Council accepts \$10,000 tourism grant at Feb. 12 meeting

At the Feb. 12 meeting, Salem City Council appropriated a \$10,000 state grant with local match for downtown tourism. It is from the Microbusiness Marketing Leverage Program awarded by the Virginia Tourism Corporation. Council approved moving the matching money from the city's tourism operating budget.

Mack Trucks to invest \$14.5M to expand operation Additional 51 jobs will be created as part of facility expansion

I must admit it, as a former Brownie and Girl Scout, I love Girl Scout Cookies. My favorite is the Trefoil cookie, but I can say that I have had a stash of Thin Mints in my freezer most years. Girl Scout cookie season helps to usher in Spring. Seeing Girl Scouts freezing outside Kroger, Food Lion, and Walmart just warms the heart and brings back memories. At six dollars a box (the price has increased this year) it is tough to risk the budget for a box. According to the Virginia Skyline council, every cookie purchase supports "Girl Scouts' ability to grow, learn, and thrive through all of life's adventures." All proceeds stay local to help fund the Girl Scouts in our area. And the Girl Scout cookie lineup this year contains all the old favorites. They've got Adventurefuls, Caramel Chocolate Chip, Samoas, Do-Si-Dos, Girl Scout S'mores, Lemonades, Lemon-Ups, Tagalongs, Thin Mints, Toast-Yay!, Toffee-tastic, and Trefoils.

Girl Scout Cookies were originally home baked by girl members with moms volunteering as technical advisers. The sale of cookies to finance troop activities began as early as 1917, five years after Juliette Gordon Low started Girl Scouts in the United States. Now the cookies are baked by two bakeries, ABC Bakery and Little Brownie Bakery. The names used by each bakery change, such as Caramel deLites and Samoas, but the cookies are the same. Every Girl Scout cookie is kosher, and Halal certified. There are also four vegan varieties - Thin Mints, Peanut Butter Patties, Lemonades and Toast-Yay! Cookies. All girl scout cookies are free of

high-fructose corn syrup, partially hydrogenated oil, and trans-fat. Two cookies are gluten-free, Caramel Chocolate Chip and Toffee-tastic.

This week's recipe is a cookie that tastes like the Trefoil. It does not require refrigeration before cutting like a standard shortbread cookie and has a crumbly melt in the mouth texture.

Copycat cookie recipe Ingredients:

- 1 cup butter, softened
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 1 ½ cups all-purpose flour
- ½ cup confectioners' sugar
- 1/4 cup cornstarch

Directions:

Preheat the oven to 375 degrees F. Beat butter in a large bowl with an electric mixer until light and fluffy.



Add flour, confectioners' sugar, and cornstarch; beat on low for 1 minute, then high for 3 to 4 minutes. Drop spoonfuls of dough 2 inches apart onto ungreased cookie sheets. Bake in the preheated oven until edges are golden, 12 to 15 minutes. Cool on the baking sheets before removing to a wire rack to cool completely. One thing to keep in mind. They move off the pan easier when they are almost to completely cool. They tend to fall apart if moved before cool enough.

The Salem Forensics team competed Saturday in the Region 4D tournament and won 52-23 over second place EC Glass High School. This is the 21st consecutive year the team has won the first level of the postseason.

Salem was led by six Regional event champions, individual including placing first and second in five events. Lebron Parsell, Connor Smythers and Colton Easter and Claire Rawlins all achieved the rare feat of earning straight first place rankings from all six judges, according to the school. Salem advanced 15 of 17 entries to the Super Region (state semifinals), with two potential alternates, which will be held March 2 at EC Glass.

Roanoke College students earn second place in national NASA challenge

A team of Roanoke College students won second place in the NASA HOEE Starshade Undergraduate Challenge, a nationwide competition that put them to work on a real problem that leading scientists are

students to put toward research and related travel. The results, announced in late January, were the culmination of months of work by competitors. Roanoke's students, led by Bobby Hoye '24 and

Visiting Assistant Professor Truong Le, assembled a diverse group that worked throughout the fall semester to develop its submission. The project demanded late nights right up through finals week to meet the deadline. "This project really became a passion for us. It

meant something to everyone on the team," said Hoye, a double major in physics and engineering science. "We felt we were in the right spot at the right time to help create something really cool." The student challenge, co-sponsored by the

The award came with a \$6,000 prize for the American Institute of Physics, invited the nation's next generation of scientists to apply their skills and creativity to questions about the best structural design for an innovative concept called a "starshade." A starshade is a machine being created to

help telescope systems record data about faraway

exoplanets that orbit large stars. The starshade would be deployed to block out the glare of light from an observed star and enable cameras to capture better images of the exoplanet. The effort could unlock new information about

the mysteries of the universe — including the everpresent question of whether life can be supported on other planets. Work to perfect the project's design is ongoing

and navigating many complexities. A starshade needs to be strong enough to withstand the perils of deep space, but lightweight and flexible enough to unfurl on its own once deployed in space. It also requires the dexterity to respond to positioning signals from NASA teams back on Earth. Roanoke's team, huddled around worktables in

Trexler Hall, delved into animated debates about materials ranging from Kevlar to a tape measure's thin metallic spine in their search for the right blend of strength and flexibility. Calculations filled the walls day and night.

Scaled-down models (one of the competition requirements) were made and remade as ideas were tested. NASA-sponsored challenge undergraduates to create a conceptual design for

a starshade that could be used with Earth's first ground-based, hybrid observatory to search for exoplanets. The project would create the most powerful planet finders yet designed. The challenge's grading had four categories that undergraduates were tasked to do work in: CAD

Drawings, Hand Calculations, Report and Physical Model, among other specifics. The students were supported by a faculty advisor,

Le, who teaches physics and astronomy. But the challenge's ground rules were clear: advisors could offer guidance but couldn't be fixers for the team. The work and ideas had to spring from the students.

"It was on them," Le said. "It was a real-life project. It was a real, scientific challenge.'

The team of nine students spanned all four years

and various disciplines, such as physics, engineering, computer science and more. "We really felt that our interdisciplinary skills and liberal arts background were part of what made us good candidates for this type of competition," Hoye said. "This work wasn't just about being good at physics. It was about being creative and problem-solving. You had to think in 3-D, do simulations and create digital designs.

Their final work was evaluated by a NASAled committee at the Hybrid Observatory for Earth-like Exoplanets (HOEE). It was the type of opportunity that few had imagined earning while still an undergraduate.

Addy Littlefield '26 only had to hear the word NASA when approached about joining the team to make up her mind. The chance to work on the challenge was an incredible, horizon-expanding opportunity.

"It's something I've never done before," she said. "There are a lot of angles you have to think about. There's no gravity in that environment. There's no air. So, materials don't react the same way they do here. We had to do a lot of research and problemsolving and adapting."

Professor Karin Saoub, chair of the Math/ Computer Science/Physics Department, noted the students and Le tackled this project on top of their normal courses and commitments with no assurance of the outcome. They persevered out of a passion for discovery and learning.

'They should be commended," she said. "The students took this on and pushed themselves to think creatively, bringing together all the knowledge they gained from their courses here at Roanoke." The news that the team's work had been ranked

among the best in the country was electrifying. "There were so many emotions that I felt when I found out," said Art Duncan '25, a double major in physics and art history. "Above all, I was just so happy. I started thinking about all the work that everyone did for this project, all the hours put in, and really just how talented and smart all the people who I got to work with on this are." To see the team's efforts recognized with this

distinction is huge, he added. "We worked hard and helped each other," he said. "I'm so thankful for See NASA, page 5

INTERSTATE LANE WIDENING CONSTRUCTION PROJECT EXIT 137 TO EXIT 141 – The \$179 million design-build project to widen both directions of I-81 between mile markers 136.6 and 141.8 from two to three lanes is underway. Work is being performed along a five-mile section of both northbound and southbound Interstate 81 in Roanoke County and the city of Salem. Barrier wall is in place along the shoulders. Two lanes of I-81 traffic in each direction are expected to remain open during the project with periodic lane closures scheduled during nighttime hours or outside of peak travel times as needed. Drivers can expect the following lane closures and upcoming traffic impacts in this area on northbound and southbound I-81:

ADDITIONAL TRAFFIC IMPACTS:

WORK ZONE SPEED: Drivers should adhere to posted 60 mph speed limits in the work zone and allow space when following a vehicle. Narrow spacing in lanes due to barrier walls, lack of shoulders and lane shifts in various locations, are present.
TRAFFIC SHIFTS ON WILDWOOD ROAD:

Expect a work zone with traffic shifts and narrow width on Wildwood Road after exiting I-81 southbound on exit 137 heading towards Salem. Southbound and northbound I-81 exit and entrance ramp narrows are

possible at Route 311. TRAFFIC SHIFT ON EXIT 140: Drivers may

experience a periodic quick merge into traffic onto Thompson Memorial Drive from the southbound exit ramp of exit 140. Work zone located at bottom of the ramp for work on the I-81 bridge at the underpass. RAMP CLOSURES: Ramp closures are possible

during nighttime hours, 12 a.m., to 5 a.m. Drivers should watch for message boards dates and times the

ramp will be closed.

LANE CLOSURES: Alternating left and right lane and shoulder closures during nighttime hours between 8 p.m. and 6 a.m., Sunday through Thursday, are possible. Lane widths will be reduced to 11 feet. Nightly lane closures may be in place along the right lane with possible nightly ramp narrows as needed for guardrail and shoulder strengthening. The project also includes replacing six bridges, widening two bridges, installing approximately 2.6 miles of sound barrier walls along northbound I-81, improving the southbound exit 137 off-ramp intersection at Wildwood Road and adding interchange lighting at exits 137, 140 and 141. Expected completion in early 2026.

I-81 NB & SB BRIDGE REHAB OVER ROUTE 100 AT EXIT 98 - Beginning late March 2024, work will begin on I-81 rehabbing the northbound and southbound bridges over Route 100 at Exit 98. Lane and shoulder may be in place on Route 100 north and on I-81 northbound and southbound, 8 p.m. – 6 a.m. Flagging operations may also be in place on Route 100 north for up to eight-minute slow rolls. Both northbound and southbound on and off ramps at exit 98 for I-81 traffic will remain fully operational for the duration of this project. Estimated completion date

I-81 NB & SB BRIDGE REHAB OVER ROUTE 100 AT EXIT 98 - Beginning late March 2024, work will begin on I-81 rehabbing the northbound and southbound bridges over Route 100 at Exit 98. Lane and shoulder may be in place on Route 100 north and on I-81 northbound and southbound, 8 p.m. – 6 a.m. Flagging operations may also be in place on Route 100 north for up to eight-minute slow rolls. Both northbound and southbound on and off ramps at exit 98 for I-81 traffic will remain fully operational for the duration of this project. Estimated completion date is summer 2024.

I-81 NORTHBOUND AT EXIT 105 NEW RIVER BRIDGE REPLACEMENT IN MONTGOMERY COUNTY - Traffic on northbound I-81 has been switched onto the newly constructed bridge over the New River at the Montgomery/Pulaski County line. Lane and shoulder closures may be in place near exit 105. Lane closure may be in effect during the week from 8 p.m. to 7 a.m. Shoulder closures may be in effect at any time during the week. Slow rolls may be performed on I-81 in the north and southbound lanes from mile marker 98 to 109. Speed limit is reduced to 60 miles per hour in the work zone. Shoulder closures will remain in place though the duration of the project. Project completion is estimated for Summer 2024.

LANE CLOSURES: Nighttime alternating lane closures are possible on I-81 northbound between mile markers 104-106 from 7 p.m. to 6 a.m. the following morning.

ROUTE 605: Alternating lane closures and flagging operations may be present on Route 605, located under the New River Bridge, for paving operations and work overhead on the bridge.

SLOW ROLLS: A slow roll operation will be in place on Monday, January 22 and Tuesday, January 23 on I-81 northbound from mile marker 104 and 106 between the hours of 9 a.m. and 2 p.m. Slow rolls may be utilized periodically on both the northbound and southbound lanes from mile marker 98-109 for structural steel deliveries and setting beams.

I-81 BRIDGE DECK REPAIRS permitting, crews will repair bridge decks on Interstate 81. Between mile markers 170 to 89, right and left lane closures will be in place northbound and southbound during nighttime hours, 9 p.m. to 6 a.m. the following morning. Drivers should watch for signs and expect possible delays.

Roanoke County

SIDEWALK PROJECT ON SOUTHBOUND WILLIAMSON ROAD IN HOLLINS AREA Work is underway on a project to construct new sidewalk along the section of southbound Route 11 (Williamson Road) between Plantation Road and Peters Creek Road. Drivers in the Hollins area can expect periodic right lane closures on southbound Williamson Road between 9 a.m. and 2 p.m. As work progresses, occasional nighttime lane closures also will be scheduled. The sidewalk project is expected to be completed in summer 2024.

APPĀLACHIAN TRAIL BRIDGE OVER ROUTE 311 - A new pedestrian bridge is under construction over Route 311 at McAfee Knob trailhead. The trailhead parking lot is currently closed and will remain closed during construction. Flagging operations will be in place daily with occasional slow rolls during nighttime hours are possible to stop traffic for up to 15 minutes at a time for setting bridge beams.

STARKEY ROAD AND BUCK MOUNTAIN ROAD ROUNDABOUT - A road project to construct a single-lane roundabout at the intersection of Route 904 (Starkey Road) and Route 679 (Buck Mountain Road) is in progress. The new roundabout is now open to traffic and drivers should be aware of the new roundabout configuration. There will be occasional flagging operations in place between the 9 a.m. and 3 p.m. at the intersection of Starkey Road and Buck Mountain Road, drivers should still expect lane closures with flaggers controlling traffic for final paving, additional concrete pouring and pavement marking until the project is finished. Final completion is expected in early spring 2024.

FLAGGING CLOSURES LANE WITH OPERATIONS: Lane closure times of 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. have resumed due to school now being in session.

ROUNDABOUT: The roundabout configuration has been set up. This means drivers should continue around the circle without turning left and that drivers in the circle have the right of way.

BLUE RIDGE PÄRKWAY CLOSURES IN ROANOKE AREA - Blue Ridge Parkway will be repairing slope failures and road closures with detours may be in place. Visit their website at www.nps. gov/blri/planyourvisit/roadclosures.htm for more information.

MOUNTAIN VALLEY PIPELINE - Mountain Valley Pipeline is expected to begin full construction again by mid-July. The history of the National Business College is closely interwoven with the history of Roanoke City, Roanoke County, and a wide surrounding trade territory. The National Business College was established in 1886, at which time Roanoke was emerging into a city. Since that time, the growth of the College and the city has closely paralleled each other.

In 1896, Mr. E. M. Coulter, now president of the National Business College, began an active participation in the management of the school. Since that time, the College has been under the same management continuously.

In 1902 Mr. M. A. Smythe, now vice president of the College, began his active association with the school. Thus, the management policy of the school has been unbroken through a long period of years.

It has been the policy of the school from its inception to do one thing well. The soundness of this policy is confirmed by the record of over a half a century of continuous growth and service in business education. 


ODAC basketball tournaments next week

Fowler breaks 200m school record in Joe LaRocco Invit.

The Kerr-Cregger Indoor Fieldhouse in Salem was the site of the annual Joe LaRocco Invitational indoor meet last Saturday, and host Roanoke College had some outstanding performances.

For the men, Brady Fowler won the 200m, breaking his own school record in the race as the Maroons posted six total top-five finishes at their final home meet of the regular season. Fowler recorded a program-record time of 22.00 seconds in the 200m to claim first, and he also landed atop the ODAC leaderboard and in ninth place in Division III for the winter. Fowler also notched a fifth-place run in the 60m, finishing in a season-best time of 6.89 seconds. That mark is good for second in the ODAC and is tied for 26th in Division III this season. In the women's meet Haylee Gamble

and Kaitlyn Nguyen produced first-

place performances for Roanoke. Nguyen won the high jump with a personal-record mark of 1.68m, narrowly missing out on a new school record and cementing her spot atop the ODAC standings for the winter. She is currently tied for sixth in Division III.

Gamble took first in the 400m

with a season-best time of 1:00.12, which leads the conference during the current indoor campaign. Gamble also ran a time of 26.35 seconds in the 200m, good for third overall.

Roanoke will compete in the Virginia Tech Challenge this Friday and Saturday.

Glenvar boys are Region 2C swim champs, girls are 5th

The Glenvar High boys will head to the Class 2 state meet as Region 2C champions after out-swimming the competition at the Christiansburg Aquatic Center last Thursday. The Glenvar girls were fifth in the region among a dozen schools and the Highlanders will send a strong delegation to today's state meet at the RVA Swim facility in Richmond.

Last week in Christiansburg the Glenvar boys scored 134 points to blow second place Radford, with 98, out of the pool. Radford won the girls' competition with 101 points. Of Glenvar's 40 individual event swims, 30 were high school lifetime bests. The boys took four event titles and the girls one, a school record was broken and 22 swims have qualified for the state championship meet.

"The hard work these kids put in at practice all season really showed," said Glenvar coach Shannon Hall. "Our 23 swimmers combined for over 2.5 million yards in practice this season. That's over 1,400 miles in 13 weeks."

The top eight individual finishes scored points with the top five advancing to the state Championship. The top six relays also scored with the top four advancing to states.

The boys 200 medley relay team led off the meet, finishing first. Avery Thompson, Landon Cairns, Connor Wilkes and Ashton Meadows lowered the school record by more than a second. That school record has been broken three times this season.

Tyler Smith finished fourth in the 200 freestyle, followed by Tucker Henderson fifth, Kees VanGerven sixth and Cooper Ermel eighth. Chloe Childers notched an eighth place finish for the girls.

Wilkes, for the boys, and Macy McMahon, for the girls, each won region titles in the 200 individual medley with Cairns the runner-up on the boys side. Meadows hustled to a fifth place finish in the boys 50 freestyle and Alec McIlwain touched seventh. Hannah Street put a point on the board with an eighth place finish for the girls. Meadows made a quick turn around and placed second in the boys 100 but-

In the boys 100 freestyle Thompson placed fourth for Glenvar and teammate McIlwain eighth. Street with an



eighth place finish for the girls.

In the 500 freestyle Smith placed second with Kees VanGerven third, Ermel fourth and Henderson sixth. Natalie McMahon touched the wall fifth for the girls.

The foursome of Meadows, McIlwain, Cairns and Wilkes won the boys 200 freestyle relay, narrowly missing a school record. The girls team of Street, Chloe Childers, Macy and Natalie McMahon followed with a third place finish for the girls.

Thompson placed third in the boys 100 backstroke with Connor Magruder dropping a full ten seconds to take seventh. Natalie McMahon tallied a fourth place finish for the girls. Avery

McClanahan scored in the boys 100 breaststroke with a sixth place finish and Macy McMahon was fourth for

The final event of the night saw Thompson, VanGerven, Cairns and Wilkes with a big win the 400 freestyle relay. The girls team of Izzy Shearer, Childers, Macy and Natalie McMahon capped off the scoring with a fourth place finish.

"The 14 qualifiers is the largest team the Highlanders have ever taken to the state championship swim meet," said Hall. "Although the region finals was one of the best meets in school history there is still business to take care of in

Spartans send 6 swimmers and a diver to state meet

Half a dozen Salem High swimmers and one diver will be competing in Richmond this week in the Class 4D state meet. The meet will be held at the Swim

RVA facility in Richmond. Representing Salem in the state meet on Friday will be Zach Easter, Joren Poush, Carter Biscotti, Carson Tucker and Davis Griffith for the boys and Eliza Fleenor for the girls. On Wednesday is the state diving meet and Avery Mangus will be representing Salem in that event.

Last Tuesday, February 6, Salem participated in the Region 4D meet at the Christiansburg Aquatic Center. Blacksburg swept the team championships with the Salem boys taking fourth and the girls finishing fifth.

"We swam 42 total swims and 34 of those swims were season best times," said Salem coach Marianne Fleenor. "That's over 84.5 seconds dropped. A great way to finish our season."

The week started off with a first place finish in diving by Mangus on Monday of last week. Then the swimmers took the pool the following day and Easter led the Spartan boys with first place finishes in both 100 fly and 100 breast. Zach is a two-time region champ in both events.

Poush took a second in the 100 free and Biscotte was third in that event. Biscotte was sixth in the 50 free and Starke Griffith was seventh in the 500 free.

'We cannot believe the season has come to an end," said coach Fleenor. "We are so proud of this team."


W&L sweeps **ODAC** swim

A few weeks ago my wife and I were at the Harvest Performance Center in Rocky Mount to hear my daughter-in-law's band, Rachael Hester and the Tennessee Walkers. I'd been there several times before, and always to hear music. It's a great place to watch a show, very comfortable and the acoustics So, I was somewhat surprised to see that Pete Rose

was going to be there on Friday, February 23rd. My first thought was, what kind of band does he have? Pete is 82 years old, two years old than Mick Jagger, and I never heard Pete sing before.

Well, rest assured he won't be singing. He certainly didn't "sing" for Bart Giamatti when he was investigated for gambling on baseball, using the word 'sing" in a mafia kind of way. With that said, what will Pete be doing in Franklin County? Apparently he's going to sit in a comfortable

chair and talk about baseball, and I'm sure he has some interesting stories to tell. There will be a moderator named Brittany Morgan, who is described as a Northern Virginia native who has spent her professional career either at the ballpark or as a sports anchor on TV. The bio says she spent the 2017 and 2018 seasons in the entertainment department for the Washington Nationals.

This could be interesting if you care what Pete Rose has to say, and you believe him. I'm old enough to remember Pete as a rookie player for the Reds in the early '60s, and he was the firstbaseman for my favorite team, the Phillies, when they won the World Series in 1980. My feeling is they wouldn't have won it without him, because he was a great player and a great leader. . . .but he's also somewhat of a rascal and that could be entertaining if you're a baseball fan old enough to remember Pete's prime.

I watch just about every Phillies game during the summer, and there was one occasion in 2022 when Pete was at the ballpark for a reunion of the 1980 team and they had him join in on the telecast. It turned out to be somewhat controversial as he made a couple off color comments about women and said he knew Phillies analyst John Kruk when he still had two testicles. That caused the station to issue an apology, and one of the writers covering the Phillies noted that Pete 'doesn't have a filter.'

Rose has always been an interesting character. From his early days as "Charlie Hustle," running to first base on a walk and making the head first slide popular, Pete has been admired as a baseball player.

He's the all-time hits leader and he still holds a long list of baseball records, things like "most career winning games played" and "most seasons of 200 hits or more." In the promo for his appearance there are 19 MLB records listed that Pete still holds.

So why isn't this guy in the Hall of Fame? As most of you know, he was accused of betting on baseball and he's never really come clean on it. Will he do so at the Harvester Performance Center on February 23? Well, you can find out if you go.

Tickets are \$77 for a reserved seat, \$97 for a premium reserved seat and \$440 for a table of four. To me, that seems like an awful lot to hear someone most folks under 50 could care less about. Roanoke College junior Mac Cafurello earned the Old Dominion Athletic Conference (ODAC) Lighter Wrestler of the Week for the week of February 12. Cafurello was a big part of the Maroons victory at Averett. Ranked No. 11 by the OpenMat.

com, Cafurello started the dual off with a 3-2 win in a tiebreaker at 125 pounds over sixth ranked

Mason Barnett. The Maroons will be presented with the ODAC trophy this Saturday at the ODAC Wrestling Championships, hosted by Averett University. All seven league programs will be in attendance as they compete in a bracket-style tournament to determine conference champions and All-ODAC honors at each of the standard 10 weight classes.

Semifinals for all three classes will begin at 9:30 am Saturday, followed by semi-final consolations at 11:30 am and consolation finals at 1 pm to determine places third through sixth in all three classes. Championship finals are scheduled to begin at 4:30

Glenvar will have four top seeds after a big day in the Region 2C tournament at James River. The Highlanders scored 212.5 points to win the region, out-pointing runner-up Chathan who had 194.5. Patrick County was third with 155, Radford had 150 and host James River had 115 among nine teams competing.

Glenvar had four champions, beginning with Alan Vu at 113. He had a 4:27 pin over Dallas Harrison of Chatham in the final to improve his record to 20-12. At 138 Jacob Campbell took a 5-0 decision over Jackson Gilbert of Radford to win the region. Jacob

Two other Highlanders advanced. Damien Weddle took third at 150 and he goes to the state with an 18-11 record and Craig Campbell was third at 215 to improve to 20-15. Josh Patsel and Chris Hernandez both scored important points for Glenvar with fourth place finishes.

"Our schedule is built to have our athletes peaking at the end of the season and it's showing now," said GHS coach Tim Miles. "There were a lot of guys that didn't place for us that scored crucial team points for us. Without them, we would not have won.
