ASU BASKETBALL GAME NOTES

TIPPING OFF...

HOW GOOD WAS 23 WINS?

- ASU won 23 tilts for the first time since 2009 (25 wins led by James Harden) and for just the second time in the past 28 seasons.
- Prior to 2009, you have to go back to Bill Frieder's 1995 squad that won 24 games to find more wins than the 2023 Sun Devils.
- It wasn't an easy 23, as it included 13 wins away from home, seven true road wins and a 6-2 mark on neutral floors.
- The 2023 season marked the fourth 20-win season for ASU in the past six years, after having 20 wins just nine times in the previous 35 seasons.

COMFORTABLE WHEN IT'S CLOSE

- ASU continued its solid play in close game games, going 11-5 in games decided by six points or less, as it is now 35-18 (.660) in close games in the past four seasons.

WEGUARDU

- ASU held its opponents to just .399 shooting from the field, the third-best mark in the league and 15th in the nation.
- It was also tied for the second-best mark in school history, one year after posting what is now the fourth-best.

HERE TO STAY

- Vice President for University Athletics Ray Anderson announced in March of 2023 that Sun Devil Men's Basketball Head Coach Bobby Hurley has agreed to an extension that will keep him with the program through the 2026 season.

NCAAS UNDER COACH HURLEY

- ASU has made the NCAA Tournament three times in the past five chances (2023, 2019, and 2018) and won two games.
- In the previous 32 seasons (1986-2017), ASU made two NCAA Tournaments and was 2-3.

2023-24 SCHEDULE

- Sun Devil Men's Basketball will be tested throughout their campaign, playing four teams that made the 2023 NCAA Tournament in just the non-conference portion of the schedule.

ATTENDANCE NOTE

Everyone knows the 2020-21 season hit the Sun Devil program hard in terms of momentum. In addition to a third straight NCAA Tournament appearance getting canceled in 2020 -- which would have been a first for the program since the early 1960s -- the Sun Devil had turned the corner on attendance Desert Financial Arena as it had had averaged 10,140 fans in a three-year span (starting with the 2017-18 season) with 496,872 fans attending 49 Sun Devil home games, as ASU racked up a 39-10 record. In the three previous seasons in 51 home games ASU averaged 6,087 fans (310,459).

HEAD COACH BOBBY HURLEY NINTH SEASON | DUKE '93

One of the most recognizable names in college basketball history became the 14th men's head coach of the Sun Devil program, as Vice President of Athletics Ray Anderson named 1992 NCAA Final Four Most Outstanding Player Bobby Hurley as the Sun Devil head coach on April 9, 2015. What has followed is aggressive scheduling, lots of fast-paced hoops, playing hard, several big-time wins both home and away and back-to-back NCAA Tournaments for Arizona State for the first time since Byron Scott, Fat Lever and Alton Lister were wearing Sparky on their short shorts (1980-81 to be exact).

In his eight seasons as head coach, Sun Devil Men's Basketball has matched its highest ranking in school history (third in the Associated Press Poll in December of 2017), notched its best two average attendances in history (10,603 in 2017-18 is the ASU record), reached the NCAA Tournament three times, notched its best two non-conference wins in school history (vs. No. 1 Kansas on Dec. 22, 2018 and at No. 2 Kansas on Dec. 10, 2017) and defeated two eventual 2018 No. 1 seeds in a span of a few weeks (Kansas and Xavier).

Following a three-year drought without a First or Second Team Pac-12 All-Conference selection, ASU has had at least one in each of the past six seasons under Hurley. Hurley has coached two Pac-12 Sixth Man of the Year winners in addition to the 2019 Pac-12 Freshman of the Year (Lu Dort). Three Sun Devils have been selected to the Pac-12 All-Tournament team and two received All-Defensive Team distinction during Hurley's tenure.

ASU won 23 tilts in 2023, reaching the mark for the first time since 2009 (25 wins led by James Harden) and for just the second time in the past 28 seasons. Prior to 2009, you have to go back to Bill Frieder's 1995 squad that won 24 games to find more wins than the 2023 Sun Devils. Also, it wasn't an easy 23, as it included 13 wins away from home, seven true road wins and a 6-2 mark on neutral floors. The 2023 season marked the fourth 20-win season for ASU in the past six years, after having 20 wins just nine times in the previous 35 seasons. ASU continued its solid play in close game games, going 11-5 in games decided by six points or less, as it is now 35-18 (.660) in close games in the past four seasons. ASU held its opponents to just .399 shooting from the field, the third-best mark in the league and 15th in the nation. It was also tied for the second-best mark in school history, one year after posting what is now the fourth-best.

Coach Hurley's team continued to improve during the 2021-22 season, as the Sun Devils ended the season winning seven of their final eight regular season games. Arizona State relied on their defense, allowing opponents to shoot only 40% from the field. This was the lowest mark since the 1971-72 season and third-best defensive effort in program history. Hurley added another signature win to his resume when the Sun Devils defeated No. 3 UCLA in triple overtime. It was the third time ASU had defeated a Top-3 team under Hurley. In the non-conference, the Maroon & Gold went on the road and defeated eventual NCAA Tournament participant Creighton. Rare Season sweeps of Oregon and Utah highlighted the Pac-12 Conference schedule.

Want some tough dudes who are resilient and bounce back? ASU was 16-5 in the two-year span of 2019-21 after a loss, the best mark in the Pac-12.

Like a coach who makes adjustments at the half and carves out second-half buckets on late possessions? Look no further than the ASU bench, as the Sun Devils have 28 halftime comeback deficits in his six years, also tops in the Pac-12.

Like bucket getting? Bobby Hurley put in a system that has resulted in ASU averaging 77.3 points per game in the past four seasons, the best mark in the Pac-12 in that time. When he was hired he promised to pick up the pace. In the four years prior to his arrival at ASU, the Sun Devils averaged 69.5 points per game, seventh in the Pac-12.

Want to change things in a program? Need a stat to show it? The Sun Devils went 11-7 in the Pac-12 after going 12-6 in 2018-19, marking just the second time in the past 25 seasons the Sun Devils have posted back-to-back winning Pac-12 records.

The 2019-20 season saw ASU (20-11) post its first seven-game Pac-12 win streak since the 1980-81 team won 11 straight. The Sun Devils came back from 22 down (37-15) to beat Arizona, and took down eventual Pac-12 Champion and No. 14 Oregon at Desert Financial Arena in late February. ASU notched its third straight 20-win season for just the

third time in program history. Not bad for a team picked to finish sixth in the annual preseason media poll.

Hurley in 2018-19 led ASU to a 23-11 overall mark and 12-6 in the Pac-12, good enough for second in the league for just fourth time in 41 years of Pac-10/12 play after being picked sixth in the preseason media poll. ASU defeated No. 1 Kansas on Dec. 22, the first win over No. 1 at home in program history and just the second all-time. ASU notched its first NCAA Tournament win since 2009 and posted 23 wins for just the eighth time in school history. Prior to its two straight appearances, ASU had made the NCAA Tournament three times in the previous 22 seasons (1996-2017). ASU averaged 80.04 points per game in 2017-18 and 2018-19, tops in the Pac-12. It had not made March Madness in back-to-back years since 1980-81, yet ASU was the only Pac-12 school to make the NCAAs in 2018 and 2019.

ASU had two-game sweeps of Arizona (first since 2008-09), Oregon State (first since 2009-10) and Cal (second straight). ASU beat No. 15 Mississippi State on Nov. 19 and Utah State on Nov. 21 to win the 2018 MGM Resorts Main Event at T-Mobile Arena, its second straight exempt tourney title after not winning one since November of 1994.

In 2017-18 ASU averaged a school-record 10,603 fans, as the 4,103 extra bodies from 2016-17 to 2017-18 was the second-best increase in all of college hoops. In the 2018-19 season 168,602 fans entered Wells Fargo Arena -- an average of 10,538, second-best in school history. ASU raced out to a 12-0 record and was the last undefeated team in the nation, topping eventual No. 1 seeds Xavier and Kansas that had the Sun Devils dribbling out the clock in in double-digit wins that they trailed at the half in both. The Sun Devils led the Pac-12 in scoring, as the senior trio of Tra Holder, Shannon Evans and Kodi Justice made Sun Devil hoops fun and fast.

His first season at ASU saw the Sun Devils notch eight top-100 RPI wins, including wins over SEC co-champion Texas A&M, Ohio Valley top seed Belmont and two Pac-12 NCAA Tournament teams (Oregon State and USC). ASU's strength of schedule was 23rd and its non-conference schedule was 13th. ASU earned come-from-behind road wins against Creighton (79-77 on Dec. 2) and UNLV (66-56 on Dec. 16).

Hurley, an NCAA champion with Duke in 1991 and 1992, led Buffalo to a school record-matching 23 wins in 2014-15, its first Mid-American Conference title and a trip to the 2015 NCAA Tournament for the first time in school history. The Bulls fell to West Virginia in the second round, snapping an eight-game win streak that was Buffalo's longest in a decade. After going to Division I status in 1991-92, Buffalo averaged 12.9 wins in its 22 seasons prior to Hurley, but was 42-20 in his two years, which included playing 29 games on the road. He coached the MAC Players of the Year in back-to-back seasons and led Buffalo to its first outright MAC East Division title in 2013-14. Buffalo went 10-7 on the road in 2014-15, including games at Kentucky and Wisconsin when it led at the half in both contests.

In 2013-14 Hurley was named a finalist for the Joe B. Hall Award, which is given to the nation's top first-year head coach. Javon McCrea was named the MAC Player of the Year and became UB's all-time leading scorer during his senior season as the Bulls won 19 games in Hurley's first year at the helm. Hurley joined UB from the University of Rhode Island where he served as associate head coach under his brother Dan.

A first-team All-American in 1993, he is best remembered for arguably being the best point guard in NCAA history. Hurley led the Blue Devils to three Final Four appearances and consecutive national championships in 1991 and 1992, and set the NCAA record for career assists with 1,076.

He was selected seventh in 1993 by the Sacramento Kings and played five years in the NBA with the Kings and Vancouver Grizzlies.

Hurley joined the Philadelphia 76ers as a scout in 2003 before venturing into private business. He was hired as an assistant coach at Wagner College in 2010 and spent two seasons with the Seahawks, playing a critical role in rebuilding the program. He helped lead Wagner to a 25-6 record during the 2011-12 season -- its best record in school history -- before joining Rhode Island, where he was associate head coach.

His father, Bob, Sr., is a legendary coach in the high school ranks, leading perennial power St. Anthony's to 26 state championships and more than 1,000 wins in 39 years of coaching. He was inducted into the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame in 2010. Hurley's brother, Dan, is the head men's basketball coach at UCONN, after successful tenures at UCONN and Wagner College and an outstanding prep school coaching career.

Hurley and his wife, Leslie, have two daughters, Cameron and Sydney, and a son, Bobby.



ASSOCIATE HEAD COACH JERMAINE KIMBROUGH THIRD SEASON

Jermaine Kimbrough enters his second season as the Associate Head Coach of Sun Devil Men's Basketball. He was promoted to the position by Bobby Hurley last off season. Kimbrough joined the staff in the Spring of 2021 and has hit the ground running, establishing himself as a force on the recruiting trail and an excellent developer of players.

The 2022-23 season had Kimbrough's fingerprints all over it, as Arizona State was one of the best defensive teams in the nation. They held opponents to just 39.9% shooting from the field, one of the lowest marks in the nation and tied for the second-best defensive effort in program history. Thanks in large part to the play of the defense, Arizona State won 23 games for the first time since 2009 and only the eighth time in program history. Kimbrough's ability to make adjustments in game has been a key factor in ASU going 11-5 in games decided by two possessions. He was instrumental in the improvement of Pac-12 All-Conference honoree Desmond Cambridge Jr. and continues to help emerging standout Jamiya Neal progress.

Kimbrough was a main reason for the midseason turnaround during the 2021-22 campaign, as the Sun Devils won seven of their final eight games of the regular season. This included completing a sweep of Oregon and Utah. It was sparked by a huge win over No. 3 UCLA, knocking off the Top-5 Bruins at a packed Desert Financial Arena. Kimbrough helped the team get prepared on the road, with ASU pulling off several impressive wins in tough environments. Arizona State defeated Creighton, Washington State, Colorado, in addition to the Ducks and Utes on the road.

The impact of Kimbrough's defensive mindset was apparent right away, with the Sun Devils holding 18 opponents under 40 percent shooting. ASU finished third in field goal percentage defense (692-of-1736/.399) -- behind only Arizona (.382) and USC (.389) -- and second in three-point defense (222-of-713/.311).

Arizona State finished with ten wins in conference play in Kimbrough's first season in Tempe, only the eighth time the program has reached double digit conference wins since the 1994-95 season. The Sun Devils had a Pac-12 All-Conference selection for the fifth consecutive year, with Kimbrough's expertise in player development helping keep the streak alive.

A native of northeast, Ohio, Kimbrough was an assistant coach for two seasons at Loyola-Chicago and the three prior seasons at the University of Wyoming. Kimbrough played a key role in helping the Ramblers to a 21-win season in 2019-20 and then the success of 2020-21 team that reached the Sweet Sixteen and went 26-5. Over the last four years, Loyola has compiled 99 wins.

Center Cameron Krutwig finished second in the voting for Larry Bird trophy as the 2019-20 MVC Player of the Year, earning first team all-league accolades, while freshman guard Marquise Kenney was chosen as the MVC Sixth Man of the Year. Tate Hall was hailed as a Third Team All-MVC pick and Lucas Williamson picked up MVC All-Defensive Team recognition.

During his three-year stint at Wyoming, Kimbrough helped lead the Cowboys to a pair of 20-win seasons, including an appearance in the College Basketball Invitational (CBI) in 2016-17, and developed two All-Mountain West Conference selections, Justin James and Hayden Dalton, who were honored on multiple occasions.

Before heading to Wyoming, Kimbrough, a 2001 graduate of Virginia Tech, spent one season at the University of Nevada, where he helped the Wolf Pack to a 24-win campaign in 2015-16. That season, Nevada captured the CBI title and also delivered four All-Mountain West Conference individual honors.

Kimbrough spent the bulk of his career at Cleveland State University, where he served nine seasons as an assistant coach under Gary Waters. During his tenure with the Vikings, Kimbrough was a key part of four postseason appearances, including a NCAA tournament and three trips to the National Invitation Tournament (NIT), and CSU racked up five 20-win campaigns. He helped recruit an abundance of talent to Cleveland State, including Norris Cole, who was a 2011 NBA Draft pick, as well as NBA players Bryn Forbes, Trey Lewis and Ike Nwamu.

Upon graduation, Kimbrough moved right into the coaching ranks, first serving as an assistant at Howard College from 2001-03 before moving on to Cleveland State as director of operations. After a season at CSU, he spent one year (2004-05) as the director of operations at Massachusetts and then one season at Purdue Fort Wayne (then IPFW) as an assistant coach before returning to Cleveland State.

Kimbrough began his playing career at St. Catherine College before transferring to Virginia Tech, where he played two seasons (1998-2000) before graduating with a degree in psychology. He was a prep standout at Shaker Heights High School in Cleveland, earning all-league honors on four occasions and all-city accolades three times. As a senior, he was a second team all-state designee after pouring in 26 points per game.

Kimbrough and his wife, Tameka, have five children.



ASSISTANT COACH NICK IRVIN SECOND SEASON (1ST AS ASSISTANT)

After serving as a Special Assistant to the Head Coach last season, Nick Irvin has been elevated to Assistant Coach. Irvin was an important resource for Coach Hurley a season ago, helping ASU win 23 games, including a win in the NCAA Tournament. This is Irvin's second stint as an Assistant Coach, previously serving in the role for two seasons at Western Illinois.

As part of his duties last year, Irvin was involved in game planning for opposing personnel as well as self scouting. Irvin was integral in the development of Frankie Collins and Jamiya Neal, who return to ASU as two of the most improved players in the Pac-12 Conference. Irvin's experience at the high school level and connections with the AAU scene have made him a successful recruiter. He has been essential in securing several marquee transfers since his promotion and has created momentum in the recruitment of several decorated high school prospects.

In his role as Assistant Coach at Western Illinois, Irvin was responsible for recruiting prospective student-athletes and coordinating the team's defensive strategies in addition to player development. Western Illinois saw a huge jump from year one to year two with Irvin on staff, improving their win total by nine games. Irvin also spearheaded the efforts to land the highest-rated recruiting class in program history.

The 2021-22 campaign started with a road win at Nebraska and ended with a 16-16 record. The 16 wins were the most by the Leathernecks since the 2012-13 season, with Irvin and company leading the program to a postseason appearance in The Basketball Classic Tournament.

Under the guidance of Irvin, the Leathernecks brought in a pair of transfers that made an instant impact. Guard Trenton Massner was a Second-Team All Summit selection while also being named to the All-Newcomer team and All-Defensive team. Luka Barisic earned All-Summit League Honorable Mention distinction while also joining Massner on the All-Newcomer team.

Irvin is part of Chicago basketball royalty, with his late father Mac sponsoring one of the most recognizable AAU programs in the nation, the Mac Irvin Fire. He followed in his father's footsteps, making an impact in the Chicago basketball scene. Irvin was the Head Coach of Morgan Park High School for 12 seasons prior to his time with Western Illinois. During his tenure, the Mustangs compiled a 301-70 record, including two separate back-to-back IHSA Class 3A State Title runs in 2013-14 and 2017-18.

Thanks to his efforts at Morgan Park, Irvin received numerous Coach of the Year awards. He was recognized as the Chicago Public School Coach of the Year four times and was the 2013 NFHS Illinois Coach of the Year. After the state title run in 2017, USA Today tabbed him as the Coach of the Year. Not only did his teams succeed on the court, but 100% of the graduating members of the Boys Varsity team were accepted into college.



ASSISTANT COACH YUSUF ALI FIRST SEASON

Yusuf Ali is entering his first season as an assistant Coach with the men's basketball program at Arizona State University.

Prior to joining ASU, Ali served as an assistant Coach at Simon Fraser University. Under his guidance, the team earned signature wins, defeating No. 1 seed Saint Martin's (64-63), Western Washington (82-80 & 78-76), and local rival UBC (90-82) in an impressive Buchanan Cup triumph, securing a spot in the playoffs. Notably, all of his graduates signed professional contracts in the off-season. This year, Ali has played a pivotal role in recruiting a talented class of players at ASU, bolstering the teams roster.

Before his tenure at SFU, Ali co-founded and served as the head coach of the Toronto Basketball Academy and DeepEnd Training from 2012 to 2020. His leadership was instrumental in TBA's outstanding record of 32-6 during his two years as head coach between 2019-2021.

Renowned for his focus on player development, Ali has mentored and coached some of Canada's top basketball talents, many of whom have gone on to play in the NCAA and professional leagues around the world.

As a former athlete, Ali was a standout player in U-Sports Basketball, representing the Ryerson Rams and achieving a National Championship with Seneca College in 2018. His exceptional performance earned him accolades, including the titles of CCAA Tournament MVP, OCAA Tournament MVP, and OCAA 1st Team All-Star during that season.

He made a lasting impression against Zion Williamson, RJ Barrett and the Duke Blue Devils in the 2018-19 season when he scored 12 points and dished out 5 assists in a 86-67 loss at the Hershey Center in Toronto.

Ali has completed his undergraduate studies at Laurentian University in Business Management. He is the older brother of Ahmed Ali who recently finished playing at University of Portland averaging 18 points and 3 assists.
