# Barn Cat Buddies continues mission of placing kittens

Animals seem to have a positive effect on many people. Nursing homes have pet days that brings smiles beyond measure to men and women who no longer have a private

home to keep a pet in. For others, a pet in the home is a natural thing. It is like having a special addition in life to care for and one that cares for you

Barn Cat Buddies is an organization that helps to place kittens into homes.

They were organized in 2007, creating their mission statement:

"Barn Cat Buddies, Inc. is a 501C-3 nonprofit charitable organization compromised of volunteers with a common mission dedicated

to saving and improving the lives of feral, homeless stray and abandoned felines in the southwest and central regions of

Our missions includes the relocation of sterilized feral, and socialized felines to safe alternative placements such as horse farms, wineries, greenhouses, orchards, warehouses or other facilities that agree to follow our relocation protocol.

Additionally, Cat Buddies, Inc. supports ending feline overpopulation through a safe habitat program known Trap/Neuter/Return where caretakers provide long-term care and monitoring of feral cat colo-

As advocates of all felines, we believe that cats, as living creatures have

values and are entitled to ethical consideration and protection."

They do not take house cats that need a new home as their adoptions are mainly kittens that they find with their unsocialized mothers when they are trapping an area.

"We prefer not to return small unsocialized kittens back outside," advocate Jean Bradley shared. "We foster them till they are big enough to be spayed or neutered and then find homes using Pet Supply Plus in Salem, Facebook and we also work with most of the shelters. A check was presented last week to Salem High School's Gary Lupton, a computer science teacher, from Code. org, in partnership with DonorsChoose.

Salem High School was one of 102 schools throughout the country to receive the Computer Science Leaders Prize, which is designed to help further computer science education for students nationwide. The prize was given to one middle school and high school in each state,

in addition to the District of Columbia.



# From the archives

## FLEMING ONE OF COUNTY'S **GREATEST MEN**

Performed Outstanding Services In This Section And Is Regarded As Soldier, Surgeon and Statesman

From the 1938 centennial edition of The Times-Register

With the exception of Andrew Lewis the most noted son of this county was probably Col. William Fleming, who performed great service both as a soldier and a statesman for this country during the French and Indian war and during the Revolutionary war. In 1781 he was chairman of the Council of State, an office which is somewhat similar to that of Lieutenant Governor today so that when Thomas Jefferson resigned as governor he was acting governor of this state for a short time.


His remains are buried and Bellmont, where the Blue Hills golf course is located one mile northeast of the city of Roanoke. The grave is preserved but no conspicuous monument marks the place of his burial.

Colonel Fleming was born in Jed-borough, Scotland, on February18, 1729, the son of William Fleming, a prominent Englishman. Col. Fleming's grandfather was the man who had informed the English of the approach of the Spanish Armada and as a reward for this service was given a large English estate called Westmoreland. The father of William Fleming became financially embarrassed and sold the estate, accepting a political

appointment in Scotland.

Good Education In his youth Col. Fleming received a very good education since he had a private tutor as s boy and later graduated in medicine from the University of Edinburgh. He immediately joined the English navy as a surgeon upon graduation. In one of the wars with Spain he was captured and taken to Spain as a captive. In a Spanish prison he suffered agonizing misery and would probably have died had it not been for the fact that a Spanish woman provided him with food and clothing. He was imprisoned in a place that had a courtyard adjoining this woman's house. From her window she was able to furnish him with supplies which enabled him to withstand the treatment at the hands of the Spanish authorities.

After his release in Spain he came directly to this country arriving at Norfolk in 1755. He immediately

entered the army as an ensign of the First Virginia regiment of which George Washington was a colonel and he was likewise regiment surgeon. He was promoted to the rank of captain when stationed at Staunton and when he was engaged in the battle of Point Pleasant he ranked as

It was at Point Pleasant that he suffered injuries that rendered him incapable of serving during the Revolutionary war. At Point Pleasant he was shot twice below the elbow and once in the chest. Although very badly wounded he endeavored to take command of the fight against the Indians when his two superior officers were killed. This action caused his lungs to protrude through the wound in his chest and it was thought he would not

On reaching his home in this county he made the following notation is his diary: "Reached home in safety, being just three months gone. Praise be to God.'

He had moved to Bellmont is 1770 and in April, 1773, was married to Nancy Christian. Three sons and three daughters were born to this union and all became citizens of more or less prominence.

For several terms he served as state senator from this district. Because of the fact that he bore the same name as another man who was a member of congress it has been assumed by some historians that he was a member of that body but that is not a fact.

Had it not been for the fact that he suffered lasting injuries at the battle of Point Pleasant he would probably have had a far more brilliant military career and his political career might have been one of more

Although he played a conspicuous part in the early history of this section no pictures of him are available today. That is probably one reason why he has not been given the acclaim that is due a man who performed such useful service for his adopted state and country.

# Give the gift of reading this Christmas

A book lover's dream plays itself out every year in Iceland where books are traditionally exchanged on Christmas Eve, and you spend the rest of the night reading and eating chocolate with a hot drink in hand. The event is called Jolabokaflod, otherwise know as the "Christmas book flood."

The event dates back to the end of World War II when Iceland gained its independence from Denmark. Paper was one commodity that was not in short supply when everything else was scarce due to rationing during the war. Icelanders shared their love of reading when other gifts were hard to find. Since 1944, the Icelandic book trade has published a yearly catalog (title translated as 'Book Bulletin' in English) which is delivered to every household in mid-November. People use the catalog to order books to give friends and family for Christmas.

The book, "How to raise a reader," by Pamela Paul and Mario Russo, authors of the New York Times Book Feature, shows you how to instill

the joy and pleasure of taking time to read. The book is divided into four sections, from baby through teen, with useful advice on every page including ways to engage a reluctant reader.

In summary:

Reaquaint yourself with reading. You must be a reader

Read aloud everyday from any book to your newborn. The content doesn't matter. They just need to hear your

Make reading aloud to toddlers a practice anytime throughout the day as well as at bedtime. Being read to is important for a child's cognitive development and your shared closeness makes them identify reading as special.

Continue to read aloud to your children even as they become more independent. Ask

questions about what they are reading and ask their friends what they are reading to encourage sharing new authors. Introduce your child to

a wide variety of fiction and non-fiction books according to their interests and to expand their knowledge. Let children read they are interested in. Get your child a library

card and make regular visits to check out books. Take the time to sit and read together in the new children's area at the Salem Public Library.

# Say what?



You may not have heard of the company Microvast Holdings before, but you've certainly heard of the People's Republic of China – controlled by the Chinese Communist Party.

Earlier this week, in my capacity as Ranking Member of the Oversight and Investigations Subcommittee of the House

the Ranking Member of the full Committee sent a letter to the Secretary of the U.S. Department of Energy (DOE), Jennifer Granholm, asking for more information as to why DOE awarded TWO HUNDRED MILLION DOLLARS to Microvast Holdings. A company that, by its own admission,

is regulated and controlled

by the People's Republic of China. Say What?

This is an electric vehicle battery manufacturing company. Now it is true its U.S. base is in Texas, but it is controlled by the Chinese Communist

Shockingly, amid public and widely acknowledged national security concerns, Energy and Commerce the Department of Energy Committee, I along with awarded this grant just

two months ago. What is even more shocking, is that it was not difficult to discover the company's ties and reliance to the Chinese Communist Party. A simple search through their U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) filings was all it took.

In fact, according to the tech investor website Nanalyze, nearly 80% of Microvast's revenue assets are located in China.

Microvast disclosed the Chinese Communist Party's control over its operations in their publicly available SEC filings: "THE CENTRAL



**INTERSTATE 581** ROUTE 581 BRIDGE WORK OVER WILLIAM-SON ROAD -On Route 11 (Williamson Road) drivers can expect intermittent and alternating lane closures between the intersections with Rutherford Avenue and Wells Avenue. Intermittent daytime and nighttime lane closures between the intersections above might be required, and will be in place utilizing flagging operations. Any impacts to I-581 will be minimal. Expected completion end of 2022.

LANE CLOSURES: A left lane closure will be in place on northbound and southbound I-581 from mile marker 0-1, Monday at 7 a.m. through Wednesday at 7 p.m. A right lane closure will be in place on northbound and southbound I-581 from mile marker 0-1, Thursday at 7 a.m. through Saturday at 7 p.m. A left and center lane closure will be in place on northbound and southbound I-581 from mile marker 0-1, Saturday at 5 p.m. through Sunday at 2 p.m. A right lane closure may be in place on Route 11 northbound between the intersections of Rutherford Avenue and Wells Avenue periodically. Nighttime left lane closures for both the northbound and southbound directions of Route 11 are possible between the intersections referenced above.

I-581/220 EXPRESSWAY PAVING OPERATIONS

Weather permitting, crews will pave, patch and repair pavement on various routes. Lane closures may be in place during nighttime hours, 9 p.m. to 6 a.m. the following morning. Drivers should watch for signs and expect possible delays.

I-581/220 LANE & RAMP CLOSURES FOR PAVING AND MAINTENANCE OP-ERATIONS IN ROANOKE COUNTY- Weather permitting, crews will be milling and paving along Interstate 81. Right and left lane closures will be in place along northbound and southbound lanes during nighttime hours. Drivers should expect possible delays.

ROANOKE CITY

13th STREET SE IM-PROVEMENTS WITH DE-TOUR – A project to improve a portion of 13th Street SE in Roanoke is underway. Located in a residential neighborhood just east of downtown Roanoke, this project will improve traffic flow and connectivity along 13th Street SE from Tazewell Avenue to Norfolk Avenue. The project entails reconstructing about 0.2mile of 13th Street as an improved, two-lane roadway with 10.5-foot-wide travel lane and a raised median. A new roadway will extend 13th Street to Norfolk Avenue and the intersection at 13th Street and Wise Avenue will be reconfigured to include a roundabout. Bike lanes, sidewalks, crosswalks and curb and gutter will also be added. Southbound 13th Street traffic has a detour in place using Norfolk Avenue onto 12th Street to Tazewell Avenue. This detour will be in place throughout the duration of this project. Signs will be posted to designate the detour route. Northbound 13th Street will remain open to traffic. Flaggers may be possible and the speed limit through the work zone is 25 mph. The project is expected to be completed in summer 2023.

TRAFFIC **PATTERN** CHANGE: Northbound traffic will be switched to the northbound lane of 13th Street. Southbound traffic will still be detoured around the work

#### **ROANOKE COUNTY**

**BLUE RIDGE PARKWAY** CLOSURE - The Blue Ridge Parkway will be repairing slope failures and a culvert failure at mile marker 127.9. A 15-mile stretch of the Parkway, mile marker 121.4 to 136, will be closed to all uses including cyclists, pedestrians and drivers. Detour signs to detour traffic around the Bent Mountain section of the Parkway will be in place. Traffic will be rerouted to Route 220 south to Route 419 north to Route 221 south. Traffic traveling north on the Parkway would be reversed. The detour is expected to be in place until 2023.

**BOTETOURT COUNTY** 

**DALEVILLE INTER-**

SECTION PROJECT FOR FIELDSTONE DEVELOP-MENT ACCESS closures northbound southbound on Route 220 in Daleville will be in place for construction of a median with crossover, a right turn lane and a new traffic signal. This work is associated with construction of the Fieldstone Development. Lane closures will be set up on various days into early next year, 2023.

**ROUTE 11 BUCHANAN** BRIDGE PROJECT - A construction project on the Route 11 Bridge in the Town of Buchanan is underway. Water Street is closed for the duration of the project and drivers should expect periodic lane closures with flagging operations to be in place during daytime hours. Message boards are present to alert and update drivers. Expected completion in summer 2023.

ROUTE 1095 (HIGH-LAND DRIVE) PIPE FAIL-**URE CLOSURE** – Route 1095 (Highland Drive) near its intersection with Sanderson Road is closed until further notice due to a pipe failure. The road is currently impassable and drivers will need to seek alternate routes to avoid the area such as Murray Court to Richardson. Please adhere to closure signs. The road is expected to be closed approximately or at least through Mid-December 2022.

ROUTE 611 (GREY-LEDGE ROAD) - A 1.5 mile

section of Route 611 (Greyledge Road) is closed due to flooding that damaged the roadway. Extensive repairs will be needed and a detour will be in place. There is no estimated time for the road to reopen.

#### **CRAIG COUNTY**

ROUTE 311 **BRIDGE** REPLACEMENT **OVER** MEADOW CREEK - Temporary signals control traffic across the bridge and will be in place throughout the project. Construction will begin on the northbound side of the bridge and once completed, work will switch to the southbound side. In addition, a section of Route 646 (Allen Street) between Route 650 and Route 311 will be closed during construction and a signed detour will be in place. All traffic will be detoured to Marshall Street and Kanawha Street to access either 311 or the homes located off Allen Street. Speed limit will be reduced to 35 mph in the work zone with a width restriction of 9 feet. Drivers should expect delays and allow extra travel time through the work zone. Weather permitting, the bridge is expected to be open to traffic by the late spring 2023.

T R A F F I C SWITCH: On September 22, traffic was switched from using the southbound lane to the northbound lane while work continues. Southbound lanes are closed. Temporary traffic signals will continue to direct traffic and message boards will notify drivers.

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
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


The playing field was larger than my friend down



Why you would buy that game today when you can play NFL Madden, I have no idea. However, I do know back in 1962 one little boy got a present he still remembers fondly 60 years later.










# Glenvar boys take 1st at Wytheville meet

This was a championship scoring meet with the top six finishers in each event scoring points for their team, and when all scores were tallied the Glenvar boys' team took the title.

The Glenvar girls' scored 30 points, finishing 5th while edging out a tough Giles team by a single point. Overall nine new personal records were set, four new state championship qualifying times were swam and three new school records were established.

Finishing in the top six and scoring points for the Highlanders were the boys 200 medley relay team of Avery Thompson, Zander Honaker, Connor Wilkes and Landon Cairns, winning the event, with the girls' team of Addie Cockram, Claire Griffith, Adrianna Hall

The Glenvar High Jasmine Bane finishing fourth. Landon Cairns finished fourth in the boys 100 butterfly and teammate Adrianna Hall took second for the girls. Griffith finished 2nd in the girls 100 freestyle, then Wilkes won the 500 freestyle for the boys and Hall again placed second for the girls. The boys 200 free-

style relay team of . VanGerven, Kees Tucker Henderson, Norman and Davis Birdlebough Lucas touched the wall fourth while the girls' team of Cockram, Bane, Hall and Griffith finished sixth. for Glenvar was the boys 400 freestyle relay. Thompson, Honaker, Cairns and Wilkes blew away the competition by more than 13 seconds, winning the event and setting a new school record and cutting a state championship qualifying time. The boys are

now qualified in all three relay events swam at the State Championship.

New state qualifying times set were Claire Griffith in the 50 and 100 freestyle, Connor Wilkes in the 500 freestyle and the boys' 400 freestyle relay team. New School records established were Wilkes in the 500 freestyle, eclipsing teammate Cairns time set just two weeks ago. In the 50 freestyle Wilkes topped his own school record and the boys' 400 freestyle relay improved on the record they set just three days earlier.

## **Electric Christmas**

Merry Christmas everyone.

As you know, this is the most wonderful time of the year. We have early sports deadlines this week so your sportswriter can have Christmas with family, so if something is missing from the sports section we'll

catch you up next week.

Like many of you, I've always loved Christmas. There's nothing like the joy of a child on Christmas Eve, anticipating the arrival of Santa. It's great when you're a child, and when you get older it's just as great to watch the children, maybe even better. I can remember one particular present when I was

a child, and it's right up there with my first bike. I wanted one of those electric football games that were so popular in the 50s, 60s and 70s, way before the EA Sports folks put out the John Madden game. That Madden game is about as close to real football as you can get without putting on a helmet. When I was a kid my neighbor down the street

had one of those electric football games and we spent hours sitting on the floor playing. If you've never played, it's a simple premise. Each team has 11 little players and a football field hooked up to something that makes the field vibrate. One player arranges his men in an offensive formation and the other does the same on defense.

The play starts when you flip the switch that makes the field vibrate, and the players move around on the gridiron. The play ends when a defensive player bumps the man with the ball, resulting in a tackle.

There's a lot of strategy to the game. First of all, you have to know your little players. Some of them will go straight and some of them will just go around in circles. Usually the guys that go straight are the backs and the ones who just go around in circles are Most of the time you're going to run the ball in

electric football, as passing is very difficult. You have one "passer-kicker" who is shared by both teams. It's a two-dimensional metal player, and to pass you put the magnetic football in his raised hand, pull it back, and try to hit a receiver with the ball when you let go. It's almost impossible to complete a pass, sort of like Russell Wilson this season.

As for the kicker, it's somewhat the same concept. You put the magnetic football on his foot and when you push down on a lever it kicks the ball. You can easily kick the ball the entire length of the field, but it's tough to put it through the goal posts, so normally you would go for it on fourth down and go for two on extra points. In other words, "just run the ball." I

expect offensive line coaches love this game.
