I hadn't had an animal in 6 years since my dog had passed, and I guess I just knew it was time for a pet again before I had even decided that it was time. She kept me sane, gave me the gift of connection in very unstable and uncertain times, and provided something for me to focus on instead of spiraling in my own mind. Without Art Gym being open and the inability to work from home, I decided to try exploring other artistic avenues. Life casting is what I am drawn to, and my life casting projects are a way for me to have a different voice than my traditional ways of expressing through jewelry. In this piece, I use a mask of my own face. It is a representation of the mask I've been wearing, not only during the pandemic, but also throughout the last few years of my life. As these times have been so unusually introspective, I've been slowly discovering how to unmask myself... getting to know the truth about who I am now, what I believe in, and how I want to move forward. Solstice has been a catalyst for the truth to be revealed as I've spent days, weeks, and months, rearranging the furniture of my mind through our chats, and reciprocal care. She has assisted me in all home projects, and is consistently covered in mold making material.
