

Hello neighbors. I am excited to report that, at Tuesday's meeting, the Council passed a resolution reinstituting the Mayor's Wellness Campaign. With support of the Green Team, we are again going to collaborate with the Mayor to focus on our community's total wellness. Keep an eye out for events towards this effort. Speaking of the Green Team, please send a huge virtual shout out to the Green Team and, especially, Julia Siegel, for compiling and completing the first round of Rutherford's Sustainable New Jersey submission. This effort was herculean and could not have been achieved without Julia's hard work and collaboration with our borough employees. Sustainable New Jersey really opens up so many grant opportunities for our beloved borough and our participation is important.

Thank you to Chris Seidler and the entirety of DPW for successfully navigating us through our first (only?) snow of the season. Your hard work does not go unnoticed. This week we closed out Black History Month. While the month itself is important, I want to encourage all of our residents to celebrate and recognize Black History throughout the year. Through collaboration with the Rutherford Civil Rights Commission, we can help you find ways to do so. For example, The History Makers (thehistorymakers.org) is a digital repository for the Black experience. It is a non-profit committed to preserving and making widely accessible the untold personal stories of both well-known and unsung African Americans. We must continue to educate ourselves about the contributions of people of color to American History. Please reach out if you are interested in learning more about these opportunities and resources. On Tuesday, February 28th, I presented my research and logic for an amendment to our current Cannabis ordinance in order to allow for Class 5 (Retail) & Class 6 (Delivery) state-licensed entities to operate within our designated "Cannabis Zone". For those who have yet to watch the meeting's recording, the <u>presentation</u> and <u>video</u> are available on the Borough's home page under "<u>Special Presentations</u>."

The highlights and facts from the presentation are as follows:

First and foremost, The Borough of Rutherford needs new revenue streams. We can not continue to sustain this incredible community on taxes and development alone. The Retail Cannabis industry is one of the fastest growing businesses in the state and has already contributed to our friends and neighbors such as Rochelle Park, Montclair and more. (See presentation for case studies and data)

Second, the ordinance as written restricts all Cannabis licenses (Class 1-6) to properties East of Rte. 17. (see map included with ordinance and presentation beginning page 9 of the 2/28 agenda packet)

Finally, the baseline revenue opportunity, based on national statistics, is \$100,000 for our zip code ALONE. Rochelle Park, whose population is less than 1/3 of Rutherford's, currently collects roughly \$1million in municipal taxes from Cannabis-based businesses.

There is obviously more nuance and context to the information provided within the presentation which is why the Mayor, Borough Administrator and I have decided to push the ordinance's second read out 30 days. This will allow us time to put together a special community hearing and/or allow for a cup of coffee with anyone who wants to learn more.

I would like to thank my council colleagues for their open minds and countless discussions. I specifically would like to thank Councilwoman Delrey-Cone for going above and beyond in her due diligence and Councilman Ray Guzman for his meticulous research. I also thank Councilwoman Quatrone for her unwavering support. (Council President McGowan and Councilwoman Begg-Roberson were absent from the meeting and not present to vote. I know all my colleagues spend countless hours thinking about all matters that impact Rutherford.)

I would also like to thank the Mayor & Borough Administrator for their support over the last 2 years as well as Borough Attorney, Robert Ferraro, for his diligence and attention to detail as we crafted this important piece of Rutherford's future.
