INTERSTATE 526 (I-526) FROM PAUL CANTRELL BOULEVARD TO VIRGINIA AVENUE NORTH CHARLESTON AND CHARLESTON, SOUTH CAROLINA

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1.0 WHAT IS ENVIRONMENTAL JUSTICE?

Environmental Justice (EJ) is the fair treatment and meaningful involvement of all people regardless of race, color, national origin, or income with respect to the development, implementation and enforcement of environmental laws, regulations and policies.

Fair-treatment means that no group of people should bear a disproportionate share of the negative environmental consequences resulting from industrial, governmental and commercial operations or policies.

Meaningful involvement is created when decision-makers seek out and facilitate the involvement of potentially affected communities so they can participate in the process, help identify community concerns, and influence decisions about activities that may affect their environment and health.





Figure 1.1: US Department of Transportation Environmental Justice Process

The South Carolina Department of Transportation (SCDOT) is committed to providing a safe and reliable transportation network while balancing impacts to the natural and human environment. As part of the project development process for the I-526 Lowcountry Corridor WEST (I-526 LCC WEST), the agency will incorporate EJ considerations into the evaluation of the project scope and alternatives. SCDOT's goal is to actively engage the community in the project planning and decision-making processes in order to prevent any community from bearing a disproportionate burden as a result of the project. **Figure 1.1** below presents steps in the Environmental Justice Process to ensure fair treatment and meaningful involvement with regard to transportation projects.

2.0 WHAT IS A POP-UP MEETING?

A pop-up meeting is a mobile booth set up in various locations to engage residents who frequent the area. They can be held at any time of the day thereby allowing hosts to target busier periods, such as evening or weekend timeframes, to increase local participation and overall facetime in the community. Several additional benefits of pop-up events are identified in graphic below.




Figure 2.1: Map depicting the location of each I-526 LCC WEST Pop-Up Meeting

Engaging the community and providing access to the project team are not only important tenets of public involvement but are integral components of the Environmental Justice Outreach Strategy developed for the I-526 LCC WEST Project. Pop-up meetings present a unique opportunity to interact with residents and business owners within and near the EJ communities identified as potentially impacted by the project: Ferndale, Liberty Park, Russelldale, and Highland Terrace. Selection criteria for each pop-up meeting host site included proximity to the EJ communities, accessibility to foot and vehicle traffic, and personnel and citizen safety (see **Figure 2.1**). Informational flyers (English and Spanish), current newsletters (English and Spanish), and business cards including project contact resources were distributed (**see Appendix B**). Community members were encouraged to sign up for project updates by providing their name and best preferred method of contact (email and/or postal mailing addresses). The project team also encouraged all with which they interacted to share the project information with a neighbor or friend. Simple details about each pop-up meeting are highlighted in **Table 2.1** with a greater description for each event starting on page 6.

2.1 POP-UP MEETING OBJECTIVES

While future pop-up meetings may be an alternative method of distributing information to anyone unable to attend formal meetings, the objectives of the initial round of I-526 LCC WEST EJ Community-focused pop-up meetings include:

- **Promoting** project awareness
- **Sharing** official information about the project development process (including signing residents up for the project email list for future information distribution)
- Providing access to information that is available electronically
- Encouraging attendance at upcoming Community Drop-Ins
- **Soliciting** feedback about the project's potential impacts to individuals as well as to the community at large
- **Gathering** suggestions on preferred mitigation options

The I-526 LCC WEST Public Information Meeting (PIM) was scheduled for November 21, 2019. SCDOT favored sharing the potential impacts of the project with the communities who might bear those impacts FIRST before bringing it to the community-at-large. Consequently, five Community Drop-ins were also scheduled prior to the PIM. In an effort to increase project awareness as well as notify provide notice of the upcoming meeting opportunities, the project team aimed to schedule and host as many weekly pop-up meeting opportunities as possible prior to the Community Drop-ins and PIM. Ultimately, 12 pop-up meetings were successfully held.

2.2 AUDIENCE

The locations of the pop-up meetings were strategically planned to provide additional outreach in areas throughout the potentially impacted communities. Attendees included those members of the public using or driving by nearby facilities or businesses where the pop-up meetings were held. To ensure that the Spanish-speaking communities were adequately reached, translated documents were also made available.

2.3 SAFETY AND SECURITY

The project team followed a safety protocol by reviewing a *Safety and Security Plan* for each meeting. See Appendix A for a blank version of this form. To encourage safe working conditions, each pop-up meeting was attended by minimum of three members of the project team.

3.0 I-526 LCC WEST POP-UP MEETINGS

3.1 CHARLESTON CARIBBEAN JERK FESTIVAL (JULY 20, 2019)

The project team set up a pop-up meeting at the Charleston Caribbean Jerk Festival on July 20th from 6:00pm to 11:00pm. Located at the Riverfront Park (1061 Everglades Avenue), this popular festival celebrates Jamaican food, culture and music. Although not located within the EJ neighborhoods, the large

crowds drawn to this festival made it an ideal place to distribute project information. The project team estimates that approximately 5,000 people attended the festival and nearly 50 people actively engaged with the booth staff by asking questions, taking an informational handout or signing up for project updates (4 contacts added). A key takeaway from this event was the public's overall confusion between a closely related project (Mark Clark Extension) and the I-526 LCC WEST project. It was also noted that booths associated with food or giveaways were better attended than those with informational handouts only. The project team would recommend attending this event in 2020 and sharing, at a minimum, information about mitigation in the EJ communities.

3.2 HARVEST POINTE CHURCH COMMUNITY YARD SALE (AUGUST 17, 2019)

The project team set up a pop-up meeting at a yard sale event in the parking lot of Harvest Pointe Church (4870 Piedmont Avenue) on August 17th from 7:00am to 11:15am. The original end time was set for 12:00pm, but weather resulted in the event ending early. In addition to members of the church, several community residents walked to the Community Yard Sale from their homes in the Ferndale neighborhood. Most of those who visited from the surrounding community were Hispanic with limited English proficiency. This experience emphasized the need for Spanish translation services at the larger community meeting in Ferndale. This event was a great opportunity to interact with approximately 50 people, mostly residents of the neighborhood, by answering questions, providing the most recent project newsletter, and signing attendees up for project updates (3 contacts added).

3.3 PPG PAINT STORE (SEPTEMBER 15, 2019)

The project team hosted a pop-up meeting in the parking lot of the PPG Paint Store (5280 Rivers Avenue) from 12:00pm to 5:00pm on Sunday, September 15th. This location was ideal because of its proximity to

the four EJ communities. The project tent was a great way to capture the attention of travelers on Rivers Avenue, particularly those exiting from I-526 West. Local residents and patrons of the nearby stores visited the tent by foot and by car. The overall sentiment expressed was anxiety regarding the potential displacements and community impacts. The project team estimates that approximately 15 people actively engaged with the booth staff by asking questions, taking an informational handout or signing up for project updates (6 contacts added).

3.4 NORTH CHARLESTON HIGH SCHOOL FOOTBALL GAME (SEPTEMBER 20, 2019)

Although highly anticipated as a successful night of engagement, the pop-up meeting at the North Charleston High School football game (2731 Gordon Street) on September 20th did not result in significant interaction with residents of the potentially impacted EJ communities. Consequently, a second pop-up meeting scheduled for a football game later in the season was canceled.

Located at the Garrett Academy of Technology, in the Hibbie Ayoub Stadium, the project team was stationed close to the ticket booth with full exposure to a large amount of people. Unfortunately, however, engagement was still low. From 7:30pm to 9:30pm, the project team spoke with two people and noted that a giveaway may be useful in the future to spark curiosity about the project handouts.

3.5 BETHEL PENTECOSTAL HOLINESS (SEPTEMBER 22, 2019)

Members of the project team attended Sunday Worship Service at Bethel Pentecostal Holiness Church (2331 Elder Avenue) on September 22nd to inform the congregation about the upcoming community drop-

ins and answer questions about potential project impacts. City of North Charleston District 6 Councilwoman Dorothy Williams, as well as members of the surrounding Liberty Park and Highland Terrace communities, also attended the end of service conversation to receive project information. Overall, members of the community were most concerned about the potential relocations, loss of property, community impacts, project schedule and sources of misinformation. Approximately 50 people actively engaged by asking questions, taking an informational handout or signing up for project updates (2 contacts added). Residents expressed their appreciation for the opportunity to interact with the project team and ask questions designed to validate the accuracy of

information being shared by local activists campaigning for elected positions.

3.6 BIBLICAL HOUSE OF GOD (SEPTEMBER 28, 2019)

The project team held a pop-up meeting in front of the Biblical House of God (2205 Van Buren Avenue) on September 28th from 11:00am to 2:00pm. In addition to promoting project awareness, the project team gathered information from residents and encouraged attendance at the future Community Drop-Ins and Public Information Meeting. Holding the meeting in the middle of the community (near Liberty Park and Russelldale) gave the project team the ability to reach people who were precisely in the potentially impacted communities. With the church's parking lot as a backdrop, the project team was afforded direct accessibility to those potentially impacted and more importantly "humanized" the project

team by presenting them in a less intimidating environment. As such, the sincere efforts to interact and inform the community were hopefully validated. Visitors shared descriptions of the community before I-526 was constructed and "before all the changes," referring to developments such as new hotels and restaurants. The project team gained greater perspective and understanding from longtime residents of the cohesion that once existed in the area. Many people did not think the improvements to the interstate would help the traffic issues and others noted that the interchanges at Rivers Avenue were horrible. One visitor

mentioned the possibility of implementing Multimodal Transit such as buses and rail systems. She once lived in the northeastern United States and thought that Charleston would benefit from more transit options. Overall, 15 people actively engaged with the staff at the pop-up meeting with 16 signing up for project updates.

3.7 RUSSELLDALE COMMUNITY CENTER (OCTOBER 3, 2019)

Members of the project team held a pop-up meeting at the Russelldale Community Center (2248 Russelldale Avenue) on October 3rd from 2:30pm to 5:00pm. A primary goal of this meeting was to interact with Russelldale residents and the parents whose children attended the community center's after school program. The project team encouraged attendance at upcoming meetings and gathered information about the concerns and needs of those that frequent the Russelldale community. Approximately 10 people actively participated in the meeting by asking questions, taking an informational handout or signing up for project updates (3 contacts added). While only having interacted with 10 people, the project team was able to gauge residents' concerns and needs from those that participated.

A key takeaway from this pop-up meeting was the amount of misinformation being distributed from

different members of the community regarding this project. The project team was advised that other people/organizations had hosted meetings, and some became frustrated when asked to leave when they shared information received from the project team. The project team also noted that an activity or treat would have been a nice addition so that the younger visitors to the booth remained entertained and engaged.

3.8 ROPER ST. FRANCIS CLINIC (OCTOBER 12, 2019)

The project team hosted a pop-up meeting in the front parking lot of the Roper St. Francis Clinic (5133 Rivers Avenue) on October 12th from 12:00pm to 5:00pm. Due to its proximity to the I-526/Rivers Avenue interchange and location near the Russelldale community, the project team anticipated significant attendance. Despite being visible and accessible, this location did not yield any vehicular traffic. The project team was able to briefly interact with three, gentlemen who either walked or cycled passed the booth but were less interested in the project and the potential impacts. The project team noted that the clinic being closed, and the high speed of traffic along Rivers Avenue, likely led to

the lack of participation from the passing traffic. The clinic did not share a parking lot with any other businesses, so there were no other patrons from which to pull. This meeting proved to be a great lesson learned regarding the criteria for choosing future locations.

3.9 HIGHLAND TERRACE-LIBERTY PARK COMMUNITY CENTER (OCTOBER 24, 2019)

Highland Terrace-Liberty Park Community Center hosted a pop-up meeting on October 24th from 2:30pm to 5:30pm. Similar to the meeting at the Russelldale Community Center, the project team hoped to engage residents in the Highland Terrace and Liberty Park communities as well as those parents who utilize the

community center's after school care program. One objective was to encourage attendance at the Community Drop-Ins, with the first event scheduled for less than 1½ weeks from that day. Fewer than 10 individuals visited the booth. They asked questions about the project schedule and potential community impacts. The project information handout was provided, and three (3) individuals signed up for project updates. Although this event was set to focus on a specific (after-school) audience, the project team felt it could have been more effective if the time was adjusted to start around 4:00pm to accommodate those that work past 5:00pm.

3.10 NORTH CHARLESTON CREATIVE ARTS ELEMENTARY SCHOOL (OCTOBER 29, 2019)

The project team hosted a pop-up booth as a part of the North Charleston Creative Arts Elementary School's Career and Wellness Family Vision Night. Holiday candy and manipulatives like slime, a working traffic signal, and toy cars attracted and engaged the kids while parents received the I-526 LCC WEST project-related information. Approximately 15 families living within the potentially impacted communities were reached with many more families expressing an interest in the project. Additionally, flyers were provided to vendors and small business owners in attendance who work and/or live in the potentially impacted communities. Feedback from participants centered around concerns about right-of-way impacts to homes and the length of the project schedule. Overall, this was a successful pop-up meeting because of the high-touch techniques employed and attentive audience.

3.11 FERNDALE COMMUNITY CENTER (OCTOBER 31, 2019)

The project team held a pop-up meeting at the Ferndale Community Center (1995 Bolton Street) on Thursday, October 31st from 2:30pm to 5:30pm. Similar to the meetings held at the Russelldale and Highland Terrace-Liberty Park Community Centers, the project team hoped to engage parents of children participating in the center's afterschool program who might also be residents of the surrounding communities. The concerns expressed by the three (3) residents with which the project team was able to engage include the potential right-of-way impacts to homes and recreational facilities and the status of the project schedule. No one signed up to receive project updates. While attempted to engage passersby, many indicated that they retrieved the informational flyer from a brochure box at either a bus stop or a nearby business and that they were aware of the upcoming Community Drop-ins.

3.12 NORTH CHARLESTON CITY HALL (NOVEMBER 7, 2019)

Members of the project team hosted a pop-up meeting outside of the North Charleston City Hall (2500 City Hall Lane) to inform the public of the I-526 LCC WEST project and encourage attendance at both the community drop-ins and public information meeting in November. This meeting was held on Thursday, November 7th from 11:00am to 3:30pm. Largely successful in engagement, the project team estimates approximately 42 people actively participated in the event by asking questions and taking an informational handout. One (1) individual signed up to receive project updates. Residents were primarily concerned with the potential right-of-way impacts to homes, potential for to multimodal transit and status of the project schedule. The project team noted that the event went very well and reception from the public was overall positive.

4.0 POP-UP MEETING SURVEY

The project team asked those visiting the pop-up booth relevant questions to gain a better understanding of community needs. By engaging with residents in this fashion, important data could be collected to help shape the overall project mitigation plan. This was a precursor to the eventual Social Needs Assessment that was conducted at the Community Drop-Ins and the Public Information Meeting.

Provide an activity or treat for the kids that attend meetings to keep everyone entertained and engaged at meetings.


A giveaway for all ages may be useful to spark curiosity about the project.




Create smaller information sheets with essential information only (website and meeting dates). Many people did not want the whole booklet of information we provided.


Utilize visuals at the pop-up meetings to describe the project impacts in the impacted areas. Visitors are interested in details, not invitations.





I-526 Lowcountry Corridor WEST: Where We've Been

The 1-526 Lowcountry Corridor WEST (I-526 LCC WEST) will host a public information meeting on November 21, 2019 at the Charleston Area Convention Center. As we look ahead to this meeting in which alternatives will be presented to the public, we thought a look back at how we arrived at this point was important.

The 1-526 LCC WEST project was born out of a 2013 planning study—the 1-526 Lowcountry Corridor Analysis project. The purpose of this study was to evaluate potential approaches for improving traffic flow through the corridor. While this report included conceptual interchange and road widening alternatives, these were only evaluated from a traffic analysis standpoint.

Enter the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) process. In January 2016, the I-526 LCC WEST, initially called the 526 Lowcountry Corridor (Phase I), began the NEPA process to conduct an Environmental Assessment along existing I-526 between Paul Cantrell Boulevard in West Ashley to Rivers Avenue in North Charleston.

Shortly thereafter, the newsletter, website, and social media were launched, and the first round of community, stakeholder, and local business meetings were held (July, October 2016).

Key issues raised included congestion and safety. Additional analysis conducted during this time included: traffic studies; a survey for historic buildings and archeological sites; environmental studies; a hazardous materials study; and a topographical conditions study.

Following this initial level of analysis, the public was invited to participate in a virtual public meeting (October 2016.) During this time, several other local and regional planning efforts were underway, such as the I-26 Corridor Management Plan which includes consideration of managed lanes along I-526. Since these studies were in various stages of completion, the I-526 LCC WEST project's schedule was revised so the results of these transportation planning efforts could be part of the alternatives development and the NEPA documentation processes.

In the spring of 2018, the I-526 Lowcountry Corridor EAST project (formerly known as Phase II) was announced, extending along existing I-526, east from the Rivers Avenue interchange to US 17 in Mount Pleasant.

Initial studies showed severe congestion and safety concerns around the N. Rhett/ Virginia Avenue interchange resulting in revisions to both projects' limits to ensure the areas with the greatest challenges would be prioritized. 1-526 LCC WEST would now extend from Paul Cantrell Boulevard in West Ashley to Virginia Avenue in North Charleston (as opposed to Rivers Avenue), and the 1-526 LCC EAST project would pick up there instead. Additionally, the 1-526 LCC WEST project was elevated to an Environmental Impact Statement. The project purpose was refined: to increase capacity and improve operations at the 1-26/1-526 interchange and along the 1-526 mainline from Paul Cantrell Boulevard to Virginia Avenue.

The upcoming public information meeting will provide the results of this extensive work to date and ask for your feedback on the purpose and need, the roadway improvement concepts (draft reasonable alternatives), community impacts, and more.


