Texas sprint champ Jaylon Hicks draws style points for crossing a line

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It all began with a high school Christmas gift trip to a baseball camp and keen appreciation for the alma mater of Barry Bonds and Dustin Pedroia. Now former All-District pitcher and Lamar Consolidated stud Brady Rodgers is mastering Packard Stadium's latest rendition of "The Greatest Show on Dirt." Pac-12 powerhouse Arizona State continues to pack heat in its quest for another conference crown. The Texan rifle's "earned" place in the Sun Devils full-on attack.

Brady Rodgers considers himself something of a "Family Guy" TV show fanatic. It's often satirical, absurdist humor is the one constant, all things being equal, he can count on to stay loose and spread lightheartedness among teammates in sometimes tense moments.

The Arizona State pitching ace doesn't have a favorite to speak of. So we'll recount our own.

It's the guilty pleasure "April in Quahog" spot where Peter happens upon son Stewie at play with a curious array of 1980s pop culture cartoon characters.

"So, you having a tea party?" Peter asks.

"No," the toddler shoots back wryly.
"We're working out a land deal. Trap Jaw
("He-Man & the Masters of the Universe) is
trying to get a variance to build an unper-

mitted structure within 10 feet of Optimus Prime's ("Transformers") property line. Destro's ("G.I. Joe") the city councilman who's telling Trap Jaw that he has to file it as an accessory structure. And even then it can only be built at the rear of the lot."

Finally, adding the ironic poke of humor at age-appropriate kiddle logic, Stewie nods to the last toy perched up at his table and concedes:



"And the Care Bear is just a Care ear."

Of course, the inside joke of it all is that his was part of an over-the-top April Fools' Day ploy. But for Rodgers, the unflappable unior right-hander (5-1, 1.12 ERA) exceling atop the Sun Devils' pitching staff, the joke has been on nearly every side to step to the plate.

It hasn't quite been all fun and games or the 21-year-old Richmond, Tex, native, tearing to go as another season of take-norisoners Pac-12 Conference play hits stride. But Rodgers has looked sharp early for No. 23-ranked ASU, bolstering his regard as one of the league's best and his stake as third-rear Coach Tim Esmay's Friday night starter the spot revered as a pitching staff's No.

"It's definitely been a huge honor," Rodpers said of holding down the position that's perned him the nickname "Mr. Friday Night." Especially in the Pac-12, it's a position that pets you a lot of respect. It usually goes to a person with at least a couple seasons of experience or someone who's done something pretty incredible.

"Last year I started to take on more of leadership role, I think. As a junior now here are more eyes on me so I've just tried to be strong and play almost with a chip on my shoulder."

A litany of accolades and stoic perfornances have primed the once precocious on Devils pitcher for his headlining, otherrise go-to-guy status this season.

The 6-2 Rodgers Greater Houston renembers for his four-pitch mix, for striking ut 376 batters in his high school career, for anning 16 in a no-no as a Lamar Consolidatd senior and for garnering Fort Bend Herald itcher of the Year honors three times has ontinued to make waves in college.

He had a sensational freshman debut, ppearing in 22 games with five starts and rading the conference with an ASU frosh repord-low 2.11 ERA. A Freshman All-America rest-teamer, he ended the 2010 campaign [-3] with three saves and a National Player if the Week nod that May for his eight-ing shutout heroics in an intrastate rivalry ctory over Arizona.

Eschewing fears of a sophomore slump odgers picked up right where he left off 2011. First embracing the role of Friday ght starter, he'd throw 98.1 innings, strikg out 87 while going (9-4, 2.75) in 15 starts his second stanza against the league's lest.

All told, opponents hit .237 against him the yielded a conference-low one homer season. He recorded the first completeme shutout of his college career against ashington and made conference Honor-

able Mention. He'd go on to build his resume last summer and grab two wins for the USA Baseball collegiate national team (2-0, 2.08, three starts), garnering buzz for his ASU return for 2011-12.

"That complete game shutout against Washington is probably my best moment," said Rodgers, credited for having arguably the best control of any pitcher in the college game this year.

A fringe Top 10 ball club this spring, Esmay has come to rely on Rodgers' 90-mph fastball, quality slider and sharp downer curve throughout the first part of a season that's already featured clashes against mighty mights Texas Tech, defending Pac-12 champ UCLA, Cal-State Fullerton and Oregon State.

His one-run complete-game win over California March 23 was recognized with his third career conference Player of Week.

Rodgers shined even in defeat against Oregon March 31, taking his first loss despite giving up only one earned run in a complete-game performance. He allowed only four base runners on three singles, a homer and no walks in his third trip to the mound this spring that went the distance. As of early April, he's struck out 48 and his earned run average is the lowest in the Pac-12. His count of 64.0 innings pitched is also conference-leading making his ERA all the more impressive.

"That guy is lights-out," junior shortstop Deven Marrero told the Arizona Republic after Rodgers went eight deep again without giving up an earned run in an 8-2 win over the Beavers, April 5. "Every Friday night that guy gives us his best. He's the best pitcher in the country, hands down."

"We've prepared him for this," Esmay says. "With Brady we're expecting that every Friday he can kind've carry us a bit and eat up a lot of innings."

The Sun Devils are ineligible for postseason play this year. So Rodgers & Co. intend to mark their 2012 by their final result in conference. They're in fifth-place with more than six weeks to play before a threegame regular season-closer at first-place Arizona.

"Every year the goal is to be national champions," he said. "It's a mindset. Of course, we made it to (NCAA) Super Regionals my freshman year and won conference. Last year we fell short (of a conference title) so that's kind of inspired us to hang tough with the mindset we can win conference this year. The last couple of years (the) conference (championship) has been won on the last day.

"Game-by-game we just have to stay ready to fight with every conference team we play." •
