

## Things to remember

- **Park hours** – 6:30 a.m. to dusk  
April 1 to Sept. 30.
- **Winter schedule** – 8 a.m. to dusk Oct. 1 to March 31. Sno-Park permit required from Dec. 1 through March 31. Although most parks are open year round, some parks or portions of parks are closed during the winter. For a winter schedule and information about seasonal closures, visit [www.parks.state.wa.us](http://www.parks.state.wa.us) or call the information center at (360) 902-8844.
- Wildlife, plants and all park buildings, signs, tables and other structures are protected; removal or damage of any kind is prohibited. Hunting, feeding of wildlife and gathering firewood on state park property is prohibited.
- One camping party is allowed per site. Maximum of eight people per campsite.
- Campsites may not be held for other parties.
- Camping check-in time is 2:30 p.m., and check-out time is 1 p.m.
- Extra vehicle overnight - \$10 per night in designated area for each vehicle in excess of the one allowed per site. Does not apply to vehicle towed by a recreational vehicle.
- Pets must be on leash and under physical control at all times. This includes trail areas and campsites. Pet owners must clean up after pets on all state park lands.
- Quiet hours are 10 p.m. to 6:30 a.m.
- Engine-driven electric generators may be operated only between the hours of 8 a.m. and 9 p.m.

The **Discover Pass** is required for day visits to state parks and access to other state-managed recreation lands. The pass provides access to millions of acres of parks, wildlife areas, trails, natural areas and water-access sites. The annual pass is transferable between two vehicles.

- Annual pass: \$30 • One-day pass: \$10 (transaction and dealer fees may apply)

# Welcome to Lake Easton!

Lake Easton State Park is a popular, forested camping park in the Cascade Mountain foothills of Central Washington. Travelers from both sides of the mountains in Washington enjoy the park year round.

In the summer, campers and day visitors enjoy boating, fishing and swimming (no lifeguards available) on Lake Easton, as well as bird watching and wildlife viewing on the lake and the adjacent Yakima River. The park has six miles of hiking trails and also lies adjacent to the long-distance "rails-to-trails" feature known as the John Wayne Pioneer Trail, where recreationists can enjoy hiking, bicycling and horseback riding. Winter brings plenty of opportunities for cross-country skiing, snowshoeing and snowmobiling.

The 516-acre park's location just off Interstate 90, 15 miles west of Cle Elum, makes it an easy stop and meeting place for travelers and weekend picnickers.

Nearby attractions include the historic South Cle Elum Historic Railyard. The Railyard has museum interpretive displays and a trail, adjacent to the John Wayne Pioneer Trail. The park also offers interpretive and Junior Ranger activities in the park amphitheater during the summer season. Check park office for program information.

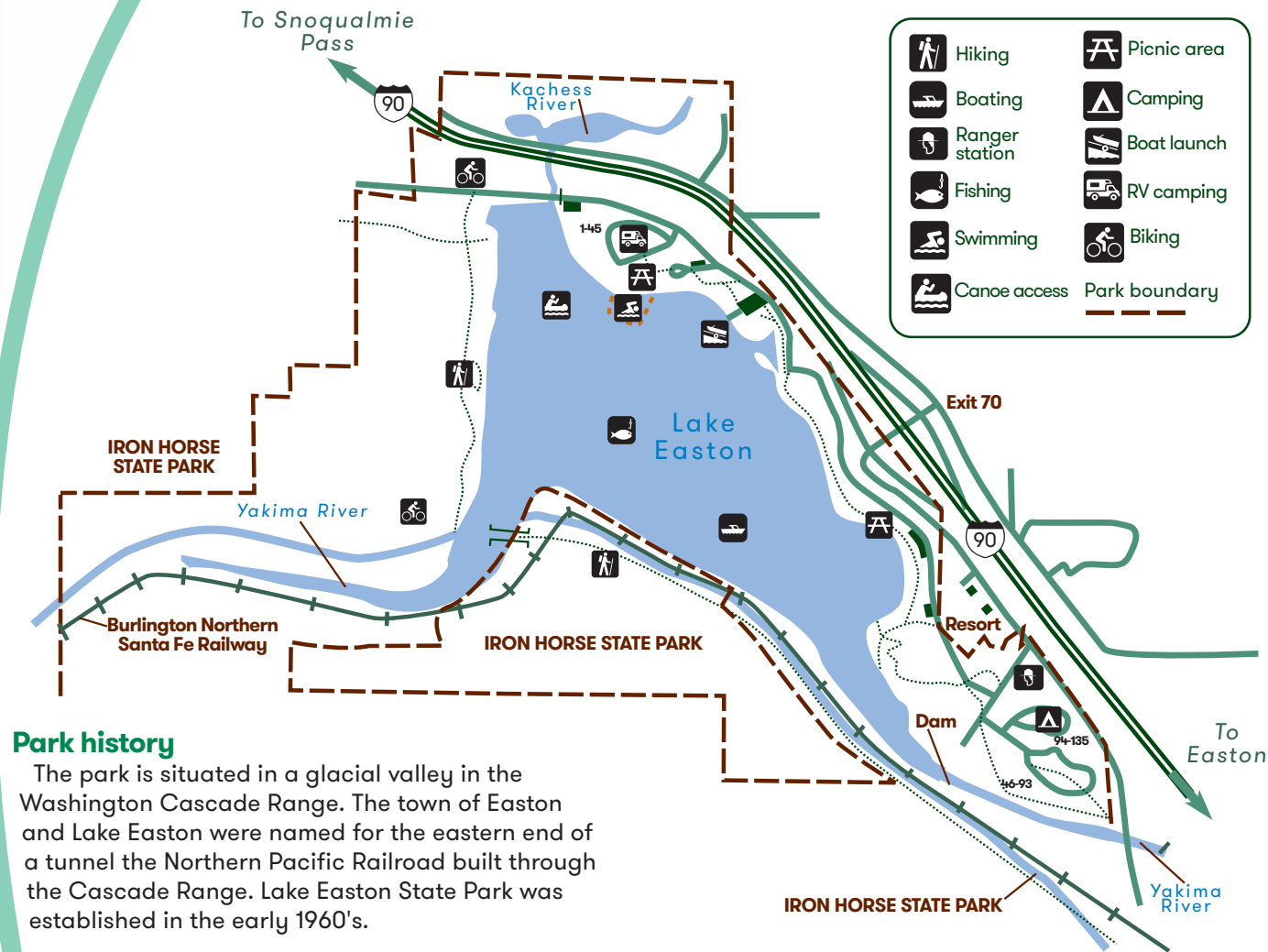
## Overnight accommodations

The park has 90 standard (tent) campsites, two hiker/biker sites and 45 full-utility RV sites with water, electricity and sewer service. There are four restrooms (three are accessible to people with disabilities) and four showers (two are accessible to people with disabilities).

Camping is in a wooded setting, with most tent sites near the Yakima River and most RV spaces near Lake Easton. The park accommodates RVs up to 60 feet in selected sites, and some sites will accommodate tipouts.

The park has a "walk-in/tent-only" group camp that accommodates up to 50 guests. The site includes a fire pit, benches, water, restrooms and parking nearby. Fees vary with the size of the group.

## Park history

The park is situated in a glacial valley in the Washington Cascade Range. The town of Easton and Lake Easton were named for the eastern end of a tunnel the Northern Pacific Railroad built through the Cascade Range. Lake Easton State Park was established in the early 1960's.

## Park amenities and facilities

The park has a watercraft launch and 20 feet of dock. Lake Easton is shallow and has stumps near the water's surface. Boat motors are limited to 10 horsepower. Other park amenities include:

- Picnic area in a wooded setting, with grills and fire pits
- 40 unsheltered picnic tables, available first come, first served
- Play structure
- Horseshoe pit and basketball court
- Modern restrooms with hot showers
- Trailer dump station
