Rutherford FD: On Wednesday, September 1, Councilman Guzman and I responded to a call by Mayor Nunziato to participate in the response to Tropical Storm Ida. Over the course of almost 8-hours I witnessed our Borough's leaders quickly and conscientiously make rapid fire decisions to assist residents and neighbors alike. It was an impressive display of professionalism and know-how.

From the opening of the Kipp center for affected persons to dropping off the last stranded local at the Rutherford Marriott at 5am, I was in awe of the efficiency and dedication on display. I would like to commend those I saw in person and who operated in the dark to help Rutherford and her neighbors.

I thank Mike Tarrantino whose work began days earlier with storm updates and prediction models. His superior knowledge and experience shone like a beacon while juggling the multiple facets of life-saving protocols, information dissemination and basic human resources. Thank you. It was a pleasure to watch you work.

To Deputy Fire Chief Thomas Twist III who, in addition to his core responsibilities, made repeated trips between the water's rising edge and the Kipp command center to deliver information updates and next step advice: Thank you.

To Assistant Chiefs Moshe Stareshefsky and Tom Riser who stood before us physically exhausted providing a final update for the night at just after 4am: Thank you.

To Fire Inspector Paul Dansbach who while on the road lost his vehicle to rising flood waters and worked his way back to town to continue aid: Thank you.

To Police Chief John Russo who toggled between his exemplary emergency & team management skills and warm compassion for those stranded at the Kipp center: Thank you.

To Detective Russ Snyder who answered Chief Russo's call for more "boots on the ground" in the middle of the night: Thank you.

To the officer in the high-water vehicle (forgive me I was not able to get your name) delivering water-logged travelers, families and pets to the Kipp center: Thank you.

To Maura DiNicola of Felician University who answered her phone after midnight and provided a Felician bus to shuttle people from the river to the Kipp center: Thank you.

To all of the EMT's on duty that night who stepped up to execute on whatever was asked of them including shuttle bus driver, thank you.

To Communications Manager, Kim Bogosian for curating important messaging as it became available from the Kipp center and delivering in a timely fashion to minimize further issues: Thank you.

To everyone else on the job that night who I missed by name: thank you.

And finally, to all of our members of the DPW who stepped up to help our friends and neighbors with cleanup after working through the previous night: Thank you.

While most of us suffered some catastrophic material losses, I hope we can all find some solace in fact that we live in a place where men and women like this work tirelessly overnight to ensure that everyone who called for or was in need of help was able to watch the sunrise the next day.

It really does take a village and I could not be prouder to be a part of this one.
