The 2025 Vinton Dogwood Festival Queen will be crowned at the Vinton Municipal Building by Mayor Brad Grose at noon on April 26.

The Dogwood Court is traditionally made up of 10 seniors from William Byrd High School who are nominated by the faculty. They are interviewed during the morning of the Dogwood Festival by a panel of judges, who then select the queen. The new queen receives a \$750 scholarship from the Dogwood Festival Committee. After she is crowned, the new queen and her court ride through the streets of downtown Vinton in horsedrawn carriages.



Pine Spur Draft Horse Pull amazes crowd

The first Pine Spur Hunt Club Draft Horse Pull was a jaw-dropping sight to behold. Pairs of powerful Percheron and Belgian Draft Horses pulled up to 7,000 pounds of concrete blocks behind them on a sled while the crowd sat in dead silence (good horse etiquette) until the finishing whistle blew.

Pine Spur was promoting equine opportunities in Southwest Virginia at the Spring Festival and very first Draft Horse Pull on April 12. They hope to make the pull an annual event. They are a non-profit group made up of horse owners/appreciators, and friends, located off Route 24 just outside of Vinton.

The day started with the festival which included equine breed demonstrations showing off the many different breeds of horses in the area, vendors, a quilt show (Jan Dickens of Vinton won first place), and more. There were horse-related activities for the kids–lassoing, face-painting, and the very popular corn pit (like a large sandbox, but with corn kernels).

Late in the afternoon came the draft horse pull. Teams of horses lined up within the ring, appearing as "quiet, gentle giants" until the competition began.

Basically, a draft pull is a contest to see who has the strongest team of pulling horses. The teams compete in rounds and weight is added at the end of each

round. Teams try for a full pull in each round—at Pine Spur on April 12, that was 27.5 feet. The winner is the team that has pulled the heaviest load the furthest. Teamwork between horses and their teamster is the key.

The teams were hitched to a flat-bottomed boat/ sled loaded with 500-pound concrete blocks. Weight increases as the contest advances.

At Pine Spur there were two divisions—lightweight (starting with a sled filled with 4,000 pounds of concrete blocks) and heavyweight (starting at 5,000 pound of concrete blocks). When the pull ended, the sled held 7,000 pounds of blocks. The "teamster" drives the horses to the boat,

assisted by two "evener" men who are responsible for carrying the metal evener bar with a hook that attaches the horses to the load. Sometimes that takes more than one attempt. This is the place where the most suspense comes in—will the horses start pulling before the bar is hooked, causing a great deal of gasping from the audience.

As soon as the horses hear the sound of the evener in contact with the boat, they are off and pulling. The teamster shouts encouragement to his team until the whistle blows, signaling a full pull. Spectators are encouraged to remain quiet until the whistle is blown so the horses don't prematurely think they are

The most common horses to see in the pulling ring are Belgians, which are typically chestnut with flaxen manes and tails and occasionally roan as well. Percherons are less common but also seen in the United States, typically black or gray. Lightweights are generally under 3,000 pounds of combined weight between both horses and heavyweights are over 3,000 pounds of combined weight.

The horses are extremely large. One of the Percherons in the competition Saturday weighed 2,250 pounds; his owner says the horse consumes 75 pounds of hay and four gallons of grain daily.

The winner of the Lightweight Division on April 12 was Odell Coley, with horses Hoover and Barney, from Statesville, N.C. Their top pull was 6,500 pounds, 21 feet.

First place in the Heavyweight Class went to Russell Harmon of Vinton and his horses Jim and George, whose top pull was 7,000 pounds pulled 23 feet.

Other winners in the Lightweight Division included: second place Stanley Chaffin of Floyd with Barney Fife and Flame, and third place Blane Chaffin of Riner with Mike and Charlie.

Other winners in the Heavyweight Division included: second place L.W. Calton of Mt. Airy, N.C., with Jack and Buster; third place Josh Stevens

Questions exclusion of Cherokee leader from parade

I'm writing out of deep concern regarding the exclusion of Chief Ren, a respected leader of the Central Cherokee Tribe, from participation in the upcoming Vinton Dogwood Festival Parade. As a resident and a proud member of the local EMS community, I believe this decision deserves urgent reconsideration.

The Cherokee people have longstanding historic ties to the Blue Ridge Mountains. They hunted, traveled, and lived on this land long before Vinton was established. Ironically, the Town of Vinton's EMT vehicles display the official Roanoke City seal, which features the image of a Native American. That image is a tribute to the tribes – including the Cherokee – who once thrived in this region. If we honor that legacy symbolically, we should also respect it in action.

The Cherokee have made important contributions to this country - especially in agriculture, medicinal knowledge, and healing practices that still influence holistic care today. Their understanding of native herbs and plants laid a foundation many of our ancestors relied on and still benefits us today.

To deny Chief Ren participation in the parade, especially as the Vinton History Museum prepares to host a Tribal Summit during the festival, feels both contradictory and exclusionary. We should welcome opportunities to include living Native voices - not just memorialize them in symbols.

As someone who rides in an ambulance bearing a seal that honors this land's first people, I believe we owe them more than symbolic gestures. We owe them respect, inclusion, and a seat in the celebration of our shared history.





RND and WBMS Art Dept. partner to showcase coffeeinspired art created by students

RND (Roaster's Next Door) and the William Byrd Middle School Art Dept. are partnering to showcase student artwork in the downtown Vinton coffee shop. Laura Baldwin, the art

teacher at William Byrd Middle School, reached out to Jes Curtin, the Events and Catering Coordinator and HR Director at RND Coffee, in hopes of collaborating to feature her students' artwork. Her goal was to connect the students with the community and for the community to support the students by showcasing their artwork, cultivating a sense of hometown pride in the Vinton community.

This is Baldwin's second year of teaching art at WBMS. She began her career as a Special Education teacher. Her goal is to make art accessible for all. Her husband also teaches PE at

Baldwin offered to work with RND to select the subject matter to fit the aesthetics of the business, and the size and number of paintings to be involved. Students could work individually on small pieces or collaborate on larger pieces. The results are a mixture of both.

"RND's motto 'Founded by Family, Bolstered by Community' and we absolutely stand by that whenever possible,"

Curtin said. "When Mrs. Baldwin reached out with this opportunity, I was eager to partner with her to continue fostering Vinton's unique sense of community. RND is honored to showcase the students' talents and to foster a sense of connection to the Vinton business community."

Baldwin worked with her students to curate custom pieces to display at RND Coffee, inspired by their menu items, as well as the colors and aesthetic of their space.

Students spent much of March creating their artwork-57 seventh and eighth grade students, creating 22 pieces in total. The eighth graders are enrolled in Arts and Crafts and eighth grade Art; the seventh graders are enrolled in the seventh grade interest block.

Baldwin taught them the skills necessary for drawing a cup, step-bystep, using minimal brush strokes and breaking down shapes. They did not draw from memory, which is not always reliable, but from photo

Baldwin, her daughter Jayda, and Curtin installed the artwork on April 8, just in time for RND's Weekend Market with local vendors and artisans on April 19 and the Vinton Dogwood Festival on April 25 and 26. The exhibit will remain on display for about six weeks afterward.

coffee-inspired

art project was an actual assignment on which students were graded. It was also a part of a unit on exploring art as a profession and helping cultivate a sense of community connection.

Baldwin says that only a handful had visited RND previously, so they were unfamiliar with the space initially, but now they are eager to come in and see their work on display.

This is not the first time Baldwin and her students have worked with the business community. For the Christmas holiday in 2023, many decorated ornaments for the Canine Tree in Salem sponsored by the non-profit Friends Regional for Animal Care and Protection (RCACP) as a fundraiser. Roanoke County Schools seeks public input on bullying policies

The Roanoke County School Board addressed the district's bullying policies and processes at its meeting on April 10, with an overview presented by Deputy Superintendent of Administration and Operations Dr. Jamie Soltis and Director of School Counseling Dr. Shawn Hughes.

The discussion followed the death of 10-year-old fourth grader Autumn Bushman, who took her own life in late March; her family reported that she had been a victim of bullying. Many supporters spoke at the meeting about the bullying policy now in effect and their suggestions for changes to be made to create a better policy.

The School Board voted to maintain the existing policy; however, RCPS Director of Community Relations Chuck Lionberger noted that the policy "can change as often as it needs to change."

The school system encouraged families to become stakeholders and share their suggestions for changes to the current policy online at https://www.rcps.us/. The survey has just one question, ""What suggestions do you have for improving Roanoke County Public Schools' Policy 3.16, Administrative Regulation 3.16AR, and our procedures for investigating bullying reports?"

The current policy in effect, also available on the RCPS website, reads: A. Policy Statement

Roanoke County Public Schools division (RCPS) is committed to maintaining a learning/working environment free from bullying as defined by RCPS. B. Harassment/Bullying Definition

There has been confusion at times as to whether a reported offense is harassment

Harassment/bullying means any aggressive and unwanted behavior that is intended to harm, intimidate, or humiliate the target; it involves a real or perceived imbalance of power between the aggressor(s) and target; and it may or may not be repeated over time or causes severe emotional trauma. bullying includes cyber bullying. Harassment/bullying does not include ordinary teasing, horseplay, argument, or peer conflict.

The principal or principal's designee notifies the parent of any student involved in an alleged incident of bullying within 24 hours of learning of the allegation of

It may involve repeated discussion and actions by all parties and may go on for a period of time before resolution occurs. Conflict mediation is recommended to end conflict. adversely affected when harassment/ bullying occurs. Therefore, the RCPS division prohibits harassment/bullying of any person at school or any schoolsponsored activity. It shall be a violation of this policy for any person, including a parent/guardian, a student or an employee of RCPS to harass/bully another person.

Further, it shall be a violation of this policy for any school personnel (bystanders) to tolerate or participate in harassment/bullying as defined by Roanoke County Public Schools.

For the purpose of this policy, school personnel includes: School Board members, school employees, agents, volunteers, contractors or other persons subject to the supervision of the Roanoke County Public Schools division."

As part of the policy each Roanoke County Public School establishes and maintains a Bullying Committee to establish and maintain procedures for education and prevention of harassment/ bullying for students, staff, and parents and to monitor ongoing prevention/ intervention procedures. Education of students and staff about harassment and bullying is to be done through classrooms annually. Each school publishes on their school's website their bullying contact, listed under the "Parents and Students"

Cyberbullyingharassing, humiliating, intimidating and/or threatening others on the Internet or through any technological device (such as phones). It can also be sexual in nature. It can involve someone a student knows or a complete stranger. Cyberbullying can include cruel jokes, malicious gossip, cruel and harmful messages, embarrassing information, or photographs, and/or websites designed to target



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

center field, scoring two.


Agee also collected three hits for Byrd while Bustamante, Dixon and Hadyn Grubb had two each.


