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The Field of Honor at the Vinton War Memorial on Mav 9

Flags fly in formation on Vinton's Field of Honor once again

Vinton Veterans Outreach Committee, Vinton Police Dept., Vinton Public Works, town staff, the nonprofit Sirens and Salutes, and several volunteers spent May 9 installing the Field of Honor at the Vinton War Memorial. This tradition began last fall with Veterans Day and is now continuing in observance of Memorial Day.

According to the Outreach

Committee, "The Vinton Field of Honor is made up of a panorama of United States flags flying in solemn formation atop eight-foot poles to honor our fallen heroes. Each U.S. flag represents an individual and tells a story."

The first Field of Honor consisted of 100 flags; this time there are 300 flags flying on the front lawn of the War Memorial, which was originally built to honor those who made the ultimate sacrifice in World War II. There are also flags flying near the portico representing each branch of the military

Vinton Public Works employees placed the poles on the field in even rows to support the flags.

The Veterans Outreach

Committee said, "The Field of Honor is being held in a patriotic tribute to honor our fallen heroes within both our First Responder and Military communities.

"The committee officially established in January 2024 to honor and support employee and town veterans through dedicated advocacy, resources, and community engagement. Their purpose is

to ensure that every veteran feels appreciated, valued, and supported long after their service to our nation has ended. The Town of Vinton has been a designated Virginia Values Veterans Employer since 2015, with the message to future employees that "Vinton Values Veterans!"

Vinton's 2050 Comp Plan nearly complete

Vinton town staff, consultants, and citizen volunteers, along with Town Council and the Vinton Planning Commission, spent a little over a year putting together the Town of Vinton 2050 Comprehensive Plan which will plot the town's course for the next 25 years.

The new plan replaces the Comprehensive Plan adopted by Town Council in 2004. It is

now in its final draft, ready to be unveiled to the town in June and adopted by council. Consultants 3TP Ventures, led by President

Mike Callahan, was

selected to work with

the town in developing

the plan. Callahan has been for help in fine-tuning assisted by Vlad Gavrilovic the document. Over 100 New Paradigm

Planning. Comp Plan 2050 kicked off at the 2024 Dogwood Festival with consultants and the Vinton Planning and Zoning staff setting up a display at the Vinton Munipal Building to solicit opinions from citizens about what they found great about Vinton, what needed to be changed, and specific suggestions for the town's future leading up to 2050.




Herman L. Horn hosts Lemonade and Literacy Night





May 1975 was awards month in the Town of Vinton. Joyce Spradlin Baker was named Mother of the Year by the Vinton Area Chamber of Commerce. She received the award at Roland E. Cook Elementary where she

served as PTA president. She was nominated by her daughter, Lin.

In her nomination letter, Lin described what made her mother so special, including "she tells us right from wrong and who not to hang around with. She went to the parade Saturday, even if there weren't any clowns. Some people think if you have seen one parade, you have seen them all. I love her and so I hope she will

The Town of Vinton named bookkeeper Ayles Brogan as the employee of the month for May.

The Town of Vinton submitted a budget for \$1.4 million, an increase of \$200,000 from the previous year.

Town Council authorized an experiment eliminating a left turn for traffic turning onto Pollard Street from Washington Avenue. Councilman Elmer Cox warned, 'You're going to have trouble if you try this.'

Fifth graders from the elementary schools were taking the annual orientation trip to William Byrd Intermediate School.

The William Byrd High School Home Ec Dept. wrapped up a year-long study on family life, with a mock wedding between Sandee Ross and Richard Canell. The newspaper article stated that "following the ceremony and reception, the couple attended their regular classes. They will reside in the homes of their separate parents."

Twenty-one William Byrd seniors received honors at the annual William Byrd Senior Scholastic Honor Banquet. Three were named co-valedictorians in 1975 – Jan Joness, Janet Conner, and Carolyn Gross; Linda

Marks was named salutatorian.

Hardy Road Elementary celebrated the end of the school year with a Hawaiian luau for their families. The menu featured Polynesian chips, Island Ambrosia, and Hawaiian Punch. The evening also included a lei for each guest, two active volcanoes erupting and hula dancing.

Vandals damaged Vinton's new gateway signs with spray paint; the Chamber of Commerce was offering a \$100 reward to help arrest the culprits. The signs had just been installed at a cost of \$500. Police were also investigating a break-in at Brabham Petroleum Company, where calculators and Dictaphones were

There were also burglaries that month at the Roanoke County Pre-Vocational School, the Hair Shack, and the Vinton Municipal Pool, along with several residential robberies (including a black piggy bank containing \$100). A shoplifter was apprehended at the Super-X Drug Store. Two mowers were stolen from G.C. Murphy.

Paving was underway on Mountain View Road.

William Byrd High School graduate Cadet Dan Darnell was named Valedictorian of the Class of 1975 at VMI and commissioned as a second lieutenant in the U.S. Air Force Reserve, going on to have a stellar career

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers was preparing to begin a flood elevation study in Vinton to establish actuarial flood insurance rates. Of special interest were flood elevation areas in the town in the flood hazard

Candidates were announcing their intentions to run in the fall elections. Incumbents Raymond Robrecht and Richard Cranwell, along with Lela Spitz, revealed plans to run for the Virginia House of Delegates.

Two candidates announced they would be running for seats on the Roanoke County Board of Supervisors representing Vinton – John Seibel and Deal Tompkins.

Vinton Mayor Gus Nicks was also considering a run for the position but eventually decided to serve out his term as mayor of Vinton.

O.S. Foster and Elizabeth Stokes were nominated to run for Roanoke County Sheriff and Clerk of Court, respectively. County Treasurer Fred Anderson of Vinton challenged Stokes for the nomination, but she prevailed.

May 27 was "Free Baby Chick Day" at Red Rose Feed and Farm Supply in Vinton. The business was giving away 25 free chicks to customers who purchased 25 pounds of chicken feed. All that was necessary was to bring your own box."



Several candidates announced they would be running for public office, including the Virginia House of Delegates, the Roanoke County Board of Supervisors, Roanoke County Sheriff, and Roanoke County Clerk of

Update on the Vinton Post Office mail collection box

Senator Mark Warner has sent an update on the long-absent mail collection box at the Vinton Post Office after his inquiry to the U.S. Postal Service. Here's the response from the postal service.

'Ān agency official states: 'Thank you for reaching out regarding the collection box replacement. I understand how important this service is to you, and I appreciate your patience as we work through this process.

"The collection box will be replaced once the freeze is lifted, though at this time, we do not have an estimated date for replacement. It was removed due to damage, and unfortunately, Headquarters has not yet provided a timeline for lifting the freeze.

"In the meantime, there are alternative collection boxes available

- Two collection boxes remain in use at Food Lion and Kroger
- Two interior boxes are available
- A 'snorkel box' is located approximately eight minutes away

downtown, and allows customers to drive up and deposit mail easily

"I sincerely wish we could expedite the process, but unfortunately, the decision regarding reinstallation rests with Headquarters. Please know that we are continuing to monitor the situation and will provide updates as soon as new information becomes available.

A motorist mail chute "snorkel box" is a collection box that is affixed with a mail chute that permits motorists to deposit mail without exiting their

Unfortunately, the collection boxes at Food Lion and Kroger and the interior boxes in the customer lobby at the post office require patrons, often elderly or physically challenged, to leave their cars and walk to the boxes and in busy parking lots. The closest snorkel box is in Roanoke, several miles away.

Read 2 Chronicles 24:1 through 26:23

After Uzziah became powerful, his pride led to his downfall. He was unfaithful to the Lord his God, and entered the temple of the Lord to burn incense on the altar of incense (2 Chronicles 26:16).

Uzziah became king in Judah at sixteen years of age. During his reign, he fortified towers, dug wells, increased agriculture, invented weapons, and raised an impressive army. 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

guiding document for growth, development, preservation, and investment in the Town of Vinton 25 years into the future. Comp Plans are required by the Code of Virginia.

The new Vinton Comp Plans contains vision principles, a future land use plan, a future transportation network and "big moves" - the high priority actions for the town to take in the coming decades to achieve their goals.

Town Council and the Vinton Planning Commission have met in joint sessions to assist with development of the

Citizens Advisory Committee has met seven times to help develop and then review plans for Vinton's future. The committee includes those who live, work, or own property/businesses in the town: Councilman Keith Liles, property manager Seth Wilkinson, property owner and business owner Stephanie Brown Mead, property/business

owner Anthony Conner, Vinton resident/property owner/artist/ Jonathan Murrill, Vinton resident/property owner James Wright, longtime Vinton resident/property owner/ former council member and Vinton's citizen representative to RVTV Ray Sandifer, Vinton resident/property owner Tiffany Rawling, and Vinton resident/ property owner Kerry Werner. The Advisory Committee

held its seventh meeting on April 30 to review the final draft, including 10 vision principles that are the bedrock of the plan. The principles envision the Vinton of 2050 as a "sociable and welcoming small town, with a thriving and authentic downtown, which serves as an outdoor recreation hub for the region, and has housing available for all phases of life, along with safe and connected streets for motorists, cyclists, pedestrians, and public transportation."

The plan also sees Vinton as an environmental stewardship leader with clean, safe restored streams for fishing and recreation, and a tree canopy along major streets, minus invasive species. There will be parks for all residents within a ten-minute walk, ballfields, playgrounds, and greenways, connected by new sidewalks and The future Vinton will retain

its small-town feel, not "frozen in time," but adaptable, so that new businesses find it easy to set up shop and find success. Older buildings can be adapted for modern uses and preserved for future generations. Vinton is already well-

known for its well-maintained infrastructure (streets, water, sewer, and stormwater). Town investments have made the town resilient. Staff are recognized for being accessible and responsive. Vinton is at the heart of

the Roanoke Valley region and partners with other localities to solve regional problems of homelessness, water quality, air

quality, traffic, and greenway connectivity. That will continue into the future. The notable "Big Moves"

developers of the plan have selected involve:

- Improving vehicular traffic patterns, improving streetscapes on Lee Avenue and South Pollard Street and activating downtown alleys to create a more walkable downtown district public Expanding
- gathering space downtown by updating the Farmers' Market, building a Glade Creek Greenway trailhead, and, longterm, exploring options for the fire and rescue station and post
- Master plans for the War Memorial area and Glade Creek/Gearhart Parks, including potential new street and trail connections
- Investing in stormwater infrastructure improvements that reduce flooding, protect critical infrastructure, and support redevelopment

- Investment in green infrastructure starting out downtown, adding trees, landscaping, and rain gardens to absorb rainwater
- Build the Gish Mill Greenway to Vinyard Park Greenway connection
- Update the town's zoning code to encourage housing development, bring the Comprehensive Planning and Zoning Code in alignment, and
- modernize standards Invest in a "close the gaps" sidewalk program focused on streets that are identified as key bicycle/pedestrian routes
- Build a direct walking and bicycling connection between downtown Vinton and the River Park area
- Make gateway including improvements murals, wayfinding signage, landscaping, and, long-term, placing utilities underground.

Callahan hopes the town will set the Comp Plan 2050 in motion quickly once it is finalized and adopted.


in the Field of Honor, carefully woven into each American flag is the sacrifice of love of country from each and every veteran."

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
