Hacer (to do/to make)



Class Objective

To understand the verb hacer and be able to use it in making phrases.



Concept A: The present conjugation of 'Hacer':

- I do – Yo hago.
- You do – Tú haces.
- He does – Él hace.
- We do – Nosotros hacemos.
- You-all do – Vosotros hacéis.
- They do – Ellos hacen.
- Although hacer often is translated as "to make" or "to do," it can be used in many other ways, including time and weather expressions.



Concept B: Uses

- To indicate the making or creation of something: A number of translations of the verb can be used in English depending on what is being made.
 1. Vamos a hacer una página web. (We're going to design a web page.)
 2. El árbol hace sombra. (The tree provides shade.)



Concept B: Uses

- As a general verb meaning "to do": Hacer can refer to an activity in general, or it can replace a verb used earlier.
 1. Hago mal en no estudiar. (I did wrong not to study.)
- As part of an expression or idiom indicating an act of some kind:
 1. ¿Quieres hacer una pregunta? (Do you want to ask a question?)



Concept B: Uses

- In weather terms: Typically, weather terms use a third-person singular form of hacer followed by a noun.
 1. Hace frío. (It's cold.)
- In time expressions: Typically, hace is followed by a period of time to indicate how long ago something happened or started.
 1. El dólar cae a niveles de hace dos años. (The dollar is falling to levels of two years ago.)
