# Haddox Law opens in Salem Firm focuses on employee rights, small business support

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A new employment law firm has opened its doors in Salem, offering specialized legal services to both employees and small business owners. Haddox Law, located on Texas Street, is led by attorney and managing partner Brittany Haddox, a Salem native with over a decade of experience in the field of employment law.

Haddox Law is dedicated to helping employees secure fair treatment in the workplace and assisting small businesses in navigating the often complex landscape of employment law. "Our mission is to help employees be paid properly and be free from discrimination and retaliation, and to help small business owners navigate the complex world of employment law so that they can focus on their business," Haddox explained.

One of the key differentiators of Haddox Law is its unwavering focus on employee rights. Haddox's experience spans a wide

range of employment law issues, including wage and hour disputes, discrimination, and retaliation. She has represented clients in significant cases across Virginia, many of which have gone to jury trials-a rare occurrence in this area of law.

"There are few of us who truly focus our time on employment law on behalf of employees," Haddox said. "This area of the law is one that, to do it right, you cannot just dabble in it."

Some of the representative cases she handled before establishing her firm include Saeed v. GWMK Hospitality, LLC, a wage theft and overtime violation case that resulted in a jury verdict in favor of the employee, and Burnopp v. Carter Bank & Trust, an age discrimination case that survived summary judgment and was resolved before trial. Haddox has also handled high-profile cases like Pickle v. United Salt Saltville, LLC, a sex harassment and retaliation case currently awaiting trial in the United States District Court for the Western District of Virginia.

Haddox's decision to open her practice in Salem is deeply rooted in her connection to the community. "I am Salem born and Salem bred, as they say," she noted, emphasizing her desire to give back to the area that has shaped her. In addition to her legal practice, Haddox is actively involved in community organizations. She serves on the boards of the Ted Dalton American Inns of Court and the Virginia Employment Law Association, which focus on developing the law to benefit everyone in the community.

Beyond her individual practice, Haddox values collaboration with other legal professionals. "I support my colleagues, and often collaborate with other employment lawyers. The strength of our legal minds together is worth more to me than focusing on any differences that may exist amongst us. And, oddly, perhaps that is what differentiates me from the other firms," she said. At the heart of Haddox Law is

# Former Salem Police Department Chief Haskins passes away

The Salem Police Department announced on Monday that retired Chief Harry T. Haskins passed away Sunday. According to his obituary from Lotz Funeral Home, which is handling the funeral arrangements, he was 87.

Notably, Haskins was Salem's chief of police for two decades.

Haskins began his law enforcement career with the Virginia State Police, according to the police department, serving from July 1958 to July 1974. He then accepted a position as special agent with the U.S. Forest Service from

July 1974 to November 1975. In the fall of 1975, he accepted the chief's position at the Salem Police Department, where he served the Salem community from November 1975 until his retirement on Dec. 31, 1995.

Haskins, the department noted, graduated from old High Forge Clifton School and earned degree an associate from Virginia Western Community College and later a Bachelor of Art Degree from Roanoke College. He is also a graduate of the 104th Session of the FBI

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# Recipe of the week

Cabbage is one of my favorite vegetables to enjoy when the seasons start turning colder. It might not taste sophisticated like arugula, but cabbage is packed with nutrients and is pretty cheap. Which makes it a winner in my opinion. You can use cabbage as a more nutritious crunchy base for salads instead of lettuce, pack it into lunch wraps or enjoy in soups, stir-fries, stews and curries. After a summer full of tomatoes, cucumbers, peppers and all the peaches I could eat, cabbage is back on my grocery list. I've been buying cabbage and making healthy cabbage additions to my meals.

Growing up I wasn't the biggest fan of cabbage, my mom only made boiled cabbage it just had that smell to it. But then I grew up and now I can't get enough. Cabbage is cheap, super resilient (it stays good in the fridge for many weeks), it's super healthy and versatile. I love it in salads – it's crunchy and so much better than lettuce...but once you sauté it...well, it is simply irresistible. Simple shredded cabbage with ranch dressing is a staple side I eat weekly.

According to the Mayo clinic, cabbage, especially red cabbage, seems to raise levels of beta-carotene, lutein, and other heart-protective antioxidants. It also helps lower something called "oxidized" LDL, which is linked to hardening of the arteries. And since it eases inflammation, it can help prevent heart disease. Half a cup of cooked cabbage has about a third the vitamin C you need for the day. It also gives you servings of fiber, folate, potassium, magnesium, vitamins A and K, and more. Cabbage has 1 gram of fiber for every 10 calories. That helps fill you up, so you eat less. It also keeps you regular, and it could help lower your "bad" (LDL) cholesterol and control your blood sugar. Cabbage also has nutrients that keep the lining of your stomach and intestines strong. Its juice also can help stomach ulcers heal.

This week's recipe is an easy stir fry. Chop all your ingredients first then stir fry. Add other vegetables for more flavor like carrots, peppers, and zucchini. If you don't want to use beef, you could make this low carb cabbage stir fry with ground turkey or chicken or even boneless, skinless chicken thighs or breast. If you want to make this stir-fry vegan, you can use tofu. In fact, I have a vegetarian version of this cabbage recipe with tofu also.



#### Cabbage Stir Fry Ingredients

- 3 cups red or green cabbage
- 1 red pepper, chopped thinly
- 2 scallions, thinly chopped
- 3 garlic cloves, minced
- 1 ½ tbsp tamari sauce
- 1 tbsp olive oil
- 3 tbsp chopped parsley or cilantro (if you like)
- 1lb ground beef (or chicken, turkey, pork)
- 1 carrot, cut in strips
- 2 tsp crushed red pepper
- Instructions

Add ground beef to a nonstick pan with one garlic clove and some oil of choice. After a minute, stir, breaking the pieces apart. Let the beef sauté for about 5-6 minutes at medium-high heat. Use the time while the beef is cooking to chop your vegetables - cabbage, carrots, peppers and the parsley (or cilantro) and scallions. Stir in the chopped cabbage, crushed pepper, carrot, another minced clove of garlic and the scallions. Cover for about 2-3 minutes to allow the vegetables to cook. Stir in the chopped pepper, the last clove of garlic and the tamari sauce. Add a little bit of oil if needed and stir for 2-3 minutes. Turn the heat off and stir in the chopped parsley or cilantro. Serve immediately!

#### Vegan Option-Cabbage Tofu Stir Fry Ingredients

- 6oz/ 180g smoked tofu
- 4 cups cabbage, chopped
- 1 carrot, chopped
- 1 tbsp fresh ginger, thinly chopped
- 1 mushroom, chopped
- 3 garlic cloves, minced
- <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> onion, small, thinly chopped
- 1 tsp crushed red pepper 1 tbsp tamari sauce

#### • 1 tbsp olive oil Instructions

Wash your vegetables and chop everything: tofu in slices, cabbage, carrots, mushrooms, onion and ginger. Peel and mince the garlic. Heat a nonstick pan, add some oil to it to sauté the mushroom for about 2 minutes while stirring. Move the mushrooms to the side and add in the sliced tofu. Let the tofu cook for about two minutes, then flip to get it golden brown on both sides. Add some crushed red pepper if you want. Stir in the onion and ginger. Then add in the garlic, cabbage, carrot and finally the tamari sauce. Let cook and stir occasionally for about 5 more minutes. Serve immediately.



National Academy.

During his tenure as chief, he was a founding member of Cardinal Criminal Justice Academy, where he served as Chairman of the Governing Council from 1983 to 1993. In addition, Haskins served seven years on the Executive Committee of the Virginia Association of Chiefs of Police, to include a term as President from 1984 to 1985.

The department was reconstructed to optimize efficiency, including the acquisition of modern computer systems and data storage equipment, during his tenure. It also started using tools for criminal investigations, like Automated Fingerprint Identification System and imaging. Additionally, a SWAT Team was organized under his watch. 

# **O**PINION **Disease defenders – How epidemiology protects community health**

The mission of the Epidemiology Division of the Roanoke City & Alleghany Health Districts (RCAHD) is to monitor and investigate emerging communicable diseases, investigate outbreaks, and provide guidance to stop the further spread of communicable diseases for our community's wellbeing. To put it more simply, epidemiologists are "disease defenders" who use data to answer questions like: Who is getting sick and why? Where is the problem occurring? Why are some people more affected than others? How can we prevent more people from getting sick?

To optimally protect the public's health, healthcare professionals and laboratories are required to report over 70 diseases or conditions in Virginia. In 2023, the RCAHD epidemiology (epi) team, which includes professionals with advanced public health degrees as well as clinical nurses with epi training, investigated over 690 incidences of reportable diseases, excluding COVID-19 and sexually transmitted infections (STI). Since 2020, the team has also included a dedicated group of COVID case investigators. The COVID team investigated and managed over 9,600 local cases in 2023, including 59 outbreaks. In addition, about 2000 STI were reported locally in 2023, including almost 100 reports of syphilis.

Much of the epi team's work is behind the scenes, carefully following up on each new case reported by local healthcare providers, analyzing and investigating each disease as needed to protect our communities and prevent further spread. They also provide guidance Health Column Christie Wills, Roanoke City and Allegany Health Districts

on topics such as testing for communicable diseases or sharing best practices to protect additional people from getting sick after a diagnosis is made. Our team of epi nurses investigate and manage cases of rabies exposures as well as cases of elevated lead levels in blood, a condition that is particularly concerning in children. There is also a team of experts dedicated to respond to cases of tuberculosis.

The epi team has been vital in helping to protect the community's health during several notable outbreaks in recent years. Working alongside our environmental health team of restaurant inspectors, the epi team investigated the 2021 restaurant-associated outbreak of hepatitis A, where over 50 people were sickened. As the community continued to see a high number of community-acquired hepatitis A cases in 2022, the epi team helped identify common risk factors involved with the spread, noting a higher incidence among people who used injection drugs.

The epi team has also been instrumental in monitoring an ongoing increase in cases of communityacquired invasive group A strep (iGAS) since 2022, and the rise of hospital associated infections both here and across the country. The team assists facilities such as nursing homes, long term care facilities and jails with best practices to prevent infections to protect staff and vulnerable residents from outbreaks.

Recently this summer, the team has noted an uptick in local foodborne illnesses. While the increased number of salmonella and campylobacter infections do not all share a common source, investigations determined that some cases were linked to a nationwide recall of cucumbers in June, and other cases may be linked to consuming unpasteurized eggs from backyard flocks. As always, washing hands and surfaces often is also key to everyday prevention.

Not all aspects of the job are spreadsheets and data, according to district Epidemiologist Hope White. She and the team also enjoy the satisfaction of direct contact with residents and opportunities to build trust, such as when she brought books to share with the children of a newcomer family receiving follow-up care from the health department. The combination of RCAHD staff efforts to build trust with residents and broader advances in epidemiology have contributed to the more than 20-year increase in life expectancy since the early 1900s and have helped to make the community a healthier place to live.







#### **INTERSTATE 81**

WIDENING CONSTRUCTION PROJECT EXIT 137 TO EXIT 141 -The \$179 million design-build project to widen both directions of Í-81 between mile markers 136.6 and 141.8 from two to three lanes is underway. Work is being performed along a fivemile section of both northbound and southbound Interstate 81 in Roanoke County and the city of Salem. Barrier wall is in place along the shoulders. Two lanes of I-81 traffic in each direction are expected to remain open during the project with periodic lane closures scheduled during nighttime hours or outside of peak travel times as needed. Drivers can expect the following lane closures and upcoming traffic impacts in this area on northbound and southbound I-81:

ADDITIONAL TRAFFIC IMPACTS:

- LANE CLOSURES Northbound and southbound possible for various work on the project during nighttime hours.
- WORK ZONE SPEED: Drivers should adhere to posted 60 mph speed limits in the work zone and allow space when following a vehicle. Narrow spacing in lanes due to barrier walls, lack of shoulders and lane shifts in various locations, are present.
- TRAFFIC SHIFTS ON WILDWOOD ROAD: Expect a work zone with traffic shifts and narrow width on Wildwood Road after exiting I-81 southbound on exit 137 heading towards Salem. Southbound and northbound I-81 exit and entrance ramp narrows are possible at Route 311.
- TRAFFIC SHIFT ON EXIT 140: Drivers may experience periodic lane closures or quick merges into traffic onto Thompson Memorial Drive from the southbound or northbound exit ramps of exit 140 off of I-81. Work zone located at bottom of the ramp for work on the I-81 bridge at the underpass.
- RAMP CLOSURES: Ramp closures are possible during nighttime hours, 12 a.m., to 5 a.m. Drivers should watch for message boards dates and times the ramp will be closed.
- LANE CLOSURES: Alternating left and right lane and shoulder closures during nighttime hours between 8 p.m. and 6 a.m., Sunday through Thursday, are possible. Lane widths will be reduced to 11 feet. Nightly lane closures may be in place along the right lane with

possible nightly ramp narrows as needed for guardrail and shoulder strengthening.

The project also includes replacing six bridges, widening two bridges, installing approximately 2.6 miles of sound barrier walls along northbound I-81, improving the southbound exit 137 off-ramp intersection at Wildwood Road and adding interchange lighting at exits 137, 140 and 141. Expected completion in early 2026.

NB & SB DECK OVERLAY AT PEAK CREEK MILE MARKER 95.7 - Repair work is underway on the northbound and southbound bridges on I-81 over Peak Creek near mile marker 95.7. This repair work will require nighttime single lane closures for the duration of the project. Lane closures may occur nightly from Sunday night through Friday mornings between the hours of 8 p.m. and 6 a.m. For the deck overlay process, lane closures may be in place between Sunday nights through Friday mornings. For the southbound lanes these will occur between the hours of 7pm and 10am, and for the northbound lanes between the hours of 6pm through 9am. Details on these closures will be listed below on a weekly basis. Estimated completion is scheduled for end of 2024.

• Alternating nighttime northbound left lane closures and southbound right lane closures beginning Monday night, August 26 through Friday Morning, September 6, between the hours of 8 p.m. and 6 a.m.

I-81 NORTHBOUND EXIT 105 NEW RIVER AT BRIDGE REPLACEMENT IN MONTGOMERY COUNTY Traffic on northbound I-81 has been switched onto the newly constructed bridge over the New River at the Montgomery/Pulaski County line. Lane and shoulder closures may be in place near exit 105. Lane closure may be in effect during the week from 8 p.m. to 7 a.m. Shoulder closures may be in effect at any time during the week. Slow rolls may be performed on I-81 in the north and southbound lanes from mile marker 98 to 109. Speed limit is reduced to 60 miles per hour in the work zone. Shoulder closures will remain in place though the duration of the project.

• LANE CLOSÜRÉS: Nighttime alternating lane closures are possible on I-81 northbound or southbound between mile markers 104-106.

# Safety experts say distracted mobility is a public health issue

RICHMOND—Advertising in the 1950s promoted doctor recommendations for cigarette brands. But sentiments changed. Now smoking is at an all-time low, linked to numerous negative health outcomes.

Distracted driving activities, like using a smartphone behind the wheel, should be talked about and treated as an addictive behavior—just like smoking, said Virginia Department of Motor Vehicles Commissioner Gerald F. Lackey.

"We're starting to realize we're having a major epidemic with distracted driving, and it's killing people," he said.

Traffic safety leaders discussed strategies for changing motorist behavior at Drive Smart Virginia's 11th Annual Distracted Driving Summit. Virginia Farm Bureau Mutual Insurance Co. is a summit sponsor.

Reframing public attitudes toward motorist and pedestrian distraction is a first step.

"Think about the progress we made with seat belt usage," said Rick Birt, director of the Washington, D.C. Highway Safety Office. "We started out with no seat belts. Now, over 90% of individuals changed their behavior, and are buckling up."

Birt said Americans should start thinking about distracted driving as a public health crisis that requires an allhands-on-deck response. "What are the values of our community around distracted mobility?" he asked.

Distracted driving accounts for about 17% of all traffic crashes in the state, according to Virginia Crash Facts. Sixtyone fatalities and 7,200 injuries resulted from 21,528 distracted driving crashes in 2023.

Lackey quoted University of Utah research that says motorists who talk on hand-held cell phones are as impaired as drivers with a .08 blood-alcohol content, which is the minimum level that defines drunk driving in most U.S. states.

"We create diversion programs with other addictive behaviors," he continued. "But I have not seen one that does it with distracted driving—engaging it as an addiction and taking you through a process to understand that and put you back in control."

Virginia State Police Superintendent Col. Gary T. Settle shared a new tactic to promote highway safety called Operation DISS-rupt. First implemented in 2023, it focuses on the four key causes of fatal and serious injury crashes in problem areas across Virginia's interstate system.

Operation DISS-rupt stands for Distracted Driving, Impaired Driving, Speed Compliance and Seat belt Safety.

"The operation's goal is to achieve zero fatal crashes during designated enforcement periods and to reduce the total number of crashes on our interstates for the calendar year by 10%," Settle continued. "I'm proud to say since initiating our first operation last winter on Interstate 81, we had zero deaths and saw decreases in overall crashes during those enforcement periods."

Operation DISS-rupt continues to be successfully conducted on Interstates 64, 66 and 95.

an affidavit that he never took up arms against the United States government or aided any hostile government in any manner.

A portion of this oath reads as follows:

"I have never voluntarily borne arms against the United States since I have been a citizen thereof; that I have voluntarily given no aid, countenance, counsel or encouragement to persons engaged in armed hostilities thereto; that I have neither sought nor accepted nor attempted to exercise the function of any office whatever, under any authority, in hostility to the United States; that I have not yielded a voluntary support to any pretended government, authority, power or constitution within the United States, hostile or inimical thereto."

This oath was printed and in addition to the above there was the regular oath of supporting the Unites States constitution.

#### **Offices Declared Vacant**

This was the order received here by Captain H. P. Grayson of the United States army when the town was under martial law. All county offices were declared vacant and this intent of the law was to have none but who could quality by taking the above oath hold office. The law provided that appointive or elective officers had to take the oath.

It will be seen that this oath disqualified practically every man in the county but officers for the county were elected and qualified.

Most of the communications addressed by the military authorities to the local authorities were sent to the clerk of court. In one of these communications the addressee was "William McCauley, deputy clerk of court". This leads to the presumption that the officers got around the law by calling themselves deputies for Mr. McCauley was clerk of court at that time.

#### Three Men Exempted

Another order was received here in which it was stated that the restrictions placed upon office holders should not apply to Zebulon Boon, Alfred Dillard and Jacob L. Frier.

On December 23, 1869, an order was received here directing the county authorities to place the colored marriages on record.

Captain H. F. Grayson who was in command of the armed forces here sent the following order to the clerk of court in June of 1869:

"The county court of Roanoke county is hereby ordered to convene at the courthouse in Salem on July 3, 1869, at 10 a.m. for the purpose of deciding on the bonds and qualifications of James M. Landon as commissioner of revenue for Roanoke county."

Evidently, Mr. Landon did not qualify in full for his name is not on the record books as commissioner of the revenue until 1876. He probably acted in that capacity but technically was not the commissioner of the revenue.

In May of 1869 the clerk of court here received from Lieut. Col. Byrd Lynchburg, a copy of the election districts in this county. What comprised these election district was not stated as it evidently was on a separate paper which has not been preserved.

#### Replaces Capt. Brownson

On July 13, 1869 an order came through appointing Captain Charles Snyder, U. S. Army, to replace Captain Henry F. Brownson as commander of the local detachment.

Another order received by the clerk of court from the authorities was one direction the court to fill vacancies in county offices according to law. Just what that provision was is not given.

On Jan. 15, 1870 an order came from Richmond appointing Hiram L. Hunt as commissioner in chancery replacing Mr. F. Johnson.

From the above orders it will be seen that the entire state was under military rule and that the army officers could bear down on the local authorities in a way that would have been most distressing if they chose the compel the local authorities to live up to the letter of the law.

However, the county and circuit courts carried on here as they did in the pre-war days so that it is presumed that the army authorities did not interfere with the administration of the courts to a great extent. An election was held here on August 1, 1865 and the officers elected, or most of them, seem to have served.

The Wolverines will host Read Mountain today at 5 pm at Salem Stadium in the first game of a doubleheader with the Salem High jayvees, who will host Franklin County. Next Monday Salem will play at Patrick Henry in a makeup game, and a week from today the Wolverines are off to Vinton to take on William Byrd Middle.

Glenvar Middle School has not played since August 26. The Highlanders will be home tonight to host Covington at 6:30 pm.

The Spartans took the opening kickoff and drove to paydirt in five and a half minutes with Josiah Persinger scoring on a seven yard run, and Ethan Millard's kick cut the lead to 20-14.

At that point Davidson answered again. His 50 yard run to the Salem 13 set up a nine yard TD pass, and a two point conversion put LCA up two scores again at 28-14 late in the third quarter.

LCA went up 35-14 early in the fourth period on a 12 yard run by Davidson with 9:37 to go. However, sophomore Jordan McCadden returned the kickoff 85 yards for a touchdown to give the Spartans hope. However, LCA was able to take time off the clock and the final score stood at 35-21 and another "good try but no cigar" loss for the Salemites.

"I thought we took some steps forward," said Holter. "We got outplayed and we got outcoached, but I saw some good things as well. We have some things we need to get better, but we'll be alright."

Davidson finished with 289 yards rushing and three TDs and the Spartans are happy they won't see him again except on TV. Persinger rushed for 108 yards for Salem on 21 carries while McCadden had 29 yards on six tries.

Salem quarterback Eli Taylor was seven for 10

passing for 74 yards and all seven went to Logan.

On defense, Logan led the team with 13 tackles, including eight solos. Sophomore Kyshead Arrington had seven solos and a dozen total tackles. Salem had just one tackle for a loss, by Dontay Davis, and no sacks or interceptions as the big Bulldog offensive line had a strong night.

The Spartans will regroup and come back with fire in their eyes at Franklin County this week. The Eagles opened with a 41-14 win over Bassett last Friday and they'll be out for revenge after taking a 48-7 beating at Salem Stadium last year. Salem has won 20 of the last 21 meetings between the two but Holter knows not to take the Eagles lightly. The last time the Spartans visited Cy Dillon Stadium they had to pull out a 33-32 nail-biter.

"A JR Edwards team is always well-coached," said Holter of the former Spartan assistant. "They have some veteran players and we'll have to play a good game to beat them."

The Salem jayvees did not get to play LCA due to lightning last week. The jayvees will host Franklin County on Thursday of this week in what will be their opener, then LCA's jayvees will come back next Monday to make up last week's weathered out game.

# Over 3,000 runners coming to Green Hill Park for "Knights Crossing"

Green Hill Park in west Roanoke County will be the site of the annual Knights Crossing cross country event, conducted by Cave Spring High School. It's a full day of racing and one of the largest events of the entire season.

This year's Knights Crossing includes teams from 108 high schools, including Glenvar and Salem High Schools. Most of the schools are in Virginia but there are 15 teams coming from North Carolina, West Virginia, Tennessee, and Kentucky. There will also be over 60 middle schools represented.

"We are very excited about this year's invitational," said Cave Spring coach Tommy Maguire. "We have well over 3,000 runners entered to race. This will be our biggest Knights Crossing XC Invitational yet and one of the largest athletic events held in the Roanoke Valley this year."





This time, however, they were able to score when quarterback Eli Taylor threw a back-shoulder pass to Coen Logan and the Spartan junior out-maneuvered the defender for a touchdown reception with 4:26 remaining in the half.




Salem came out determined in the second half.

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
