

Rutherford's First Black Councilman

Councilman Sisco hailed from a long line of Rutherfordians who have called this area home for 300 years. Tragically, Councilman Sisco's life was cut short by a heart attack at the young age of 49 in 1980. His impact, however, lives on through his numerous contributions to our borough. His wife, Sandy, also an esteemed member of our community and a teacher at Pierrepont School, continues to reside in Rutherford with her family.

Over the next few months, we will work diligently with his family to ensure that Councilman Sisco's story is told, preserving his memory for generations to come. I would like to express my heartfelt appreciation to Councilman Sisco's family for their collaboration in ensuring his story is acknowledged and shared appropriately.

Please stay tuned for further updates regarding the plans to honor Councilman Sisco. Together, we will create a tribute that reflects the depth of his impact and commemorates his service to our borough.

This week the Council voted to support a Redevelopment Agreement and PILOT for the Williams Center.

The Williams Center project is near and dear to my heart. Generations of my family have visited the Center and Rivoli Theater. Before I ran for office, I was involved in a community movement to save the theater from auction. I truly believe that preservation and transformation of the Williams Center historic theater and cinemas is vital for this town's future health and prosperity.

I believe we should be very careful and transparent in how we evaluate whether a redevelopment project requires a PILOT, as not all projects merit one. I do believe a PILOT makes sense in this case. The owner of the Williams Center has already invested a lot in a very ambitious, expensive, challenging and high risk project. The PILOT program is intended to help ensure the success of redevelopment projects that can benefit and improve the community, as the Williams Center certainly can do in Rutherford.

If the Williams Center succeeds, we all do. The Newman Theater (formerly Rivoli) is a stunning and beautiful space. Creating a community art center around it highlighting high level creative performances and community collaboration in the center of downtown will do wonders for Rutherford.

But don't just take my word for it. The Williams Center has been show-casing many unique artistic acts and events for many months now. Each week they show art house movies in the Newman Theater. They regularly host musical groups, non-profit fundraisers, holiday-themed community parties, antique markets, game nights and much more. I urge everyone to come out and support the Center's offerings. The whole town needs to invest in this project for it to succeed.
