## Salem School Board approves FY 2025 budget

The Salem City School Board officially approved the Fiscal Year 2025 balanced budgets, which encompass the School Fund, Grant Fund and Cafeteria Fund. The approval was made during the board's June 11 meeting. The total budget amounts to \$61,008,069, distributed as follows: the School Fund budget stands at \$54,500,420, the Grant Fund budget at \$4,001,953 and the Cafeteria Fund budget at \$2,505,696.

The approved budget includes several significant

- Compensation increases: \$1,505,495 has been allocated for staff compensation, ensuring a 4% salary increase.
- Technology and textbook funding: There is increased funding for technology infrastructure, software licensing needs and textbook adoption.
- Staffing needs: Additional positions will be created based on the division's requirements.
- Health insurance: A 2.5% increase in health insurance rates has been accounted for. Grants: The budget anticipates grant awards and
- carryover amounts for various division grants. • Lunch prices: A preliminary 10 cents increase in lunch

prices is projected, pending final determination from the Federal government's calculator tool. In addition, the city of Salem has approved its FY 2025 budget, which includes a local appropriation increase of

\$885,000 dedicated to covering the cost of the 4% raise for

all school staff. This approval was crucial for balancing the

school budget, which had been temporarily unbalanced pending confirmation of the city's support, officials said. The city council's approval on May 28 provided the necessary certainty to finalize the budget.

The state has also provided updates that do not impact the adopted budget. Notably, the governor approved a budget amendment that includes funding for a 3% raise for staff, which aligns with the proactive measures taken in the preliminary budget.

Overall, the Salem City School Board's budget approval reflects a commitment to enhancing staff compensation, advancing technology infrastructure and meeting the evolving needs of the school division, officials said.

The board also recognized student Josephine Eaton for her accomplishments at the 2024 Virginia State Science and Engineering Fair and her automatic qualification for the Regeneron International Science and Engineering Fair.

Josephine Eaton has had a remarkable journey in the world of science fairs this year. Her ascent began with a First Place victory at the Roanoke Valley Governor's School Project Forum in early February. This impressive win took her to even greater heights when she secured first place and a grand award at the Virginia State Science and Engineering Fair (VSSEF), held at Old Dominion University on April 12-13. At VSSEF, Josephine triumphed in the Plant Sciences category and was distinguished as one of the prestigious Grand Award winners.


Her performance at VSSEF earned her a coveted spot at the International Science and Engineering Fair (ISEF) in Los Angeles, on May 11-17. During this international event, Eaton not only presented her groundbreaking project, titled

"The Effectiveness of Glycine max on Microplastic Removal from Soil," but also embraced a week filled with opportunities to expand her knowledge, network with peers from around the globe and engage in unique experiences.

Eaton's achievements are particularly significant as she is only the fourth student from Salem to advance to this prestigious level in nearly four decades.

## Salem voters cast their ballots in GOP Senate primary

Salem voters went to the polls on Tuesday to cast their ballots in the Republican Party primary election for the United States Senate. All precincts voted at the Salem Civic

Early, no-excuse voting at the Salem Registrar's Office took place Monday through Friday from May

3-June 15, with the office also being open for Saturday voting on June 8 and 15. May 28 was the last day to update one's registration or register to vote in the primary.

The results are as follows the Virginia according to Department of Elections website as of presstime: Hung Cao (52.53% in Salem and 61.80% in Virginia), Edward C. "Eddie" Garcia Jr. (23.20% in Salem and 9.77% in

Virginia), Jonathan W. Emord (6.93% in Salem and 8.63% in Virginia), C.L. "Chuck" Smith, Jr. (7.20% in Salem and 8.85% in Virginia) and Scott Thomas Parkinson (10.13% in Salem and 10.96% in Virginia). Out of 17,873 registered voters in the city, 751 voted in the election. The winner will be on the November ballot for the seat currently held by Democratic Sen. Tim Kaine.



## KECIPE OF THE WEEK

Today is the summer solstice...I have a feeling it's going to be a long day. Once Memorial Day passes most of us have unofficially started our summer season, but technically, it depends on whether we are speaking meteorologically or astronomically. Most meteorologists divide the year into four seasons based on the months and the temperature cycle, which allows them to compare and organize climate data more easily. In this system, summer begins on June 1 and ends on August 31. Solstice means the "standing of the sun" from the Latin words sol (sun) and sistere (to stand still). The effect of the sun standing still is all about the tilt of earth of its axis and rotation around the sun, leaving us with more hours of sunlight on this day than any other day of the year. Following the summer solstice, the days of the year get shorter and shorter, until we reach the longest night of the year or the winter solstice. Historically, Midsummer Day marked the midpoint of the growing season, halfway between planting and harvest. In the Southern Hemisphere, it's the opposite: the June solstice marks the astronomical start of winter when the Sun is at its lowest point in the sky. We here in western Virginia will have plenty of sun for the next few weeks, but in the next 6 months, we will lose nearly 2 hours of daylight as we inch closer to the first day of winter. And for those who are wondering, there are 188 days until Christmas.

Summer solstice is the time when we honor the gift of sunlight and start to harvest some of the vegetables in our gardens. When temperatures start to rise and the first seasonal vegetables show up at the market, Chicken Primavera is the perfect way to celebrate their fresh flavors.

Chicken primavera Ingredients:

- 2 boneless skinless chicken breasts (1 1/4 to 1 1/2 lb.) lb.) cut into 1-inch cubes
- 2 1/2 tsp. salt, divided
- 2 tsp. ground black pepper
- 4 Tbsp. butter, divided
- 1/4 c. olive oil
- 16 oz. dried short pasta, such as penne, rotini, or
- 1 32-oz. container chicken broth
- 3 carrots, thinly sliced (about 2 cups)
- 2 c. asparagus pieces, about 1-inch long, from 1 bunch (woody stems removed)
- 1 1/2 c. fresh or frozen peas

- 2 c. cherry tomatoes, halved
- 6 garlic cloves, grated
- 1 1/2 c. freshly grated parmesan cheese
- 1 lemon, zested then cut in half
- 1/2 c. chopped fresh basil, plus more for garnish

Season the chicken with 1 1/2 teaspoons of salt and 1 teaspoon of pepper. Add 2 tablespoons of the butter and all the olive oil to a large Dutch oven; heat over medium-high heat. Add the seasoned chicken to the pan. Cook, stirring occasionally, until the chicken is lightly browned all over, about 5 minutes. Use a slotted spoon to transfer the chicken from the pan onto a plate and set aside. Add the pasta to the pan; stir to coat it in the oil mixture. Add the broth and 2 cups of water, and bring to a simmer. Reduce heat to medium or medium low to keep it simmering for 6 minutes, stirring occasionally to prevent sticking. Stir in the carrots, asparagus, and peas. Cover the pot and let cook until the pasta and vegetables are just tender, about 4 minutes. Uncover the pot. Add the tomatoes, grated garlic, and cooked chicken to the pot. Cook, stirring occasionally, for about 2 minutes to reheat the chicken. Remove from the heat and add the remaining 2 tablespoons butter, parmesan cheese, lemon zest and juice, and the remaining 1 teaspoon each of the salt and pepper; stir to combine. Stir in the basil just before serving. Top each serving with more parmesan.

#### Sunshine salad

- 1 large can of sliced peaches, drained
- 1 md pineapple chunks drained
- 1 large box frozen strawberries thawed with juice
- 3 bananas sliced
- 2 tablespoons Tang drink mix
- 1 large box vanilla instant pudding.

Mix fruit into a large bowl and sprinkle tang and vanilla pudding overall. Mix, coating everything well. Chill in the refrigerator for at least 2 hours. Cheers friends and happy summer solstice!

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## ROADWATCH

#### **Interstate 81**

INTERSTATE 81 LANE WIDENING CONSTRUCTION PROJECT EXIT 137 TO EXIT 141 – The \$179 million design-build project to widen both directions of I-81 between mile markers 136.6 and 141.8 from two to three lanes is underway. Work is being performed along a five-mile section of both northbound and southbound Interstate 81 in Roanoke County and the city of Salem. Barrier wall is in place along the shoulders. Two lanes of I-81 traffic in each direction are expected to remain open during the project with periodic lane closures scheduled during nighttime hours or outside of peak travel times as needed. Drivers can expect the following lane closures and upcoming traffic impacts in this area on northbound and southbound I-81:

#### ADDITIONAL TRAFFIC IMPACTS:

WORK ZONE SPEED: Drivers should adhere to posted 60 mph speed limits in the work zone and allow space when following a vehicle. Narrow spacing in lanes due to barrier walls, lack of shoulders and lane shifts in various locations, are present.

TRAFFIC SHIFTS ON WILDWOOD ROAD: Expect a work zone with traffic shifts and narrow width on Wildwood Road after exiting I-81 southbound on exit 137 heading towards Salem. Southbound and northbound I-81 exit and entrance ramp narrows are possible at Route 311.

TRAFFIC SHIFT ON EXIT 140: Drivers may experience periodic lane closures that require a quick merge into traffic onto Thompson Memorial Drive from the southbound exit ramp of exit 140. Work zone located at bottom of the ramp for work on the I-81 bridge at the underpass.

RAMP CLOSURES: Ramp closures are possible during nighttime hours, 12 a.m., to 5 a.m. Drivers should watch for message boards dates and times the ramp will be closed.

CLOSURES: Alternating and right lane and shoulder closures during nighttime hours between 8 p.m. and 6 a.m., Sunday through Thursday, are possible. Lane

widths will be reduced to 11 feet. Nightly lane closures may be in place along the right lane with possible nightly ramp narrows as needed for guardrail and shoulder strengthening.

The project also includes replacing six bridges, widening two bridges, installing approximately 2.6 miles of sound barrier walls along northbound I-81, improving the southbound exit 137 off-ramp intersection at Wildwood Road and adding interchange lighting at exits 137, 140 and 141. Expected completion in early 2026.

I-81 NB & SB BRIDGE REHAB OVER ROUTE 100 AT EXIT 98 – Work is nearing completion on the I-81 rehabbing of the northbound and southbound bridges over Route 100 at Exit 98. Lane and shoulder closures may be in place on Route 100 north and on I-81 northbound and southbound, 8 p.m. to 6 a.m. Flagging operations may also be in place on Route 100 north for up to eight-minute slow rolls. Both northbound and southbound on and off ramps at exit 98 for I-81 traffic will remain fully operational for the duration of this project. Estimated completion date is summer 2024.

I-81 NB & SB DECK OVERLAY AT PEAK CREEK MILE MARKER 95.7 - Repair work has begun on the northbound and southbound bridges on I-81 over Peak Creek near mile marker 95.7. This repair work will require nighttime single lane closures for the duration of the project. Lane closures may occur nightly from Sunday night through Friday mornings between the hours of 8 p.m. and 6 a.m. For the deck overlay process, lane closures may be in place between Sunday nights through Friday mornings. For the southbound lanes these will occur between the hours of 7pm and 10am, and for the northbound lanes between the hours of 6pm through 9am. Details on these closures will be listed below on a weekly basis. Estimated completion is scheduled for end of 2024.

I-81 NORTHBOUND AT EXIT NEW RIVER BRIDGE REPLACEMENT IN MONTGOMERY COUNTY – Traffic on northbound I-81 has been switched onto the newly constructed bridge over the New River at the Montgomery/Pulaski County line. Lane and shoulder closures may be in place near exit 105. Lane closure may be in effect during the week from 8 p.m. to 7 a.m. Shoulder closures may be in effect at any time during the week. Slow rolls may be performed on I-81 in the north and southbound lanes from mile marker 98 to 109. Speed limit is reduced to 60 miles per hour in the work zone. Shoulder closures will remain in place though the duration of the project. Project completion is estimated for Summer 2024.

 LANE CLOSURES: Nighttime alternating lane closures are possible on I-81 northbound between mile markers 104-106.

ROUTE 605: Alternating lane closures and flagging operations may be present on Route 605, located under the New River Bridge, for paving operations and work overhead on the bridge.

SLOW ROLLS: Slow rolls may be utilized periodically on both the northbound and southbound lanes from mile marker 98-109 for structural steel deliveries and setting beams.

I-81 BRIDGE DECK REPAIRS – Weather permitting, crews will repair bridge decks on Interstate 81 between mile markers 170 to 89, right and left lane closures will be in place northbound and southbound during nighttime hours, 9 p.m. to 6 a.m. the following morning. Drivers should watch for signs and expect possible delays.

Roanoke County SIDEWALK PROJECT SOUTHBOUND WILLIAMSON ROAD IN HOLLINS AREA - Work is nearing completion in the next few weeks on a project to construct new sidewalk along the section of southbound 11 (Williamson Road) between Plantation Road and Peters Creek Road. Drivers in the Hollins area can expect periodic right lane closures on southbound Williamson Road between 9 a.m. and 2 p.m. As work progresses, occasional nighttime lane closures also will be scheduled. The sidewalk project is expected to

## LIVERY STABLES DEVELOPED IN EARLY TIMES Main And Clay Streets Were Sites Of Stables Catering To Trade

From the 1938 centennial edition of The Times-

Register
"Gone with the Wind" is the old time livery stable which flourished for years before the automobile came along to furnish a faster means of transportation. In those "horse and buggy days" there were a number of livery stables in this county, some of them being in Salem before the Civil War; and in the city of Roanoke the "livery business" in the downtown section could almost be compared with an industry at the turn of the century.

In those days when a young man wished to make a bit with his lady fair, a hired horse and buggy was the means of him furnishing the last work in entertainment. Some few of the young gallants in those days owned their own horse and carriage but such convenience was beyond even the dream of the majority of the swains who made out by hiring their transportation from the livery stable. A Sunday afternoon buggy ride was a comparatively exciting even in that day. With the passing of the livery stable, the

blacksmith also found that tings are not what they used to be, so that today there are only enough blacksmiths to remind us that he was a mighty useful citizen in the last century and that a number of men made their living by this

#### The Jersey Wagon

Still another horse drawn vehicle that is now but a memory is the old time jersey wagon which the livery stable furnished to traveling salesmen to enable them to carry large sample cases of merchandise to display before the merchants. Even though this method of transportation was not so fast there were probably more "drummers" on the road in proportion to the stores than there are today. Not all of them needed jersey wagons but a salesman who used such a wagon was the cream of the crop.

When General Fitzhugh Lee was a candidate for governor of this state in the previous century he came to Salem where a horseback parade was formed to visit Roanoke. At that time a horseback parade was a procession de luxe and it is probably that many a vote in favor of the General was secured through this method of campaigning. General Lee rode a coal black stallion which made him stand out as a conspicuous figure in the parade. For such an occasion the livery stable had a number of horses that could be furnished

to riders and these together with the privately

owned horses were numerous enough to stage a



**GREENWAY** 

CONSTRUCTION - Beginning June 18, Highland Road will be closed between Hogan Road and Rutrough Road for construction of the Roanoke River Greenway through the Blue Ridge Parkway underpass by Roanoke County. The roadway will reopen by August 14, 2024, before the first day of school for Roanoke County Public Schools.

ROANOKE GAS UTILITY WORK - Roanoke Gas is renewing gas lines along Route 1306 (Bower Road) and Route 1371 (Hyde Park Drive). ## **Jones repeats as C-of-Y**, illiams is best player

To the victor go the spoils, so they say, and for the second year in a row the spoils go to the Glenvar High boys' soccer team. Josh Jones has been named Virginia High School League Class 2 Coach of the Year for the second year in a row and the Highlanders also have the state Player of the Year for the second straight season. This year its senior Jake Williams after Colin Clapper won the award last year.

Williams captained a back line that allowed zero goals in three state tournament games and had shutouts in the final 10 games of the season. Williams' leadership and direction from the back, his ball-winning ability, and one-on-one defending anchored the Glenvar defensive unit.

Jake's biggest goal came off a header in the 78th minute from a corner kick to give the Highlanders a 1-0 win over Clarke County in the 2023 state finals. Williams also scored a goal in this year's state semifinal win against Bruton.

Jones completed his fourth year at Glenvar, leading the Highlanders to back-to-back state championships with a 1-0 win over Radford in the finals. Glenvar finished the season 22-0 with 18 shutouts and outscoring opponents 93-4. The Highlanders have compiled a 75-3-2 record, winning ten trophies since 2021 including four straight Three Rivers District and Region C championships along with back-to-back state champi-

Before arriving at Glenvar Jones, a William Byrd High School graduate, spent 18 seasons leading the Salem girls' team. His record there was 269-73-30 with a state title in 2003, two state runner-up finishes in 2016 and 2017, five region championships and seven district championships.

The all-state soccer team consists of five forwards, five midfielders, five defenders and one goalkeeper. Only those players selected first-team all-region are eligible for selection to the all-state team. The all-state selection committee comprises eight coaches, with two from each region. In addition to Williams Glenvar had three other play-

ers make the first team, senior midfielder Zach Curfiss, junior midfielder Aidan Hylton and sophomore defenseman Cooper Mullins. Second team all-state selections from Glenvar include senior forward Bryce King and junior forward Kian Fisher. Williams and Jones also swept Player and Coach

of the Year in both Region 2C and the Three Rivers District. Joining Williams on the all-region first team are King, Fisher, Hylton, Curfiss, Mullins and keeper Grayson Shepherd. Second team all-region Highlanders are Luke Farmer, Adam Saunders, Alan Vu and Tyler Curfiss.
