

OurValley.org Council cancels HopeTree hearing until Planning Commission action

At the March 11 meeting, Salem City Council canceled an advertised public hearing on the proposed Planned Unit Development for the HopeTree campus between North Broad and Red Lane.

The reason was the Salem Planning Commission has not yet taken action on the proposal. "Only after the Planning Commission has voted and made a recommendation will we reschedule," explained Mayor Renee Turk.

HopeTree plans were also the subject by four of the five citizens who spoke during the Citizen Comment portion.

Caroline Scarborough, who lives on Academy Street, urged that native seedlings and saplings be rescued before destruction and construction begins.

She was concerned that the 40 acres of greenspace Stetson development firm has said would be reserved for recreation might not be saved;

- · Emily Paine Carter of North Broad Street was concerned that the neighborhood's Historic Neighborhood Designation would be affected by potential increased traffic. "We are tied up with Salem's history. We have a love old houses and old kindnesses," she said;
- Barbara Bell, who for 47 years lived on North Broad, expressed concern about HopeTree's 24 adult disabled residents "who live at the top of HopeTree Hill...They were there first and their welfare needs to be considered." She said if those residents happened to wander into the proposed boutique hotel or restaurant, or new residents' property, "There very well be repercussions," Bell

Roanoke College launches Master of Education program

For more than 30 years, the professors in Roanoke College's Education Department have been training and preparing students to enter the teaching profession. Their efforts, in partnership with the region's school divisions, produced approximately have 1,000 teachers and educational professionals.

The department has established itself as a respected and trustworthy member of the professional network for education, with faculty that offer years of teaching experience at all levels of education, the college said.

"Building on our strong relationships with regional schools, Roanoke is offering a new Master of Education to give teachers and others interested in education high-quality opportunity а transform the education to landscape," said Lisa Stoneman, M.Ed. program coordinator.

Roanoke's inventive graduate offering, Master of Education: Educational Inquiry, is ready to launch this fall 2024, pending approval from The Southern of Colleges Association and

Schools Commission on Colleges (SACSCOC). The new program is Roanoke College's second graduate degree.

The new degree brings together theory, empirical research, community outreach, innovative pedagogies and a capstone research project to empower educators to be leaders and create positive change in their communities.

The study of education is often narrowly focused on what happens inside a conventional classroom and school building. However, Roanoke College's master's program adopts a broader perspective to provide foundational knowledge individuals interested in furthering their careers as practicing teachers and education advocates. Those careers could be in the public K-12 arena, nonprofit fields, workplace training and micro-credentialing, law and public policy, private forms of schooling and more. The master's program also benefits recent college graduates by deepening their knowledge of education. It offers a rich intellectual foundation and practical preparation for individuals aiming to pursue higher degrees in

education and the social sciences.

New students will be accepted on an ongoing basis. The Master of Education is open to students holding a bachelor's degree in any major. Roanoke graduates with at least a 3.0 GPA and one academic reference are guaranteed admission. Courses are collaborative and inperson. Classes generally run from 4:30 to 7:30 p.m. to accommodate the schedule of working professionals.

Ten credits are required and can be completed by taking two courses at a time over a full year (summer included). The program can be completed over a two-year period with students taking one class at a time. Courses can provide recertification points for Virginia teachers.

"In addition to the outstanding faculty, a unique strength of this program will be the diversity of the students, with teachers and professionals in adjacent fields," Kathy Wolfe, vice president of academic affairs and dean of the college, said.

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CIPE OF THE WEEK

As March moves along, the St. Patrick's Day holiday observes the death of St. Patrick, the patron saint of Ireland. This holiday has evolved into a celebration of Irish culture with parades, food, music, drinking and a lot of green. The foods associated with St. Patrick's Day are corned beef and cabbage, colcannon (mashed potatoes and greens), and green beer. I must admit I am a big Shamrock Shake fan and green is my favorite color so I really like St. Patrick's Day.

Because Ireland is an island that is very green with leafy trees and grassy hills it is called the Emerald Isle. Green became associated with the holiday since the shamrock is green and is a national symbol of Ireland. Wearing green on this day is another tradition. Did you know that the reason you are supposed to wear green is so that you are invisible to leprechauns who pinch anyone they can see? While I don't think the Roanoke River will be dyed green like the Chicago River in Illinois, I expect Saturday's parade route in downtown Roanoke will be full of green dressed spectators rain or shine.

Like potatoes, cabbage is a staple ingredient in Irish food. The most common way to serve it is boiled with bacon. Cabbage is highly nutritious. Rich in vitamin c, fiber, and vitamin K they help with heart and digestive health. Baked cabbage rolls were a favorite of my grandmother. She grew up in rural Arkansas, and cabbage was a readily available vegetable. While I like the flavor of cabbage rolls I don't like all the work involved, boiling the cabbage leaves, making the filling, then wrapping and baking everything. A soup form of cabbage rolls



is much easier. Served with crusty bread this hearty soup is good for those breezy spring nights. Wear something green, pour yourself a drink (preferably green) and eat something hearty and warm.

May your blessings outnumber The shamrocks that grow. And may trouble avoid you

Wherever you go.

Cabbage Roll Soup Ingredients:

- 2 tsp olive oil
- Salt and pepper to taste
- 1 pound ground beef (90% lean or higher)
- 1 onion finely diced
- 2 tsp minced garlic
- 4 cups coarsely chopped green cabbage
- 2 carrots peeled, quartered and sliced
- 4 cups beef broth
- 3 8oz cans tomato sauce
- 1/2 cup uncooked long grain rice
- 1 bay leaf 3 TBLSP brown sugar
- 2 tbsp. parsley



Directions: Heat the olive oil in a large pot over medium high heat. Add the ground beef and season with salt and pepper to taste. Cook, breaking up the meat with a spatula, until beef is browned, approximately 4-5 minutes. Add the onion and garlic and cook for 2-3 minutes. Add the cabbage, carrots, beef broth, tomato sauce, rice, bay leaf and brown sugar to the pot. Season with salt and pepper to taste. Bring to a simmer and cook for 25 minutes or until rice is tender. Remove bay leaf and discard. Sprinkle with parsley and serve.

- One-year certificates for BEarly Cab Service and Reid Taxi. No one spoke at that public hearing ;
- Authorizing City Manager Chris Dorsey to sign for the city on administered projects locally for the Virginia Department of Transportation;
- Closing Main Street for Olde Salem Days on Sept. 14;
- Amending the School Operating

Board;

- An appropriation of \$12,428 in Virginia Fire Programs Grant revenue;
- Reappropriating \$54,914 in Fourfor-Life funds to purchase training equipment;
- Transportation Alternatives federal funding of \$187,671 for Hanging Rock Battlefield Trail Phase 2 to capital funds projects;
- Issuing a soil and erosion bond for \$16,205, with 12 months completion, for demolition cleanup at Old Virginia Brick. Mayor Turk noted that even though some people had suggested the city buy the former brick company property, "This is private property and the owner is not willing to sell."

At the end of the meeting, Councilman Randy Foley said, referring to citizen remarks recently, "The city is not going to purchase HopeTree. It will be developed either Residential Family or Planned Unit Development."

The meeting adjourned at 7:16 p.m.



Unlike many communities across the commonwealth, Salem was spared much of the destruction caused by the Civil War. The Union Army marched on Salem twice during the War. The first came December 16, 1863 when General William Averell's troopers marched into Salem, and a second when General David Hunter's soldiers came on June 21, 1864. When soldiers marched through an area, bullets were often left behind. You can see these bullets on display this weekend as part of the Salem Museum's Hands-On History Saturday program. This month, Hands-On History highlights "American Military History."





Fowler, Nguyen are Division III All-Americans in indoor track

Two Roanoke College athletes earned All-American honors at the NCAA Division III Indoor Championships at the Virginia Beach Sports Center in Virginia Beach, VA last weekend. Brady Fowler placed fifth in the 200m and eighth in the 60m to secure All-America status in both events while Kaitlyn Nguyen finished ninth in the high jump, earning Second Team All-America honors.

Fowler finished eighth in the finals of the 60m dash with a time of 6.87 seconds. His qualifying time of 6.81 seconds in Friday's preliminary heats eclipsed his own school record. Then Brady proceeded to break his own Roanoke record in the 200m for the second straight day, clocking a time of 21.54 seconds to land in fifth place overall.

Fowler's performances earn First Team All-America laurels in both events, marking the first such honors of his collegiate career. Sam Blaskowski of Wisconsin-La Crosse won the national title in both races, logging times of 6.68 seconds in the 60m and 20.93 seconds in the 200m.

Nguyen tied her career-best high jump with a height of 1.68m to place ninth overall. Competing in a field of 20 athletes, Nguyen secured Second Team All-America laurels in her first appearance at a national championship event. Grace Alley of Loras won the individual title with a jump of 1.74m.

The Maroons will open up the outdoor season at the W&L Carnival in Lexington, Va. this Friday and Saturday.

Glenvar downs LB in opener




