Salem's Comprehensive Plan revamp: A vision for the future

In a move to shape the future of the city for the next quarter-century, Salem has embarked on a comprehensive rewrite of its existing comprehensive plan. The initiative, mandated by Virginia State Code, is designed to reflect the community's aspirations and address emerging challenges with innovative strategies. An open house, which

to learn more and provide feedback, was held on Aug. 13 at the Salem Civic Center.

"Every five years, we are required by state law to review our comprehensive said Mary Ellen Wines, a key figure in the city's planning department. "This time around, we felt it was crucial to not just review but completely rewrite our plan. We want to take what's great about Salem and build on it, using new practices that can carry us into the

next 20-25 years."

To lead this ambitious

project, Salem enlisted the expertise of Glenn Walters from Town Studio. Walters, known for his communityplanning approach, emphasized that the plan is not just a bureaucratic exercise but a deeply communitydriven process. comprehensive is totally communitybased," Walters explained. "Our job is to

Salem students return for 2024-25 school year





Schools in Salem opened Monday morning for the start of the 2024-25 school year. This marks the earlier start date since Salem Schools became an independent division in 1983. "Our schools kicked off the new school year with a remarkably smooth opening thanks to extensive summer planning and our staff's focus and dedication during teacher workweek. The smooth start was also the result of our outstanding transportation department and bus drivers. While there were some minor delays as expected for the first days of school, these were few and far between," Dr. Curtis Hicks, superintendent, said. "Mother Nature also played her part, blessing us with mild temperatures and perfect weather, making the start of the school year even more enjoyable. Students and staff quickly fell into their new routines, making it difficult to tell we were only in our first few days. We're excited for the year ahead and grateful for the strong start!" Roanoke College to name new science center for McConnon

College alumnus Shaun McConnon '66 has pledged an additional \$5 million for construction of a new science center on the campus, bringing his total support of the project to \$20 million and inspiring the school to name the innovative new facility in his honor, according to an announcement from the college this week.

McConnon's donations, along with the essential contributions of many other alumni and friends of the college, have allowed the science center project to exceed its fundraising campaign goal of \$60 million. In recognition of McConnon's unparalleled support,

the completed science center will be named the Shaun McConnon Discovery Center.

"Knowing Shaun is a privilege," said Roanoke College President Frank Shushok Jr. "He recognizes the village of people at Roanoke College who helped him become his best self. It is both humbling and inspiring that Shaun is so deeply dedicated to ensuring that today's students receive the same kind of education that launched his flourishing and successful career. He's paying forward what he received - generously and passionately."

McConnon's most recent donation is a fitting bookend

to the fundraising effort. A Massachusetts-based cybersecurity expert who founded and sold several successful companies, McConnon kicked off the campaign in 2021 by donating \$15 million to the project still the largest cash gift in the school's 182-year history.

McConnon said College has been instrumental in his life path and success, so it feels appropriate to invest in the school's future.

"As I reflect on my life, I see clearly the role that Roanoke College has played in my success," McConnon "Roanoke said.

Salem School Board approves bus stop and leave procedures and policies

The Salem City Schools Transportation Department committed to safely transporting students to and from school, with students assigned to bus routes and stops based on their home addresses. The Salem School Board approved the following revision during the Aug. 13

meeting: Key

guidelines:

- Elementary students may walk up to 0.3 miles to their bus stop, while secondary students may walk up to 0.5 miles.
- School buses will not stop within 300 feet of another bus stop unless significant safety concern is identified.
- Bus routes and stops aim to avoid private

General Andrew Lewis: Colonial Hero at the Salem Museum

Step back in time with the Salem Museum to the Colonial era on Saturday, Sept. 7, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Enjoy a full day of living history. Historians in Colonial-era attire will bring the past to life for kids and families alike. Salem's very own Revolutionary War hero General Andrew Lewis will present two talks on his extraordinary life and times at 11 a.m. and 2 p.m. All events are free to the public.

Colonial living historians from the Fincastle Company will demonstrate the professions, trades, and crafts essential to the era while telling stories about the brave men and women who built a life on Virginia's frontier with determination and heroic deeds.

The Fincastle Company is a group of dedicated historians who portray both military and civilian roles during the time of the American War of Independence. They conduct extensive research into the clothing and equipment of the era in order to be as accurate to the period as possible. The

group performs living history displays at various historical sites across the mid-Atlantic region. They specifically portray the Fincastle/Montgomery County Militia, an authentic unit from Southwestern Virginia that served in the American Revolution.

At 11am and again at 2 p.m., Garrett Channell, the museum's new executive director, will portray Andrew Lewis. In his talk "Pioneer and Patriot: The Life of Andrew Lewis," Channell will share Lewis' heroic story, how he twice

won Virginia's freedom, and which Founding Father he was surprisingly close to.

The Salem Museum also includes exhibits on two of the area's Colonial heroes, Colonel William Fleming and General Andrew Lewis. The French and Indian War battle sword of Fleming, a noted physician and statesman, is featured. Lewis is remembered for leading his troops to

possible and formulate a vision that captures what Salem should be in the

next 25 years." The new plan is organized interlocking themes rather than the traditional separate elements like housing, transportation, economic of development. Walters described this thematic approach as a way to ensure the city's growth is integrated and holistic.

"We've moved away from the old model of separate elements because we've realized these things overlap and weave together," he said. "For example, we're looking at complete and safe streets, access to parks, and areas for redevelopment as interconnected themes." One of the plan's focal

points is housing, with a particular emphasis affordability and "Housing diversity. affordability is a critical issue we've heard from the community," Walters noted. "People want a variety of housing options at different price points so that everyone, including our kids, can afford to live here. But to achieve this, we'll need to make some tough policy

decisions." The city's planning has process been extensive, involving community workshops, online surveys, and partnerships with local

listen to as many voices as organizations to ensure broad participation. "We've made every effort to involve as many people as possible," Wines said. "It's been in the news, around on social media, and we've even reached out to churches to encourage participation."

During the week April the Compreĥensive Plan team held multiple community engagement sessions focused on housing issues. These meetings included diverse groups such as real estate professionals, builders, high school students, business owners in East Bottom, and the general public.

Overall, participants supported integrating higher-density housing into existing neighborhoods and new developments to boost diversity and However, affordability.

many emphasized the need to maintain Salem's sense of community, safety, and quality while addressing current and

future housing needs.

Feedback indicated a cautious approach to population and housing growth, with residents preferring that new units align with the scale and character of surrounding neighborhoods. There was an openness to various housing types—like patio homes, townhouses, small apartment buildings—though many suggested these be limited to new developments rather than historic areas.

Specific topics like Accessory Dwelling (ADUs) Units and Manufactured Homes sparked mixed opinions. While recognized for their potential to enhance affordability, further discussion is needed to




clarify their approval processes and regulatory frameworks.

As the plan continues to take shape, Salem residents are encouraged to stay engaged. The city aims to finalize the plan with clear strategies and an actionable roadmap

that outlines near-term, mid-term, and long-term goals. "This is just the beginning," Walters said. "The real work begins when we start implementing these ideas and turning them into reality."



Roanoke College Poll: Harris holds slim lead over Trump in Virginia

Vice President Kamala Harris holds a slim threepoint lead over former President Donald Trump (47%-44%) in a head-to-head matchup in Virginia and a similar lead (45%-42%) when other candidates are included, according to the Roanoke College Poll. Both are within the poll's margin of error. In the U.S. Senate race, Democratic Sen. Tim Kaine leads his Republican challenger, Hung Cao, (49%-38%). The Institute for Policy and Opinion Research (IPOR) at Roanoke College interviewed 691 likely voters in Virginia between Aug. 12 and 16, 2024. The survey has a weighted margin of error of 4.5%.

2024 General Election

Although only 2% of likely voters say they are undecided (in the multi-candidate question), another 8% (two-way) to 13% (six-way) say they will vote for someone other than Harris or Trump (Robert Kennedy Jr. 6%; Cornel West 2%; Chase Oliver 2%; Jill Stein 0%; Other 3% in the six-way race). The previous poll in May showed Trump and President Joe Biden tied. This is the first Roanoke College Poll including Harris as the Democratic party candidate.

Nearly four in five (79%) likely voters are very certain

of their vote choice, and another 18% are somewhat certain. More than half (60%) are very enthusiastic about voting, and 25% are somewhat enthusiastic. The economy dominates among the most important issues, being cited by 48% of respondents. Abortion (16%) and immigration (15%) were chosen more frequently than foreign affairs (6%) and crime (4%). Two-thirds (68%) of likely voters plan to vote on Election Day, while 31% say they will vote earlier. Biden's departure from the race impacted the

campaign and voters' perceptions. When asked in the new poll about what their vote plans had been prior to Biden's withdrawal, respondents gave Trump a six-point lead (although the candidates were tied in the May poll). Some who had planned to vote for other candidates appear to have changed their minds, and 3% said they had not planned to vote in a Biden-Trump matchup.

Likely voters generally perceive Harris to be more liberal than Biden (45%), with only 16% thinking she is more conservative. Half of the respondents (50%) think Trump's immediate response to the attempted assassination showed toughness; nearly as many (44%) see it as an attempt to gain votes.

The large majority of respondents do not think a candidate's physical characteristics are important (64% not at all; 18% not very important), but about one in five think it is important that a candidate looks like them (8% very important; 10% somewhat important).

A bare majority (51%) thinks Trump is a threat to democracy. Slightly fewer (47%) see the Democratic party process of replacing Biden with Harris as such a threat. Slightly more likely voters (56%) see Trump as strong enough to deal with adversaries of the United States, such as Vladimir Putin, while less than half (49%) say the same about Harris.

Just under one-third of respondents (29%) think criticisms of Harris are based more on her race and gender, while more think they are based on either policy differences (35%) or pure politics (35%). More than half (58%) think that criticisms of Trump are due to the large number of people who dislike him.

Regarding choices for vice president, likely voters are less than thrilled, as 44% are either dissatisfied or angry with the choice of Tim Walz (30% dissatisfied; 14% angry), and J.D. Vance fares even worse (32% dissatisfied; 18% angry). Approval, Favorable/Unfavorable,

Directions of Virginia and Nation

Evaluations of the direction of the nation and the commonwealth remain stable. A small majority (51%) thinks that Virginia is headed in the right direction, while 71% think the country is on the wrong track. Job approval for President Biden (35%) and Congress (20%) are almost identical to the May poll. Gov. Glenn Youngkin saw his job approval rise to 59%, the highest in his term thus far. Biden's 62% disapproval rating is the highest during his time in office. Favorability ratings for federal officials and

institutions generally continue in negative numbers with Trump (40% favorable/57% unfavorable) and Biden (37% favorable/61% unfavorable) leading in the wrong way. Harris is also underwater at 43% favorable/53% unfavorable, just slightly better than Trump. Both vice presidential candidates are also viewed negatively with Walz sitting at 34% favorable/51% unfavorable and Vance at 32% favorable/55% unfavorable. The U.S. Supreme Court fares slightly better with 45% favorable and 52% unfavorable. Kaine breaks the negative trend with 50% favorable (tying his all-time high from six years ago) and 41% unfavorable. Youngkin's ratings rose to 54% favorable (his best rating during his term) and

Except for the direction of Virginia, each of these ratings is the result of major perception gaps between Democrats and Republicans. Overall, Democrats think the country is headed in the right direction, approve of the job being done by Biden, disapprove of Youngkin's performance, and are negative regarding Congress. Republicans are the opposite of each, other than being even more negative toward Congress. The same is true for favorability ratings of public figures and the Supreme Court. Independents are typically between the two, sometimes closer to Republicans and sometimes closer to Democrats.

'The switch from Biden to Harris made a difference in Virginia, but perhaps not as great as some may have thought," said Dr. Harry Wilson, senior political analyst for IPOR and professor emeritus of political science at Roanoke College. "The news for Harris is certainly better than it was for Biden, but her three-point lead is still within the margin of error."

"Both candidates are polling very well within their rty, and there is a miniscule number of undecided voters. The party bases remain important, as always. The number who say they will vote third party is declining, and those voters may well determine who wins in

One big takeaway continues to be the chasm between the views of Democrats and Republicans. None of it is new, but it is remarkable that partisans interpret everything through different lenses."

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ECIPE OF THE WEEK

Little Debbie

My mom's mother, Mimi, did not cook. She wasn't the type of grandmother that made homemade treats for me. But she could shop like a star. One thing I remember is that she always had Little Debbie snack cakes. Banana Marshmallow Pies, Star Crunch Cakes, Nutty Buddy bars, and Oatmeal Creme Pies. I knew exactly which cabinet she stored them in. On road trips, they were always in the front seat, and if they came to visit us, Mom would buy them to have on hand. My mom did not buy them except for those visits.

O.D. and his wife, Ruth, founded McKee Foods in 1934. In 1960, O.D. McKee was trying to produce a catchy name for their new family-pack cartons of snack cakes. Inspired by a picture of his 4-yearold granddaughter Debbie, he decided on the name Little Debbie®. Each Little Debbie package features an illustration of a cheerful little girl in a straw hat who looks like she would enjoy jumping rope and would never throw a remote at the TV. The first family pack was produced in August of that year and consisted of the original snack cake, the Oatmeal Creme Pie. Family packs were one of the first multiple-item baked goods available with individually wrapped snacks. While the Oatmeal Creme Pie was the original Little Debbie snack cake, there were 14 different varieties by 1964. Now, more than 75 varieties are available. Little Debbie snacks are available in all 50 states, Canada, Mexico, and Puerto Rico, as well as on U.S. military bases throughout the world. And little Debbie? She is still involved with the business and currently holds the position of Executive Vice President and serves on the McKee Foods Board of Directors.

When it comes to my opinion, my favorite is the Nutty Buddy Bars. I used to eat them one layer at a time, to make them last longer. Oatmeal Creme Pies and Glazed Doughnut Sticks reside at 2 and 3 on my Little Debbie power rankings. Although, the Christmas Tree Cake is also on my list. I don't understand how Little Debbie can turn her regular boring snack cakes into a magical holiday staple with some frosting and sprinkles. But those Christmas Cakes taste at least

10,000 times better than the January-November Cakes. As my coworkers will attest, I can never pass a holiday display of Little Debbie snacks without buying

Iced Oatmeal Cookie Bars

- Ingredients for Bars
- ½ cup unsalted butter, melted 1 large egg
- 1 cup light brown sugar, packed tablespoons medium, dark, or full-bodied
- molasses
- 1 tablespoon vanilla extract • ½ teaspoon salt
- ¼ teaspoon cinnamon
- 1 cup instant oats, not old-fashioned or whole-
- 3/4 cup all-purpose flour • Ingredients for Frosting
- ½ cup unsalted butter, softened
- 1 ½ cups confectioners' sugar
- one 7-ounce jar marshmallow creme
- 1/4 to 1/2 teaspoon salt, cuts some of the sweetness

Instructions

Preheat oven to 350F. Line an 8x8-inch baking pan with aluminum foil, spray with cooking spray; set aside. In a large, microwave-safe bowl melt the butter, about 1 minute on high power. Wait momentarily before adding the egg so you don't scramble it. Add the egg, brown sugar, molasses, vanilla, salt, cinnamon, and whisk until smooth. Add the oats and stir to combine. Add the flour and stir until just combined, don't overmix. Turn batter out into prepared pan, smoothing the top lightly with a spatula. Bake for




about 24 to 25 minutes, or until done. A toothpick inserted in the center should come out clean, or with a few moist crumbs, but no batter. Place pan on top of a wire rack to cool completely before frosting. Don't frost warm bars or the frosting will melt.

To the bowl of a stand mixer fitted with the paddle attachment (or large bowl and electric hand mixer), add the butter, confectioners' sugar, and beat on mediumhigh speed (start on low so you don't spray sugar everywhere) until light and fluffy, about 3 minutes. Stop, scrape down the sides of the bowl, and add the marshmallow creme, salt, and beat on medium-high speed until well combined, about 1 minute. Turn frosting out over bars and lightly smooth it with a spatula or offset knife.

students should keep devices in their lockers. While we recommend that students leave these devices at home, we understand that they may be necessary to facilitate communication with family members at the end of the school day.

For high school students:

the high school communication devices must be "off and away" during class. Each classroom is equipped with a cellphone caddie. Upon entering the classroom, students will be expected to turn off their devices and place them in the caddie. They can retrieve their devices from the caddie as they exit the classroom. Students are allowed to use their devices before and after school, between classes, and during their lunch.

Devices security:

Please keep in mind that students are not required to have personal communication devices at school. Therefore, the Salem City School Division is not responsible for these devices at school. If you or your child have concerns about device security as a result of the procedures outlined above, we recommend leaving these devices at



Medical conditions:

We understand that some students may need to use their devices to monitor medical conditions. Students who require this accommodation will be allowed to keep their devices with them after providing the necessary documentation from a physician. property whenever possible. Students should arrive at their bus stop at least 5 minutes before pickup, with parents encouraged to accompany younger children. In the afternoon, an adult must be present to receive preschool, kindergarten, and first-grade students. If no adult is present, the student will be returned to their school.

For students attending non-home schools or using alternate drop-off locations, transportation may be available if the bus has capacity and the stop is part of the current route. Parents must provide a signed School Bus Pass for such arrangements.

Salem has designated walk zones for three schools: Salem High School, Andrew Lewis Middle School, and G.W. Carver.

Special needs transportation is tailored to individual requirements, with door-to-door service available when needed. Parents may be required to be present at the bus stop, depending on the student's transportation plan.

The department also offers limited transportation to day care centers that are on existing bus routes, with priority given to students residing on the route. Transportation requests for newly established day care centers will not be considered until the following school year.

For concerns or appeals related to transportation services, parents can contact the Transportation Supervisor, with further review available through the Assistant Superintendent if needed.

The Salem City School Board also introduced a new personal leave policy for the 2024-2025 school year, offering three days of paid personal leave for all fulltime professional and support staff, including school nurses. This policy applies to employees on ten, ten-and-a-half, or eleven-month contracts.

Key details of the policy:

Personal leave can only be taken after the employee has started their contracted work year.

The leave cannot be used on the

day before or after a holiday or nonschool day and must be approved in advance by the school principal or supervisor.

Requests for personal leave should

be submitted at least one week

in advance. However, exceptions may be made if the request can

be accommodated with minimal disruption. In cases where granting personal leave could lead to a shortage of substitutes for emergencies, the principal or supervisor may ask the employee to reschedule the leave. In extreme circumstances, approved

leave may be denied. The policy distinguishes between eligible and ineligible employees based on their direct interaction with students. Eligible employees, such as administrators and office aides, may take leave in onehour increments, while ineligible employees, including teachers and librarians, must take leave in halfday or full-day increments.

Unused personal leave will not carry over to the next school year. Instead, any unused leave will be converted to sick leave at the end of the school year or paid out at the employee's daily rate of pay. The policy is part of a pilot program set to expire on June 30, 2025, unless extended by the School Board.

The Superintendent has the authority to grant exceptions to this

policy as needed. In student success matters, Salem High School sophomore Drew Perez was recognized for an almost flawless tennis season. Perez won the Class 4 Boys Tennis Singles State Championship on Saturday, June 8, at Huntington Park in Newport News. Perez secured the state title with a commanding 6-3, 6-0 victory over Broad Run's Neel Pasunuri, finishing the season with an impressive 20-1 record.

In addition to his championship, Perez was selected for the All-State Boys' Team, a remarkable achievement for the young athlete. The community eagerly anticipates his contributions to his sport, team, and school.

College was transformational for me. It has become very important for me to give back to the institution which was so formative to my learning, personal growth and journey through life."

McConnon majored in biology at Roanoke and earned a minor in chemistry. He attributes his academic success to multiple faculty members. Also, a top sprinter, McConnon ran anchor on Roanoke's champion 4x100 relay team, was a member of Kappa Alpha Order, and held down several jobs to pay his college bills.

"The lessons I learned from my friends, fraternity brothers professors taught me much and helped sustain me through my 50-year hightech career," he said.

After stints in pharmaceutical research and sales, McConnon was recruited by Honeywell's newly minted computer division. He went on to serve Data General and Sun Microsystems before building and selling four high-

Raptor tech security companies: Systems, Okena, Q1 Labs and BitSight Technologies. Goldman presented McConnon with a plaque indicating that the first three companies he founded had sold for more than \$1 billion combined.

For a man who built a successful career around technological innovation and excellence, supporting transformative learning in current and future students is very appealing.

"I believe this is a critical moment in the history of Roanoke College - one of innovation and transformation and I love where the college is going," McConnon said. "We must be bold to compete in this competitive higher education environment. I want this building to be called the Discovery Center to fulfill our quest and dream of being a visionary leader in science and

related disciplines. I hope many new

discoveries occur in this facility and in

the lives of our students."

A ceremonial groundbreaking for the Shaun McConnon Discovery Center took place during Alumni Weekend 2024, and construction is currently underway. A new central building, which will stand in place of Massengill Hall, will provide much-needed teaching and learning spaces for Roanoke's growing student population. Three of Roanoke's 10 most popular majors will be housed in the McConnon Center, and 33% of all courses on campus will be taught

In a later phase of the construction project, Trexler Hall will receive a facelift while Life Science will get not only a facelift, but also a new name. Life Science will be renamed in honor and memory of Biology Professor Emeritus Bob Jenkins '61, who taught at Roanoke for more than 40 years and passed away in July 2023. Jenkins was foremost ichthyologist, renowned researcher and beloved teacher. His career was marked by many significant

discoveries, including more than a dozen new fish species and one previously thought to be extinct.

One of Jenkins' former classmates and lifelong friends, John Snyder '64, along with his wife, Linda, donated \$5 million to the McConnon Center project. Rather than requesting that part of the facility be named after them, the Snyders chose to honor Jenkins.

McConnon hopes that his support of the science center project will also serve as a call to action for fellow alumni and friends of the college.

'Your investment will change the lives of students in good and powerful ways," he said. "Earlier generations of Maroons did this for me, and I'm grateful to pay this forward to the next generations of Maroons. I hope that my example will encourage other alumni and friends to give generously to the college."

Virginia Western awarded National Science Foundation grant focused on agricultural technology

ROANOKE-Virginia Western Community College has received a \$343,209 Advanced Technological Education (ATE) grant from the National Science Foundation, the U.S. government's independent science agency, according to a release from the college.

The three-year grant will fund the college's project, "Cross-Pollination Skillsets: Growing Mechatronics and Agricultural Collaborations for Producing Skilled Agricultural Technicians," which will test Virginia Western faculty members' ideas to improve technician

'We are very grateful to receive this substantial grant from the National Science Foundation," said Dr. Robert Sandel, Virginia Western's president. "Our faculty are always seeking innovative ways to equip our students to meet community needs, and this collaboration builds on that strength. Our state leaders have identified key workforce needs in the agricultural sector, and we are ready to help make Virginia a welcome destination for these employers."

The Cross-Pollination Skillsets project targets a state government priority for developing business opportunities through controlled environmental agriculture (CEA), according to Dr. David Berry, assistant professor and Mechatronics Program head. As principal investigator, Berry will lead the new initiative with Dr. Mallory White, assistant professor of biology and Agriculture Program head, who is serving as coprincipal investigator. The concept of the grant is to train the next level of technicians needed in the state's agriculture workforce.

Integral to the project's formation was the partnership with the project's Business and Industry Leadership Team (BILT). Contributing as members of the BILT are: Matthew Lohr, Virginia Secretary of Agriculture; Arturo Gomez Mazatan, Red Sun Farms; J. Scott Lowman, the Institute for Advanced Learning and Research; Gus Brennan, Greenswell Growers; Jared Heffron, Novenesis; Stefanie Manbeck, Cattlemen's Insurance Agency; Kate Stevens, James River High School – FFA advisor/agriculture teacher; and Walter Grigg, TORC Robotics.


"This project has been shaped by our community partners, and we are so grateful for their support," said Dean of STEM and Workforce Solutions Amy White. "Our faculty investigators were very open and flexible as we began the planning process, and so we were able to be very nimble to respond to the BILT's input."

Industry members outside the BILT also note the value of the project's synergies. "Integrating agriculture and technology into college curriculums is essential for businesses like MOVA Technologies Inc or Vegg Inc, which offer climate-smart ag-tech solutions," said Luke Allison, director of advancement and communications for MOVA Technologies, Inc. "The next generation of workers must be leaders in environmental stewardship while advancing technological progress. Higher education needs to ignite their imaginations, fostering a proactive approach to creating innovative solutions for challenges that have yet to arise."


Through teamwork with Shelley Lyons, Virginia Western's grant coordinator, and Dean Amy White, investigators Berry and White began preparing the grant proposal with mentoring and technical support from Mentor-Connect, which provides mentoring and technical resources to help two-year college faculty write competitive grant proposals. Mentor-Connect is an ATE project led by Florence-Darlington Technical College in partnership with the American Association of Community Colleges. Virginia Western was one of 24 community colleges nationwide selected to participate in Mentor-Connect's year of training and mentoring sessions to prepare the grant application.

"Much of the credit for our winning proposal must go to the Mentor-Connect program. I was initially skeptical that the program would properly address our focus area. The focus on agriculture is just gaining momentum and I wasn't certain any mentor would have experience with the subject matter," said Berry. "However, the mentors worked with us continually, pushing us to make progress even though we were swamped with other responsibilities. The result of this experience wasn't only a winning proposal; our internal team, our external network and our focus has been strengthened significantly."

Mallory White pointed to the need this project will fill. "This is new territory. However, our urban college is uniquely poised to instruct the community about hydroponics and controlled environmental agriculture," she said. "We have a strong science department, so it's important to take advantage of our existing programs, incorporate new courses, and think of the future to meet the growing need for more







Mechatronics and Agriculture programs, plus new courses being developed, to receive an Associate of Applied Science in Technical Studies. Because these programs already existed, there is a much smoother onramp than the longer process of having a completely new program approved at the state level.

The NSF grant will aid staffing, course development and equipment to better target the focus on controlled environment agriculture. For example, the project is developing a course in vertical growing and hydroponics, which will include equipment that will also benefit the College's Horticulture Program as well. literally be able to cross-pollinate the mechatronics and ag fields - the mechatronics with the sensors and pH meters, giving students more practice with data analysis and the ag field through understanding the technology behind the hydroponics," Mallory White said. The program also plans outreach to benefit K-12

Another mode of cross-pollination involves increasing gender diversity among the Mechatronics and Agriculture programs' current populations. The Mechatronics Program enrolls more male students, while female students comprise the majority of Agriculture Program enrollees. "One of our target outcomes is to create a more diverse population in the programs and have men and women explore ideas within this developing field of controlled environment agriculture," Berry said.

The ATE program focuses on the education of technicians who work in high-tech fields that drive the nation's economy. Because two-year community and





technical colleges are the leading sources of technician education in the United States, faculty from these higher education institutions have had leadership roles in most ATE projects since the program began in 1993.

"We are thrilled to work within our community to support the growing field of agriculture and look forward to the outcomes of this valuable project. We strive to be good community partners, and this project is yet another way Virginia Western can be a leader in providing opportunity and resources to our students,"



From the 1938 centennial edition of The Times-Register Born at Hollins College November 21, 1875, the son of Joseph A. Turner and Leila Cocke Turner was J. A. Turner, who died October 21, 1937. His mother was the eldest daughter of the late Charles Lewis Cocke, founder of Hollins College.

Mr. Turner was educated at Alleghany Institute, in Roanoke, Richmond College, and the University of Virginia. He taught at Alleghany Institute in 1897 and

1898, prior to becoming assistant business manager of Hollins, College in 1898. In 1900 he became business manager, which post he filled until his death. he was also secretary of the Hollins College Board of Trustees and in 1927 supervised the Hollins College endowment

Historian

He was prominent in Rotary, being an ex-president of the Roanoke club and ex-chairman of the international committee on Rotary education, as well as former district governor for Virginia, North Carolina, and South Carolina. He was a charter member of the Southwest Virginia Historical Society and president since its beginning. A contributor of historical articles to the William and Mary Quarterly and to local papers, he made addresses before numbers of organization on subjects of interest i the history of this section of Virginia. Last year he was president of the local chapter of the Archaeological Institute of America, now names the Joseph A. Turner Chapter in his memory.

V. P. I. Certificate

Virginia Polytechnic Institute awarded him a certificate of merit "for promoting the development of agriculture in the state of Virginia," and he served on the Board of Visitors of this institute for a number or years. He was president several times of the State Farmers Institute, the State Dairyman's Association, and the Holstein-Friesian Club, and made frequent contributions to the publications of these associations and to other farm journals.

During the World War he was district chairman for the Liberty Bon and Savings Stamp campaign.

Mr. Turner was among the first leaders in the campaign for good roads in Virginia, and was actively engaged for a number of years in the building of good roads in Roanoke County. He was chairman of the building campaign for the Roanoke Y. W. C. A. and has been chairman of the county community fund. He gave his support to Enon Baptist Church for many

In the County Public Health work, he was especially active, and took a deep interest in "Merch House" for the indigent sick.

Other associations of which Mr. Turner was a member are the Colonade Club of the University of Virginia, Kappa Alpha Fraternity, and the Association of University and College Business Officers of the Eastern States.



Roanoke County to relocate Parks, Recreation & Tourism Office

ROANOKE COUNTY Roanoke County's Parks, Recreation & Tourism Department will soon relocate to a new office on Starkey Road in the Cave Spring district, following the purchase of the property from the Roanoke Economic Development Authority. For the past 37 years, the department has been based on Kessler Mill Road, just outside of the city of Salem. However, due to issues with aging infrastructure, flooding and location, staff recognized the need for a new space.

"The relocation our Parks, Recreation & Tourism Department will address the long-standing challenges of our previous facility," said Roanoke County Administrator Richard Caywood. "This modern, central location will enhance our ability to better serve the community saving over \$2 million through the repurposing of an existing building, reflecting our commitment to fiscal responsibility and public service."

The county's FY2023 budget approved funding for a relocation, and as construction costs rose, purchasing an existing building became more cost-effective. The selected property at 4818 Starkey Rd. spans approximately 2.71 acres and includes an existing building, which was previously owned by Delta Dental and purchased by the EDA in the spring of 2024.

After discussions, the county purchased the building for \$1,907,152.33, which includes contents currently in the building. Funding for the purchase and renovations will come from the county's bonds . Virginia through Authority. Resource Supervisors voted on an amendment to the VRA bond financing lease during their Aug. 20 board meeting to approve the funding.

The county anticipates staff will transition into the Starkey Road building by late 2024.

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
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

College, the George Mason club team and Fork Union Military Academy.

The Maroons have hit the ground running. Alumni Gym, where the basketball team played for many years before the Bast Center was built, is being converted into a football weight lifting facility. Locker rooms are a work in progress and new uniforms are ready to go, with white helmets and the RC bird logo on the sides.

"Everything seems to be top drawer," said Highfill. "Coach Stinespring has a great resume and it's an honor to work with him."

Jeff knew Stinespring from his days coaching at Byrd. "Stiney" has a long resume that includes a stint as offensive coordinator and recruiter for Frank Beamer's nationally ranked teams at Virginia Tech.

"He recruited our area for Tech and he always came by to see me," said Highfill. "Many times I told him we didn't have anyone he'd be interested in but he came by anyway, just to stay in touch."

Stinespring has heavily recruited the Roanoke Valley for his first Roanoke College team, which is comprised entirely of freshmen and sophomores. The first roster lists 53 freshmen and 10 sophomores.

Included on the roster are sophomore receiver Chase Ferris and freshman wide out Khamari Garner from Salem High and four players from Glenvar, sophomore kicker Tyler Pierce, sophomore tight end Aiden Wolk and freshmen defensive linemen Ben Holliday and Nate Johnson. Linebacker Gabriel Shaffer, who played at Smith Mountain Lake Academy, also has a Salem address.

Other players from the greater Roanoke Valley include prospects from William Byrd, Eastern Montgomery, Alleghany, Radford, Christiansburg, Covington, Patrick Henry, Franklin County, Craig County and Blacksburg. Of the 63 players on the roster only eight list their home as outside of Virginia.

Stinespring has five full-time assistant coaches, including Tony Spradlin who played at Salem High and coached at Glenvar under Kevin Clifford. Tony is the recruiting coordinator and wide receivers coach. "It's a great atmosphere and it will be interesting to see what happens that first Sunday," said Highfill. "It seems to be a good group of guys with a great attitude, and everything has been done first class."

Carly Coyle has left Salem High School after one year as coach of the Spartan girls' lacrosse team to



Spartans win Franklin Co. Invit.

The Salem High golfers picked up their first win of the season Monday when the Spartans went low on three other teams at the Franklin County Invitational. The fourteam match was held at the Waterfront Country Club.

"Scores were a little higher today across the board on a challenging course where the wind really picked up, but Kathryn Ha played a great round," said Salem coach Blaine Hancock. "She took advantage of close approach shots and scrambled well when she needed to get up and down.'

Ha fired a 68 for four under par to take home the medalist spot out of 24 players. She had three birdies and one eagle on the day to lead Salem to a 311 team score. Host Franklin County was next at 335, followed by Patrick Henry at 340 and Hidden Valley at 341.

"Mike and Aidan managed to put in a solid round," said Hancock. "It wasn't easy to score today and those guys fought hard. Croix coming in with a season best on this course was impressive. All of our team that scored for us today finished in the top 10 and I'm proud of this team putting a season best 311 score on a tough course."

The Spartans also played in the Woodford Invitational in Wytheville last week and finished second among 13 teams despite playing without number one Ha. Blacksburg was first with an amazing score of 269, 11 under par as a team, and Salem was second at 314. Marion was three strokes behind the Spartans at 317, Abingdon was fourth at 322, Gate City was a stroke back at 323 and host George Wythe was sixth among the 13 teams at 325. Hidden Valley and Pulaski County, both of the River Ridge District, had 327 each to tie for seventh.

"It was a great day for the Spartans," said Hancock. "I couldn't be more happy for this group, coming in second with Kathryn in a 13 team field of 65 players.'

Blacksburg's Jake Albert was medalist with a nineunder 61. Bocock led the way for the Spartans with a career low 74 to tie for 13th individually. Bateman carded a season low 75 for 15th.

"Zach and Mike had a great day on the course," said Hancock. "They had a lot of great looks and capitalized on scoring chances.'

Also scoring for the Spartans were Andrews with an 81 and Creger with a season's best 83.




