Thank you to all who supported state parks this last year!

This letter is an annual report to share all the great things that happened in 2024 along with a financial report and balance sheet for fiscal years 2023 and 2024.

**Your support in the last year made an incredible difference for Washington's state parks. Thanks to your generosity, state parks were restored, repaired and made ready for visitors just like you.**

As parks faced increasing human use and more severe weather, *you* helped to ensure that these special places remained healthy and accessible for everyone.

This wouldn't have been possible without you!

I can't thank you enough for how you've helped state parks. Your gift, pooled with others, made it possible to complete projects at more than 20 parks with more than 20 still in progress. Here's just a brief snapshot of what you made possible:


- **Improved Facilities:** A new playground was completed at Deception Pass State Park, campsites at Ike Kinswa State Park were revitalized, picnic shelters improved at Riverside State Park and restroom facilities at Cape Disappointment State Park received much-needed upgrades.
- **Increased Public Programming:** Interpretive interns led ranger programs at the Mt. St. Helens Visitor Center, an amphitheater restoration was completed to enhance public programming at Lewis and Clark State Park, and the Arts in the Parks initiative provided creative programming to visitors at parks across the state.

- **Expanded Accessibility:** An adaptive swing set at Sacajawea State Park was constructed, making play areas more inclusive for more visitors. You helped fund a trail guide for individuals with disabilities and provided matching funds for a Track Chair at Lake Sammamish State Park.
- **Enhanced Boating Recreation:** Your gift helped add a new kayak access ramp at Jarrell Cove State Park and upgraded pumpout stations serving a number of Puget Sound parks. These efforts are improving the environment and helping more people safely get out on the water.
- **Protected Habitats and Wildlife:** Thanks to you, Steamboat Rock State Park received crucial tree restoration to support native wildlife and ecosystems. And a wildlife study at multiple state parks was conducted to make sure wildlife are better protected.
- **Fostered Sustainability:** Because of you, the Retreat Center at Sun Lakes State Park's Camp Delany now features energy-efficient LED lighting. Potholes State Park received a water bottle filling station to help visitors combat warmer summer weather.

These are just a few examples of the amazing work you helped with. Thank you!

Washington's parks will continue to face big challenges in 2025, but they do have one big advantage... They have you on their side to ensure their beauty and resilience lives on!

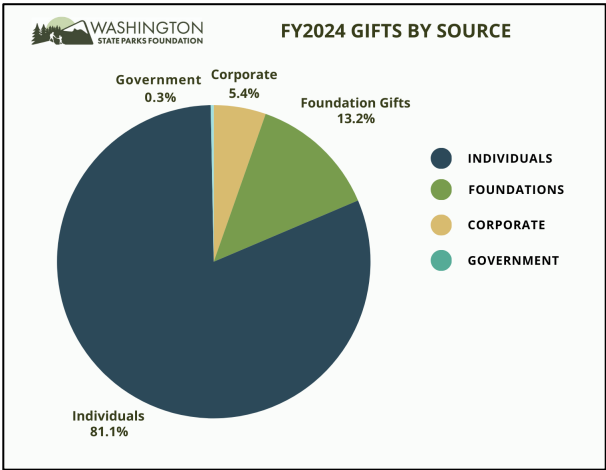
*Your support enabled more ranger programs to be hosted at Washington State Parks.*

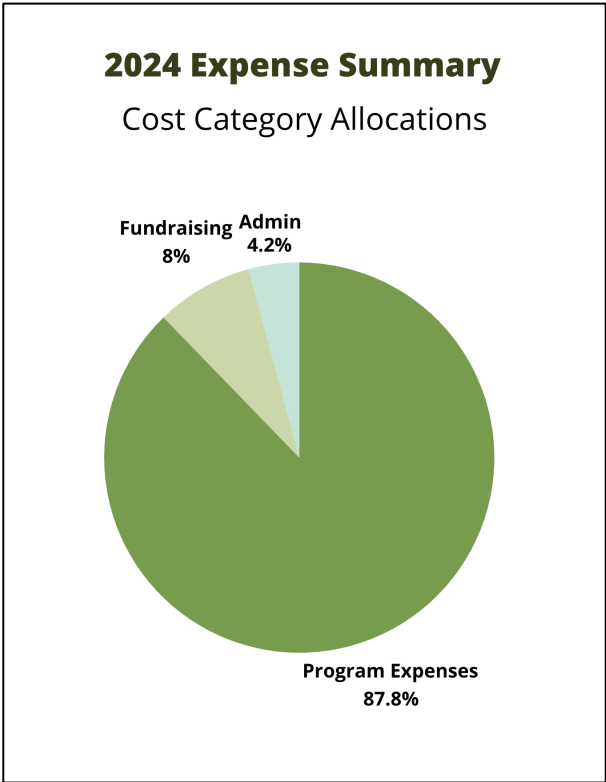
*Your support helped to install many new bridges like this one at Moran State Park to make trails safer and more enjoyable.*
