Devils Return Home for Non-Con Trio

TEMPE – The Sun Devil women's tennis team returns to Whiteman Tennis Center after a tough road trip to face Cal State Fullerton on Friday, and Memphis and New Mexico State Sunday.

"It's nice to get home to some warm weather," coach Sheila McInerney said. "Last week was a little chilly, but it was good for us to play those two good matches. It's never fun to lose, but when you play two competitive matches against two good teams, your level goes up."

ASU is a combined 11-0 against its weekend opponents, with a 2-0 record against the Titans, a 2-0 advantage on the Tigers and a 7-0 record against the Aggies.

ASU's first opponent will be an unbeaten Cal State Fullerton squad that won its season opener 7-0 over UC San Diego last Wednesday. Coach Dianne Matias' women amassed 20 wins in 2018.

"For us, we're more focused on what we have to do as a team," McInerney said. "We know from here on out, every team will be a challenge. We expect good matches this weekend, and we just have to play well."

The Sun Devils have not been shy about putting some new faces into the lineup as freshman Samantha Alicea has played in all five matches so far, and Grace Koester and Julia Fisch have both appeared in two matches.

"We're going to have to lean on the younger kids a little more," McInerney said. "It's kind of all hands on deck and everyone has to be ready when we need them."

The Sunday doubleheader will be ASU's second of the season. During their last homestand, the Devils swept all three matches, including taking a double over Drake and Northern Arizona.

The doubles success from 2018 has carried over into the 2019 campaign. ASU has been successful in doubles so far this season, taking the point in four of their five matches. The only point they Devils have dropped this season was against Wake Forest.

The Titans and Devils get the weekend started Friday in Tempe at 1:30 p.m. The Sun Devil men take on Pepperdine Saturday, and the women return to the courts Sunday at 10 a.m. for Memphis before they battle New Mexico State at 2 p.m.

Rankings Update

Defending national champion Stanford held firm at No. 1 in the second poll of 2019 after sweeping to another ITA Indoor Championship berth.

The ITA Kickoff Weekend saw several teams make leaps into the top-25 after successful weekends.

Ohio State soared to No. 16 after they got out of a region and into the ITA Indoor Championships, and NC State, Syracuse and LSU also got into the championship event after knocking off regional hosts in their respective regions.

More than half of the Oracle/ITA top-25 is ACC and SEC teams. Even though No. 1 Stanford hails from the West Coast, Vanderbilt, North Carolina, Duke and Georgia Tech round out the top-five for the East Coast.

No. 8 UCLA is the only other Pac-12 program ranked in the top-25, but California and Southern Cal both received votes.

The doubles and singles rankings will be updated next month. Until then, the All-American duo of John-Baptiste/Hattingh remains at No. 8 in the nation and only Cali Jankowski is ranked in singles play for the Devils.

Last Time Out

Arizona State dropped a pair of matches during the ITA Kickoff Weekend in Columbia, South Carolina.

The Sun Devils opened the weekend slate with a matchup with a Wake Forest, the team that eliminated ASU from the NCAA Tournament a season ago.

The Demon Deacons controlled the match and defeated the Devils 4-0 to give ASU its first loss of the 2019 season.

Pac-12 rival California lost its opening round match to South Carolina, which sent them into the consolation round where they matched up with ASU.

Although ASU took the doubles point, injuries forced the Devils to make changes to the singles lineup.

Cal jumped out to leads on four courts, while Ilze Hattingh and Samantha Alicea held advantages on courts one and four.

Both Devils with leads couldn't finish their matches before the Bears locked up the match and took the win 4-1.

Home, Sweet Home

The Whiteman Tennis Center has been a fortress for the Sun Devils in recent years.

The Sun Devil women's team has picked up 47 wins while dropping only three matches in the past six years during non-conference play at Whiteman.

Last year, ASU won every non-conference match at home and dropped one home match overall to eventual national champion Stanford.

Of the three non-conference losses since 2011, two have been to Ohio State, who returns to Tempe later this season, and the other came against then No. 9 Pepperdine, who the Devils will visit this season in Malibu.

In 2019, ASU has six more home non-conference matches, including battles against TCU, Ohio State and Denver.

Overall, ASU has 12 matches in the comfy confines of the Whiteman Tennis Center, including visits from Southern Cal and UCLA, and the school down south to wrap up the season.

In the past 34 years, Sheila McInerney has seen a vast amount of change at Arizona State, from new athletic directors, new head coaches, schools added to the conference, and numerous renovations to athletic facilities. Through the countless changes across Arizona State, McInerney has continued to lead the women's tennis program in a successful direction heading into her 34th

In Arizona State's history, no coach has the number of accolades that Sheila McInerney has accumulated during her 34-year tenure as a Sun Devil. Since her first season as head coach in 1985, Sun Devil women's tennis has won 512 matches, advanced to 32 of 33 NCAA Tournaments, including 31 straight, and has finished each season in the top 38 nationally. That's the second most wins by any Arizona State coach in school history. In the 2016 season, McInerney was named the Southwest Region Coach of the Year by the ITA, as well as the Pac-12 Coach of the Year. She also was awarded the 2016 ITA Meritorious Service Award, which is given to an ITA coach who has gone "above and beyond" in their commitment and contributions to the ITA and college tennis in general.

In recent years, Arizona State's tennis program has continued to thrive on and off the court.On the court, the Sun Devils have 87 wins against ranked opponents since 2008. Leading the way for the tennis program have been 47 All-Americans and 43 All-Pac-12 student-athletes. Of these integral players in Arizona State's history, there have been 40 players ranked in the Top 50 of the singles season-end ranking and 23 in the Top 25 of the doubles season-end ranking.

In the classroom, McInerney has recruited bright student-athletes. She has had four Academic All-Americans, 45 ITA Scholar-Athletes (since 2002), and 80 Academic All-Pac 12 studentathletes (since 1991). Of those 45 ITA Scholar-Athletes, four were named in 2015 - Alexandra Osborne, Aubria Solares, Gussie O'Sullivan and Kassidy Jump. Her players have had majors such

Business Bioscience, Management, Criminal Criminology, Justice and Journalism, English, Kinesiology, Science, English, Marketing, Sociology.

McInerney has also been fundamental in helping players' development to reach high achievements in the NČAA. Among the achievements include Jacqueline Cako named Arizona State Female Athlete of the Year (2013), Michelle Brycki awarded Cissie Leary ITA National Sportsmanship Award $(20\dot{1}2),$ Kelcy McKenna selected as the



Pac-12 Post-Graduate Scholar (2011), four singles and four doubles All-Americans since 2009, 14 players ranked in the singles season-end ranking and seven doubles teams ranked in the doubles season-end ranking since 2009.

Prior to coming to Arizona State, McInerney served as assistant women's tennis coach at the University of Southern California during the 1983-84 season, in which the Trojans were NCAA finalists. In addition to her success as a collegiate coach, McInerney has traveled with various USTA junior and national teams. At the 1986 Goodwill Games, McInerney coached the team to gold and silver medals. In 1987, she led the U.S. Pan American Games doubles squad to a gold

McInerney attended USC, where she captained the Trojans during her senior season. The fourtime All-American also was a four-time Trojan Spirit Award winner, as voted by her teammates. The Trojans won three national championships during McInerney's collegiate career, and she was the national collegiate doubles runner-up three times and a singles semifinalist in 1977. McInerney collected a half-dozen USTA national titles and was a member of the 1977-80 USTA Junior Federation Cup team. As a professional, she played on the major international tour, earning a world ranking in the top 75. McInerney competed at three grand slam venues -- Wimbledon, French Open and the U.S. Open where she reached the round of 32. She also served a short term as assistant pro at the highly acclaimed L.A. Tennis Club.

McInerney earned a bachelor's degree in public relations from the University of Southern California in 1980. A member of the Dean's List at USC, she won the USC Postgraduate Scholarship Award, the USC Junior Student-Athlete and Senior Student-Athlete awards.

Head coach Sheila McInerney announced in 2015 that Matt Langley would join the program as an assistant coach and in 2017, Langley was named associate head coach.

Langley joined the Sun Devils from Middle Tennessee State University, his alma mater, where he most recently served as assistant coach for its women's tennis program. At MTSU, Langley helped coach the Blue Raiders to one of their best seasons in program history, recording a 19-5 overall record, 7-1 in Conference USA competition.

A member of the MTSU men's tennis team from 2009-12, Langley was a two-year co-captain and three-time Sun Belt Conference Champion, earning two Most Outstanding Player honors at the Sun Belt Conference Championships. Langley also recorded three career appearances at the NCAA Championships.

Langley graduated from MTSU with a degree in exercise science, and was a two-time Academic All-
