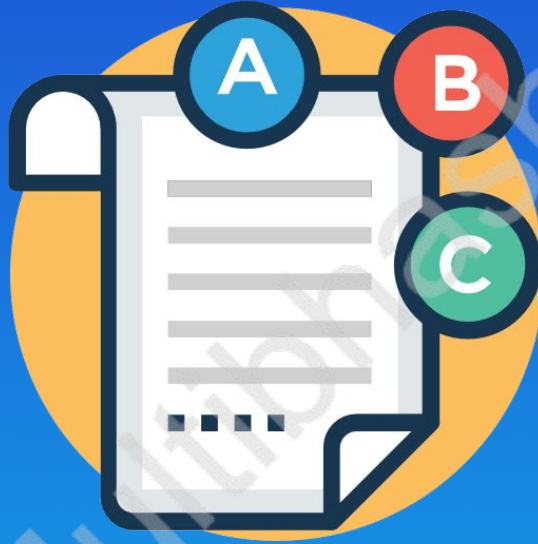

Concept A : Adjectivendungen ohne Artikel.

| | Masculine | Neutral | Feminine | Plural |
|-------------------|-----------|---------|----------|--------|
| Nominative | er | es | e | e |
| Accusative | en | es | e | e |
| Dative | em | em | er | en |
| Genitive | en | en | er | er |



Concept B : Find the correct adjective ending.

There are two kinds of adjective endings, the **strong ending** and the **weak ending**, which roughly correspond to the two tables above. Whenever you use a strong ending or a weak ending depends on which article (der, ein) is used.

- **After an indefinite article, use the strong ending.**
- **After a definite article, use the weak ending.**

Strong ending rules

In any of the following three cases, the adjectives take what is called the

Strong ending

- Indefinite articles
- Possessives
- Kein/keinen/keine

Strong ending table

| Accusative | en | e | es |
| Dative | en | en | en |
| Genitive | en | en | en |
