

SUN DEVILS IN THE MLB DRAFT



No school has played a more significant role in the MLB Draft than Arizona State University. Since the draft's inception in 1965, ASU has had more players selected (477) and more number one overall picks (4) than any other school in the country.

Naturally, the first player ever drafted was from ASU – Rick Monday, who went to the Kansas City Athletics as the No.1 overall pick in 1965. That's a marvelous testimony to Sun Devil Baseball's reputation among Major League scouts, and it also makes quite a statement about the school's tradition and amazing consistency.

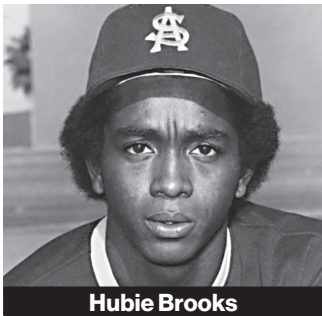
Straight to the Top: Eddie Bane (LHP, 1973), Bob Horner (3B, 1978), Mike Leake (RHP, 2009) skipped the Minor Leagues and went directly from the Draft to MLB. Draft History

Pre-1965: Before the introduction of the First-Year Player Draft, amateurs were free to sign with any Major League team that offered them a contract.

1965-1986: Three drafts were held. The June draft, which was by far the largest, involved new high school graduates and college seniors who had just finished their seasons. It started in 1965 and continues to this day. In January, a second draft was held for high school and college players who graduated in the winter. Finally, there was a draft for players who participated in amateur summer leagues in August. The August draft was eliminated after only two years, while the January draft lasted until 1986. A player could be chosen twice a year before both phases of the old January draft, along with the secondary phase in June, were folded into a single, solitary phase in 1987. Since 1966, the January draft

had been held for junior college players and those whose eligibility had expired.

1987-1997: The draft process was streamlined in 1987, from four phases to one. Not only were both January phases abolished, but the June secondary phase was eliminated as well.

1998-2011: The draft was modified in 1998 to limit teams to 50 rounds. Previously, there had been no limit on rounds.

2012-2019: The draft was modified from 50 to 40 rounds.

2020-2022: The 2020 draft was modified due to the COVID-19 outbreak and was limited to five rounds. Similarly, the 2021 draft was limited to 20 rounds.
