

Ordinance 3528-20 (Agnew Amendment) - On Monday night, the Mayor and Council unanimously defeated the proposed amendments to the redevelopment plan for Agnew Place. I'd like to take this opportunity to thank our residents for their dedication to the community that WE ALL love. As your elected representatives, it is our job to explore every opportunity that comes before us to determine whether or not it would be best for the Borough, not only in the short term, but in the future as well. It is your job as residents monitor the items that are before the Mayor and Council, to engage us in civil discourse about these items, and for us to come to a collective decision about what is best for the Borough. We will not always agree, and that is perfectly natural and acceptable. Disagreement breeds compromise, and compromise, via civil discourse, is the best example of good government. Please note, although the amendments were defeated, a redevelopment plan approved for six stories and 140 units still remains in effect. We will continue to explore how best to move forward with this particular area of town. **Planning Board** - Met on 9/2.
