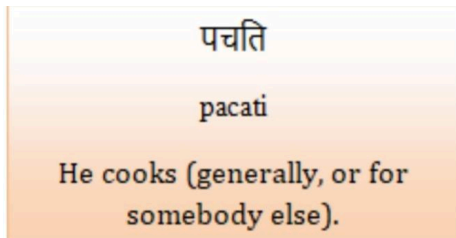


Atmanepada - Future tense, imperative and potential

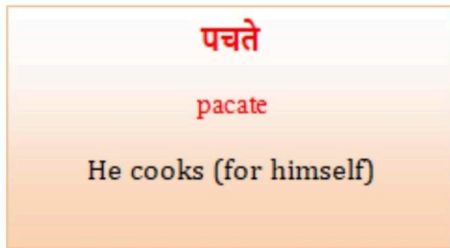
CLASS OBJECTIVE: To learn about (आत्मनेपदी) - Future tense, imperative and potential

CONCEPT A:- INTRODUCTION

- Verbs are of two types; Parasmaipada and atmanepada. Parasmaipada words usually describe the activity done by others or results occurring to others, for instance, "he feels happy". Here we are going to learn about the word atmanepada. Atmanepada, contrary to the former one, is a self-serving one. Here the verb describes the activity done by itself or result occurring to the self, for instance, "I feel happy".
- These verbs are called ātmanepada, meaning "word for the self." The traditional definition is that the "fruit of action," meaning the result, goes to the one who acts. Hence, they are "self-serving" verbs, or verbs "for the self."
- We can think of the ātmanepada verbs as reflexive verbs since the result of the action, whatever it is, goes back to whatever acted in the first place. For illustration, consider the verb pac, meaning "cook," in the examples below.



(Parasmaipada normally ends with **ti** in the end)



(Atmanepada normally ends with **te** in the end.)
