Concept A: Introduction

Dialogue means conversation between two or more people in the form of powerful expression of feelings or exchange of ideas or opinions. Dialogue writing is a very important part of English writing. Dialogue is basically a conversation between two or more people. In fiction, it is a verbal conversation between two or more conversations.

Concept B:RULES FOR FRAMING DIALOGUE

 Use quotation marks around the words which the character says: When the names of speakers are not mentioned, the dialogues should be written within quotation marks and attributions like- said, replied, told, mentioned must be used. Commas need to be used properly.

Examples:

- "I have an appointment today at 4 pm."
- "Why are you going to the doctor?"
- "I need to reach the office on time," he said.
- Where the names of speakers are given, they should be followed by a colon mark (:). Every time a new speaker speaks, a new line should be used.

Examples:

- Mrs Joshi: How are you?
- Mr Rao: I am fine, thank you!
