
Things to remember:

- The ELC is open March 15 through Oct. 15.
- Reservations may be made up to one year in advance.
- Each group must identify a full-time camp director who will be responsible for activities.
- Health permits must be displayed. All health standards established by the Washington State Department of Social and Health Services must be observed.
- The ELC cannot serve more than its capacity.
- Check-in time is 1 p.m., check-out is noon.
- Each group must be checked in and out by park staff. Groups are responsible for all damage beyond normal wear and tear and must clean all facilities at the end of their stay. Groups will be charged accordingly for damages and for not cleaning the facilities.
- Pets and fireworks are not permitted in the ELC.
- An initial deposit is required at the time the ELC is reserved. Groups will be billed the balance of the fee after park staff has inspected the buildings for damages and appropriate cleaning. School groups and some government-sponsored groups may use purchase orders for remitting payment.
- Complete rules and regulations are available at the ELC and can be requested at the time of the reservation.



Driving Directions to Camp Wooten ELC



Camp Wooten is located 30 miles southeast of Dayton and 20 miles southwest of Pomeroy in the Blue Mountains.

From the east (Pomeroy): Drive on Tatman Mount Road south for two miles. Stay right at the fork, road turns into Linville Gulch Road. Drive eight miles to the end of the asphalt road and then two mile miles on the gravel road. Turn left on Tucannan River Road, and drive nine miles. The entrance to Tucannon Campground and Camp Wooten is on the left.

From the west (Dayton): Drive south on Patit Road for 12 miles. Take a left at the "T" in the road, and drive for one mile. Stay right at the fork, and drive approximately six miles. Turn right on Tucannon Road, and drive about 12 miles to the end of the asphalt road. The entrance to Tucannon Campground and Camp Wooten is on the left.

CAMP WOOTEN

ENVIRONMENTAL LEARNING CENTER







amp Wooten Environmental Learning
Center (ELC) lies in the heart of Washington
state's Blue Mountains. Camp Wooten was
originally a Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) site
called Camp Tucannon. Some of the original 1930s-era
CCC buildings remain today, such as the mess hall.
Washington State Parks, with help from the Camp
Wooten Association, developed the site over the years,
and now Camp Wooten is the largest environmental
learning center in eastern Washington. The ELC is
available for group use only.

Camp Wooten ELC accommodates 240 overnight guests. The housing facilities accommodate 205 guests, and additional space is available for guests tent or RV camping. The mess hall comfortably fits 240 guests and features modern appliances, a walk-in cooler, refrigerators and freezers. Separate cabins are available for cooks, administrators and nursing staff. Restrooms and state-of-the-art shower facilities complete the overnight accommodations.

Visitors can enjoy a variety of activities at Camp Wooten, including swimming, hiking, biking, wildlife watching, fishing or simply relaxing. The ELC features a heated, indoor swimming pool that slopes in depth from three to 10 feet deep. Groups must provide their own certified lifeguard, and a schedule of pool usage must be sent to the camp in advance. An interpretive display of wild animals and several nature trails are available for visitors to study wildlife. A recreation hall is available for group classes, services, training or meetings. An outdoor campfire area includes seating a stage for plays and skits. Other amenities at the park include:

- Covered archery range (requires permit from park ranger)
- Multi-purpose paved court for tennis, basketball and other sports
- Softball field
- Canoes with life jackets at Donnie Lake
