after defeating Class 5 Franklin County, 35-7, as the Vikings look to have their best team in years.

"The Blue Ridge District is very strong this season," said Lutz. "Every week is extremely important and will impact the playoff picture."

The Byrd jayvees defeated Fleming last week, 13-12. The Terriers will host the Lord Botetourt jayvees tonight, Thursday, at 6 pm at Patterson
