## WHERE FORETHOUGHT MEETS FOLLOW-THROUGH

The door is now opened wide to spectacular promise. Vision becomes reality, placing the epicenter of the sport – from tournament competitions and collegiate championships to training centers, manufacturers' laboratories and amenities-rich facilities – in the Valley of the Sun.

The Valley's big-event, big-thinking history is now bolstered by the return of men's tennis to ASU. It is enhanced and complemented by a unique new alliance between the country's most innovative university and the governing body of college tennis. The timing is perfect: the realization of a 330-acre mixed-use urban campus that features new and reinvented NCAA sporting venues; a one-of-a-kind

place for tennis growth and development; and the advancement of equipment and game technologies. This is **a tennis epicenter** able to attract big-time tournaments; amateur, collegiate and even professional championships; the best and the brightest on the courts and in the sport's research settings.

This is a **tennis hub for all**. From ages eight to 80, it's a community asset available to the public with state-of-the-art, high-tech facilities that place an emphasis on the **advancement** of the sport and the expansion of community outreach and accessibility.

#### AN ALLIANCE FOCUSED ON IMPACT

A precursor to the return of men's tennis at ASU and the realization of a hub for the sport – its players, fans, teachers, manufacturers and signature events – is a three-decades long relationship between ASU and the Intercollegiate Tennis Association (ITA).

In 2016, that relationship evolved into an alliance designed to increase tennis participation through community outreach, provide a place for elite players to train after college in preparation for a professional career and position the Valley as a hub for tennis tech and research. The Arizona Republic calls the new partnership "yet another progressive move aimed at making ASU into a national leader in major college sports."

The relocation of ITA's headquarters to the Valley creates a new ecosystem for growing American tennis. It includes a multipurpose complex designed to accommodate all the sport can serve; a setting where equipment manufacturers test, measure and invent the future of the game; the ability to attract amateur and professional competitions on a scale never before realized; and more.

The ASU-ITA alliance is built to deliver.

### TENNIS IS IN OUR DNA

Competitive tennis in the Valley of the Sun began on ASU's Tempe campus. It took its first steps here and ingrained itself in the local mindset. This venerable game was **one of ASU's first athletic competitions**, evolving from a club sport in 1902 at what was then Tempe Normal School.

Along the way, the men and women studentathletes of ASU tennis produced **national and conference championships**, competed regularly in NCAA tournaments, nurtured All-American and all-academic players, and created lifetime memories across the net and in the stands. Sun Devil tennis teams have served up success from coast to coast, have rallied long and hard against top national rivals and brought immeasurable recognition and respect to Sun Devil Athletics.

Today, the opportunity to take this tradition of excellence to another level for generations to come is here for the taking. It combines a world-renowned university, a storied athletics tradition and an unparalleled chance to build on more than 100 years of success.

### THE LADIES ARE THE CHAMPS

One of the most successful programs in the history of collegiate tennis is women's tennis at ASU. Sheila McInerney, who completed her 32nd season as head coach in 2016, has guided her teams to a remarkable 481 wins, appearances in 31 of 32 NCAA tournaments, and top-40 rankings nationally each year. Forty-two All-Americans and 79 All-Pac-12 academic selections have donned the Maroon and Gold for her teams. Coach McInerney is a two-time Pac-12 Coach of the Year.

Today, ASU women's tennis continues its championship tradition, a **highly respected** 

entry in the hyper-competitive Pac-12 – one of the top three conferences in the U.S. With 30 straight NCAA tournament trips to its credit, the women's team in 2015–2016 earned the Pac-12 Tournament team title, landed top local and national recruits, and finished among the country's top 25 teams, remaining dominant on the home court at Whiteman Tennis Center.

This is a nationally ranked, unshakable foundation of collegiate tennis excellence.

#### A RETURN TO FORM ... AND MORE

For more than a century, from 1902 to 2008, men's tennis was a **staple of the ASU sports lineup**. At the turn of the century, the major competitions at the university could be counted on three fingers: football, baseball, men's tennis.

The return of men's tennis to the competitive landscape of Sun Devil Athletics marks the continuation of a **championship tradition** that includes conference trophies; All-American, All-Pac-12 and all-academic selections; and an honored entry in "The Conference of Champions." It opens wide the door to hosted tournaments, amateur and professional.

The best collegiate players from across the country will stamp their ticket to compete in the Valley of the Sun. The regeneration of recruiting opportunities targeting the best and brightest players is already underway – players who will serve as models of **athletic achievement and academic success** while vying for team and individual honors.

Like the successful return of wrestling and swimming/diving to Sun Devil Athletics, the return of men's tennis heightens **the overall university experience** and gives greater voice to Maroon and Gold spirit throughout the globe.

He recorded successful stops at powerhouse SEC programs Mississippi State and Alabama, including ITA Southern Region Assistant Coach of the Year and SEC Assistant Coach of the Year honors. And he is a top recruiter, a keen developer of nationally ranked players and a mentor focused on the success of his student-athletes – his teams have won conference academic recognition and are consistently placed among the sport's top-performing scholars.

### BIG-EVENT CREDENTIALS, MORE TO COME

The Valley's big-event success indicates we've never been so ready for new opportunities. Consider **our big-event-staging credentials**: three Super Bowls, NBA and MLB All-Star games, Fiesta and Cactus Bowls, BCS National Championship games, PGA and LPGA golf tournaments. Professional baseball, basketball, football, hockey. College basketball's Final Four will be played here in 2017.

In addition to junior, collegiate and professional tournaments, tennis in the Grand Canyon State rivals – often surpasses – the development, participation and reputation of the sport's regional hotspots. Nearly 900 tennis courts dot the local landscape. USTA tournaments are staged at 16 different sites, and eight tennis programs

represent 20 teams on NCAA Division I and II and junior college levels.

At ASU, the future is already taking place. Wrestling has returned. Swimming/diving is again creating headlines. Four programs have been added over the last 18 months. In addition to men's tennis, ASU has elevated its national championship-winning club ice hockey team to NCAA status, and added women's lacrosse and women's triathlon, bringing the varsity sports count to 26.

With such explosive growth, the timing is right and history is on our side. We're **building a better future for ASU, Sun Devil Athletics and our community**.
