Class Objective: I was able to understand idioms on health it's meanings and their usage in sentences.

Concept A: What is the meaning of an Idiom?

Definition: An Idiom is a group of words whose meaning is not directly linked to those of the individual words. The meaning of the idiom is not the literal meaning of the words. They can be either a part of a sentence or a full-sentence and can be used independently.

Examples:

• Shop around- to go to different stores to compare prices.

The rewards of working hard by getting my hands dirty is truly immense.

• On the back foot : outmanoeuvred by a competitor or opponent

The team was immediately on the back foot with 2 wickets falling in the first over.

Get down to business	Talking seriously about actual work	We need to get down to business and increase sales.
From day one	Since inception	Peter has been hardworking and sincere from day one.
Learn the ropes	Learn the basics	Priya has to still learn the ropes of this job.
Bring to the table	Something that benefits the company-skill, expertise	SHeela brings to the table her French language expertise
Get off the ground	start doing a job or project,	The perfume product line has to get off the ground next time.

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
