#BYTHENUMBERS

The Sun Devils are 46-12-1 in the modern era in seasons openers and have won 10 of the last 11 openers, the lone loss coming in 2014 against Baylor, The Sun Devils have been very efficient in February in the last 12 seasons, posting a 19-4 series record in that span. ASU has won 11 consecutive season opening series heading into this weekend. The Sun Devils swept Northwestern in a three-game set in Tempe last season. The alst time ASU played Miami (OH) was also on Opening Night in 2008.

The Sun Devils were 27th nationally in total attendance, bringing in over 83,000 fans of the season and surpassing its 2016 total attendance numbers. The Devils were also 27th in average attendance per game (2,622). The Sun Devils have had a pair of big attendance games, including 6,010 against Oregon State in the series opener - the second largest crowd since moving back to Phoenix Muni - as well as 4,107 fans against UNLV in the largest midweek attendance since returning to Muni.

Gage Canning was the only player in the Pac-12 last season to have 6 or more doubles (12), triples (8) and home runs (6) this season. Canning's eight triples easily led the Pac-12 and finished second in the nation. Canning had three or more hits 10 times last season, becoming the first Sun Devil player to reach double digits since Jason Kipnis had 13 such games in 2009. Canning was a perfect 134-of-134 on fielding chances as well, having not had a single error on the season - the only Sun Devil on the roster to accomplish the feat regardless of total games played.

> Connor Higgins started 2017 with a 27.00 ERA in just 1.1 IP in three appearances over ASU's first 13 games on the season. After that, Higgins was arguably the top pitcher out of the bullpen, leading the team with a 2.84 ERA in 16 relief appearances after the tough start. Higgins was third on the team with three wins (all coming in that span) and led the team with four saves. Higgins was named to the 2018 NCBWA Stopper of the year Preseason Watch List.

Photography/Videoography

Accomodations for B-Roll purposes at practice can be made through Jeremy Hawkes (jdhawkes@asu.edu). During games, credentials must be worn in plain view throughout the game while on the field and all photographers must adhere to painted lines and instructions given by security personnel and/or Arizona State staff members at all times. Shooting areas are designated camera wells on the far side of both the visitor's and home team's dugouts. Contact Jeremy Hawkes for any details regarding shooting game action.

Media Highlights Policy

Highlights include Pac-12 Networks/ESPN/FOX broadcasts and all home hosted non-televised competitions, including those that are live streamed. ESPN networks (i.e., ESPN, ESPN2, ESPNU) will also televise all NCAA College World Series games from Saturday, June 17, through Wednesday, June 28. No other broadcast network or Internet entity, other than ESPN, may air these games, nor show highlights of these games until the ESPN broadcast is off the air. Broadcast networks / television stations may use up to three (3) minutes (per newscast) of video footage from any one game or five (5) minutes total of video footage from all games played on that particular day of competition for up to 72 hours following the game / broadcast. No media entity (commercial or noncommercial) is allowed to display any game video on its website. If a commercial broadcast entity wishes to license video footage beyond the previously described time period (72 hours), all requests to obtain clips or copies of NCAA championships / events (e.g., game / program records, melt / highlight tapes) need to go through the NCAA / T3 Media online footage request system, which can be found at the following website: http://www.t3licensing.com/video/home/ncaa.do.

- ASU had won 16 consecutive February series until dropping a threegame series against top-ranked TCU Feb. 20-22, 2015. Prior to that, the last time was Feb. 18-20, 2005 when they were swept by No. 1 Tulane on the road.

GAME NOTES

Season Openers and Double Headers

- The Sun Devils are 46-12-1 in season openers and 490-143 in doubleheaders.
- ASU has won 10 of its last 11 season openers, the lone loss coming in 2014 to Baylor.
- While doubleheaders on Opening Weekend aren't necessarily rare, a doubleheader on Opening Day is almost unheard of, though the Sun Devils will not be doing it two seasons in a row. ASU took on Northwestern in an Opening Day doubleheader last season as well. Prior to that, ASU last played an Opening Day doubleheader on Feb. 4, 1979 against Cal State-Dominguez Hills and this weekend will mark just the fifth Opening Day doubleheader on record in program lore.
- ASU last played Opening Day doubleheaders in consecutive seasons in 1960 and 1961.

Scouting the RedHawks

- ASU is 2-0 all-time against Miami (OH), with the last contest coming in 2008, also a season opener in the DeMarini Invitational - an 8-0 victory for the Sun Devils.
- Prior to that, the two teams last played in the 2000 NCAA Tempe Regional - a 15-7 victory in ASU's favor.
- Miami (OH) is the alma mater of current Sun Devil head coach Tracy Smith. Smith compiled eight straight 30-win seasons, two NCAA Regional appearances and advanced to the Mid-American Conference Tournament finals six times at Miami (OH).
- Currenty Miami head coach Danny Hayden played under Smith while he was a student-athlete at Miami (OH).
- Redshirt senior Ross Haffey, who has led Miami
 (OH) in most of the major offensive categories the
 last two seasons, returns to his familiar first base
 position. He has started every game over there for
 Miami the last two years. Last season, he was a
 Second-Team All-MAC pick for the second straight
 year.
- Miami finished the 2017 season with a 22-34 record, including an 8-16 mark in conference play.
- The RedHawks were picked to finish fifth in MAC

this season.

Mr. Friday Night

- Sophomore LHP Spencer Van Scoyoc is scheduled to toe the rubber on Opening Night on Friday, hoping to join a long line of legendary Sun Devils to lay claim to the title of Mr. Friday Night.
- Van Scoyoc joins a long and illustrious line of Mr.
 Friday Night's at ASU that includes nine Major
 Leaguers and numerous ASU Hall of Famers, including Eddie Bane, Floyd Bannister, Kendall Carter,
 Mike Esposito, Larry Gura, Gary Gentry, Mike Leake,
 Trevor Williams and Brady Rodgers.

Eli's Coming

- Eli Lingos enters his senior season looking to have another impactful year after a solid junior year that saw him sit as one of the top ace's in the Pac-12.
- Totaled a team-high six quality starts on the season, finishing with a 4.21ERA in 87.2 innings with a teamhigh 66 strikeouts.
- Had the fourth lowest ERA in the Pac-12 conference among pitchers with at least 16 starts.
- Picked off three runners on the season, good for fourth in the Pac-12.
- Lingos led the Sun Devils with six quality starts last season. No other Sun Devil had more than one quality start this season.
- Among his career-best six wins were an upset over then-No. 1 TCU and a career-best 7.2 IP outing against LMU in which he allowed no runs.
- Lingos went over 6.0 IP in his first five appearances this season after neving having consecutive games over 6.0 IP in his career prior to this season. He has seven games over 6.0 IP this year, six of which were wins.
- He is ninth in the league with 83.1 innings pitched this season and ninth in the conference with 64 strikeouts. He is tied for sixth nationally with 15 starts this year.

12-Gage

 Gage Canning led the team in virtually every hitting category last season, including batting average

- (.332), runs (37), doubles (12), triples (8), home runs (6) and slugging percentage (.538) en route to First Team All-Pac-12 honors.
- He was the only player in the Pac-12 to finish with a double-digit number doubles while also posting at least six home runs and six triples.
- On top of dominating the leader boards at ASU, Canning's eight triples were the most by a player in the conference and second-most in the NCAA, behind only Brent Sakurai of New Mexico State who knocked nine.
- Canning also recorded 120 total bases on the season, good for third in the conference.
- The outfielder really hit his stride in the middle of the season, as he went on a 12-game tear in which he hit at a .538 clip, including five three-hit nights and a four-hit performance.
- Canning had 10 games with three or more hits on the season which was six more than any other Sun Devil and surpasses the team lead from last season (6).
- The 10 3+ hit games were the most since Jason Kipnis had 13 such games in 2009.
- With 14 career triples, Canning is just six out of cracking the all-time top-five at ASU in the category.
- As if that weren't all enough, Canning is a perfect 134-of-134 on fielding chances this season and did not commit an error all season - the only Sun Devil field player to do so, regardless of games played.

Lin-Sanity

- Lyle Lin has Lin burst onto the collegiate scene on a high note, batting over .300 midway through the season.
- The infielder bounced between catching and playing first base, but joined Canning as one of only three players to start all 55 games for the Devils.
- Lin finished his freshman campaign batting .290 with nine doubles, one triple and two home runs.
- Lin's nine multi-RBI games were good for second on the team and he had a team-best 24-game reached base streak at one point in the season - the third-longest for a Sun Devil freshman since the 2000 season.
- His 12-game hitting streak at one point in the season was tied for Canning for the longest of the year while

his 17 multi-hit games were second on the team.

 He was also solid defensively, as Lin was one of two Devils this season to make it to SportsCenter's Top 10 Plays of the Day for a diving snag down the first base line against California.

On The Hunt

- After a start to the season that saw him batting .250 after 30 games, Bishop finished the season strong.
- The freshman finished his 2017 campaign with an impressive .301 batting average, five doubles, four triples and five home runs.
- He ranked second on the team behind only Canning
 – in batting average, runs scored (27), triples, home
 runs and slugging percentage (.484).
- Bishop started 31 games in the outfield season to become just the sixth ASU freshman in the past 15 years to start over 50 percent of the season in the outfield, most recently done by Canning last season.
- His 10 multi-RBI games were also a team-best.

Turning The Tides

- Connor Higgins was named to the NCBWA Stopper of the Year Preseason Watch List this season, awarded to the top relief pitcher in college baseball
- Connor Higgins was in pretty dire straights in the first 13 games with a 27.00 ERA in three appearances with just 1.1 innings pitched.
- Higgins posted a 2.84 ERA in 15 apperances to wrap up the season with 29 strikeouts in 34.0 innings pitched while picking up three wins and a team-best four saves in the process.
- After the tough 13 games to start the year, Higgins leds the teams relievers in strikeouts, innings pitched, wins and saves in the final 38 games of the season.

Keeping It Interesting

- The Devils have a knack for success in close games in recent years.
- Since 2016, the Devils are 7-2 in extra-inning games (1-1 in 2017), with six walk-off wins (two this season) and are 21-7 (9-6 last year year) in one-run games -including 7-6 in Pac-12 play.

GAME NOTES

- ASU has driven in the game-winning run in the eighth inning or later 14 times (four times this year).
- Arizona State has notched 10 wins since 2016 when trailing after six innings (four times last season).

#OccupyPHXMuni

- ASU drew more than 83,000 fans last season, more than it posted in 2016 and finished 27th nationally in total attendance and average attendance per game (2,622).
- The Sun Devils have had a pair of big attendance games this season, including 6,010 against Oregon State in the series opener - the second largest crowd since moving back to Phoenix Muni - as well as 4,107 fans against UNLV in the largest mid-week attendance since returning to Muni and fifth-largest overall since returning.
- ASU ranked 13th in total attendance and was the only school west of Texas to draw more than 100,000 fans in 2015, and ranked 18th in average attendance with 3,082 fans per game. ASU's 107,010 fans were the program's most since 2010 and ranked as the fourth-highest regular-season attendance since 1988.
- ASU moved back to Phoenix Municipal Stadium in 2015 after playing 40 seasons at Packard Stadium from 1974-2014, winning their first contest in the team's on a walk-off home run in extra inning against No. 5 Oklahoma State on Feb. 13, 2015.
- The Devils played 137 games at Muni from 1964-74, and went 111-26 at the stadium, including 17-6 against Arizona. ASU's first game at Muni was April 10, 1964, and was a 5-3 win over Arizona. ASU's last game at Muni was March 18, 1974, and was 9-6 win over Colorado. ASU won District 7 titles in 1965 and 1967 at Muni before going on to win National Championships in Omaha.
- Former Sun Devil and eventual Major League Baseball Hall of Famer Reggie Jackson was the first college player to hit a home run at Muni.

Movin' On Up

As has become commonplace at Arizona State, five Sun Devils heard their names called in the MLB Draft following the 2016 season. The Sun Devils have had five or more players drafted in 46 of the 53 MLB Drafts held since 1956 and five or more players have gotten the call in 13 of the last 15 seasons.

Keeping the Tradition Alive

- Four Sun Devils made their debuts in the MLB during the 2016 season, bringing ASU's total to 108 all-time the most among all NCAA schools since 1959. Jake Barrett (Diamondbacks) and Tony Barnette (Rangers) each saw their first Big League action in the opening month of the MLB season last year while Brady Rodgers (Astros) and Trevor Williams (Pirates) bookended things, appearing in the final month of the season.
- The Sun Devils have now had at least one major league player on their varsity roster each year from 1961 through 2013, which is the longest current streak in the nation. Thirty-three ASU baseball players have made their MLB debuts since 2002.



TRACY SMITH - HEAD COACH - THIRD SEASON (21st OVERALL)

OVERVIEW

- · 2013 National Coach of the Year
- 75 of his players have been selected in the MLB Draft, including 68 draftees since 2000 and 32 in the first 10 rounds
- Coached the fourth overall pick in the 2014 Major League Baseball June Amateur Draft (Kyle Schwarber) and three first-round selections in the 2009 MLB June Draft (Eric Arnett, Josh Phegley, Matt Bashore)
- One of five active coaches and one of eight all-time to bring three different Div. I schools to NCAA Regional play when he guided the Sun Devils to a No. 2 seed in the Fullerton Regional in 2015
- Has amassed a 698-535-1 career record in 21 seasons as a head coach at three different schools, including nine seasons at both Miami (Ohio) and Indiana, and three years at Arizona State
- His 698 victories rank in the Top-40 among active coaches in the NCAA, and his 21 seasons represent the fourth-fewest number of years on that list to be ranked within the Top-40

ARIZONA STATE (2014-p)

- Hired as the fifth head baseball coach in program history on June 24, 2014
- Enters his fourth season at the helm of the Sun Devil baseball program
- Has seen 22 players earn Pac-12 All-Conference honors
- · Coached three players to All-American honors in 2015 (Seth Martinez, David Greer and Colby Woodmansee)
- 24 players have earned Pac-12 All-Academic honors in Smith's first three seasons (ASU's 10 selections in Smith's first season led the Pac-12)
- Instrumental in Sun Devil Baseball's signing of the nation's top recruiting class in 2016, which included eight players who had been drafted by the Major League out of high school
- The 2017 class was also rated in the Top-5 nationally and was the No. 1 class in the West. The 2017 class was second in the country behind Vanderbilt in having the most signed players make it to campus for the 2018 season

INDIANA (2006-14)


- Named National Coach of the Year in 2013 and was a unanimous choice for Big Ten Coach of the Year after he led IU to the school's only College World Series appearance
- Led the Hoosiers to the No. 4 national seed in the 2014 NCAA Tournament, the first national seed in Big Ten baseball history
- Tallied more than 40 wins in his final two seasons at IU and led the Hoosiers to consecutive Big Ten Conference Championships for the first time in school history
- Won the Big Ten regular season and B1G Tournament title in 2013, marking the school's first regular season conference championship since 1949 and the first outright crown since 1932, and advanced to the 2013 College World Series, which ended the Big Ten's 29-year CWS absence
- Led the Hoosiers to an NCAA Regional in 2009 and to the College World Series in 2013, notched a program-best 21 conference wins in 2014 and secured eight first team All-Big Ten selections to tie a conference mark for most first team honorees from one school
- · Academic Progress Rate as a head coach increased each season until it reached a perfect 1000 in two-year stretch between 2008-10

- Mentored two Big Ten Players of the Year, three Big Ten Pitchers of the Year and a pair
 of Big Ten Freshman of the Year in nine seasons at IU, and at least one Hoosier earned
 Freshman All-America honors in six of the past seven seasons in Bloomington
- Landed three players on the USA Baseball Collegiate National Team and mentored numerous players at all positions, including outfielder Alex Dickerson, who was named Big Ten Player of the Year and won the Big Ten Triple Crown in 2010, right-handed pitcher Aaron Slegers, who was named 2013 Big Ten Pitcher of the Year, and catcher Kyle Schwarber, who was named an All-American by five major college baseball groups in 2014

- Compiled eight straight 30-win seasons, two NCAA Regional appearances and advanced to the Mid-American Conference Tournament finals six times at Miami (OH)

- Four-year letterwinner at Miami (Ohio), Smith was a pitcher and an infielder for the RedHawks, and played three minor league seasons in the Chicago Cubs organization
- Participated in 1992 Major League Scouting Bureau's Professional Scout School as a representative of the Cubs
- Born Feb. 14, 1966, Smith graduated with a bachelor's degree in Education from Miami (Ohio) in 1989 and completed a master's degree in Sport Organization from Miami (Ohio) in 1992
- Native of Kentland, Ind., Smith and his wife, Jaime, have three sons, Casey, Ty and Jack



<u>BEN GREENSPAN - ASSISTANT COACH/RECRUITING COORDINATOR</u>

-The 2017 campaign saw Gage Canning emerge as one of the elite players in the Pac-12 with Greenspan helping to oversee that growth. He was the only player in the Pac-12 to finish with a double-digit number of doubles while also posting at least six home runs and six triples.

-Greenspan also helped oversee the emergence of Hunter Bishop as one of the exciting young freshmen in the country on the year. Bishop started 31 games in the outfield eason to become just the sixth ASU freshman in the pa<mark>st 15 years to start over 5</mark>0 percent of the season in the outfield.

-Catcher Brian Serven earned First Team All-Pac-12 recognition in 2016, as well as Pac-12 All-Academic honorable mention and was a semifinalist for the Johnny Bench Award, given to the nation's top catcher. His prowess on both sides of the plate was evident as he became just the fifth catcher in school history to lead the team in home runs and he caught 17 runners stealing, the most by a Sun Devil since 2009.

-Also excelling at the plate under Greenspan was first baseman David Greer, who also earned a First Team All-Conference selection as well as earning a spot on the Louisville Slugger All-America third team. The Arizona-native finished his junior campaign first in the conference in doubles and total bases, second in slugging percentage and third in runs

I-n his first season at ASU, Greenspan helped the Sun Devils excel both offensively and defensively. The Devils ranked in the top half of the Pac-12 in a number of offensive categories, including second in slugging percentage, third in both batting average and hits, and posted their best defensive numbers since 2010 as they finished fourth in the conference in both fielding percentage and errors.

-Excelling in his recruiting coordinator position, Greenspan assembled the No. 1 recruiting class in the nation in 2016 according to Collegiate Baseball Newspaper. Greenspan followed that up in playing a big part in another Top-5 Nationally ranked recruiting class in 2017, and the top recruiting class in the Pac-12 and the West. The 2017 Sun Devil class features six signees who participated in the 2015 Area Code Baseball Games, an invitation-only elite baseball event held annually in Long Beach, Calif., and one who played in the Tournament of the Stars - a showcase hosted by USA Baseball.

Greenspan spent six seasons as an assistant coach at Indiana, including the past year as recruiting coordinator, and worked extensively with the team's catchers and hitters. The Hoosiers' offense ranked in the top 25 in the nation in batting average, slugging percentage, total hits and extra-base hits in 2014.


Greenspan mentored some of the most prolific hitters in IU program history, including two-time All-American catcher Kyle Schwarber, current Oakland Athletics catcher Josh Phegley, and 2010 Big Ten Player of the Year Alex Dickerson. He also played a large role in developing talent at IU as 11 of his position players were selected in the Major League Baseball First Year Player Draft, including five in the top five rounds. In the eight years Greenspan has served as a catching coach, his guidance has produced a First Team All-Conference player at that position in five of those seasons with two of them currently playing MLB (Schwarber and Phegley).

Greenspan's additional hitting protégés include 2012 Big Ten Freshman of the Year Sam Travis, two-time All-American Dustin DeMuth and current major leaguers Micah Johnson and Ethan Wilson.

Greenspan played for two seasons under coach Smith at IU, and was a Hoosier team captain and Academic All-Big Ten performer in 2007. He spent two years at the University of Connecticut as a catcher and first baseman before joining the IU program. He earned a bachelor's degree in Sport Marketing and Management and a master's degree in Sport Administration from Indiana University.

Greenspan is originally from West Point, N.Y., and is married to his wife, Janine. The pair have two children, Grayson and Adalyn.





-Prior to his coaching career, Cather had a 10-year career as a professional pitcher with three seasons spent in Major League Baseball with the Atlanta Braves (1997-99). Cather did not allow an earned run in his first eight games in the MLB and helped the Braves to a spot in the National League Championship Series against the Florida Marlins in 1998.

-Among his professional assignments and developments through the years, Cather has worked with All-Stars Josh Beckett and Clay Buchholz, as well as the likes of Matt Wisler, Carl Edwards, Jr., Joe Ross and Daniel Bard.

-In 2014, Cather joined the Chicago Cubs organization as the pitching coach for the lowa Cubs at the Triple-A level and oversaw a pitching staff that led the Pacific Coast League in ERA, setting several club records in the process. He developed young and veteran players for the team's postseason run in 2015

-Cather joined the San Diego Padres organization in 2012 where he served as the Minor League Pitching Coordinator as well as the pitching coach for the El Paso Chihuahuas, the Padres' Triple-A affiliate. In El Paso, Cather worked under former Sun Devil Baseball head coach Pat Murphy. He also initiated and created the throwing program used for Dominican players at the overseas academy.

Cather began his career in the professional ranks with the Boston Red Sox organization in 2006. He joined the organization as the pitching coach for the Class A Wilmington Blue Rocks before being promoted to pitching coach for the Portland Sea Dogs, the Red Sox's Double-A affiliate, in 2007. In 2010, Cather was named as one of Boston's Major League advanced scouts, where he provided reports and insight to the organization's Major League staff.

-During his playing career with the Braves, Cather pitched two scoreless innings of relief in Game 2 against the Houston Astros in the 1998 National League Divisional series after helping the team to the NL Eastern Division title. In the National League Championship Series against the Marlins, Cather did not allow a run over four games.

-Earley will also serve as the team's outfield coach and helped pace one of the top outfields in the Pac-12 in 2017. On the year, first-team All-Pac-12 selection Gage Canning started in every single game for the Sun Devils and while providing stellar defense with zero errors on the season and leading the team in outfield assists

-Canning led the team in virtually every hitting category, including batting average (.332), runs (37), doubles (12), triples (8), home runs (6) and slugging percentage (.538). He was the only player in the Pac-12 to finish with a double-digit number of doubles while also posting at least six home runs and six triples.


-Earley also helped oversee the emergence of Hunter Bishop as one of the exciting young freshmen in the country on the year. The freshman earned All-Pac-12 honors and finished his 2017 campaign with an impressive .301 batting average, five doubles, four triples and five home runs. He ranked second on the team - behind only Canning - in batting average, runs scored (27), triples, home runs and slugging percentage (.484).

-During the 2017 pitching coach search, Earley was granted a waiver to recruit by the NCAA. Earley assisted in recruiting during the spring and summer of 2017. During that time Earley helped identify prospects and recruits for the 2017 through 2020 recruiting classes. The 2017 recruiting class was ranked fourth in the country andt tops in the Pac 12.

-Earley played under Smith at Indiana from 2008-10 before going on to a professional career with the Chicago White Sox organization. He played professional baseball for six seasons, including time with the team's Triple-A affiliate, the Charlotte Knights.


-The outfielder finished his playing days with the Southern Illinois Miners in the independent Frontier League in 2015. He finished his professional career with 559 hits, 117 doubles, 38 home runs and a .284 average. He was named to four All-Star teams in his professional career and was also named a member of the Southern Illinois All-Decade Team.

-Earley earned Third Team All-Big Ten recognition during his senior campaign at IU in 2010 after he tied for fourth in the conference in home runs with 13, and finished the season batting .352. Earley was the only player in the Big Ten with double digit homeruns and stolen bases during the 2010 season.


