### Things to remember

- Park hours April 1 to Sept. 30, 6:30 a.m. to dusk.
- Winter schedule Oct. 1 to March 31, 8 a.m. to dusk. Although most parks are open year round, some parks or portions of parks are closed during the winter. For a winter schedule and information about seasonal closures, visit www.parks.state.wa.us or call the information center at (360) 902-8844.
- Wildlife, plants and all park buildings, signs, tables and other structures are protected; removal or damage of any kind is prohibited. Hunting, feeding of wildlife and gathering firewood on state park property is prohibited.
- One camping party is allowed per site. Maximum of eight people per campsite.
- Campsites may not be held for other parties.
- Camping check-in time is 2:30 p.m., and check-out time is 1 p.m.
- Extra vehicle overnight \$10 per night in designated area for each vehicle in excess of the one allowed per site. Does not apply to vehicle towed by a recreational vehicle.
- Pets must be on leash and under physical control at all times. This includes trail areas and camp sites. Pet owners must clean up after pets on all state park lands.
- Quiet hours are 10 p.m. to 6:30 a.m.
- Engine-driven electric generators may be operated only between the hours of 8 a.m. and 9 p.m.

The Discover Pass is required for day visits to state parks and access to other state-managed recreation lands. The pass provides access to millions of acres of parks, wildlife areas, trails, natural areas and water-access sites. The annual pass is transferable between two vehicles. Annual pass: \$30
One-day pass: \$10 (transaction and dealer fees may apply)

## Welcome to Brooks Memorial


Brooks Memorial State Park is situated in a forested region between the barren hills of the south Yakima Valley and the ponderosa pine forests of the Simcoe Mountains. The park provides a variety of natural environments for visitors to enjoy.

This 700-acre, camping park features hiking, biking and equestrian trails along the Little Klickitat River and up through ponderosa pine and Oregon oak forests. At the top are open mountain meadows with a panoramic view of Mount Hood. In the winter, cross-country skiing, snowshoeing and playing in the snow are very popular activities. Visitors may see deer, beaver dams, squirrels and a variety of orchids and birds.

The park also offers a variety of recreational activities, including bird watching, horseback riding, mountain biking and wildlife viewing. Nature talks are offered at the Environmental Learning Center (ELC) upon request. Tours and programs may be arranged through park rangers. Please call the park at

(509) 773-4611 for more information.

Activities available nearby include stargazing at the Goldendale Observatory, visiting the Maryhill Museum, viewing the replica of Stonehenge on State Route 14 and driving the historic Columbia River Highway in nearby Oregon. The Satus Pass property, 5 miles from the park, features 180 acres for hiking and sledding.



### **Overnight accommodations**

The park offers several options for overnight stays. There are 22 standard campsites and 23 utility sites that accommodate RVs up to 60 feet long. Nestled in a forested mountain setting, an ELC is available for rent by groups with up to 72 guests. The ELC features seven cabins (each sleeps 10), a comfortable log lodge with fireplace and beds for two guests, a fully equipped kitchen, meeting room/ dining area. Restrooms and showers are nearby. To reserve the ELC, please call (800) 360-4240 or (360) 902-8600.

The park also provides a group camp that accommodates a maximum of six RVs and 20 to 50 people. The camp has a fire ring, picnic tables, two vault toilets, water and volleyball net. The camp is open year round with limited facilities in winter. Fees vary with size of the group. To reserve the group camp, call the park office
