As an art maker, the Covid Prayer Prints were done to relieve personal anxiety through the ritual of process. We have all been affected by Covid 19 -especially those within the epicenter and relatives living there. My heart is in a twist even though their concerns are for me, mine are for them. Across the country, interconnections of family and friends are angst ridden.

These " prayer " images combine multiple references: the stick like impressions are to Chi Chi sticks, a game of chance used in the USA in the earlier part of the 20th century and a direct descendant of Asian fortune augurs that used sticks inscribed with the writings from ancient books to discern possible outcomes. The oracle sticks both ancient and modern were selected at random - reflecting in that gesture, Fate. The second reference is to Buddhist prayer cards in the form of the golden papers chine colléd to the bottoms of the prints. These cards suggest the fragile requests for blessings, fluttering in the wind outside a temple and combined in my mind with the sticks, called by some, lottery poetry, seemed an apt metaphor for the hope that is surrounded in the unknown at this particular time.

These prints are collagraphic monoprints made from found vegetation around my studio utilizing multiple runs. The disturbance of ecological world systems are, on a very generalized scale, a possible instigator of this virus so using dried vegetation is a fitting tool to issue a prayer for the common well-being.

Bones, Rot & the Growth In Between is a sculptural exploration that uses inorganic elements to exhibit the process of decay and rebirth in a simulated forest ecosystem. Modern Western societies are far disconnected from the natural processes of death and rebirth that complete the cycle of life. Non-decaying plastics are emblematic of such disconnection, slowly disintegrating for millions of years but never going to rebirth. Depictions of plastic mushrooms, bugs, and other plant matter represent the liminal process of our own life cycle. The organisms work to break down decaving matter into nutrients used to grow new parts of the forest.



My multidisciplinary art practice uses transhistorical labor research to investigate relationships to material culture and the production systems that generate it. My primary interest is image making in quilting, which is explored through individual and group projects. This rich component of American folk art history is used to capture biographical information about my life and surroundings, which is inherently connected to identity, creative expression and storytelling in a nonhierarchical format. I contextualize relationship to object making through researching sites of ancient architecture and artifacts found in archeological discovery. Imagery in the reverse appliqué and quilted textile works look to forms and materials of these sites to animate long forgotten physical gestures of the people that built and inhabited them. Casting a reflection backwards plays with lineages of human expression through art and aims to compact a viewers notion of time. The accessibility and social aspect of quilting is evident through its culture of open source pattern and skill sharing practices. These ideas are explored in my social practice work that provides free lectures. workshops and public conversations on the topic which result in collectively made public art quilts. These works provide a comparative study of different forms of indigenous textiles and archive a visual symbol index that is representative of the identities and people that contributed to it.

I would change this chorus line from a famous 70s song by prominent Soviet musician Visotsky to "Better than mountains can be only mountains, which you haven't worn yet". I made mountain-shaped hats, forever celebrating the wisdom and permanence of nature around us.

My name is Margarita Rozenberg, I am a multidisciplinary artist and I moved to Colorado from Russia in February 2020. When the pandemic happened, I found myself locked down in Lakewood, Colorado, surrounded by mountains, having nowhere in particular to go, nothing to run for, just to witness the Green Mountains, listen to its tales and let the mountain ground me. I started making hand-felted woolen mountain-shaped hats. I learned this ancient technique in my hometown Syzran from the local craftswomen and mastered it even more while working on the mountain hats. When I look at the hats I made, I see the Green Mountain I know but through the prism of fairy world where I would often fall and hang in for a bit while working on the project. I used wool and needle to shape the mountain outlines and color them bright but I would still call this process "painting" and the product "landscape". Technically speaking, it's a wearable art project.

I present one model from the Mountain Mama hat series, called "When the sun rises". All pictures were taken by my husband Joseph Horejs.

Aaron Storm

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As Susan Sontag wrote in her seminal essay Illness as Metaphor, " Illness is the night-side of life, a more onerous citizenship. Everyone who is born holds dual citizenship, in the kingdom of the well and in the kingdom of the sick." In a new body of image based photographic work, Dual Citizenship , artist Aaron Storm explores this onerous moment of night life. As quarantine practices shift and recontextualize many aspects of the well known and once comfortable aspects of life. the artist utilizes composite, dual self portraiture in addition to theories of dance and performance to examine the ways bodies interact with domestic confinement, as well as the ways in which this systemic confinement lays bare the oft erotic dualities of the self. As the figures interact with a strangely lit, alternatively colored, nocturnal world, they beg the questions: What has changed? What are the rules of this new world? How are we, as a collective, to behave as citizens of the Kingdom of the Sick?

I am thankful that my family is still doing well, but because the pandemic is still ongoing at this time I am still afraid. I feel so deeply for those who have been affected by it. The majority of COVID-19 deaths in our county have been in nursing homes. People are continuing to die without the company of their loved ones. This breaks my heart and I know I'm not the only one experiencing these feelings. This work is about the fear and anxiety I know many of us are dealing with at this time.

By using a flame to melt the emulsion on my family photographs, symbolizing how their immune systems have been affected by smoking and overconsumption, I am creating a more tactile surface for the alum crystals to grow and spread, similar to the way in which the virus resides in the respiratory system and grows within the body.

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In this series of paintings I have attempted to move beyond a literal depiction of landscape into a more abstract expression of the natural environment. emphasizing movement and energy through the use of color, line and form. I begin each piece with a digital sketch, layering transparent shapes that mimic simplistic clouds. hills and valleys or ocean waves. Lines that emanate from and slice through the central body animate the scene. Rhythmic repetitions of swelling shapes, like a visual representation of music, at times advance right off the pictorial edge, suggesting a continuation of form beyond what is visible; the sharp shapes, a counterpoint to the flowing undulations of the rest of the composition. I choose color gradually and intentionally, using contrasting values and gradients to reference generalized light and shadow, and imply depth with illusions of transparency. A final figure emerges; an abstract representation of the resilient energy contained in a body of water or earth. Hovering in an atmosphere of radiant light, it pliably harmonizes with the vigorous forces imposed upon it by its surrounding environment
