Roanoke College's Dr. Liz **Ackley recognized as one** of Virginia's outstanding faculty for 2022

Dr. Liz Ackley, the Brian H. Thornhill Associate Professor of Health & Human Performance at Roanoke College, has been recognized as one of 12 recipients of the 2022 Outstanding Faculty Awards by The State Council of Higher Education (SCHEV) and Dominion Energy. The award will be presented at an in-person ceremony on March 1, 2022. Ackley is one of only two professors at private Virginia colleges honored with the 2022 award.

"If we were to mint a professor who was designed to engage students in community-altering research, to inspire students through her instructional talent, to provide leadership to college and community in ample doses, the professor would be Dr. Ackley," Michael C. Maxey, president of Roanoke College, said in the nomination of Ackley for

Ackley, who joined the Roanoke College faculty in 2010, holds a B.S. in exercise science from the State University of New York at Cortland College, and an M.S. and Ph.D. in health and human performance from Middle Tennessee State University.

"This honor is such a recognition of the teams who have supported my work over my career," Ackley said. "İ am celebrating with everyone who has provided support and collaboration. That includes students, faculty colleagues, the adminispartners."

"It's also made me reflect on how lucky am I to be at Roanoke College and our mission of Freedom with Purpose," Ackley said. "I am fortunate to work at a place that really believes in giving faculty

Discovery

"Ackley developed novel health veillance methodology to identify geographic inequities in the social, environmental, and economic factors contributing to health disparities in children. Her surveillance system, the Roanoke Valley Community Healthy Living Index, has since grown to become one of the largest, most successful translational research models of its kind."

Knowledge Integration "Dr. Ackley has spearheaded a number of efforts to bring together traditionally disparate academic disciplines, institutions of higher education, and community partners to develop experiential learning opportunities for students which emulate the real world. She does this by convening partners around a shared equity agenda informed by her primary line of discovery."

Service "In addition to bolstering her professional reputation through service to her academic community, Dr. Ackley has advanced Roanoke College's institutional goals, position within the community, and pursuit of becoming a top-100 liberal arts college...Her most visual service contribution came to fruition in 2018 when she single-handedly founded, funded, and institutionalized the Center for Community Health Innovation at Roanoke College, developing new pathways to student experiential learning opportunities through internships, service-driven research opportunities, and special projects with community partners."

Dr. Matthew Rearick, Health and Human Performance department chair, said what separates Ackley's "work from others across the state is how she manages to merge everything she does into a seamless pursuit. It is virtually impossible to see where one of her academic areas ends and another begins. This is her gift to her students, colleagues, and community."

Student Kavya Iyer '22, described Ackley as "an amazing mentor.'

"Dr. Ackley fosters a collaborative and interdisciplinary team of students from different majors, with various points of view, to tackle problems that everyone is proud to be a part of," Iver said. "She takes time to know what our future career plans and goals are and helps us target weaknesses to make ourselves more competitive applicants for future endeavors. "

Virginia Planning District Commissions awarded millions for broadband expansion

Commissions and Regional Councils (PDCs/RCs) in Virginia have been awarded \$570 million through the Vir-Telecommunication Initiative (VATI) for broadband expansion projects in Virginia. These awards, which comprise just under 80 percent of the \$722 million in total funding that was announced, will help fund 14 regional projects across the state in partnership with internet service providers. The projects also plan to leverage more than \$770 million in additional

resources. The grant awards are part of \$722 million in state general funds and federal American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) dollars that are supporting 35 projects covering 70 Virginia localities to connect more than 278,000 households, businesses and anchor institutions to high-speed internet. The announcement of these awards by Governor Ralph Northam at the Goochland Fire and Rescue Station 6 was made to a gathering of local and state officials, first responders, locality staff and business partners. Virginia U.S. Senators Mark Warner and Tim Kaine, along Congresswoman Abigail Spanberger, also participated in the event.

Administered by the Department of Housing and Community Development (DHCD), VATI provides targeted financial assistance to extend broadband service to areas that are unserved by an internet service provider. During the VATI FY22 application round this Fall, PDCs were the lead applicants on 14 out of 57 grants (nearly 25 percent of all applications), asking for \$640 million of the total of \$943 million in requests and proposing

nearly 230,000 passings. Planning District Commissions were enabled by state legislation in 1968 and most were established the following year. There are 21 PDCs/RCs in Virginia made up of elected officials and citizens appointed by local governments. The purpose of Planning District Commissions is to encourage and facilitate regional solutions to problems of area-wide significance. This is done by promoting the efficient development

Give Light - Christmases: Past and Beyond -

[This is a memory from the many decades the author has been privileged to write for daily and weekly newspapers circulating in Western Virginia.]

With the end of 2021 in sight, it's time to look back a bit and try to glimpse a few things we hope for the future.

The weekly publication of this Memoir, "Give Light..." with the subtitle "and the people will find their own way" dates from four years ago. Following the example of Ed McCoy, the longtime editor of "The Fincastle Herald," I decided at the end of 2017 to retire from active news coverage of Religion issues in the Roanoke Valley and instead continue to write for Mountain Media publishers, but in the form of a weekly Memoir column. In time, the column evolved

from a direct tie with a faith issue of the past and now covers many subjects I've reflected on over my ten decades. As the lifespan in the United States has lengthened before the COVID pandemic has taken so many lives - it has become relatively common to know people in their 90s, and some of them still physically active and mentally alert and stim-

For instance, the past weekend in my Salem church, I attended two memorial services for women long connected to the congregation. One was 97 and, though physically failing, was able to attend worship in a wheelchair until her final weeks. The other, though showing her age in mind and body, died four days short of her 90th birthday. I have talked with a lucid

woman of 102 at the Virginia Veterans Care Center as she came to worship there. And most of all I marvel at a friend of 50 years duration living in a Lexington retirement home who may see her 100th birthday on April 15, 2022. A phone conversation with her is a delight.

All of us can remember much about World War II and some things that affected our families in the 1930s years of the Great Depression.

Which is to say, I hope to continue to publish the column in 2022. It's older people who still

read their newspapers these days and who often tell me they can relate to events, movies, books and other happenings I mention. Perhaps being restricted in getting about more in the pandemic has increased this tendency to look back.

{Since Christmas is nearing, this is a good chance to remind readers that, although this newspaper will be published next week, it will contain only a review of significant stories of 2021. This permits the staff to rest. My next column will appear on January 6, 2022.}

In this Digital Age, it's now possible to send holiday greetings by several means other than the Postal Mail - to the weakening position of the United States Postal Service. My age contemporaries - for lack of energy, wits or money for needed postage - have largely given up the many pretty cards once sent. My detailed family letters, mailed for the past 40 years, were scrapped this Yuletide season, and greetings went only to those who sent

in by marriage, part of the vast Stebbins clan who still resides in Halifax County's rural Southside Virginia. A pianist for her local church, she publishes poetry even at 94. Widowed from her first cousin now for many years, she rejoices that all her eight children are, not only still living, but are close by enough to come frequently to visit her at the old "home place."

That doesn't happen a lot now. Families differ in "closeness." Especially in the years following World War II, American corporations often moved their white-collar or management personnel around the nation; some also were affected by a father's military service.

Being an "only" living with my widowed mother, I was totally accustomed to being with some of my deceased father's family every Christmas. Most of them lived within an hour's drive of our home in Piedmont Virginia, but my mother had no car, and the family place was a mile off a paved road. Young adult cousins drove over to pick us up when I was a small child, and we stayed in the rambling old house for three days where there was a big stone chimney for Santa to

Family changes when I was seven sent us to a nearby city reached for the day by bus or train, and this continued until my college days and the death of my mother.

For me, however, it was not Christmas to stay at home, and for years thereafter with my own husband and children we found some elderly cousins with which we spent the afternoon, a bad memory for my now aging daughter and son.

And now I am the last of my generation. A long life and many memories on which to reflect.

Winter Gardening

activity The springs first to mind is

pruning. Yes, winter is a fabulous time to do with (most of) the leaves off. I see so many people doing it in a fashion I think is wrong, I don't want to wade into that swamp. If you want to learn it, beg a hands-on lesson from a knowledgeable gardener whose yard you like. The online video https:// www.youtube.com/ watch?v=rl7pHemVye8 is pretty good. In a quick internet tour of pruning seminars, I saw moun-

tains of bad pruning on

display. So, onto mulching. Mulching in the late fall/ winter has a lot of benefits. You mulch for three main reasons: 1. Reduce weeds 2. Keep water in the soil 3. Keep the soil in place. Then there are the esthetic reasons for improving the looks of your yard with a nice, uniform-colored mulch. If you have kept up with the yard work enough this year to be worrying about looks at this point, give yourself a big mug of hot chocolate.

Winter mulches do help keep next spring's weeds down. Annual weeds have been throwing seeds around in your yard all year. If you put a good layer of mulch over those seeds, they will have a much harder time germinating. For perennial weeds, mulch will at least slow them down, but not necessarily smother them. Well mulched weeds are easier to pull in the spring though, I think (never read a study on this though). Keeping soil moisture

in: Yes, plants in the winter need water, albeit a lot less when they are having to support foliage. Newly planted trees and shrubs should be mulched to reduce your winter watering chores if it gets dry. The place where you purchased trees and shrubs should have told you to keep them watered for 12 months after planting; which runs you into winter. Newly installed spring bulbs love a mulch too - again keeps the water in the soil and reduces weed competition. And there are some perennials which do well planted (and mulched) in the fall.

If you have never considered what bare soil will do all winter, think again. Remember learning about the dust bowl in school of the 1930's? Well, bare, un-mulched soil will leave town in a high wind, but also leaves courtesy of runoff - when we get the heavy downpours like we

have in the last couple of years. Mulch softens the impact of raindrops on the ground and adds, in effect, rainwater storage which will slowly seep into the ground. Not only do you get more water, its less pounding and compacting of the soil.

Winter mulch ma-terial should be something that is not going to blow around. Leaves make fabulous mulch, but they might need to be chopped up with the lawnmower to help them stay put. In theory, mulches will tax the nitrogen content of the soil underneath as the soil microbes that decompose that mulch will require some nitrogen. Fall/winter mulches are good in that nitrogen usage of plants during fall/winter is about zero. One of my favorite good-looking mulches is pine needles. These guys don't form a surface 'crust' as easily as tree bark mulch does, and you could argue the lighter color blends into your landscape better.

Two other lighter-colored mulches are straw and old hay. Straw can be a little wiggly until it gets good and wet. Old hay varies in color quite a bit depending on how decomposed it is. If you

put down a moderately thick layer (four inches), this should be enough to discourage most of the weed seeds which you will always find in hay. Six inches is even better.

One final benefit of mulches is that they keep soil temperatures and moisture content from fluctuating as much as it does in bare ground. common advice for planting marginally winter hardy trees, shrubs and perennials for your growing area, is to mulch well in the fall. Sometimes a good winter mulch will allow you to grow a plant about 1/2 of a zone colder than where it is traditionally hardy.

Two mulches I do not recommend are landscape fabric and rock mulches. Landscape fabric is tough on your soil, keeping all organic matter out of your soil, and tends to repel rainfall. Organic matter helps the soil retain moisture, helps retain nutrients, and makes it easier for roots to travel through the soil. Rock mulches, to be successful, either require a layer of landscape fabric under them, or need to be put down very thickly (like four inches or more). That's a lot of rock.

As in many newer homes, the hot water tank was located in the attic. A pipe leading to the tank had frozen and burst in the cold snap, causing extensive water damage on the second and first floors, resulting in \$100,000

"We had to gut that house back to the stud walls," Hardee said. "And everything had to be removed from the house. It was

catastrophic, to say the least." Even with the thermostat set in the 50s and sink cabinets left open, pipes in the attic can still freeze. Hot water tanks often are installed in attics to enhance the square footage

We handle many claims related to losses caused by hot water heaters in the attic,' Hardee said. "And those claims are more fre-

when leaving town quent during a warm winter when temperatures suddenly drop down to the 20s.'

> Inhabitants of newly constructed homes should be aware of this possibility, she said, and take precautions. Bump the thermostat into the 60s, and have a neighbor, friend or family member periodically check on the house. The same goes for secondary homes that are inhabited sporadically.

"Major losses can happen overnight," Hardee added. "Have somebody come by and check things out."

VFBMIC's property experts also recommend letting faucets drip during extreme cold and insulating pipes that are most susceptible to freezing, such as those running along exterior walls. Inspect and replace weather stripping, if necessary, and caulk around windows and doors to ensure your home's interior stays cozy when temperatures plummet.

If a snowstorm hits, use a snow rake to promptly remove accumulated snow to prevent roof damage. In addition, take steps to prevent ice dams-thick ridges of ice that build up along a roof edge and prevent melting snow from draining.

Finally, perform routine roof maintenance throughout the year, inspecting and repairing any damage to fortify your home against winter-weather disasters and extend the life of your roof.





Farmers can apply for critical Dairy Margin Coverage

The enrollment period for the 2022 Dairy Margin Coverage program has opened, and dairy farmers who wish to participate have until Feb. 18 to submit applications.

Administered by the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Farm Service Agency, the DMC makes payments to participating dairies when the national milk price-over-feed cost margin falls below a specific level. From January through October 2021, DMC payments have totaled \$1 billion.

Casey Phillips, a dairy farmer and owner of Dry Valley Farms in Montgomery County, participates in the DMC and said programs like this are an important safety net.

"As a dairy farmer, everything is kind of a gamble," said Phillips, a member of Virginia Farm Bureau Federation's Dairy Advisory Committee. "We don't know exactly what we're going to get paid for the milk that we produce today, until a month

He added that rising inflation combined with the challenges of the pandemic have been a further hardship on Virginia dair-

"The last couple years, dairy prices have been down, and all of our feed and operating costs have been up," he lamented. "If it wasn't for those (DMC) payments, it would have been very

New for the 2022 DMC program is a supplemental DMC, which will provide \$580 million to help small and mid-size dairies that have increased production over the years but weren't able to enroll the additional production. Now, they'll be able to retroactively receive payments for the supplemental produc-

Tony Banks, senior assistant director of agriculture, development and innovation for VFBF, explained that when working with a highly perishable product, dairies don't have the ability to store their product until prices improve or stop feeding their herds because of high feed costs.

"On-farm milk production decisions with respect to the cows are made a year in advance and may not align with current farm milk prices," he noted. "Over the last 20 years, U.S. dairy exports and currency exchange rates are having an increasing influence on U.S. farm milk prices. While exports have provided additional markets for U.S. dairymen, they have also added increased milk price vola-

In addition, dairies who participate in the DMC program at the tier 1 level are eligible for the new Virginia Dairy Producers Margin Coverage Premium Assistance program. This program was established earlier this year

by the Virginia Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services and reimburses dairies for the premium payments they have made to the federal pro-

"Virginia's premium costshare program helps offset premium costs for dairy farmers that participate in DMC above its basic catastrophic level," Banks explained. "Dairy margins have been very tight in recent years, making it difficult for producers to participate in

Farmers who wish to sign up for the DMC program can visit their local USDA Service Cen-

Extend the life of your leftover eggnog

Eggnog has a limited shelf life, but consumers can still indulge post-Christmas cravings, and do so safely, with a few kitchen hacks.

Mary Rapoport, consumer affairs and educational director for the Virginia Egg Council, shared some tips in a January 2021 episode of Virginia This Morning.

"It's a wonderful time of year, because I love eggnog," she said on the broadcast. "But if you make homemade eggnog, it doesn't keep a long time. It will turn in about a week. And even with store-bought eggnog, you can't keep it forever."

Rapoport added that with inflation the way it is, consumers can't afford to waste anything.

Her solution - an eggnog-infused quick bread. Rapoport demonstrated how she mixes flour with a box of vanilla instant pudding, baking powder, salt and nutmeg. In a separate bowl, she whipped butter, sugar and eggs.

"And if you have a situation where there's a cup and a half of eggnog left, use it!" Rapoport said, finishing the whipped mixture with a splash of spiced rum and a few handfuls of leftover cranberries.

She combined the mixtures and baked it in a parchment paper-line pan, resulting in a decadentlooking quick bread studded with bright cranberries.

"The pudding makes it almost cake-like!"

Rapoport also recom-

mended making popsicles with the leftovers, for an off-season eggnog fix. Thoroughly wash an egg carton, and pour leftover eggnog into the cups. Freeze the carton for about an hour, and insert halved popsicle sticks into the partially frozen eggnog to make freezerready eggnog pops.

"I was eating those this summer," she said. "They were still good!"

homemade Because eggnog typically consists of milk, sugar, spices and raw

eggs, food safety mindfulness is key, Rapaport shared with Virginia Farm Bureau Federation.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention refrigeratrecommend ing foods containing eggs promptly after cooking. Symptoms of bacterial salmonella exposure usually appear within six hours to six days, causing digestive distress or worse for those with compromised health.

Eggnog made with cooked custard can eliminate those concerns.

Today, most recipes call for a cooked custard. To make one, simply stir the eggnog mixture over medium heat until the eggs thicken, heated to 160° or higher, Rapaport explained. Cover, and refrigerate to chill eggnog thoroughly. Eggnog and other reci-

Roanoke County receives four VATI Broadband Grants

Roanoke County recently announced that it has been awarded four Virginia Telecommunication Initiative (VATI) grants totaling more than \$3.7 million to fund broadband expansion for residents. The County partnered with internet service providers to leverage more than \$7.7 million to improve broadband connectivity throughout the County.

On Monday, Governor Northam announced \$2 billion in (VATI) grants awarded to localities across Virginia to achieve nearuniversal access to broadband and high-speed internet. In this application year, VATI received 57 applications from 84 localities that partnered with 25 internet service providers, requesting more than \$943 million in





The "B" team lost to the Salem "A" team, 78-6, but beat Madison County, Rappahannock, Staunton and Waynesboro's first teams.

"We are wrestling very good at the moment," said Salem coach Lawrence Van Liew. "While at the Holiday Rumble the A team won in dominant fashion and the B team wrestled tough.'

Salem's Kyman Kinney, Matthew McNeil, Avery Hall, Linkin Calihan and James Brooks are all approaching 20 wins on the season and looking to do well in the Big Orange.

"I am looking forward to a very strong showing at the Big Orange,'

"In a dual format tournament having open weight classes in your line-up really makes it challenging to win. Each of those open weight classes effectively costs you six team points in the final score. With Glenvar having several open weight classes this year we really had to shift around the line-up and ask several kids to wrestle up a weight class in order to maximize our chances of winning at this event. The kids really stepped-up and had an outstanding day.'

Glenvar opened with a 54-24 win over Cave Spring, then beat E.C. Glass, 59-22, host Blacksburg, 39-36, and Liberty Christian, 48-27. That set up a final between Glenvar and Lord Botetourt, who also won their first four matches. It was an interesting final, as LB was first and Glenvar was second in the Titan Toughman Tournament, an individual tourney, at Hidden Valley High a week prior.

This time the Highlanders came out on top. Glenvar beat Lord Botetourt 48-36 to claim the championship.

"We expected Blacksburg and Lord Botetourt to be our toughest matches of the day, and they didn't disappoint," said Cline. "Both of those teams have deep line-ups and great coaches so we knew it was going to be a battle. In every match Saturday we had some great performances.'

Five Highlanders went undefeated, River Smith at 113, Jake Cline at 132, Trey Lawrence at 145, Ethan Flowers at 152 and Chase Miller at 160.

"Those five wrestlers went undefeated on the day with nearly every match ending in a pin," said coach Cline. "We also had a few key wins in critical matches that helped us win the team score battle

In the Blacksburg match, Wesley Heltzel picked-up a pin in his match and that ended-up being the difference in team score that put Glenvar into the Finals. In the Finals, a pair of pins from Mason Hylton and Ryan Kirby were the difference that allowed the

Highlanders to take home the team title. This week Glenvar is at the always tough Agie Skeens Memorial Tournament in Grundy. There are over 25 teams competing with powerhouses from Virginia, Kentucky, West Virginia and North Carolina in attendance. The two-day tournament starts at 4 PM Tuesday.
