Concept A: Reflexive pronouns

Let us revise:

Let's take a look at the German reflexive pronouns.

AKKUSATIV REFLEXIVE PRONOMEN:

Subject Pronoun	Reflexive Pronoun	Pronunciation	Translation
<i>ich</i>	<i>mich</i>	mihsch	myself
<i>du</i>	<i>dich</i>	dihsch	yourself



Concept A: Reflexive pronouns

<i>er/sie/es</i>	<i>sich</i>	<i>sihsch</i>	himself/herself/itself
<i>wir</i>	<i>uns</i>	<i>uhns</i>	ourselves
<i>ihr</i>	<i>euch</i>	<i>oyush</i>	yourselves
<i>sie</i>	<i>sich</i>	<i>sihsch</i>	themselves
<i>Sie</i>	<i>sich</i>	<i>sihsch</i>	yourself (formal)



Concept A: Reflexive pronouns

- *Ich wasche **mich**.* (I wash myself.)
- *Du badest **dich**.* (You bath yourself.)
- *Er rasiert **sich**.* (He shaves himself.)
- *Wir entspannen **uns**.* (We're relaxing ourselves.)
- *Ihr Ihr freut **euch*** (You're all pleased with yourselves.)
- *Sie kümmern **sich**.* (They take care of themselves.)



Concept A: Dative Reflexive Pronouns

So far these are the accusative reflexive pronouns. They are nearly always used in the accusative, but occasionally they do get used in the dative. When this happens all but two stay the same as those in the table. The two that differ are:

- *mich*, which becomes **mir** (pronounced: mihr)
- *dich*, which becomes **dir** (pronounced: dihr)

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
