Cornerstone Antiques moves, literally, to a new foundation

The Vinton Farmers' Market and Stage usually draw a crowd for special events, like

Mingle at the Market concerts, Fall Festival, or Market Saturdays, but on November 19, the crowd at the corner of Walnut and Lee Avenues was there to see a truly incredible sight—the structural relocation of the former Cornerstone Antiques building to a

Frank and Janine Stone were the owners of the Cornerstone Antiques business for about 40 years, and known as beloved educators throughout the valley who also loved antiques.

new foundation, just feet

building (originally a residence built in 1939) from the Claude St.Clair family. Upon retirement, the Stones sold it to The Wilkinson Group, Inc., led by developer Dale Wilkinson, who had a vision for downtown Vinton.

It took an enormous and some crane knowledgeable, painstaking, unflappable workers, but the building was moved with no damage and in a relatively short amount of time—after weeks of preparation.

The process involved goes something like thisdigging out the original foundation to get underneath the building and support the bottom plate with steel beams,

They purchased the cutting holes in the steel to place strapping on the beams, placing a spreader bar on the roof, lifting straight up, guiding the structure onto the new foundation with a lead rope, and gently setting it down on the newly built foundation.

> Vinton Assistant Planning and Zoning Director Nathan McClung explained that "a zoning permit was necessary to verify the new setbacks of the relocated structure and a commercial building permit in order for the new foundation, structural plans, mechanicals, etc., to be inspected and approved." Town Council signs contract for construction of Vinton hotel, police officers recognized


According to Vinton Mayor Brad Grose, actions taken at the Vinton Town Council meeting on November 19 were "historic." After a public hearing, council voted unanimously to sign a contract with KARA Hospitality, LLC to bring a new hotel to Vinton.

The town purchased six parcels of property (about two acres) in 2018 and 2019 within, and adjacent to, the intersection of Virginia Avenue, South Pollard Street, Cedar Avenue, and 1st Street for the purpose of recruiting a hotel to be constructed on the site.

The town completed Phase I and Phase II environmental assessments on the parcels, demolished existing structures on the property, conducted several hotel market studies, and established a conceptual site plan for the site.

The Covid pandemic stalled those plans, but intensified efforts over recent months led to the issuance

William Byrd welcomes new Navy JROTC instructor

Quartermaster Chief (Surface Warfare) Michael Dixon has been named as the new instructor for the Navy JROTC Program based at William Byrd High School, but serving all five Roanoke County High Schools. He became the instructor for the program on Sept. 30, succeeding Chief David Perrin.

Dixon is from Lancaster, Pa., and enlisted in the U.S. Navy in August 2003. He attended the Seaman Apprentice Training School and was temporarily at Navy Station Norfolk before reporting to sea duty in March 2004 onboard the U.S.S. Enterprise (CVN-65), homeported in Norfolk.

He advanced to Quartermaster Third Class Petty Officer in June 2005 and earned his ESWS qualification. He extended his tour in 2007 and reenlisted in 2008. Over the five years that he served on the U.S.S. Enterprise, Petty Officer

Dixon went on two deployments, including a Pacific tour, where he earned his shellback (Crossing the Equator) qualification, as well as two shipyard workups.

In April 2009, QM2(SW) Dixon reported to Naval Station Great Lakes where he earned his instructor qualification for both the Deck (Ablebodied) Seaman Apprenticeship Training School and Quartermaster "A" School. He even earned the Navy's Master Training Specialist (Advanced Instructor) qualification.

He then transferred into the Navy Reserves in October 2012 and moved to Anchorage, Alaska, to be closer to his wife's family. He reported to NOSC Anchorage's Operational Support Unit and began attending college full time at the University of Alaska-Anchorage. He graduated with a Bachelor's Degree in History and a Political Science Minor from the

University of Alaska in May 2016. He qualified as a U.S. Navy Reserve Career Counselor.

His awards include five Navy and Marine Corps Achievement Medals, a Navy Unit Commendation Ribbon, a Battle "E" Ribbon, four Good Conduct Medals, a National Defense Service Medal, the Global War on Terrorism Service and Expeditionary Medals, and the Sea Service Ribbon.

Dixon was selected for Chief Petty Officer in June 2016 and accepted in September. He moved to Roanoke in July 2024 to be closer to his family. His grandfather, LCDR Walter John Dixon, had retired to the Roanoke area after serving on board a destroyer during World War II. Currently, his father and cousin live in the area.

Dixon married his wife Andrea in February 2009. They have a 3-yearold daughter, Sophie, and one cat.

Vinton re-elects incumbents to Town Council, Board of Supervisors

Fully reported election results from Roanoke County indicate that Vinton Mayor Brad Grose and Council members Laurie Mullins and Keith Liles have been re-elected to serve on Vinton Town Council for four more years. In a Special Election, Tammy Shepherd has been elected to represent the Vinton Magisterial District on the Roanoke County Board of Supervisors. She is completing the unexpired term of Jason Peters which ends on December 31,

Only voters registered in the Town of Vinton precincts could vote for mayor and Town Council. Only voters in the Vinton Magisterial District were permitted to vote for the Board of Supervisors

Vinton representative. In 2020, Town of Vinton elections for mayor and town council took place in May. In 2022 and again this year, those local elections were moved to November at the same time as the General Election.

One hesitation about moving the local elections to coincide with state and national elections was a concern that the change

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would introduce partisan politics into nonpartisan local issues - like paving keeping and roads streetlights operational. There was also concern that local issues and candidates would get lost in the shuffle, as everyone would be involved with statewide and national issues.

Whether or not any of that has proven to be true, the number of citizens voting in the Town Council election did increase in 2022 when Vice Mayor had two seats available in Mike Stovall and Council member Sabrina McCarty dramatically this year when the elections moved to November in combination with a presidential election

In this year's November elections, Mayor Brad Grose received 3,103 votes and 97% of the vote, with 96 write-ins. (In May 2020, he received 410 votes.)

Keith Liles received 1,961 (46%) votes for Town Council this year. (In May 2020, he received 373 votes.)

Laurie Mullins received 2186 (51.4%) votes, and 343 votes in May 2020.

There were 106 write-ins for Town Council, which

this election. Tammy Shepherd was were elected, and even more elected to the Roanoke County Board Supervisors representing the Vinton Magisterial District with 93% of the vote (8,646 votes) with 638 write-ins.

> Across Virginia, the proposed amendment to the state constitution extending a tax exemption to surviving spouses to those killed in action to also be available to surviving spouses of soldiers who died in the line of duty was approved with 93% of the vote.

> Data indicates that 76% of registered voters in Roanoke County voted in the November 5 election.

Mayor Grose served in the U.S. Army from 1966 to 1968 in Korea during the Vietnam era. He worked as an electronics technician and in tech/supply. Grose was first elected to Vinton Town Council in 2000. He has served the town as mayor since 2004 and was just re-elected to another four-

Jimmy Brown served stateside in the Marine Corps for three years. He has worked in the Town of Vinton Public Works Department since November 2, 2020, and holds the position of Chief Mechanic.

Police Chief Drumond served in the United States Marine Corps from 2002 to 2006. He earned the rank of Camp Lejeune, N.C., and trained as an assault man. He was deployed to Africa, Cuba, Iraq, and Afghanistan. He has been employed by the Town of Vinton since 2009 and was appointed Chief of Police in December 2020.

Sgt. Brandon Alterio served in the U.S. Air Force from 2008-2014 and reached the rank of Staff Sergeant. He joined the Vinton Police Department in March 2019.

Cpl. Jesse Dibble served in the United States Navy from 1994-1996. He was sworn in as a member of the Vinton Police Department in May 2022. Local high school receives a NASA 'Moon Tree'

High School (LBHS) recently selected to receive a NASA Moon Tree, a unique opportunity to connect with space exploration. sweetgum tree arrived to coincide with the school's celebration of "Moon Week" during the last week of October where students engaged in educational activities centered around space, science, history, and the importance of trees to the environment.

"We jump-started our moon festivities with Mr. Martin and our Air and Space Club," Lord Botetourt graduate - now science teacher - Caitlin Pannell shared last week. "They set up telescopes the other week to view the super moon, Saturn, and a comet during the LB vs. William Byrd football game. LBHS designated the entire last week of October as Moon Week, which worked out wonderfully since it aligned with Halloween. Classes participated in a door decorating contest revolving around the Moon Tree."

Pannell applied for the tree in fall 2023 and learned the school would be receiving the tree in

"It is a huge honor to be selected as a location for a Moon Tree and we really wanted to celebrate," Pannell continued. "I am always looking for opportunities for students to learn in new and interesting ways and this seemed like a perfect fit for Botetourt."

According to a NASA release from last week, its Office of STEM Engagement partnered with U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Forest Service to fly five species of tree seeds aboard Artemis I as part of a national STEM Engagement and Conservation Education initiative. The project builds on the legacy of the original moon trees, which were planted in the 1970s after NASA astronaut Stuart Roosa orbited the moon with tree seeds in his kit. Roosa, the command

module pilot for 1971's Apollo 14 mission and a former USDA Forest Service smoke jumper, carried tree seeds into lunar orbit. The Apollo 14 Moon Trees were grown into seedlings by the USDA Forest Service and eventually disseminated to national monuments and dignitaries around the world, with a large number distributed as part of the nation's bicentennial event.

In a nod to the legacy of Apollo 14, and a celebration of the future of space exploration with NASA's Artemis Program, a "new generation" of Moon Tree seeds traveled into lunar orbit aboard the Orion spacecraft in 2022. The seeds travelled thousands of miles beyond the moon, spending about four weeks in space before returning to Earth.

The Artemis I Moon Trees, rooted in the legacy of the original Moon Trees flown by Roosa during Apollo 14, journeyed 270,000 miles from Earth aboard the Orion spacecraft. A diverse array of tree species, including sycamores, sweet gums, Douglas firs, loblolly pines, and giant sequoias, were flown around the surface of the moon. The first batch of seedlings will ship to almost 50 institutions across 48 contiguous U.S. states.

Some of the Lord Botetourt Moon Week door decoration concepts included: space exploration, myths and legends about the moon, Greek mythology of Artemis and Orion (names of the mission and ship the seeds went on),

lunar phases, and moon references in music and pop culture. Teachers incorporated themes into lessons such as reading stories about moon myths in Spanish or analyzing data to see if there is a relationship between moon phases and crimes- turns out there

Through NASA's Office of STEM Engagement (OSTEM) and NASA's Artifact Module, museums, universities, federal agencies, including NASA Field Centers, and K-12 serving organizations were invited to apply for ownership of a Moon Tree seedling.

"The biggest part of the application was setting up a plan to incorporate the Moon Tree in a variety of learning experiences for the school," said Pannell. "I feel like we did a good job with that at Lord Botetourt; a lot of teachers got on board with the theme.

mini-STEM (Science Technology Engineering and Math) stations for teachers to bring classes to throughout the week which included tree identification, using natural materials in art, crater formation, egg drop contests, nocturnal animals, and engineering structures," Pannell added.

"I also

"We even had a Moon Walk dance competition during lunch. The entire school really got on board with the theme, and it has inspired students to be curious and creative. We will also be doing some STEM activities with our elementary students in the spring involving the Moon

The sweet gum tree has been planted at the school and a celebration in welcoming the Moon Tree to Botetourt is planned for spring 2025.

Pannell previously taught at William Byrd High School, where she met her husband, James, an instructor and coach. She teaches Biology and Earth Science, mainly to freshmen and sophomores





Native American descendant Ren Herdman was the guest speaker at the Mount Pleasant Lions Club on November 5. She grew up in Southwest Virginia and is a graduate of William Byrd High School and a member of the Central Appalachian Cherokee Tribe (CAC). She has spent years studying and documenting Native American sites throughout the Central Appalachian region and across the country. She also speaks as a Native American educator on the local tribes that were present in the Central Appalachian region, as well as tribes that were present in other parts of the country.

Herdman is multi-talented. Her first mention in The Vinton Messenger was in 1996 with a feature article on her stunt work in a Jean Claude Van Dam movie "Sudden Death." She was a radio broadcaster for Vinton station WKBA, for Q99 and K92, then the

of a Request for Proposals in August 2024. Two formal proposals to develop a hotel at the site were received. The town's Economic Development Committee chose KARA Hospitality and directed staff to negotiate acceptable terms with the company.

A Contract of Sale for the property with KARA Hospitality has been agreed to in principle and will include a due diligence period through June 30, 2025, that will include the approval of a performance agreement with the town (development incentive grants), finalizing building plans, making site improvements, and securing a hotel franchise for the property.

Council also approved a resolution authorizing the town manager to execute the Performance Agreement between the Town of Vinton, the Roanoke County Economic Development Authority (EDA) and KARA Hospitality for the purpose of developing an Extended Stay America Premium hotel on the parcels, to be known as the Vinton/East County Hotel Project.

Under terms of the Performance Agreement, KARA has agreed to a minimum investment of \$12 million for the development of the hotel, to create and maintain at least 10 new full-time jobs at the hotel, and to generate \$100,000 in increased transient occupancy tax revenue per year for the

In turn, the town and EDA will provide an Economic Development Incentive Grant to encourage the hotel project and pay the amount of the grant to KARA Hospitality over a five-year period. Commencing on the first anniversary of the opening date of the hotel, and continuing thereafter on each anniversary day of the opening date for five consecutive years (for a total of five annual payments), the town will pay to the Authority and the Authority will pay to KARA a grant in the amount of \$100,000; provided that the amount of the grant will be reduced by the amount of any shortfall the company has in achieving its annual Transient Occupancy Tax Revenue Target for each respective year.

Mayor Grose earnestly thanked Town Manager Pete Peters and staff for diligently pursuing this project for several years, despite the many obstacles they encountered.

The council meeting included many recognitions and awards for local businesses and staff.

Economic Development Specialist Marshall Stanley recognized Vinton restaurants who received Best Dining Awards in the annual Roanoker competition: Magazine Dogwood Restaurant, Macado's, New York Pizza, Our Daily Bread, Pok-E-Joe's, Pollard 107 South, and RND Coffee. Owner Cory Welch accepted the award for Pok-E-Joe's; Jes Curtin represented RND Coffee.

Vinton Human Resource/ Risk Management Director Donna Collins recognized Town of Vinton employees who are veterans, including Mayor Brad Grose, Police Chief Fabricio Drumond, Cpl. Jesse Dibble, Public Works Chief Mechanic Jimmy Brown, Officer Sean McKittrick, and Officer Jacob Miller. She commended the veterans for their honor, sacrifice, resilience, courage, and discipline. She also recognized military families for those same traits. Flags were dedicated to each veteran employed by the town and placed on the inaugural Field of Honor at the Vinton War Memorial. She noted that the event raised over \$1,100 for Vinton VFW Post 4522 and will continue next year. Veterans were also honored at a town luncheon last week.

Town Council recognized Collins and Community Programs Manager Amanda Payne for their hard work leading to Vinton being recognized as a "Top Performer" Commemorative Partner by the U.S. Department of Defense. To achieve this recognition an organization must host five or

more events honoring Vietnam veterans and their families. This rare honor goes to only 15 percent of the more than 13,000 organizations participating. Police Chief Drumond

recognized several Vinton officers during the meeting. Officer Jesse Dibble was promoted to the rank of corporal, pinned by his mother. Officer Grant Shepherd was also promoted to corporal, accompanied by his wife and infant son.

Sgt. Brandon Alterio and Sgt. Jeremy Shrewsbury received Certificates of Commendation for completing the strenuous FBI-Leeda Trilogy Series in leadership.

Officer Jason Call was commended for his actions on September 27, 2024, during Hurricane Helene. On that date, Officer Call brought his chainsaw to work to clear blocked roadways and removed downed trees, performing far "above and beyond" his job requirements. Drumond commended him for his "tremendous attitude and exemplary qualities" which demonstrate his care for the community. Public Works Director Bo

Herndon updated council on topics and projects discussed at the November Public Works meeting. Two citizen issues were dealt with—complaints about motorists speeding on Ruddell Road and those ignoring stop signs at the intersection of 5th and Cedar. Ruddell Road has recently been striped, and the town anticipates installation of speed limit signs. The town is in discussion with VDOT over the 5th and Cedar intersection and possible remedies.

He also reported that the traffic signal destroyed in an accident at PFG will be replaced by mid-December. Efforts continue to replace street signs throughout the town. The Midway community is complete; currently, crews are working on the Bali Hai/Bush Farms area; next up will be Dillon Woods and Briarcliff.

The town anticipates the completion of repair work which has closed Niagara Road by mid-December or early January. The new utility line is in service; the Western Virginia Water Authority is now in the process of abandoning the old line.

Treasurer/Finance Director Andrew Keen presented September and October financial reports for council's approval. He noted that revenues continue to exceed expectations (including consumer-based meals, cigarette, pari-mutuel, and state sales taxes) while expenditures are lower than anticipated. He mentioned the upcoming renovations to the Vinton War Memorial, which will require its closure for about a year, are expected to cost about \$2 million.

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



operators arrived from Lynchburg Crane; the building was jacked up about two inches off the foundation the day before, then utility workers from Appalachian Power disconnected the structure from services; Vinton Public Works employees coordinated street closures for the event.

Wilkinson says the building weighs about 60,000 pounds, but to be safe, they used a 260-ton crane to lift the

When asked why he chose relocation over demolition, Wilkinson said that we should maintain and preserve historic places when we can. This is one of the gateways into Vinton and it's important for it to look right."

The plans for the area include an open space, "Stone Plaza," on the corner in honor of Frank and Janine Stone. Stone served as principal at three Vinton elementary schools, for decades at Hardy Road Elementary (now W.E. Cundiff); Janine taught math.

Wilkinson also owns the historic McCarty Paint & Supply building next door which years ago was a hardware and "the place to go in Vinton—the ultimate man-cave." He has a vision for that building as well. (He is already well-known in Vinton for preservation projects including the Roland E. Cook

Lofts and Vinyard Station.)

In October 2024, Vinton Town Council adopted a resolution authorizing the town manager to execute a Performance Agreement among the Town of Vinton, the Roanoke County Economic Development Authority (EDA), and The Wilkinson Group, Inc to redevelop the Stone and McCarty buildings along West Lee Avenue, develop two public plazas, improve two alleys that run among Lee Avenue, Walnut Avenue, and Pollard Street, and improve some public utilities in the area. The agreement involves a grant to the Wilkinson Group.

Wilkinson intends to renovate and lease the buildings, which will involve capital investment in the town and the creation of new jobs.

He says that the aim of the project is to keep people in Vinton to shop and do business, just as the goal of the Vinyard Station and Roland E. Cook projects he was involved with encouraged people to live and dine in Vinton and contribute to the local

Wilkinson says, "Vinton is a unique municipality," always willing to work with developers.

The general contractor overseeing the project is Tommy Thompson.

"weather girl" on WSLS TV. She went on to become a broadcaster in Pittsburgh, a martial arts instructor, and an author of magazine articles and books. In addition, she is also an ordained chaplain, and an active military member of the State Guard, where she proudly serves as a Warrant Officer.

This past summer, Herdman visited the Vinton History Museum and donated several archaic artifacts to the museum for its collection.

She brought along many artifacts on her visit to the Mount Pleasant Lions, mostly from the Roanoke Valley and along the Roanoke River, including nutcracker rocks, the blade of a gardening hoe, many sizes of grinding stones and pestles, projectile points, scrapers, fleshers, abraders, sewing tools, and pottery chards. She and two members of the CAC who assisted her, Ashes Dearing and Cherokee Princess Aleni

Garcia, were dressed in Cherokee regalia. Herdman talked about blankets and what they meant to Native American tribes, especially during the forced relocation, the Trail of Tears, as a sign

of not just warmth, but of comfort. Part of the CAC mission is giving blankets to local police departments to comfort victims of accidents and crimes. She displayed beads, seeds, shells, and hairpin bones, which were used decoratively by Native Americans, along with shakers and feathers. Feathers, especially eagle feathers, were important in Native American culture because birds "fly closest to the Creator." She explained the purpose of the

popular "dreamcatchers" placed over a child's or elder's bed to catch bad dreams.

Herdman explained that the Central Appalachian Cherokee Tribe is a nonprofit, community-based educational tribe. Members are descendants of the Cherokee people who once lived in East Tennessee, East Kentucky, Southwest Virginia, parts of North Carolina, and parts of West Virginia. Tribal membership is based on Native American blood quantum and/or family

history (oral or documented.) The purpose of the CAC is "to help support the communities of the volunteerism and philanthropy, and to keep the memory of members' ancestors alive." Many descendants of the Central Appalachian Cherokee assimilated or died before the Indian Removal Act of 1830, as well as before the organization of the Dawes Rolls from 1899-1907. The CAC wants to "remember them, as their life was hard, and their true identity was considered shameful in that time of American history."

The CAC is not affiliated with any other federally recognized Cherokee tribe; members do not participate in, nor tolerate, American witchcraft or any other form of shamanistic occultism. In fact, Herdman is a Christian.

Herdman serves as the CEO "Chief" of the Central Appalachian Cherokee Tribe, a member of the Wolf Clan.

She is multi-ethnic and proud of

all the heritage she represents. Like

most Americans on the eastern side of the country, Native American blood quantum isn't her largest percentage. However, she is well documented to be of Native American descent by both DNA and family history. She also feels that God is calling her to help with Native American causes.

She is the first female to be named CEO "Principal Chief" of the tribe.

At the end of her talk, Herdman answered questions from Lions Club members. One concerned determining Native American heritage, as many families in this area believe they are Native American descendants. DNA "spit" testing appears to be a good starting point for determining ancestry. For more information on the Central

Terriers turn the lights out on Staunton River for playoff win

Byrd will play top-seeded Abingdon on the road in Region 3D semifinal this Friday

The William Byrd football team played Staunton Defensively, they created a lot of pressure on our pass-River for a second time last Friday and scored one less point than in the first meeting. This time, however, they held the Eagles scoreless and 20 was plenty for

The Terriers beat the Golden Eagles in overtime, 21-20, on November 1st in Moneta in a game that went down to the final seconds and the final inches of a failed two-point conversion attempt. Last Friday the fourth seeded Byrdmen got to host the fifth seeded Eagles in the first round of the Virginia High School League Region 3D playoffs, and Byrd shut out the visitors at Patterson Stadium. With the win Byrd advances to this week's region semifinal at Abingdon High School.

Certainly playing in Vinton was a benefit, but Byrd coach Brad Lutz and his staff were able to make some adjustments for the second meeting with Staunton River. The result was the fourth shutout of the season for the Terrier defense as Byrd improved to 9-2 on

"While we won the first game against Staunton River, they had success against us on offense and defense," said Lutz. "Offensively, they produced success in the run game, and our defensive staff made a few adjustments that made a huge difference.

ing game, and our players put in a ton of film and field time to adjust. The extra adjustments and prep paid off, and I believe was the difference in the game.' Byrd jumped on top early this time around. Ethan

Haston picked off a pass on Staunton River's first possession and two plays later Cannin Lutz found Tate Kotz for a 42 yard TD pass. The extra point attempt failed but Byrd had a 6-0 lead with less than two min-

The defense held Staunton River on the ensuing possession and Byrd struck again on a 42 yard TD pass from Lutz to Kam McKee. This time the conversion was good and Byrd led 13-0 in the first quarter.

After a scoreless second period the Terriers put another score on the board in the third quarter. After a brief delay due to a power outage the Terriers lit up the scoreboard with Kotz' second TD reception from Cannin Lutz, this time from 24 yards out. The 20-0 lead was plenty for the Byrd defense as the Terriers closed out a big win.

Lutz completed 10 of 15 passes in the game for 193 yards and three scores. Kotz had five catches for 115 yards and McKee had 53 yards on two receptions. Jerrett Shepherd had 103 yards rushing on 17 carries and Gray Matthews rolled up 58 yards on a dozen attempts.

The defense was solid as Blake Anderson led with eight tackles and Jahdai English had six. Graylen Castleberry had a huge game with five tackles, including four for losses, and two quarterback pressures. Reliable Maurice Burnette had a tackle for a loss and a pair of QB pressures to go with four tackles. Shepherd and Kotz had four

The playoff win was Byrd's fourth in the past two years. Byrd is 21-4 over the past two seasons after going 3-16 the two seasons prior, and you can see the confidence building.

"Confidence is the key ingredient in growing any program or team," said coach Lutz. "Our players have worked very hard and earned an opportunity to compete in the playoffs. We are blessed to have an older group, who has not only had playoff experience, but experienced success in the playoffs. Playing in a game of this magnitude is not new to them, so that is a big advantage for us."

This Friday the Terriers will take on the top-seeded Falcons at Abingdon High. Abingdon is 10-1 and their only loss was to Tennessee High of Bristol, 21-0, the last Friday in September. The only common opponent between the two is Christiansburg, who Byrd beat 33-0 and Abingdon defeated 31-28. Both games were in September one week apart.

"They are the biggest team that we have played this season," said Lutz. "They only have a few players that go both ways, which is a big advantage. They have a lot of team speed and run an offense that limits your offensive possessions. They are very well coached and play extremely hard."

Byrd and Abingdon have never played each other in the history of both schools. The winner will play for the Region 3D championship against the winner of a game between second seeded Magna Vista and third seeded Lord Botetourt. If Byrd wins this week they will be on the road again the day after Thanksgiving, but that shouldn't be a problem. The Terriers are 4-1 in road games this year with their only loss at Lord Botetourt in a game that went to the final seconds before it was decided.

"Our program has a very structured game day routine, so we want to keep that routine this Friday," said Lutz "The extended trip creates a few challenges, but we will adapt. Emory and Henry University is near Abingdon High School, so we're going to stop there and use their facilities to have our normal pre-game snack, walk through and dress for the game." Coach Lutz knows his way around the E&H cam-

pus as his son Bryson, a former Byrd standout, is a junior offensive lineman for the Wasps.
